Port Arthur Delivery Completed. Washington, D. C., Jan. 12.—The Japanese legation has received a cable-gram from Tokio, dated today, saying that Gen. Nogi reports that the delivery at Port Arthur has been completed. It includes the following: Permanent forts. 50: guns, 546, of which 54 are of large caliber; 140 of medium caliber and 345 of small caliber; cannon balls, \$2,670; am-mantiton, 30,000 kilos; rithes, 35,252; horses, 1920; battleships, 4, except Sevastopol, which is extinely sunk; cruisers, 2; gunboats and destroy-ers, 14; steamers, 10, etc., besides small steam-ers, 35 of which will be serviceable after little repairs.

in East Africa.

The animal kingdom in British East Africa looks upon the 2100 miles of tele graph wire strung through that region as an innovation to be utilized. The wires arouse curiosity and stimulate experimentation. A number of genera and no end of species are trying to find the adaptation of the telegraph to their speetal purposes; and so the routine of the telegraph business is more or less crowd-ed with incidents of an unusual char-acter, some of which are mentioned in the latest official report. This speaks of monkeys as incorrigible. Many of them have been shot and thousands frightened.

monkeys as incorrigible. Many of them have been shot and thousands frightened, but they cannot get over the idea that the wires are merely a new facility for their athletic performances in midair. They have ceased to pay much attention to the locomotive, and even the shrieks of the whistle are not permitted to inter-fere much with the fun of swinging on the wire. Three wires are strung on the same line of poles for 584 miles between the Indian ocean and Victoria Nyanza, giving an opportunity for more com-plicated performances. The Kikuyu for-est is mentioned as a place where mon-keys, in their evolutions, sometimes suc-ceeded in twisting the wires together. The gentle giraffe is also a source of The gentle giraffe is also a source annoyance. He sometimes app annoyance. annoyance. The sometimes applie enough muscular energy to the bracke on which the wire is fastened to twist i around, stretching the wire and causin it to foul with other wires. The hippo obtained is also a nuisance, because rubs up against the poles and sometim knocks them over.

knocks them over. These creatures, however, do not steal the wire. Thievery was the greatest evil with which the telegraph builders had to contend, and the evil has only recently been suppressed. When the copper wire was stretched northeast from Victoria Nyanza, through the Nsoga country, the natives cut out considerable lengths of it: and at one time about forty miles of hatives cut out considerable lengths of it; and at one time about forty miles of wire were carried away and never recov-ered. Passing caravans found also that they could help themselves along the way by cutting the wire and using it in the barter trade. The temptation was great and not always resisted, for wire would buy anything the natives had to sell. A great deal of energy was expended in stamping out wire stealing and it now

great deal of energy was expended in stamping out wire stealing and it now seems to be a thing of the past. Fifty-nine offices are receiving and sending telegrams in British East Africa and Uganda. Wires connect the seacoast with Albert Nyanza, where Emin Pasha was so long cut off from the world by the Mahdists. Telephone messages are constantly being sent between Mombasa, on the coast, and Nairobi, 328 miles in-land and the telegramh business last land, and the telegraph business last year amounted to 42,759 messages.-New York Sun.




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
