Is Held Without Bail.

Poole was arraigned in court for his month. preliminary hearing this morning. An adjournment was taken until Thursday, June 11, and the prisoner is being held

June 11, and the prisoner is being held without bail. Poole waited in his pew until the con-gregation began leaving the church, where the benediction had just been pro-nounced by the pastor. Rev. Sabin Hal-sey, who was for years the pastor of the Grand Avenue M. E. church in Milwau-Grand Avenue M. E. church in Milwau-kee and for ten years in charge of the Division Street M. E. church here, be-fore committing the crime. He fell in behind Mrs. Orvis who was just then greeting all of her friends with gracious smiles as she passed out of the edifice. In the crowded vestibule, Poole drew a revolver and fired three shots at the woman. Two of the bullets went wild, one of them striking the door and other narrowly missing Mrs. W. Atkins. A third struck Mrs. Orvis in the back. The ring of the shots mingled with the

final notes of the organ postlude. Mrs. Orvis sank to the floor. The women of the congregation turned their attention to reviving her, but there their effort were unavailing. A doctor reached her side in a short time after the shooting and after a few minutes' examination ounced that life was extinct.

Shrieks Like an Animal.

Ir the meantime, Poole, with a cry that sounded more like that of an infu-riated animal than anything else, sprang from the church and ran toward the ledge. Poole then came out of his hiding and, throwing down his weapon, and hold his hands in the air said: "Don't shoot!"

Poole was then handcuffed and taken to the Fond du Lac county jail. There were many threats of lynching among the angry villazers of Oakfield, but they were persuaded to permit the sheriff to take the man to jail alive.
