Double-Tracking a Transcontinental Railway.

An article in the National Magazine of October, by H. J. Cleveland, treats at length the progress of improved rail-roading and especially refers to the C. & N.W. line since it has grown from the infant Galena & Chicago Union railway to its present proportions. It gives complete details of double-tracking between Chicago and Omaha. It says that in 1901 the 492 miles of double track will be ready for service, 213 miles of which is already in operation.

An idea of the immense expenditures of the work may be obtained from the following: The construction work (including the steel bridge 2,688 feet long, which will cost \$600,000) will amount to \$1,250,000. Sixty locomotives, 1,000 cars and 1,600 men are necessary in the construction work.

The Union Pacific railroad, the through connection of the North-Western with the Pacific coast, is rapidly double-tracking a considerable portion of its line and straightening out many curves. Through vestibuled passenger trains carrying the newly created travel for the Philippines, China and Japan, for Hawaii and Guam, speed from Chicago to San Francisco and Portland without interruption. The influence of the Orient and its coming remarkable trade is already felt by this great railway system of the West.
