Washington, D. C., Sept. 5.—A reply has been received at the navy depart-ment from Capt. Forsyth to the letter calling his attention to an alleged inter-view published on the subject of the Schley court of inquiry. The follow-ing statement of the character of the reply was made at the department:





Not that the roulette and trente-et-quarante tables lack patrons, but the fact is that a number of the patrons have taken to winning largely, thereby upset-ting all the bank's calculations. A cer-tain baron is said to have won £50,000 this season, and his coolness and im-mense capital make the bankers despair of recouping the loss. When he loses he plans on calmly until luck changes, as it is sure to do in time. Nevertheless, it is usually calculated that to win at Monte Carlo requires a capital about 250 times as large as one's winnings. On the other hand, the small players, who start with hand, the small players, who start will £100 or so apiece, are almost sure to "go broke." A short run of ill luck cleans them out, and "the subsequent proceed-ings interest them no more." It is from these small fry that the bank derived its net gain of £900,000 last season.
