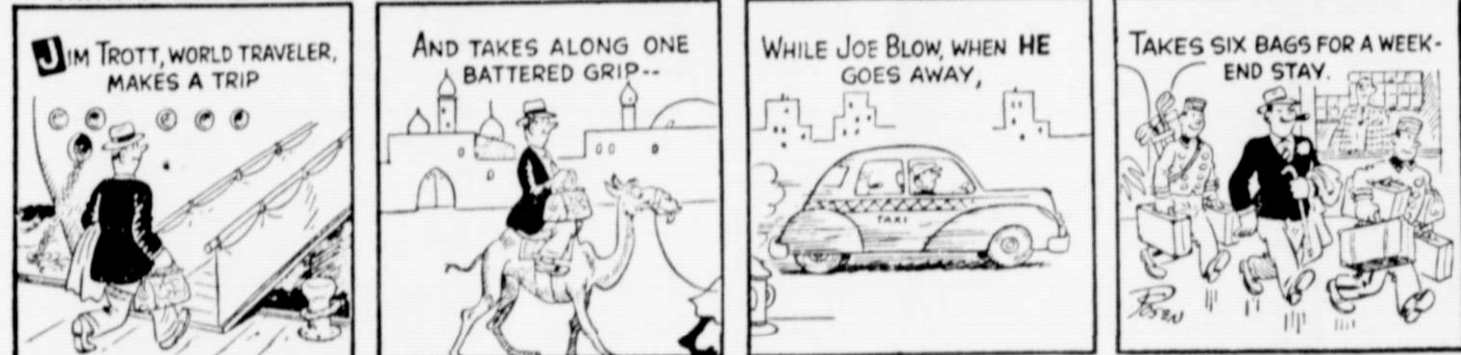

**New Faces Arrive**

If there is one thing the fight game or the ring game needed above everything else it was the arrival of new faces. Most of the old faces had begun to pall, leaving a depressing effect. The most popular new face seen around the East was that of Bob Murphy, the Californian carrying the busiest pair of fists we've seen in a long, long spell.

There is another face for the East to look at since Rex Layne lost to Rocky Marciano at the Garden recently. If Layne or Marciano or both, can make good up to the Murphy measurements there will be no complaint. There is still a young fellow named Matthews who can take care of himself, not to mention many others.

Ray Robinson has about the only old face that hasn't lost its ring appeal. The answer here is the boxing skill of a great fighter. But most of the old ones have begun to wear out. Replacement orders were badly needed when Murphy arrived and Layne came on from Utah.

We have a faint idea that the face and actions of Murphy are not going to appeal to Doc Kearns, manager of Joey Maxim, the light heavyweight champ. Using the same tactics he employed in the Ezzard Charles fight, Maxim might last three rounds. Maybe four. Here is the boxer-sluggo combination that makes a good party, as a general rule. Maxim hasn't been too busy in the last two years, but he will spend one of the busiest evenings of his career trying to keep Murphy out of his hair when they get together.

Murphy is the Dempsey type that gives his entire attention to the offensive side. He has little or no interest in defending himself. He is a good puncher, fast enough, and dead game. He also has that other needed ingredient—ability to take a punch, head or body.

The Layne-Marciano evening should give you a better line on where these two belong in the field.

**Your Favorite Sport?**

The sovereign state of Iowa is a pretty fair representative commonwealth as far as average Americanism is concerned. Iowa certainly has as many true Americans, man for man or woman for woman, as any state in the nation.

Such states as Iowa, Texas, Indiana, Tennessee and Ohio are what you might call basic states in regard to American sport. By that I mean such native games as baseball, football, boxing, etc.

Racing has a heavy grip on the states that have racing—New York, Maryland, Kentucky, Illinois, California, Florida, Louisiana, Massachusetts, etc. But racing is missing from many states, twenty-five or thirty, where the scratch sheet and the Racing Form are missing and most of the daily papers give little publicity. Iowa, among many others, is one of these. Naturally, racing in such localities is an unimportant item.

A close check on the Iowa situation reveals these facts:

- 1—The world series is the big sporting feature with a vote of 39 per cent.
- 2—The Rose Bowl comes second with 17 per cent.
- 3—The Kentucky Derby is third at 14 per cent.
- 4—The heavyweight championship comes next at 12 per cent.
- 5—The Olympic Games are fifth, with the Indianapolis Auto Races, the U.S. Open, and the Chicago All-Star football game following in order.

Here is the way Iowa picked its favorite sports: Baseball, basketball, football, racing, boxing, golf, fishing and hunting.

It must be remembered this is the Iowa angle. There are different angles in other states. You get a different slant when you take in South and North, East and West. For example, Iowa wouldn't be nearly as much steamed up over the same sport that might appeal to Florida and Georgia. Or New York.

There are a few states that take in and nurse, after a fashion, every sport. New York, Michigan, California, Illinois, Kentucky, Maryland and Florida lead in this march. They bar neither racing nor boxing.

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**FIRST AID TO THE AILING HOUSE**

**Changing Woodwork Finish**

QUESTION: We bought an old cottage which has grained woodwork. It is badly marred in places. Is there any possible way this can be removed and an oil stain applied? The baseboards are rather wide and I am afraid if we were to enamel them white, it would make them look still wider.

ANSWER: I don't agree with you on that point. I believe that if you were to enamel them to match the color of the walls, the width of the baseboard would not be so apparent as it would be if it were a contrasting, and probably a darker color than the walls. You can remove the present finish with a small portable electric sander (if you can buy or rent one), or else by softening it with varnish remover and scraping it off, then cleaning off the remover thoroughly with turpentine. You can finish with two coats of enamel undercoater and a coat of enamel, or else with your oil stain and varnish. I hope you will not make the woodwork too dark.

**Polio Precautions Are Reemphasized by Staral**

Anton E. Staral, chairman of the Washington County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, reemphasized the need for complying with polio precautions recommended by the March of Dimes organization.

"None of these precautions can guarantee immunity to polio," he said, "but they are common sense steps that may very well reduce a youngster's chances of getting paralytic polio."

He said scientists have found that during a polio outbreak there are hundreds of "silent" carriers of the disease—that is, persons who have been infected by the infantile paralysis virus but are not sick.

"We are told," he explained, "that such things as chilling or over-fatigue may constitute the trigger which converts a silent case into a clinical case; these trigger factors may also make the difference between a mildly paralytic case with full recovery and a severe case with residual crippling."

Staral said the precautions recommended by the National Foundation were as follows:

1. Don't get over-tired by hard play, exercise, work or travel.
2. Don't get chilled. Don't bathe or swim long in cold water, or sit around in wet clothes.
3. Don't have mouth or throat operations during a polio outbreak.
4. Avoid having children mix with new people, especially in the child daily living of a home.
5. See that children wash their hands carefully before eating and always after using the toilet.

If polio should strike, the local chairman said, the Washington County Chapter of the foundation stands ready with financial assistance for all those needing assistance. The local chapter may be contacted by calling West Bend number 46.

**Masterson New State Fair Manager; Replaces Reynolds**

The appointment of W. M. Masterson as manager of Wisconsin State Fair was announced Friday by D. N. McDowell, director of the state department of agriculture.

Masterson, 31, assistant fair manager since March, 1949, has also been manager of the junior fair since that time.

He will replace Jack Reynolds who resigned to accept a position as manager of the Eastern States exposition at Springfield, Mass. Reynolds is married to the former Florence Schroeder of West Bend.

Masterson, a native of Janesville, was graduated from high school there where he participated in 4-H and FFA activities. He was a member of the Harmony 4-H club in Rock county for 11 years. He received the State Farm award for the FFA in 1948.

Masterson left the University of Wisconsin to enter the army signal corps in 1941. He served 3 1/2 years in service and then returned to the university, receiving his degree from the College of Agriculture in 1949.

He will assume his new duties Jan. 1, 1952.

Masterson is married and has a daughter 19 months old.

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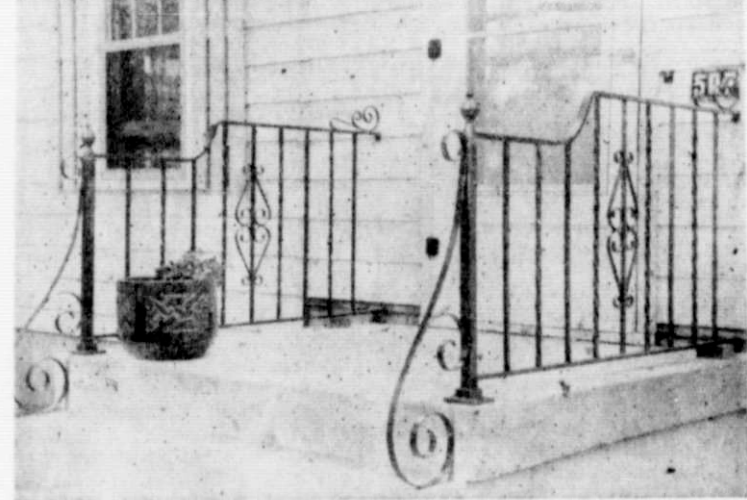
