According to Prof. Forel, who has made a special study of the Alpine glaciers during the past twenty-five years, the day of the glacier is gone. They are deteriorating slowly, but with steady persistence, and diminution becomes more marked from year to year. There is only one exception to this rule—that of Bovier, in the Valley of Entremont, which is ince 1892 has shown continuous growth. The famous glaciers of the Rhone have shrunk 755 meters since 1874, or an average of 29 meters a year. Many have so changed during the past few years that old tourists after a few seasons of absence have failed to recognize them. Some hotels once standing in the immediate proximity of glaciers are now at a considerable distance from them—to the serious loss of the proprietors.
