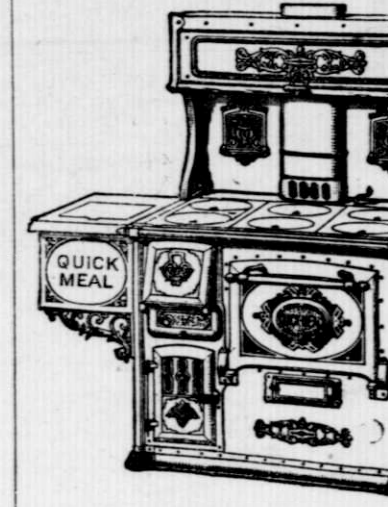

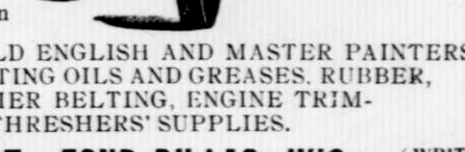

BOILER GOES THROUGH HOTEL.

One Death Results From Explosion in a Foundry at Adell, Wisconsin.

Last Monday evening the boiler in the Charles Helming foundry at Adell, Wis., exploded and the force of the explosion split the boiler through the side of the boiler house and into the Burke hotel, where Mrs. William Burke lay in bed.

The dead are: Raymond Whiting, aged 8 years, killed by flying iron. The injured: Mrs. William Burke, nose broken, arm fractured, and internally injured; David Hoff, leg and arm broken; internally injured; Chas. Helming, owner of foundry, injured about the head and body, scalp cut, and arms bruised; Anton Helming, shoulder dislocated and bruised about head and body; William Burk, owner of Burke's hotel, bruised about the head and face; Mrs. R. T. Franey, burned about the face and hands, body bruised.
