

## CANNON HITS AT NINETY MILES

London, May 8.-The St. Petersburg Prof. Bierkeland Demonstrates Power of Gun Before Experts. Berlin, May 8 .- Prof. K. Bierkeland, the Norwegian physicist, has been in Berlin recently for the purpose of demonstrating the powers of his electromagnetic cannon before a number of experts in electrical artillery. The results of the demonstrations have been so convincing that a firm of artillery manufacturers has bought the invention for immediate exploitation. Theoretically the device can throw a projectile weighing two tons a distance of ninety miles, or the properties of the convention of the convention of the contract two tons a distance of ninety miles, or even further, by sufficiently prolonging the tube. The projectile is expelled from an ordinary cast iron tube thickly wrapped with copper wire. This tube can, of course, be made more cheaply than the cannon now in use. No ex-plosive gases results from the discharge of the new gun.
