





CITIZEN ARMY FOR AUSTRALIA

New Federation Taking Steps to Provide for National Defense.

The idea of a citizen army for the Australian Commonwealth is taking a very strong hold of a large section of the people, writes the Melbourne correspondent of the London Express. The scheme which seems most likely to be adopted, is that formulated by Brig.-Gen. Gordon, commandant of the South Australian forces, under which every man who is physically fit and between the ages of 18 and 21 will be taught to shoot, will undergo an army training for shoot, will undergo an army training for a certain number of weeks every year, and will undertake to join the ranks of the Federal Volunteer army whenever

The federal government would, under this scheme, provide instruction, arms, accounterments, ammunition and uniform, and would pay each man who made himself efficient a bonus of £10 to £30 a year for non-coms, and regular

Each state would raise sufficient men o guarantee immunity against attack by a foreign foe and would supply the needs of the empire in the event of any such emergency as that which in South Africa has found so loyal and enthusiastic response. Under this scheme it is calculated that it would not be difficult to raise within five years a capable and efficient citizen army of 300,000 men.






