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## Japanese and Russians Have Different Map Nomenclature.

A great deal of the difficulty which the ordinary reader experiences in following the reports of the operations in Manchuria is caused by the employment in them of different names for the same place, according to the sources from which they come. An example is to be found in this morning's dispatches in which the name is called in the Russian account Bentsiap, the one being Manchou and the other Chinese. The names Tsingtau and Peking scattered over the maps are not names proper, but the designation of a natural feature, in which Tsingtau is "Ta" being apparently the Manchu form of the Chinese word "Ta", and "ing" being the word for pass. The "ling" follows a name proper generally where the pass is the designation from an adjoining village, or the mountain on which it is situated.
