Reburial Services Held Tuesday for Sgt. Walter Werner

The casketed remains of Staff Sgt. Walter E. Werner, 24, arrived in Kewaskum Monday at 9:45 p. m. aboard the northbound Chicago & North Western passenger train No. 161. Major Fred J. Miller, Kewaskum, a close friend of Sgt. Werner, accompanied his body from Chicago as military escort. A large number of American Legion members of the Kewaskum post, members of the family, and a large number of friends of the deceased met the train. With the Legion color guard in the lead, a long procession accompanied the body to Miller's funeral home where the body was in state until 1:30 p. m. Tuesday.

Funeral services for Sgt. Werner, son of Emil Werner and the late Mrs. Werner, village, were held from the funeral home to the St. Lucas Evangelical Lutheran church at 2 p. m. on Tuesday. The Rev. Gerhard Kanneis officiated and committal services were at St. Lucas Memorial Park. Many members of the Legion and a delegation from the Harton VFW post took part in the services. Military rites at the grave were in charge of the Legion post and its firing squad. Major Miller presented the American flag to Mr. Werner which covered the casket of his son.

Ballbearers were six close friends and former buddies in the army, Fred Bass Jr., Hyron Bunkelman, Ralph Marx, Albert Iron Jr., Sylvester Terlingen and Carroll Haug.

Werner was killed in action against the Germans on the battle-scarred soil of France on Aug. 30, 1944, while fighting with the 110th Infantry which entered the French fight late in July. He was with an anti-tank company.

Sgt. Werner was inducted into service on Sept. 29, 1942, with the largest group to leave Washington county. The group included many other young men from Kewaskum. Later quite a number of men in this group were killed and wounded in action, including quite a few from this community. With the group Werner was first sent to Fort Striban, Ill. and Camp Livingston, La. for basic training. He was then transferred to Camp Gordon Johnston, Fla. and later to Camp Pickett, Va. before going overseas on Oct. 1, 1943. He was stationed in England several months until his unit moved into France in July. "Wally" was last home on furlough a short time before being sent overseas. He was the second young man from this village to lose his life in World War II.

Walter Emil Werner was born July 2, 1926, in Milwaukee. When a small boy he moved with his parents to Chilton where the family resided a short time before coming to Kewaskum in 1924. He attended the Kewaskum Public school and graduated from the Kewaskum High school, later taking a short course in Milwaukee. Before entering the service he was employed at Millers, Inc. here. "Wally" was a member of the Kewaskum fire department and was active in athletics. He was one of the finest, most popular young men in Kewaskum and was well liked by all.

The deceased is survived by his father, two brothers, William of Chicago and Clarence at home, both of whom also served in the armed forces; one sister, Lillian (Mrs. Arthur Buss) of Kewaskum; one sister-in-law, Mrs. William Werner, and many relatives and close friends. His mother passed away on Sept. 26, 1948.

When Attorney General Clark heard of the Ferguson statement, he was, to say the least, flabbergasted, and sent word to the senator that he would give him 15 minutes to take back his statement.

Ferguson was quick to reply. He sat down and wrote Clark a humble, longhand note taking back what he had said. The senator's excuse was that he had been misquoted. He never had said he gave information about Judith Coplon to Clark, nor did he state that he had demanded a probe of the matter, Ferguson wrote the attorney general.

Next day the attorney general happened to be up on Capitol Hill calling on the chairman of the senate judiciary committee, Pat McCarran of Nevada.

"Here's a letter that might interest you," remarked Senator McCarran, handing him a typewritten letter on the stationery of Senator Ferguson.

In the letter, Ferguson said exactly what the newspapers quoted him as saying the night before, and which he had denied to Clark. Two years ago, wrote the Michigan senator, he had given the information about Judith Coplon to Clark, and now he demanded an investigation. Furthermore, he put all this in black and white.

The attorney general read the letter with amusement.

"Well, here's a letter he wrote me," he remarked, pulling out the handwritten note in which Ferguson said he had been misquoted.

McCarran read the note, then observed:

"I thought there was something funny about Ferguson's phoning me last night. He wanted to know if I had received this letter. Then he said: 'Well, don't give it out. It's confidential.'"

Silver Lobby Loves China

In a secret report to the senate foreign relations committee last week, Secretary of State Acheson bluntly announced that the Communists are complete masters of China and it would be folly to send more U.S. arms to the defeated Nationalists.

Acheson revealed that nine-tenths of the equipment already furnished by the United States has been surrendered to the Communists in the past eight months. Today the Communists have the military power to march wherever they please in China—including south China where the Nationalists are still holding out, Acheson reported.

Meanwhile, the Nationalists are negotiating frantically for a coalition government. Whether the United States will do business with the new government, Acheson said, will depend on the Communists' attitude.

The secretary of state was called before the foreign relations committee to answer a petition, signed by 50 senators, demanding aid for the Nationalists. Significantly, the petition was sponsored by Sen. Pat McCarran of Nevada, the silver lobbyist, whose plan is to bolster the Nationalist economy—with silver.

Lobbying for Peace

Senate G. O. P. leader, Arthur Vandenberg, backed colleague Owen Brewster of Maine in a corner, glanced furtively for eavesdroppers and whispered:

"You'd better lay off that ECA fund to the Dutch that you've been raising such a fuss about. I just learned there's a lobbyist mixed up in this."

Vandenberg probably referred to young Randolph Feltus, a registered lobbyist in capitol hill, who has been fighting ECA aid to the Netherlands on the ground that the money will be used to finance Dutch armed imperialism in Indonesia.

"Listen, Arthur," grinned Brewster, "have you ever heard of legislation on any subject in congress, of major or minor importance, that doesn't have a lobbyist for or against it?"

Note: Feltus and many others have been talking to senators on the ground that a breakdown of the U.N. regarding Indonesia means a serious undermining of the peace machinery of the world.

Maltreating Nazis

Senator Tydings of Maryland has been trying to side-step a senate investigation of army brutality in Germany.

What some senators want to investigate is evidence that the army used strong-arm men to torture confessions out of the Malmédy war criminals. Some prisoners, it is contended, had their teeth knocked out. Others were taken before mock courts which condemned them to die. Then, after they were convinced there was no hope, they confessed.

Fertilizer pays under irrigation in the Panhandle, according to F. B. Hunt of Hale county, Texas. With 200 pounds of ammonium nitrate an acre applied in the fall before sowing over land that had been summer-fallowed, he increased his wheat yield from 45 to 55 bushels; on land in continuous wheat, 200 pounds of ammonium nitrate per acre raised the yield from 15 to 30 bushels.

Mr. Hunt is one of hundreds of Panhandle farmers using well irrigation. With water, which permits the growing of legumes, they are starting crop-rotation systems to hold the soil at high-production levels.



Ex-PFC Oscar Purkey, veteran of the last war, feels better after reading the Atlantic pact, but he still thinks it's smart to keep mothballs in his uniform and not swear off canned eggs for life at this point.

PRICE DROP: Hits Inflation

American consumers were asking themselves: What does it mean? Why were prices being slashed, the dollar stretching a little further?

Continued reductions in such basic commodities as lead, zinc, copper and steel indicated there might be further cuts in manufactured goods in the wind.

One automobile manufacturer announced cuts ranging from \$198 to \$333 in the price of his cars.

Businessmen and industrialists agreed that the "bloom is off the boom" — that a healthy readjustment is underway.

SPEED PILOT: A New Record?

Joe De Bona, by his own admission was a "scared boy."

And he had every reason to be. He had taken off from Burbank, Calif., in actor Jimmy Stewart's nine-year old plane—a souped-up F-51—at 9:20:50 a.m.

Fred H. Wilkerson, official timer of the National Aeronautical association, said the NAA would have to decide whether De Bona set a new cross-country record.

THE OFFICIAL coast-to-coast record for a single reciprocating plane such as De Bona flew is six hours, seven minutes and five seconds, set by Paul Mantz on February 28, 1947.

DEFENSE CHIEF: Has Big Job

Louis Johnson of West Virginia had taken on one of the biggest jobs in the world, and had added to the magnitude of the task when he declared the armed services of the United States would be "united as one."

WELL, JOHNSON, in taking over as secretary of defense, was the man whose job it would be to unify the armed services, but his predecessor, James V. Forrestal, retiring to private life as a banker, hadn't been able to do it.

The fact was that jealousy between the services made it practically impossible to implement a congressional act unifying the army, navy and air corps.

FORRESTAL: Medal From Harry

James V. Forrestal, retiring secretary of defense, received a surprise when he called at the White House to say goodbye to President Harry S. Truman.

RENT BILL: Buck Was Passed

The rent control question was read. Congress knew it. The people knew it. But something had to be done before controls expired March 31.

EVERYTHING congress wrote into the present bill can be nullified by a governor or a legislature, if they see fit.

The bill continues rent controls for 15 months, or to June 30, 1950. It sets up a "home rule" process for decontrol of states, cities, or other local areas.

UNDER THE MEASURE, the housing expediter is authorized to sue a landlord for three times the amount of any charge made against a tenant above the legal rent ceiling.

STOCK MARKET: Curbs Are Relaxed

The federal reserve board had taken an action that should make the "ribbon clerks" very happy.

CONFERENCE: That's All, Folks

The Cultural and Scientific Conference for World Peace had ended without any specifically untoward incidents, barring a lot of booing and a harrowing by rightist elements of the leftist techniques of picketing and heckling.

More Pay for Jurors

The senate judiciary committee of congress has decided it's time witnesses and jurors in federal court cases get better pay.

TRUMAN: Still Adherent

President Harry Truman was nothing if not stubborn. Rebuffed by the senate armed services committee on his appointment of Mon C. Wallgren to head up the national security resources board, Mr. Truman has served notice the fight is not over.

DESPITE THE FACT that senate policy and tradition seldom has taken such a matter to the floor after committee disapproval, it was understood that Mr. Truman was planning to have the issue taken from the committee and fought out on the floor of the senate.

The committee, in declining to approve the Wallgren appointment, stated its position was taken only because of its conviction that Mr. Wallgren was not fitted, either by experience or ability, to hold down the vital key post in the national defense setup.

Truman associates said that if other means fail, they expect the President to urge Millard Tydings, Maryland Democrat, chairman of the committee blackballing Wallgren, to take the lead in a fight to relieve the committee of consideration of the nomination.

SEN. WARREN G. MAGNUSON, (D., Wash.) said he thought there was a possibility that some member of the committee majority might be persuaded to let the nomination go before the senate, although with an unfavorable report.

President Truman's fight for his old fishing covey and senatorial colleague was not expected to begin immediately. Instead, the President was said to be planning to let the matter rest for awhile so he can see what may be done toward out-manuevering some of Wallgren's opponents.

KEEPING HEALTHY 'Electric Knife' Surgery

WHILE many of us know about removing tonsils by electro-surgery, we may not know that this method, the "electric knife" as it is called, also is used for other operations.

When and why is this "electric knife" method used? In "Clinical Medicine," Dr. Gustav M. Blech, Chicago, states that the principal reasons for use of this method, now an absolute necessity in nerve and brain surgery, are (1) tissues are divided with a least amount of injury; all cells, dangerous and not dangerous, are destroyed by coagulation; (2) small blood vessels are sealed or closed by this method, preventing further bleeding and the need for gauze sponging, which irritates the surface tissue when the surgical knife is used; (3) pain following the operation is slight because of the blunting of the ends of nerves.

HEALTH NOTES

An individual's chances of reaching a ripe old age are far more dependent on environment (his surroundings) than on heredity. Figures based on an insurance company's study of the death rates and family history of policy holders, shows that those whose parents died at relatively advanced ages did little or no better than those whose parents died early in life.

Research workers in food and nutrition—particularly those who do special work in overweight and underweight—state that many overweight persons actually eat more food when worried about something than when their mind is at rest.


There would be little need for extra vitamins if we ate enough of the usual everyday foods, never failing to use some of the protective foods—dairy produce and green vegetables—daily. This applies to normal, healthy individuals.

Remember that early cancer is curable by (1) X-ray, (2) radium and (3) surgery. See your doctor immediately if you notice any of these signs and symptoms of cancer: (1) any sore that doesn't heal, (2) a painless lump or thickening in the breast, lip or cheek, (3) irregular bleeding or discharge from the nipple or any opening, (4) change of color in a wart or birthmark.

While examination of pieces of tissue (not just cells that have come away) is the best method of detecting cancer, this is often impossible and dangerous, whereas an examination of the loose cells of the affected part is free from such danger.

A physician on the staff of the University of Illinois lived for more than 30 years after he learned that he had heart disease because he lived on a slightly lower level of physical and emotional activity.

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



Use Easter Eggs for Place Cards (See Recipes Below)

Easter Plans
ONE OF THE TRADITIONAL highlights of Easter will probably be the coloring of Easter eggs. Though some adults think that coloring eggs is strictly child's play and should be left to youngsters, a large percentage of grownups doesn't agree. As a matter of fact, many people welcome Easter as a time when their artistic skill can be brought into full swing.

You may make the eggs as elaborate or as simple as you like. Perhaps a few brightly colored eggs in a gay basket as a setting for the Easter breakfast table are all you'll want. On the other hand, you may want to try out your skill at making faces or penciling names on colored eggs.

With certified Easter egg colors that come with a handy writer, you'll be able to create eggs as simple or professional as you like. Eggs will be effective and appropriate place cards at the Easter dinner.

Two appropriate creations certain to appeal are the pert bunny and a coy little chick. Stiff white cardboard is used for the base and for the stand-up collars that hold the eggs.

Use yellow dye for the chicken. Rest the egg on a collar with a perky bow tied under the "chin." Paint on eyelashes and attach a paper beak at the right place. Stand a feather up the back, and you'll have a chicken everyone will love!

The rabbit is prettiest when dyed light blue or pink. Use little white reinforcements (the kind the youngsters get for notebook paper) for the eyes and mouth. Bits of white string tucked under the "mouth" make whiskers and long, tapering pieces of crepe paper make the ears. Turn the collar down in front to make a crepe collar and the bunny is complete.

EASTER DINNER might be built around lamb with appropriate sauce and spring vegetables.

Roast Leg of Lamb
Have leg of lamb boned and rolled by the butcher. Wipe with a damp cloth. Mix together the following: one-third cup fat or salad oil, one minced clove of garlic, two teaspoons marjoram, three-fourths teaspoon powdered mustard, one-half teaspoon salt and one-half teaspoon paprika. Rub the mixture over the meat before roasting.

For boned, rolled leg of lamb, set the oven slow (325°) and roast, without water or other liquid, 45 minutes to the pound if the meat weighs between four and five pounds. For a heavier leg of lamb, roast 42 minutes per pound at the same temperature.

HAVE YOU EVER tried sweet potatoes with lamb? They're a delicious combination. Here are two recipes from which you may take your choice.

Sweet Potato Puffs (Serves 6)
3 large sweet potatoes

LYNN SAYS:
Here's What to Do With Easter Eggs
Eggs decorated for Easter may be used in many different ways to add nourishment as well as interest to meals. They should be hard-cooked before decorating, of course!

Mix the whites of four hard-cooked eggs with two cups of white sauce and pour this over toast. Press the yolks through a sieve to decorate the tops of the creamed whites.

To one cup of white sauce, add 6 hard-cooked eggs, diced, season with curry powder and serve over a bed of hot cooked rice or on toast points.

Hard-cooked eggs may, naturally, be used for deviled eggs to go with a luncheon or supper salad, or to accompany sandwiches in the lunch box on the following day.

Green vegetables take on color and interest when they're garnished with sliced hard-cooked eggs. They're especially good on a mound of spinach, broccoli, asparagus or cooked greens.

1 tablespoon butter
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon nutmeg
1 cup crushed cornflakes
1 egg
Water
Boil potatoes in boiling water until tender. Peel, rice and mash them. Season with butter, salt, nutmeg and cream enough to make them moist. Roll into small balls. Dip in egg which has been slightly beaten with water. Coat with cornflakes. Bake in a greased pan in a moderate (350°) oven until browned, 15 to 20 minutes, or, fry in hot deep fat. (Fat should be hot enough to brown a cube of bread in one minute.)

***Carrot-Asparagus Salad**
Cut scraped, cleaned carrots in fine strips and plunge into ice water. Chill thoroughly. Drain and dry between towels. Arrange in a circle on crisp lettuce leaves. Place chilled, cooked or canned asparagus tips in the center and serve with well chilled, seasoned French dressing.

TENDER MUFFINS served with jelly make a delicious accompaniment to the dinner:

***Sally Lunn Muffins** (Makes 1 dozen medium)
1 cup butter
1 cup sugar
1 egg
1/2 cup milk
1 1/2 cups sifted flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
Cream butter and sugar until very smooth. Add egg and beat well. Sift flour with baking powder and salt and add alternately with milk to first mixture. The batter should be quite thin. Grease medium sized muffin pans and pour in mixture to fill them two-thirds full. Bake in a moderately hot (375°) oven 15 to 20 minutes.

***Peach Refrigerator Pudding** (Serves 8)
1/2 pound butter
1 cup confectioners' sugar
4 eggs
3 cups sliced peaches
2 1/2 lady fingers
1 pint whipping cream
Cream butter and sugar until light and fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating thoroughly after each addition. Line an oblong pan with lady fingers on sides and bottom. Fold in peaches with creamed butter-sugar and egg mixture. Place one-half of mixture in lady finger lined pan. Add a layer of lady fingers, then remaining mixture. Top with lady fingers. Place in refrigerator for 24 hours. Unmold and garnish with whipped cream. If using fresh peaches, sprinkle them with lemon juice and sugar.

Ever tried eggs au gratin? Devil hard-cooked eggs, then place in a casserole, cover with grated cheese and white sauce. Top with buttered crumbs and bake until golden.

Mix the yolks of hard-cooked eggs with finely chopped ham, then refill the whites. Serve on lettuce leaves and pass mayonnaise.

Hard-cooked eggs may be ground or chopped, then mixed with drained sweet pickle relish, mayonnaise. Thousand Island dressing, mustard and salt to taste. Pack the mixture into small cups and chill.

Add grated cheese to white sauce, in the proportion of one-half pound of cheese to four cups of sauce. To this add eight hard-cooked eggs sliced, one-half pound sauteed mushrooms and one can of tomato soup. Heat and serve on toast or patty shells.

Sliced, hard-cooked eggs combine with any fish casserole and make it colorful. They extend the fish, too!

Chopped hard-cooked eggs may be mixed with mayonnaise and chili sauce for a delicious salad or meat dressing.

Juple Gets New Angle On "No Kids" Rent Rules
SCRANTON, PA. — Mr. and Mrs. Angelo J. Luciani reversed the usual qualifications of apartment-seekers. Offering two new apartments for rent at \$65 and \$75 a month, they stipulated that "childless couples need not apply."

Great Britain Relaxes Curb On Purchases of Clothing

LONDON. — The biggest relaxation since clothing rationing began in Britain nearly eight years ago will enable a man or woman to buy a new suit or dress from now on without coupons.

Harold Wilson, president of the board of trade, making this announcement in commons, said this improvement, with the freeing of footwear and other changes made last year, meant about half of the clothing field now was off the ration.

The relaxation will apply to all woven wool cloth and garments made from it, such as trousers, jackets, overcoats, skirts, dresses and children's wear.

The minister made other changes, such as having the coupon rate for fur garments, and indicated further improvements might be made later. He said better production of wool had made the changes possible, but that cotton cloth still was in short supply.

For that reason there will be no relief in the household linen situation or in men's shirts.

The spider found its way into the mechanism of the vertical component, one of three seismometers of the station, leaped upon the sensitive pendulum and registered a violent, earthquake-like reaction. Then it spun a web, causing a lull in the instrument's recording.

Alert scientists investigated and found the culprit. Despite the contortments, said the college, the seismograph had the second best accuracy record in the nation in the last three months. The spider?
