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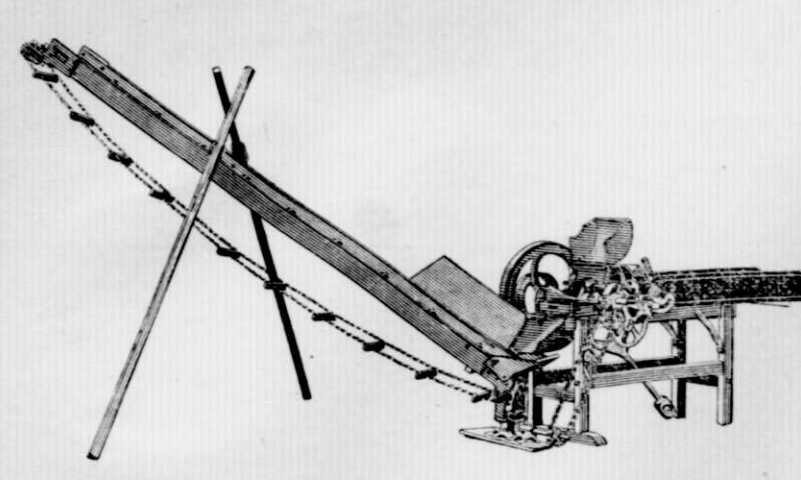

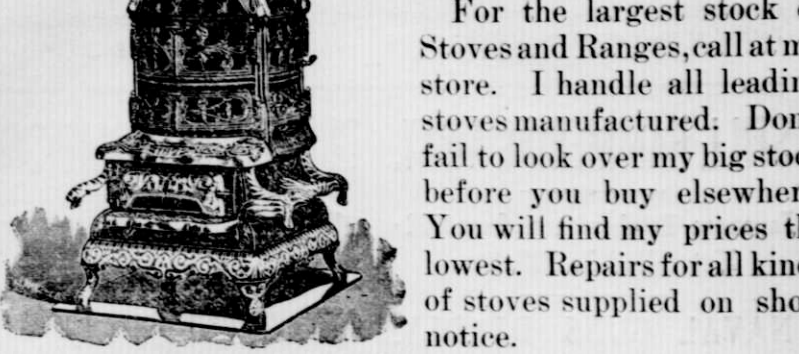

The board of trustees met in regular monthly session with President Stark in the chair. All members present except trustee Besbier. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. Bills were allowed as follows:

Well Known Engineer Dead.

John Fox, one of the oldest and best known engineers on this division of the C. & N. W. R'y., who was fatally injured at Van Dyne, Wis., last Wednesday afternoon, died at the St. Agnes Hospital at Fond du Lac last Thursday at 1:45 p. m. Fox was in charge of the engine pulling passenger train No. 16, which is due here from the north at 6 p. m. His skull was crushed while he sat leaning out of the cab window. His train was passing through Van Dyne at the rate of forty miles an hour and the swinging arm of a mail car struck the unfortunate engineer on the side of the head. He sank in his seat insensible. The train sped on for a mile before Fireman Jacob Krueger discovered the engineer's plight. He was 54 years of age and had been an engineer on the road for thirty years. Until recently he held a high office in the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers.

Census Next Year.

Next year the decennial census of the state of Wisconsin will be taken under direction of the secretary of state and notices have already been issued. The census will be taken by town, village and city clerks, who will receive \$1.50 for every hundred names. They will make their returns to the county clerks, who will receive \$3.50 per 1000 names for copying lists. The expense of making the enumeration of about 2,200,000 people, the approximate population of the state will be \$4,170. In addition to this is all the work in the secretary of state's office, printing, etc., which will bring the cost of taking the census up to or above \$100,000. The population in 1895, according to the state census was 1,937,915. In 1885 it was 1,686,880, and the gain in the succeeding decade was a little short of 15 per cent.
