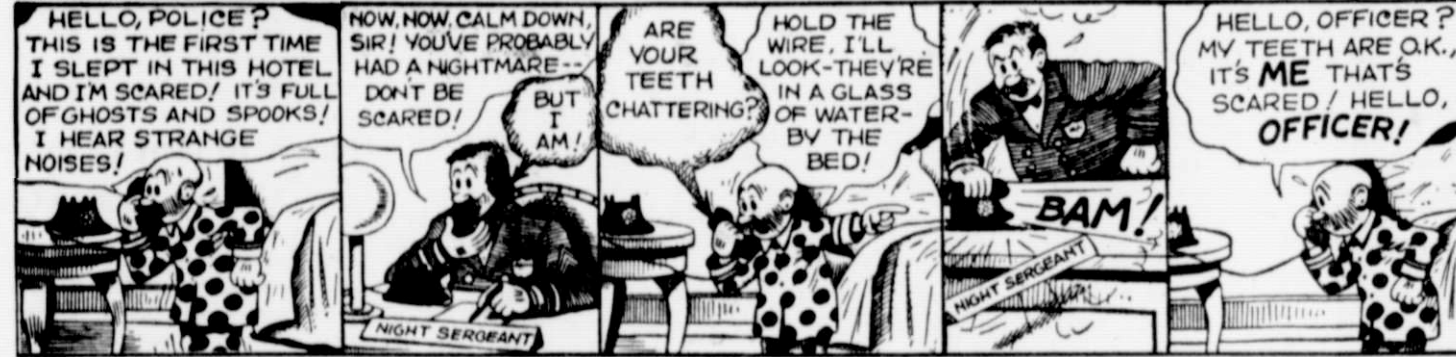

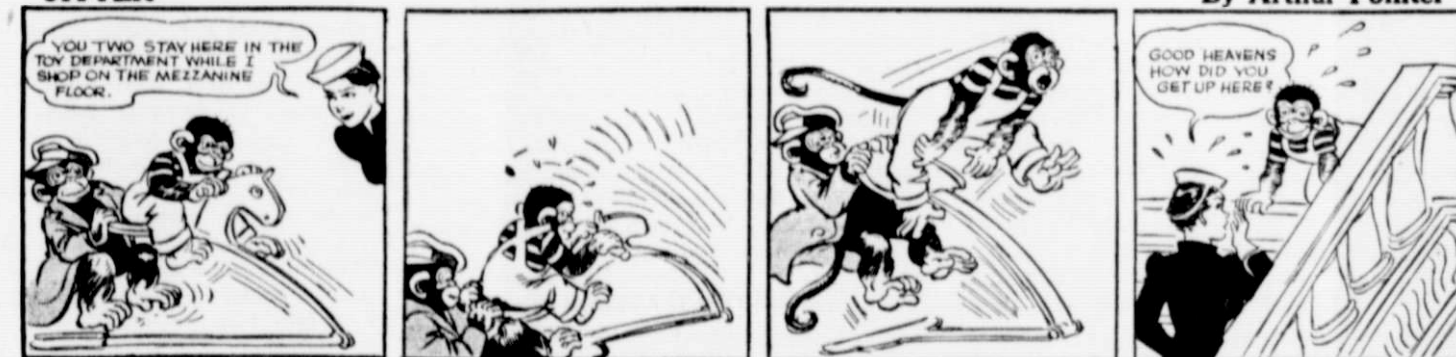

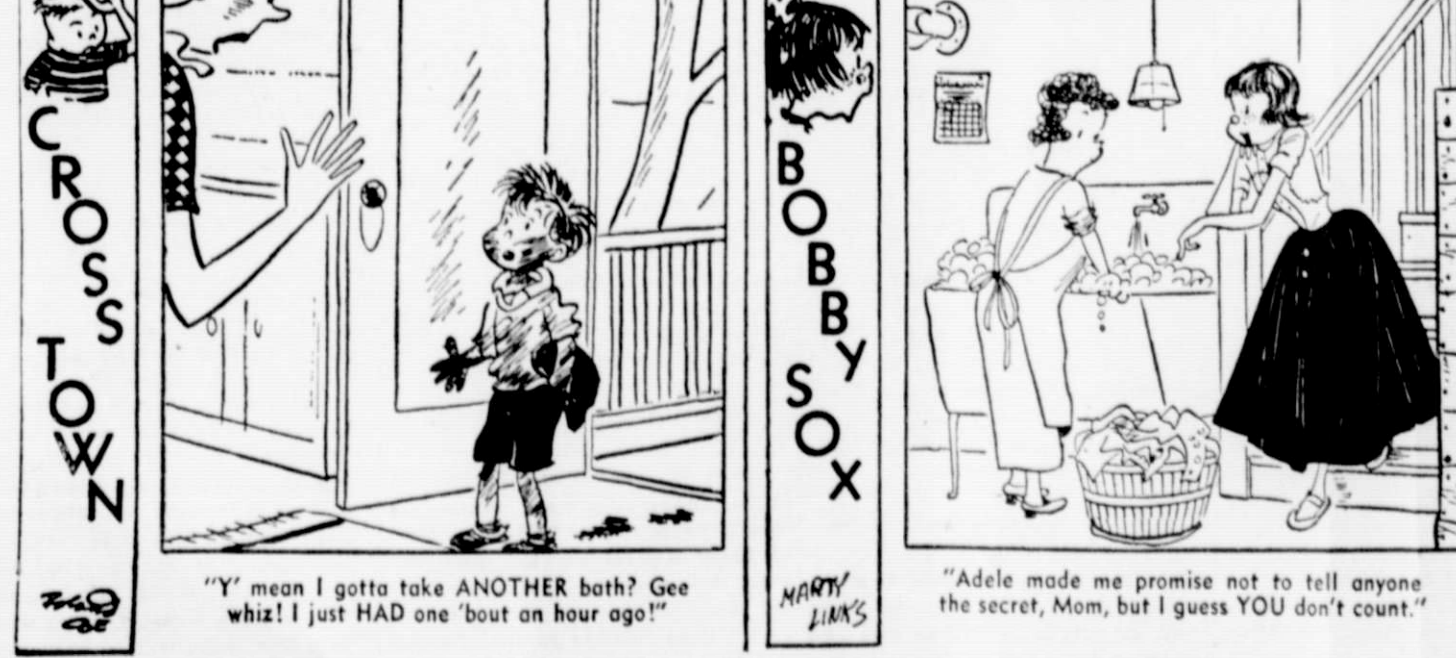

Luncheons of Distinction May Be Prepared Easily Around Seasonal Foods

WHEN YOU'RE entertaining, the foods need not be elaborate to make a big hit. If they're well-prepared and attractively served, you may be certain to create the right impression. Using seasonal foods and taking full advantage of their freshness and color will lend a distinction and elegance which is hard to achieve when you work with out-of-season produce.

Fresh summer greens, pink and red, with a gay touch of yellow are now at their height, and they can be brought to the table at their best. Plan your special luncheons around foods which feature these colors and you'll receive compliments galore on even the simplest fare.

FOR EXAMPLE, sandwiches of the double-decker type teamed with an attractive salad of pineapple and cherries and a Pineapple Torte gives you color and tasty foods at the same time.

Watermelon should have a symmetrical shape and a fresh attractive exterior. A ripe melon scratches easily on the skin with a nail and thumps with a dull hollow sound. Honeydew melons are best when the blossom end is slightly soft, the flesh green, juicy and sweet. You'll also be able to tell ripeness by the aroma.

Your best plums are those which are plump, fresh-looking, soft, clean and full of color. Avoid plums which are shriveled, mushy, hard or over-ripe. If they're brown colored, plums have been sunburned and are undesirable. When you select nectarines for eating, look for unblemished fruit that's firm, plump and fragrant.

Cherries which are best have bright color and are firm to the touch. They should have their stems on and be free of surface damage and decay. Over-ripe cherries can be detected because they stain.

LYNN SAYS: How to Select Fruit For Table Use Fresh figs are best when they're soft to the touch and vary as to size. Avoid those which are molded or decayed on the surface. Plump, over-ripe figs have a sour odor which is caused by fermentation. Pineapple is abundant now and can be eaten if soft to touch, golden yellow in color and fragrant. To test for ripeness, you may also pull a leaf or spear from the top. If it pulls readily, the pineapple is ripe. Cantaloupes are difficult to select, but the best tests include fragrant aroma, softness near the stem and coarse netting on green or gray rind. Any mold on the surface that doesn't penetrate the fruit doesn't injure the melon. Ripe pears should be firm or fairly firm, clean, smooth-surfaced and well-shaped. Discard any fruit which has rotting at the stem or blossom end. Bananas which are plump and well filled are mature. For eating just as they are the peel should be yellow, flecked lightly with brown.

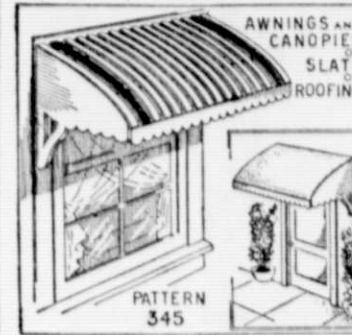

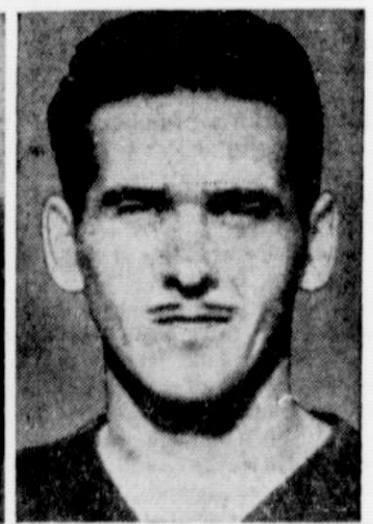

Adult-Education Program Is Hard Work, But Energetic Community Can Achieve One

Last week we attempted to point out some of the values, both moral and material, that might accrue as a result of establishing and maintaining an adult-education program in a small town.

To repeat the emphatic opinion of Dr. Roben J. Maaske, president of the Oregon College of Education: "An education program for a community is incomplete without a well-balanced program of adult education."

From a practical point of view, right now is a good time to begin planning such a program. Arrangements can be carried forward through the summer and brought to completion in time for the adult classes to begin in conjunction with the opening of school this fall.

While organizing a community adult-education program is far from easy, virtually every small town does have the ability to do it, as was indicated last week by citing the success which Sac City, Iowa, and Olivet, Michigan, have achieved in this field.

Dr. Maaske offers a general plan of action which will be workable in most cases, provided it is tempered to fit the needs and conditions of the particular town to which it is applied. Here's how the plan operates:

First step involves the organization of a community adult-education council, probably composed of representatives of the varied interests in the area—educational and semi-educational service organizations and agencies, public schools, libraries, service clubs, churches, recreational agencies, and so on.

In Sac City, for example, there is such a council which consists of 40 persons, 10 men and 10 women from farms and the same number from town. As a general rule, however, councils with not more than 20 or less than 10 members are most effective.

Second step, once the community council has been brought together, is the designation of a coordinator for the program. In towns like ours, this office probably would have to be assumed voluntarily by someone capable of doing the job.

Experience has proved that a community adult-education council won't function successfully for long without a director to devote time to important details and planning.

The next problem is to arrange a survey to ascertain the needs and interests which ought to be considered in arranging the adult-education setup. Special attention should be given to meeting needs of older persons.

One way of determining just what the predominant needs are might be for each council representative to query members of the particular group he represents. Also, a checklist of interests might be given general circulation to homes through the schools, churches, the newspaper, and the service clubs.

When the "curriculum" has been generally established, it is time to select leadership talent to conduct the various classes. An interesting sidelight here is that adults—all of us, that is—will respond more readily to a class conducted by a "leader" than they will to one presided over by a "teacher."

Enrollment or tuition fees also ought to be considered at this stage, and a decision must be made as to where classes will be held. The local school is a natural selection, of course, if the necessary arrangements can be made; however, a community center building or similar location would do almost as well.

Fifth phase is to give the leaders a short training program which would instruct them as to the manner in which classes are to be conducted. Length of the courses is an important factor, too. Usually a seven to ten-week period is best, with one meeting a week.

Finally, arrangements should be made to keep the program dynamic—and flexible enough to meet changing needs and conditions. In this connection, the community council must play an active role in the continuing evaluation of the program.

That's the way to set up an adult-education schedule. It calls for vision, community cooperation, and hard work—but any small town can do it.

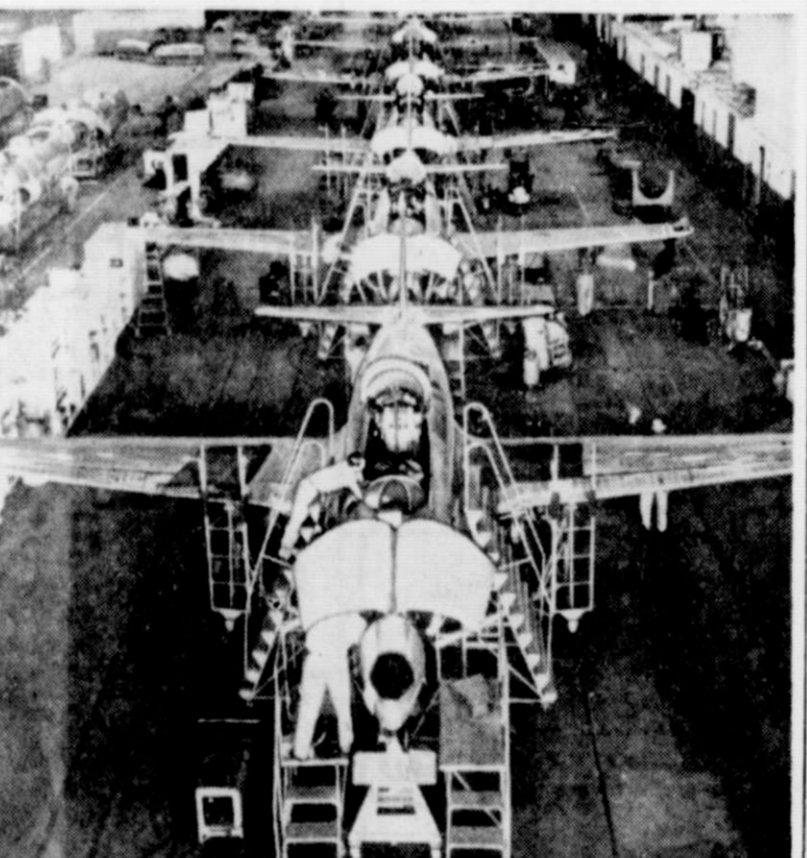
THREE ON A GUN . . . Leathernecks get lights on hot machine gun.

Chiang Evidence

LOCKED IN the files of the house foreign affairs committee is some dynamite-laden evidence by a former adviser to Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek, which would be of great interest in the MacArthur-Truman debate.

Secret testimony was given on April 6, 1949, before the foreign affairs committee by Maj. Gen. David G. Barr, former military adviser to Chiang. At that time Barr testified, among other things, that Chiang's staff officers were incompetent, lazy, derelict and in some cases downright dishonest. He described the surrender of some Manchurian cities to the Communists by Chiang's generals as so suspicious as to raise possible doubts of a sell-out to the enemy. In some cases, Chiang's staff officers were not even present when the troops under them surrendered.

General Barr also told how great quantities of American equipment which we supplied the Nationalist forces fell into Communist hands, and in turn made the Red conquest of China much easier and quicker.

In one case a big allied supply base at Chinchow was left virtually and mysteriously undefended. Considering the amount of American equipment stored there, the actions of the Nationalist Chinese had all the earmarks of a sellout to the Communists who shortly thereafter captured it. It was not long before all Manchuria fell.

General Barr testified that he believed Chiang himself was honest, but that his troops, lacking leadership, long ago had lost the will to fight. For a while the war against the Communists on the Chinese mainland simply depended upon how rapidly Mao Tse-Tung's men wanted to travel.

Taft and MacArthur

Friends of Senator Taft report that the senator's visit with General MacArthur at the Waldorf Tower, New York, netted only two things—Taft's firm conviction that MacArthur meant what he said about keeping out of politics, and second, that the general could out-talk the rather loquacious senator from Ohio.

Taft went to see MacArthur to find out discreetly whether the general had any political intentions; and second, if not, to lay some diplomatic groundwork so that the general might later get on the Taft bandwagon.

MacArthur was cordial, but politically negative. He gave Taft a shortened version of his congressional speech, quoting it in such verbatim detail that it almost seemed as if he had memorized it.

Taft's friends say that he did not tell the general that he, the senator, was a candidate for the presidency though he did hint that the Republicans were most grateful to MacArthur for what he had done and that they would certainly want him to be a leading defense planner if they won in 1952.

History Repeats

Herbert Hoover, who has been the chief confidante of General MacArthur during the present big debate, paradoxically was on the other end of a somewhat similar situation when he was President of the United States.

Hoover made the mistake of ordering the court-martial of Maj. Gen. Smedley D. Butler, a popular marine corps figure, after Butler had started a lecture that Benito Mussolini, then dictator of Italy, had run over a child with his car but failed to stop. General Butler's court-martial was ordered after Italian Ambassador Di Martino had protested officially.

But immediately there arose a tremendous outcry from the American press and public, and for weeks Hoover was the butt of possibly more scathing criticism than Harry Truman.

The situation was somewhat comparable to the present MacArthur debate in that the admirals did not like General Butler any more than some of the leaders in the Pentagon love General MacArthur.

It was also significant that Hoover's popularity at that time had sunk to an extremely low ebb, comparable to that of Truman's today.

In the end, Hoover did what Harry Truman has not done. He abjectly surrendered and called off General Butler's court-martial.

Droughtproof Crops

Most important experiments in modern agriculture in years are being conducted at the government's research laboratory at Beltsville, Md.

Beltsville scientists, though cautious in their comment, indicate that they are on the scent of a sensational discovery that may make farm crops droughtproof.

Briefly, the scientists are developing a chemical spray that makes plants capable of holding moisture for prolonged periods.

Washington Pipeline

William Harrison, overworked head of the national production authority, has decided to heed his wife's advice and resign May 1. The doctors told her: "You'll have to choose between a live husband or a dead hero." . . . Jack Small, now head of the munitions board, is a good bet to take his place. . . . Newsman Sen. Blair Moody, the new son from Michigan, is the kind of guy who goes uphill when it would be much easier to go downhill.
