





Comparatively high prices for meat animals and low prices for grain and feed have made breeding and feeding live stock a profitable business. At least, farmers are getting a great deal higher price for the grain they produce by "marketing it on the hoof" than by selling it as grain.

Of course, during the summer the cattle or hogs are allowed to run in the feed lots, where forage is plentiful and the self-feeders supply the fatmaking rations that the animals require in addition to the grass they get from the pasture. But in winter a weather-proof stable is necessary to protect the animals from the cold winds, which take their vitality and force them to use up much of the food they consume for bodily warmth. # More than 73,000 miles in a New Ford


