Now the American povernment has violated its word and hence has compromised the honor of the American people. The disapproval of the Hay-Herran treaty was due to constitutional obstructions, which can be legally re-moved by the Colombian people and which were made worse by the diplomatic discourtesies of the department of state and its representatives here.
