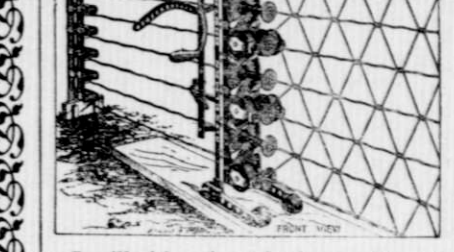

FARM AND GARDEN.

Bait Your Own Horse Power.

When the bottom fell out of the horse market a few years ago many farmers not only quit breeding horses but sold their best mares, says a writer in the Prairie Farmer. Now these same farmers are beginning to buy their work horses. While it may not pay to raise horses for the market under present conditions, it certainly does pay to have enough horses to furnish the necessary horsepower for the farm. It is decided to purchase to hitch two teams together which are continuously working at each other and it is still more profitable to purchase the best horses to be put to work together. The trouble extends from sundry skirmishes when in the harvest season the horse power is needed for another, making it necessary to lay him off two or three days, perhaps.
