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



#### Explored Caves From Boyhood.

Floyd Collins had been a cave explorer since he was a little boy. He was born on a farm five miles from Kand cave, where the Collins family still lives, and as nearly as his father can remember Floyd has seldom been away from the cave country.

When just hig enough to handle a plow, his mule one day sank to his knees in what has since been known as Mule cave and Floyd's cave enthusiasm was started.

Some of those among the early reseners who talked with Floyd said he described his new-found cavern as "the most beautiful I have ever seen." With the finding of Collin's lifeiess form it was realized that Collins' droom of three weeks ago was a presentment which had come true.

"I dreamed I was caught in rock and the angels came and took me away, he had told his tepmother, Mrs. Jane Collins, three weeks ago, after having announced to her that he had before him two days of the most dangerous cave exploring he had ever attempted. Mrs. Collins had urged Floyd to abandon his intentions to explore Sand cave.

Collins came to his death "from exposure caused by being accidentally entrapped in what is commonly known as Sand cave," a coroner's jury declared after each member of the jury had inspected Collins' Body.

The verdict was read into the record of the military court of inquiry which has been seeking to establish the identity of the imprisoned man beyond any doubt.

the place of meat. Green Pepper Omelet. -Wash six green peppers, remove the seeds and white fiber, break into smail pieces and saute in four tablespoonfuls of butter until ten

der. Beat two eggs and add onefourth cupful of milk, taree-fourths cupfuls of grated cheese, salt one-half teaspoonful, and one-eighth teaspoonful of paprika. Cook over a slow fire until the omelet is a golden brown on the bottom. Run a spatial around under the omelet, make a slight inclsion on opposite sides and fold over. Turn on a het platter and serve at once.

Peasants' Omelet .- Melt three tablespoonfuls of butter in a double boiler, add one tablespoonful of flour, and when well-blended and smooth add one teaspoonful of salt and oneeighth of a teaspoonful of pepper. Add one cupful of cold diced potatoes. Beat six eggs until light and pour into a well-buttered omelet pan. Cook slowly, lifting the mixture often at the sides. When the mixture begins may be moistened very slightly with a cream sauce. String beans, peas or other vegetables may be used, but should be hot when spread over the omelet.

Shirred Eggs .-- Blend together one cupful of mashed potatoes, one-half supful of cooked minced ham, onehalf teaspoonful of sait, one-fourth tenspoonful of pepper, and one beaten egg; mix well and cover the bottom of buttered baking dish. Break five eggs over the potato mixture, making depression to held each. Dot with bits of butter, dust with salt and pepper and bake until the ezzs are firm.

Dinner Cheese .- Put through a meat olives; add one cream cheese, and when well blended add two cupfuls of grated American cheese. Season well with salt, roll in a long roll and decorate with a few thinly sliced stuffed olives. Pass on a cheese plate with

Baked Ham and Sweet Potatoes .-Grease the bottom of a round baking dish and place a slice of ham about one-half inch in thickness in it. Pepper and sprinkle with a few cloves. Spread with mashed sweet polato to the depth of the ham. Season the potatoes with butter and pepper, then add another slice of ham and top off with potato and finish with a third

Orange-Cider Frappe.-Boil together one and one-half cupfuls of sugar and two cupfuls of water for five minutes. Add one quart of aweet cider, two cupfuls of orange juice; cool, strain and freeze to a mush.
