THE death of Judge Newman of the supreme court will make it necessary to have an election in April for his successor, as an appointee can only serve until the people have an opportunity to elect. It is altogether probable that Justice Bardeen will be elected by the people, but it is just as well for the people to have a check of that kind in their hands, else at some time a man might get on the bench by appointment who could never be elected. Under the present system there is little danger that any governor would appoint an unworthy man to the position, for the refusal of the people of the state to endorse the appointment would be a worse verdict against the governor than against the judge.

JUDGE CHARLES V. BARDEEN of Wausau has been appointed by Gov. Scofield to fill the vacancy in the supreme court made by the death of Judge Newman. Judge Bardeen has occupied the bench of the Sixteenth circuit nearly seven years and ranks as one of the best circuit judges in the state.
