Rural Route System. Washington county is in the near future to have a rural mail delivery system which will reach every inhabitant and bring the mail to every door. S. A. MacSwain, an inspector of rural routes, is in the city this week to go over the county with a view of laying out such additional routes as may be required to cover the entire county. But as the roads are not in a condition to allow the trips to be made he may not be able to proceed with his work and will no doubt be obliged to delay his work until a more favorable time. When Mr. MacSwain gets through with his work there will not be included in one of the routes, unless it be such where there are no farm homes on it. Mr. MacSwain is not in a position to state when the system which he will map out will be put in operation. It will take him some time to travel over the county and divide the territory into routes which can be served by one carrier each and every day. The county now has twenty rural routes, but in order to go to the county system a number of routes must be added. But while the farmers of the county are to get this valuable system, up to the present time, we are told, they have not shown any appreciation of it, insofar as they have sorely neglected their roads. Whether it is a fault of theirs or the neglect of the road commissioners was not stated, but the fact remains that the roads are in a very poor condition in the opinion of the rural route service officials.—Pilot.


