# BIG SUM IS MISSING.

Wife of the Late Dr. Davison of Chicago Said Her Husband

Had \$14,500. Kenosha, Wis., April 11.-[Special.]-Mrs. Lucy P. Davison of Chicago appeared in the county court in this city and applied for the appointment of herself as administratrix of the estate of her husband, the late Dr. William M. W. Davison of Chicago, who died in this city on March 2. There is quite a mystery in connection with the affair. Dr. Davison was the head of the National Medical college in Chicago, and a short time before his death he left his home in Chicago very suddenly. He told his wife that he was going around the corner to get a postage stamp, and this was the last heard of him until he was discovered at the home of his mother in this city. No one seems to know how he reached Kenosha and it is possible that he wandered about several days before reaching the city. In her petition demanding an administration, Mrs. Davison states that at the time he doctor left Chicago he had in his possession \$14,500 worth of personal property in the way of stocks and cash. Since his death not one cent of this large amount has been located. Whether the deceased doctor was the victim of a daring robbery or whether the property was delivered to someone in this city, no one seems able to state. While Mrs. Davison had been appointed administratrix of the estate of her husband in Cook county, no effort had been made to settle the estate in this county. The widow of Dr. Davison is the only heir at law to the estate and for some time before his death it is said that the relations existing between the doctor and his wife were very strained. For this reason it is thought possible that the doctor disposed of his personal property among his friends and relatives in Kenosha.

MENTALLY UNSTRUNG.

Soldiers will Not Obey His Erratic Commands-Great Distress in His Army.

Cape Town, April 11.-Gen. Christian Dewet has been superseded by Gen. Louis Botha, who has reopened peace negotiaons with Lord Kitchener. Dewet is now mere automaton. The rapid failure of his mental qualities and the numberless efeats which he sustained in his daring "For years I suffered intense pain in the region of the heart. that he assumed the responsibility for the negotiations for the entire Boer forces. Dewet capable of holding the command. A short conference was held between Gen. Botha and his staff, with the result that an announcement was the result that an announcement was made that Botha would take the chief command and that he would personally attend to the progress of all negotiations. The soldiers from the camp told many strange stories of the condition of mind of their leader. They affirmed that yesterday he had ordered them to advance to the siege of Cape Town, and in less than two hours after had announced that negotiations were completed and that the war was at an end. He then ordered the soldiers to disband, and upon his com-mands not being obeyed fell into a rage and ordered several out to be shot. They were taken away from the camp to humor him, returning after dark. He is said to be afflicted with sudden fits of melancholy and is constantly craving for violent action of some description.




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
