MOBS IN ITALY ATTACK FRENCH

Riots Spread Throughout Country; Troops Smash Crowds in Rome.

SCHANZER GABLES A DENIAL

Declares Briand Did Not Pronounce Single Word Even Remotely Offensive to Italy in the Arms Conference Debate.

Rome, Nov. 29 .- Anti-French demonstrations spread to Rome when 500 students attempted to hold a meeting in front of the French embassy. The students refused to halt when ordered by police, and cavalry charged the mob, dispersing them.

The Rome demonstration followed similar ones in Turin, Venice, Florence and Genoa, which were caused by a report that Premier Briand at the Washington arms conference had made slighting remarks concerning the Italian army.

Fruits of all kinds are essential for good health. Fresh fruits, when rea-

sonable in price will be preferable; but the dried fruits are always in market, and many unusual and easily prepared recipes will be found to serve

vour purpose very satisfactorily. Fruit Bread .- Slft together one cupful of flour, one and one-fourth cupfuls of graham flour, one tablespoonful of sugar, four teaspoonfuls of baking powder, one teaspoonful of salt. Add five tablespoonfuls of shortening. bent two eggs until light : add one cuoful of milk and one-fourth of a cupful of molasses. Stir into the dry mixture and add three-fourths of a cupful of chopped figs, one-fourth of a cupful of chopped dates and six prunes chopped fine. Pour into a well-greased bread pan, and let stand 30 minutes. Bake in a moderate oven 40 minutes. Let stand 24 hours before using. Ones fourth of a cupful of nuts may be added If desired Prune Stuffing for Goose .- Mix two

cupfuls of stale bread crumbs with two-thirds of a cupful of melted shortening one teaspoonful of salt, oneeighth of a teaspoonful of pepper and one and one-half teaspoonfuls of sage. Add one apple peeled and chopped and one cupful of stewed, drained, stoned and chopped prunes. Moisten with prune julce and use for filling the goost

Jellied Prune Whip .- Wash and cover with cold water one-half pound of prunes, and simmer slowly until tender. Add one-half cupful of sugar and simmer five minutes longer. Drain, saving the fuice; remove the stones and cut the prunes into very small pleces. Soak two tablespoonfuls of gelatine in one-fourth of a cupful of cold water for five minutes, and stir Into the hot prane juice. Add the juice of one large lemon, and cool until beginning to thicken, then whip until light and foamy. Fold in the prines and the stiffly beaten whites of two eggs. Pour into a mold or serving dish and serve very cold.

here Baby Christ Lay in Bethlehem. GIRLS and boys of Italy and Spain, which are called the Latin countries, never hang up their stockings at Christmas time, nor do they have Christmas trees. Kris Kringle and Santa Claus are German saints and the Christmas tree came out of the German forests long, long ago, when the nations of northern Europe were forest tribes. It is the northern peoples-the Germans, Scandinavians and English, all of whom are descended from old Teutonic tribes-who keep Christmas as Americans do.

Presipio," Instead of Christmas

Is Representation of the Place

Tree, in Italy and Spain.

Instead of the Christmas tree. Italian and Spanish boys and giris have the presipio. "Presipio" means manger, and it is a representation of the manger where the baby Christ lay in Bethlehem. It is presented in different ways. Sometimes it shows only the inside of the barn where the Baby and His mother lay, with Joseph, the Three Wise Men and the animals about. Sometimes it shows a billside, with the Wise Mon coming on foot or horseback, or on donkeys, bringing their gifts to the stable. Sometimes the manger is small-not more than a foot square. Sometimes it is large enough to occupy the whole end of a room. It is built on a board foundation and is made of wood. with earth, pebbles, dried grass and leaves for the outdoor scenes. The figures are carved of wood, or perhaps little dolls are used, all very carefully and elaborately dressed by the girls. Sometimes brooks and lakes are ingeniously represented with paper, glass or isinglass. Sometimes the whole is rough and rude, but again it is very neatly and beautifully done, and is quaint and interesting when all complete. The French, who are half Latin and

half Teutonic in their makeup, mix the customs of both races in their Christmas keeping. They build the manger and they also give the children presents; only, instead of hanging her stocking, little French Babotte puts out her shoes. The French call the manger "creche," and in country villages in France companies of children still go from house to house on Christmas eve, carrying the creche and singing Christmas carols. Sometimes they help to build a beautiful large croche in the village church, over which they are very proud and dolighted.
