## FARM VISITORS AT WEST POINT, MISS.

Charles Garbisch and a number of others from Sheboygan county, who left last week for Mississippi as delegates to the dairy industry at that county are having an interesting trip on their tour of inspection, as they are ready to give by a letter received at this office from the members of the committee which was publishing in the interest of our readers an entirely different country from the one we had visited around Genoa. An open gently undulating prairie surrounded the city and it appeared to all of us that the soil was black and we saw several fields of alfalfa already green. The breakfast was good. After having satisfied the inner man, we were taken in automobiles into the country. We had a delightful drive throughout the entire eastern part of Chickasaw county, and all of us were of the opinion that the soil and the conditions were ideal for dairy farming and several of us are already talking about taking up the proposition offered through the Sales Demonstration Farms. If we were young men all of us, we would very likely start a dairy farm right away. As it is we are going to try to get some of our young men to co-operate with the Mississippians and establish permanent connections between this country and the cattle breeders of Wisconsin. There is no doubt the soundness of the plans of Mr. Mord. We are fully in favor of all they are doing down here in this connection.

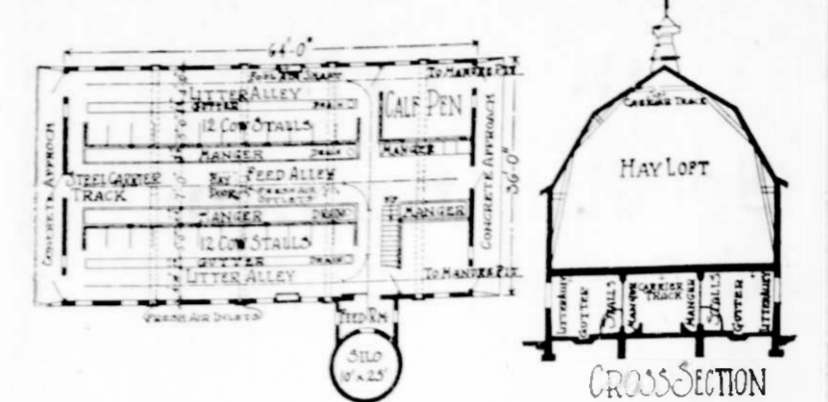
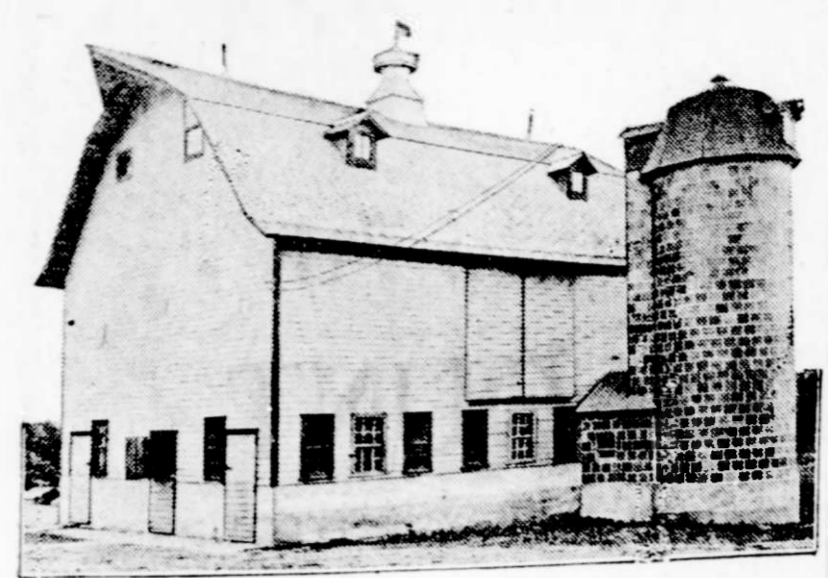

Profit in the dairy business comes from getting the largest possible amount of milk at the lowest cost for feed and labor. Cows that are cold in winter and bedeviled by flies in summer cannot produce the amount of milk they are capable of giving.

During the past few years home buyers are paying more attention to insulation and it will be but a short time until this item will be as important as the exterior finish and architectural design of the house.

Use of Wallboard Makes Garage Weatherproof
Owners of corrugated sheet-metal garages often find that the cold penetrates them to such an extent that it is difficult to start the automobile of winter mornings.

Entrance Adds Beauty to the Residence
Proper treatment of the entrance to the home adds greatly to the attractiveness of the exterior and many houses otherwise plain and severe are softened and made homelike through an intelligent handling in this feature.

Fall and Winter Is Proper Time to Paint
An excellent time for interior and exterior painting is during the fall and early winter months. Surfaces are dry, and in good condition, if properly prepared, to receive paint or varnish.

Alterations
Interior painting should be done from November to April; plumbing alterations from December to March.

Nemas Use Much Free Nitrogen

Nitrogenous Fertilizers Are Most Costly Food Farmers Must Buy.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture)
Although four-fifths of the atmosphere is nitrogen, the most expensive of our staple foodstuffs are those containing it and nitrogenous fertilizers are the most costly food the farmer must buy to feed his crops.

Take In Nitrogen.
Dr. N. A. Cobb of the bureau of plant industry, United States Department of Agriculture, has observed that certain nemas—those threadlike organisms found widely distributed throughout the world in soil, water, and in plants, animals, and insects—seem to have the capacity to take in free nitrogen, along with other constituents of the air, and combine it with other materials for their own use.

Peat Fertilizing Value Is Not Yet Understood
Every little while a question arises as to the fertilizing value of peat. This is a natural question, because the peat deposits throughout northern sections of the country show a high content of nitrogen.

Saving Frosted Combs
Breeding males whose combs have been slightly frosted may be treated so that they will recover in a short time. Place the birds in a fairly cool room and treat them individually with a mixture made as follows: Heat five tablespoonsful of grease until it becomes liquid. Then stir in two tablespoonsful of glycerin and a tablespoonful of turpentine.

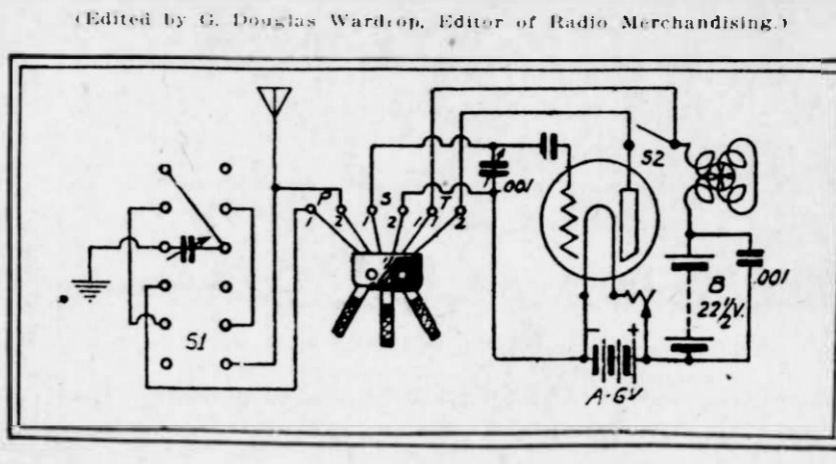
Cow for Producing Milk
Pure bred animals possess 100 per cent of the blood of their respective breed. Grade animals have a preponderance of the blood of a given breed but less than 100 per cent, and they are usually by pure bred sires and out of native or grade cows.

Size of Calf at Birth
The size of the calf at birth depends largely upon the size of the dam and sire. Jersey and Guernsey calves will weigh from 50 to 90 pounds at birth, Holstein calves, from 85 to 95 pounds.

Qualities of Good Cows
Good cows of well-established dairy breeds possess full size for age, and they are deep-bodied, vigorous growing animals. They furthermore show a form which indicates that the feed they consume is converted into milk and butterfat rather than into flesh.

Good Work in Orchard
Plant the orchard in good soil on a high piece of ground. Avoid slopes too steep to get over easily with a spraying outfit. Plant clean, healthy trees. You would not buy a diseased breeding animal, why buy a diseased fruit tree?

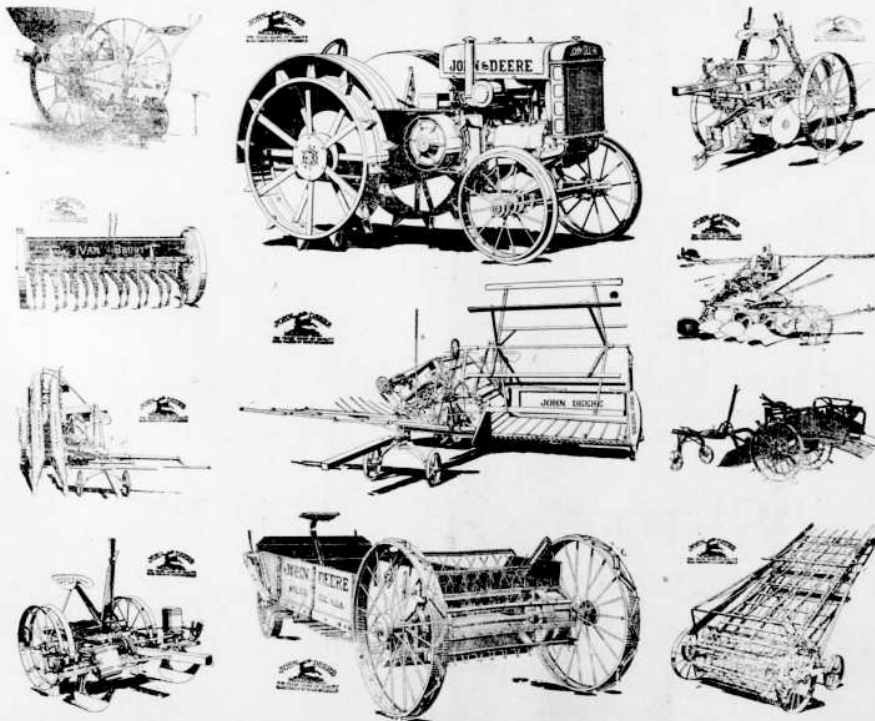
