Interest in Primary Election on Tuesday Centers on GOP Party

Polls in the village for the fall primary election next Tuesday, Sept. 21, will be open from 9 a. m. to 5:30 p. m. and voting will be held as usual in the village hall. Voting for the town of Kewaskum will be in the Modern Woodman hall here.

Election officials are as follows: Val Peters, chief inspector; P. J. Haug and Harry J. Schaefer, inspectors of election; George Koerble and Wm. J. Harbeck, clerks of election; Fred Schiefel and John H. Martin, ballot clerks.

Interest in the primary is expected to center on the Republican party which has two candidates for governor, five for lieutenant governor, three for secretary of state, three for state treasurer, four for attorney general, two for member of assembly, and three for sheriff.

On the Democratic ticket interest will focus on the race for governor, there being two candidates in the field and on the outcome of the vote for district attorney. The Democrats have no candidate for district attorney, which necessitates a write-in vote. None of the other candidates on the Democratic ticket are opposed.

Running for governor on the GOP ticket are the incumbent, Oscar Schneider, and Ralph M. Ingwell, former brigadier-general of the state national guard and head of the state defense council during World War II.

Seeking nomination on the Republican ticket for lieutenant governor are Frank E. Panzer, George M. Smith, William F. Trinke, James L. Callen and Francis L. McElligott. Panzer represented Washington and Dodge counties in the state senate and served that body as president pro tem in its last session. Trinke is a past commander of the state department of the American Legion.

Fred R. Zimmerman, incumbent secretary of state, is opposed by Andrew J. Rockne and William H. Markham, well known Horicon attorney and skatemeister. For state treasurer are John R. Mullen, Chester G. Roberts and Warren R. Smith. A Washington county man is on the GOP ticket for attorney general. He is William H. Dieterich, Hartford, chairman of the county school reorganization committee. Others seeking the post are Frank X. Didier, Port Washington attorney; Donald J. Martin, and Grover Broadfoot, the incumbent.

Incumbent Frank H. Keefe, Oshkosh, has no opposition as representative in congress. Incumbent assemblyman Theodore Holtebeck has opposition from Harold J. Laubenstein. There are three candidates in the race for sheriff. They are Herbert A. Baehring, former sheriff; Sylvester A. Naumann and Ruben C. Wittig. Incumbent sheriff Ray Koth is completing his second term and is prevented by law from running again.

None of the other county officers on the Republican ticket has opposition. They are incumbents Anton P. Staral, clerk; Paul L. Justman, treasurer; Lawrence P. Berend, clerk of circuit court; Arthur C. Snyder, district attorney; Edwin Pick, register of deeds, and Milton Schaefer, surveyor. Dr. Raymond Frankow, coroner, is not a candidate for re-nomination and Dr. Richard H. Driesel, West Bend.

Running for governor on the Democratic slate are Carl W. Thompson and William D. Carroll. The party's candidate for lieutenant governor is Anthony P. Gawronski. Other Democratic candidates are: Eric J. Stoneman, secretary of state; Miles H. McNally, state treasurer; Thomas E. Fairchild, attorney general; Kenneth Kande, representative in congress; Clinton Laubenstein, member of assembly; Jerome Gunninger, county clerk; Roger Daeger, county treasurer; Rufus Justman, sheriff; Dr. P. M. Kauth, coroner; Matt L. Goeden Jr., clerk of circuit court; district attorney, none; Gilbert J. Hinkes, register of deeds; surveyor, none.

The Socialist party has Walter H. Uphoff running for governor, William Osborne Hart for lieutenant governor, Archie S. Oliver Jr. for state treasurer, Anna Mae Davis for attorney general, and Rudolph Reen for member of congress. The party has no candidates for county officers.

Candidates on the People's Progressive slate include Henry J. Berquist for governor, Alex V. Wallace for lieutenant governor, George C. Warnecke for secretary of state, Mary P. Sami for state treasurer, and M. Michael Esbin for attorney general. The slate has no other candidates.

This organization now offers to insure all pupils enrolled from grades one through twelve, for twenty cents a school year. Before any school can be eligible for coverage, every student must subscribe to this plan. This insurance pays benefits according to the nature of the injury and applies only to accidents in school buildings, on school grounds, or while under supervision of the teacher. It does not cover accidents on the way to and from school.

The Kewaskum Utensils of the northern Land o' Lakes league, in which they placed fourth, lost their second post-season exhibition to a Rainbow league club here Sunday when they were shaded by the loop champion St. Michaels nine, 3-1. This was Kewaskum's finale of the season. The previous week the Utensils also were noosed out by the Kewaskum Indians of the same circuit, 2-1.

Whip St. Michaels played an inspired, bangup game, the Utensils appeared listless, having little pep in the field and no power at the plate. They played one of their poorer games, being chalked up with seven errors, highest total of the season. And these misuses won for the Saints, who tallied two runs in the eighth on them without a hit to break a 1-1 tie.

The cause for Kewaskum's lack of power mainly was Kugler. St. Michaels pitcher, who hurled one of his best games with a masterful four-hit job on the locals. All four were singles. Kugler was on and really pitched himself a ball game, striking out 13 Utensils. "Mix" Marx was on the hit for the losers and also threw a fine game but was given shabby support. He allowed seven hits and whiffed 10 Saints. Kewaskum's team was noticeably weakened by the absence of Paul Kral, catcher, Cy Wietor and Louie Bath, three regulars who were missing. Kral and Wietor were not present and Bath was not put into the lineup until he batted in the eighth.

A new third baseman, Eckert, bolstered the St. Michaels nine. He played well and led the hit parade with two for three. Hausman also collected two bingles in four at bats. Kewaskum's four safeties were divided.

Not an earned run was scored. The Utensils pushed over their only run in the first when J. Stautz reached first on a missed third strike and scored on Eckert's single, stolen base and an error in the third. The winners' last two runs in the eighth came on three errors, a walk and wild pitch.

Outlay for Foreign Travel Returns to Boomtime Peak
Foreign travel in 1947 cost Americans an estimated sum of 690 million dollars, according to the department of commerce.

The total was a fourth above 1946 and about the same as the previous high mark of boomtime 1929.

American steamship and airlines took in about 95 million dollars of this money; foreign ship and airlines, 45 million dollars. The rest of the 690 million dollars was spent in foreign countries, helping them

change this year. Still, transportation and hotel space limitations in Europe lay down limits on how many can go there—the department estimates about 450,000—no matter how many want to.

Washington monument, in the nation's capital, was finished December 6, 1884. The shaft towers 600 feet above the tidewater of the Potomac river, and there is room enough inside the monument to house an army of 12,000 men.
