VILLAGE ORDINANCE

Sec. 1. M. and A. Rosenheimer of Kewaskum, Wis., their successors or assigns are hereby authorized to build and maintain all lines of wire and other electric appliances and machinery for the generation and transmission of electricity for the purpose of furnishing light, heat, power and signals in the streets, alleys, tunnels and public grounds of this village.

Sec. 2. All wire built and maintained by said firm shall be strung at least twenty-two feet above the surface of the ground in the streets and alleys of said village.

Sec. 3. To build and maintain a trench to convey steam for heating power purposes in the streets, alleys, tunnels and public grounds of this village, said trench to be built so as not to interfere with any sewer or gutter.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall be in force from and after its publication.
