OVER HUNDRED PERSONS GO DOWN WITH FLOATING DOCK AT OMAHA CELEBRATION.

SIX BODIES RECOVERED

List of Injured Is Long and There Are Five on the Roll of Those Missing.

OMAHA, Neb., July 5.—Six bodies, those of five young women of Omaha and an unidentified man, were recovered today from the waters of Lake Manawa, where, last night, more than 100 persons, while watching a display of fireworks on the lake, were precipitated into sixteen feet of water from a floating dock.

NEW HEIR IN GERMANY

BOY BORN TO CROWN PRINCESS ON FOURTH OF JULY.

Fatherland Rejoices and Will Have Occasion to Celebrate the Same Day We Observe.

BERLIN, July 5.—Crown Princess Frederick William was safely accouched of a son at 9:15 Wednesday morning. The boy is well formed and strong. The news of the birth of his grandson was communicated to Emperor William by means of a wireless dispatch from Kiel to the steamer Hamburg, on which his majesty is proceeding to Trondheim, Norway. There was great rejoicing at Potsdam. Germany will have reason to celebrate July 4, in the future. Then the city knew that an heir presumptive had been born.

OSZARCA STOP REVOLT

TAKING UNPRECEDENTED STEP OF ORDERING GRAND DUKE TO QUELL 'DISORDERS.'

Riotous Scene in Parliament Turns Out Victory for Government and Shows Up a Factional Split.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 5.—Emperor Nicholas has taken the almost unprecedented step of publicly directing Grand Duke Nicholas Nikolaievitch, commander of the forces in the military district of St. Petersburg, to investigate and take measures to stop the "disorders" among the troops.

Weekly Weather Bulletin.

(For week ending Monday, July 2, 1906)

The weather during the week ending July 2, 1906, was generally partly cloudy to cloudy with moderately high temperature and abundant precipitation.

The week opened with generally fair weather and moderate temperature, but during Monday afternoon and night an area of unsettled, showery weather spread over the state.

Showers and thunderstorms with nearly stationary temperature continued during Tuesday and Wednesday. By Thursday morning the temperature had become high and the weather continued very warm and sultry until Friday afternoon.

Severe electric storms with some heavy rainfalls were reported in various parts of the state during Thursday night and Friday afternoon. These latter storms caused much cooler weather. The last two days of the week were generally partly cloudy with moderate temperature.

The mean temperature for the week was from two to five degrees above the normal in the southern and central sections and slightly below the normal in the northern section.

The highest temperature for the week occurred at most stations on Thursday, the 28th, when maxima of 90 degrees to 92 degrees were recorded at many places.

The total precipitation for the week was considerably above the normal, the fall being heaviest in the western half of the state and lightest in the interior of the northeastern part.

According to the showing made from extensive experiments, under the supervision of the agricultural department of the University of Wisconsin, sulphate of iron sprinkled over the growing crops of farms will prove to the farmers' salvation from the greatest pest of agriculture, the Canada thistle and wild mustard.

The university scientists have striven for years to eradicate these evils without demonstrated success and it has been estimated that the increase in value of land without the thistle and mustard would average \$25 an acre.

The importation of a spraying machine from Germany has made it possible to spray an acre of land at a net cost of 50 cents.
