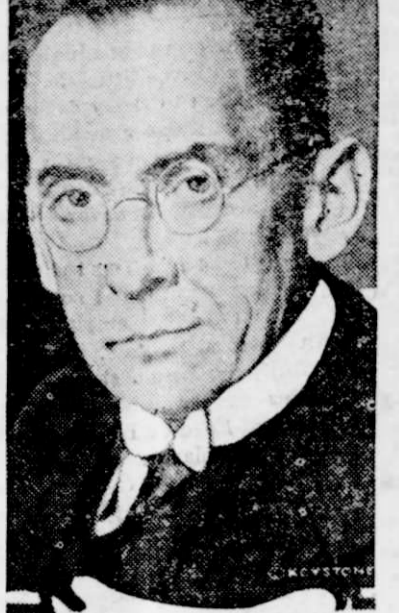
7,000,000 Cattle Tested

HOUSE PASSES NEW TAX BILL 390 TO 25

Amended to Limit Tenure of Office for Members of Appeals Board.

Salem, Mass.—Prof. Edward S. Morse, noted zoologist and former professor of zoology at the Imperial university of Tokyo, Japan, died at his home here. He was eighty-seven years old.

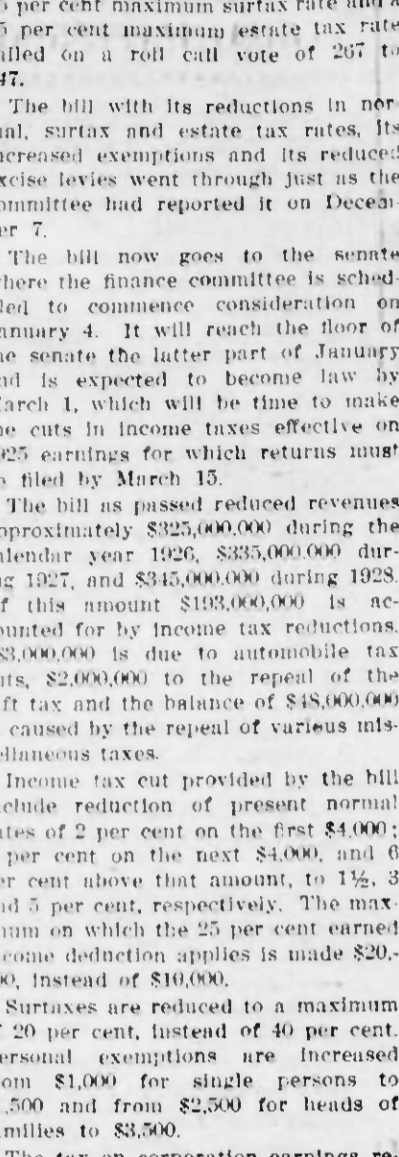
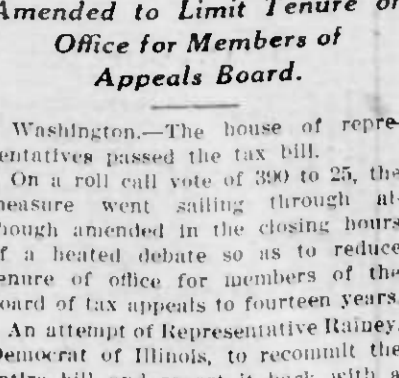
Mussolini's Power Supreme

New York—George W. Hill was elected president of the American Tobacco company to succeed his father, the late Percival S. Hill.

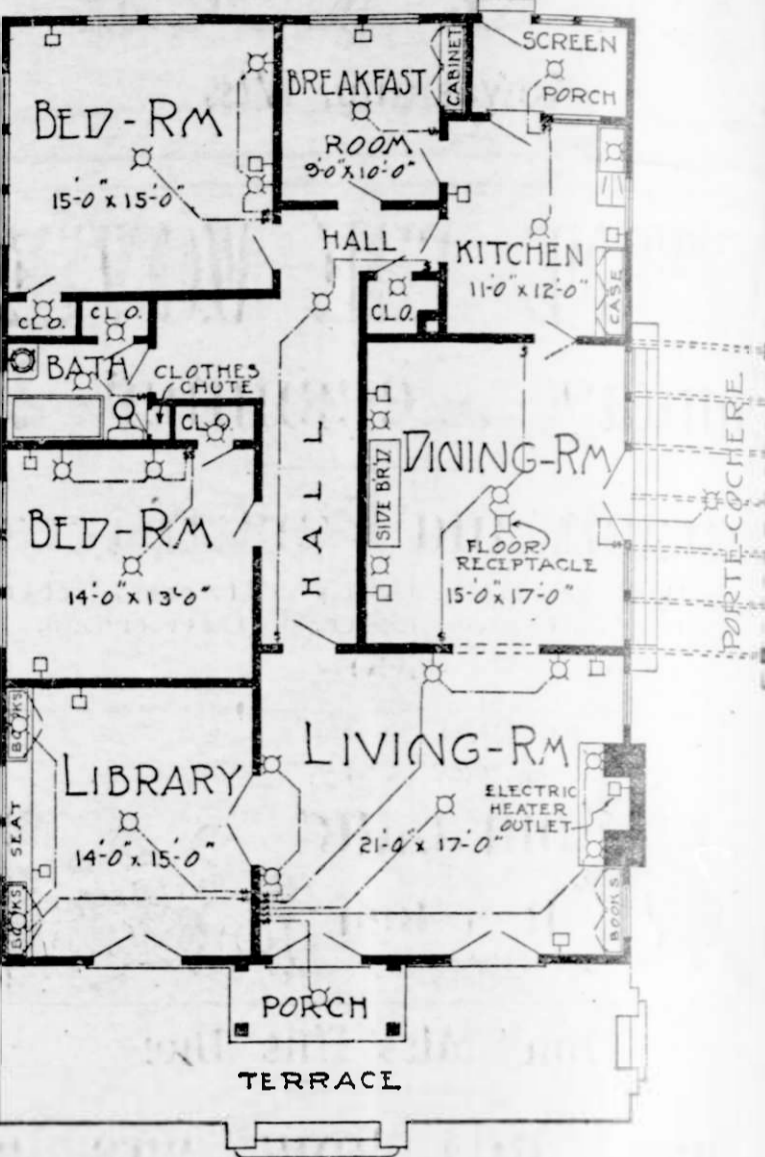
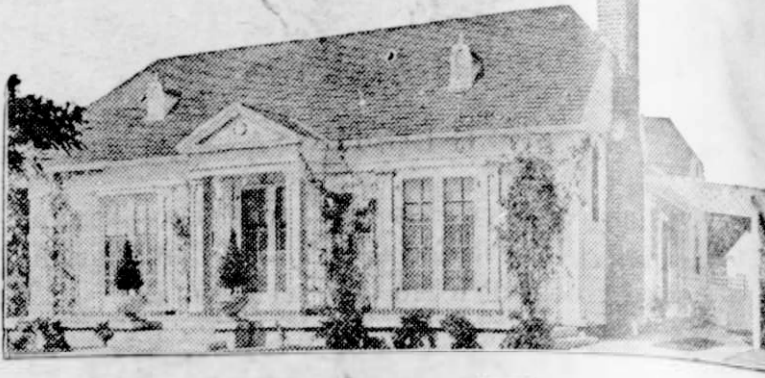
