

GOV. PHILIPP STOPS PRISON TWINE SALE

STEP TAKEN AFTER PROBE BY EXPERTS SHOWS MANY UNCOLLECTIBLE ACCOUNTS.

SUFFRAGE BILL VOTED DOWN

Assembly Defeats Measure Similar to One Passed by Legislature of 1913 and Vetted by Gov. McGovern.

Madison, April 21, 1915.

The sale of binder twine by the Wisconsin state prison has been stopped by Gov. E. L. Philipp following an investigation of the affairs of the plant by experts commanded by the governor.

The action by the governor was taken at the conclusion of the hearing before the legislative investigating committee in the governor's office, which was attended by members of the board of control and several members of the legislature.

At this hearing the reports of investigators employed by the governor, were submitted showing upwards of \$50,000 on the books of the twine plant of which about 50 per cent is considered uncollectible.

The plan for adjournment until next January, which has been a feature of every session for the last half dozen years, has made its appearance.

Several new bills have been introduced in the senate. One provides for a county referendum vote on bond issues.

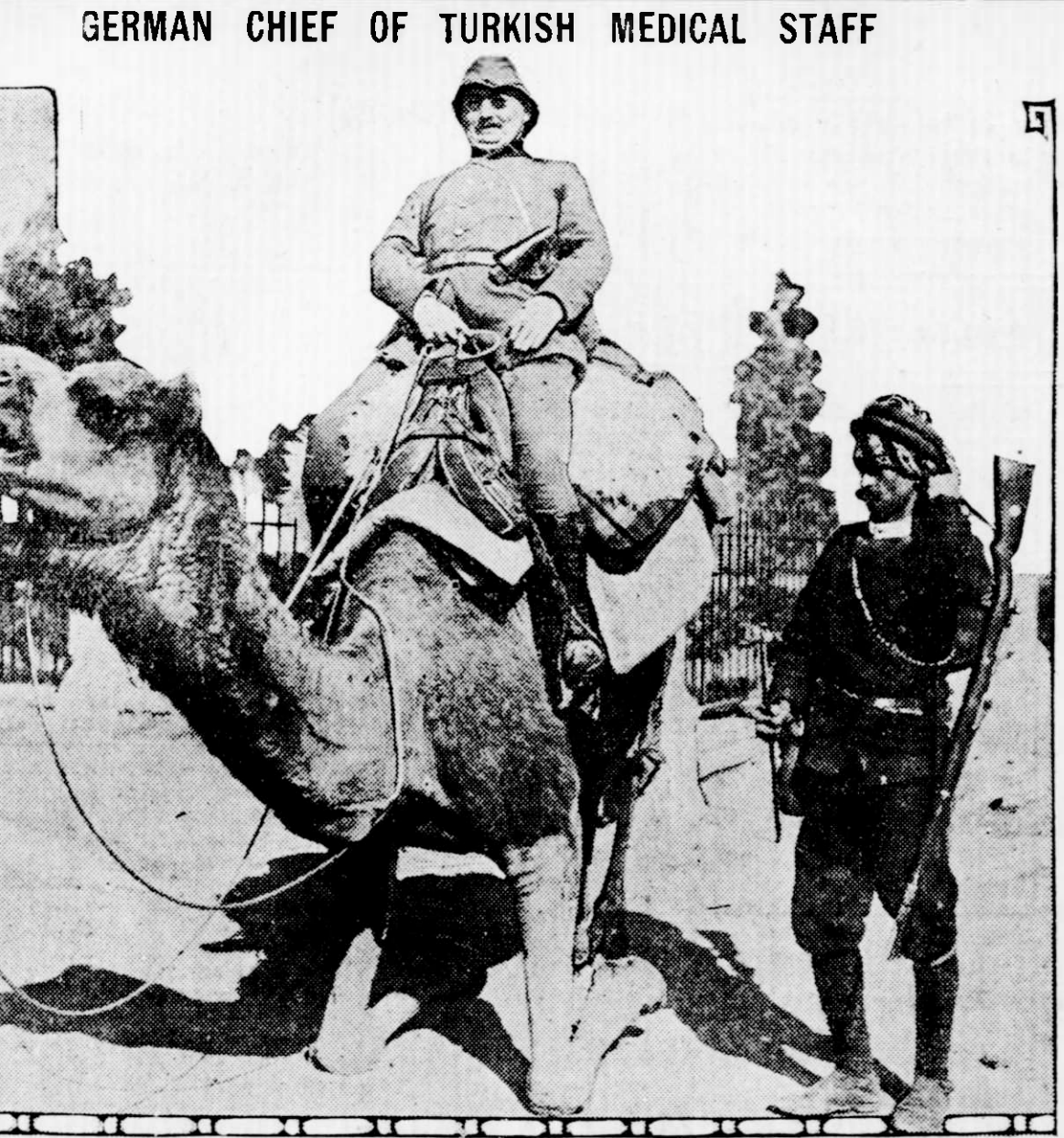

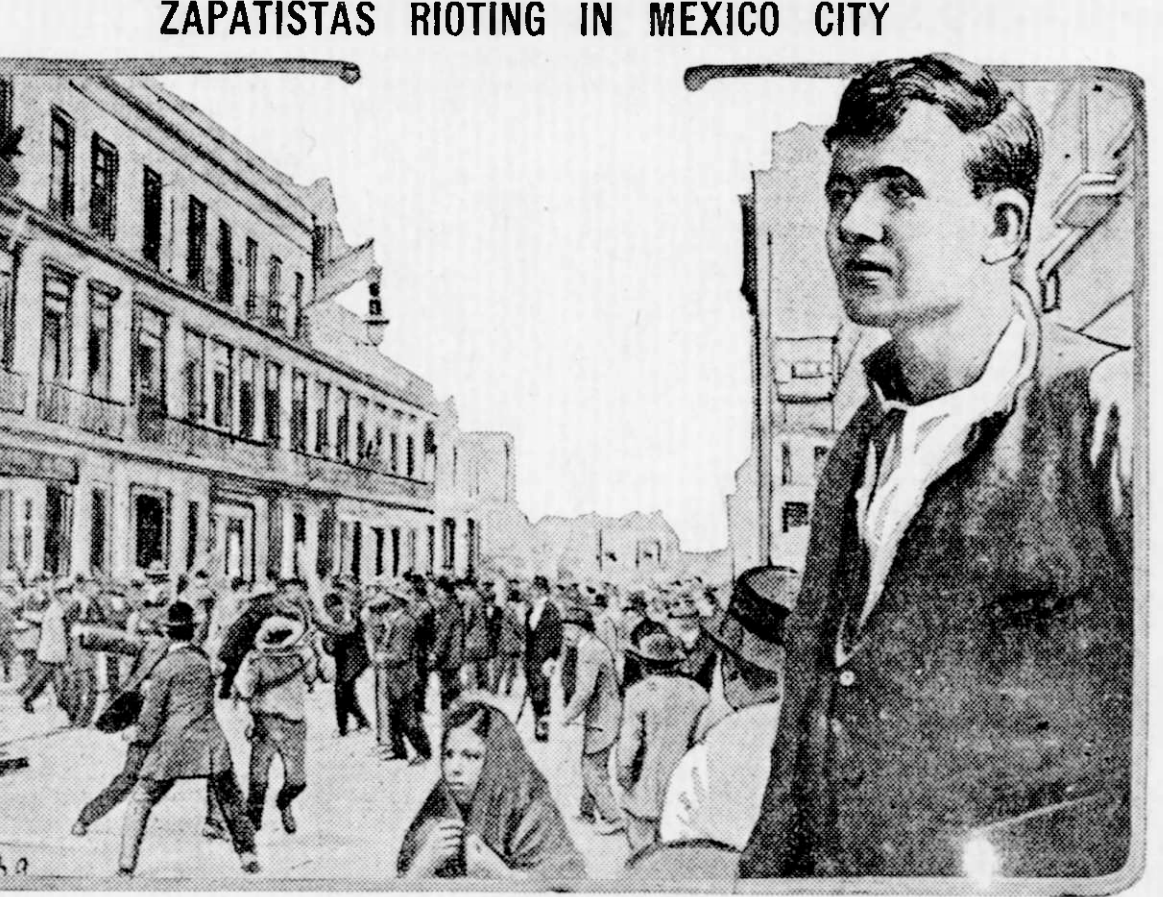

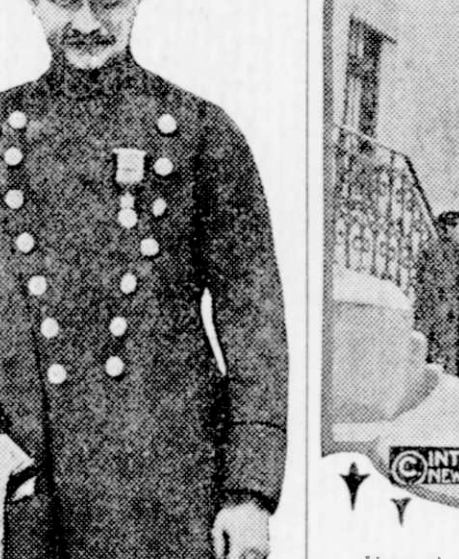


Doctor Ingells, the German medical chief of the Turkish army, is here seen in the desert on the back of Hedshi, the biggest camel in the Ottoman army.
