Chicago,-William Darling Shepberd was directly accused as the mayer of William McClintock, the millionaire orphan.

The accusation was made in a complete confession by Dr. Charles D. Falmun, hend of the so-called National University of Sciences, that he and Shepherd conspired over a period of a year to take young McClintock's life by means of typhoid garm poisoning.

Falman declared, in the course of a deliberate and slowly traced confession, that he furnished typhold germs to Shepherd; that he instructed Shepherd from time to time in the care and culture of the germs, and that it was perfectly well understood between them that young McClintock should be sluyers.
