## IN ACTION

### Your Home Town Paper is Nation's Most Sincere 'Salesman of Freedom'

"You newspaper guys are always popping off about freedom of the press," a fellow accused the editor of a community weekly the other day. "You've made a religion out of it, using as text the First Amendment, so everybody'll bow reverently and keep buying papers and advertising. With you, it's a business—you sell freedom over the counter."

#### A MAIN STREET FEATURE

"Let somebody stand up in the legislature and complain you're peddling prejudice and retarding government, and off flies the top of the editor's ink bottle and out comes a host of verbal hounds, howling for blood. A sacred institution has been violated! Bosh! You've no more right to supreme intervention than the butcher when he's accused of shortweighting. No fiery editorials defend the freedom of butcher-shops."

The editor, hastening to check court house records before his weekly deadline, muttered a quick "That so?" and left his detractor temporary victor. But the following week, the newspaper editorialized in this manner:

Forget for a moment that your community newspaper sells news and acts as a billboard for merchants in this vicinity—legitimate enterprise, you must admit—and suppose we've gone into the press freedom business exclusively, filling our till and supporting our workers and editors by dispensing "freedom for us." What's in this package for you?

Freedom of the press is the framework of your entire freedom. The bequeathers of freedom included it in the first of the Bill of Rights—our "text," if you please. They knew, when they granted privileges of publication to all newspapers and did not withhold the franchise for a single propaganda bulletin printed in the capitol basement, that only local and possibly conflicting organs of information can support the idea of freedom in all the communities like ours in America—an idea without which no people can cope with oppression.

Freedom of the press contains the right to know, to learn, to listen to anyone who might know, whether he lives in our town or in Washington, D.C.—above all, the right to investigate and discard any established pattern of thought.

The idea of freedom that we "sell" this community is a continual picture of liberty as contrasted with arbitrary power, a guide in resisting coercion and achieving new prerogatives. In it, you see any threatening tentacle of tyranny encircling this city or spy new gateways to independence. Maybe the editor in the next town has given the picture a different shade, but a free exchange of information has established the proper perspective.

We fight for our neighbors' access to this perspective, delivering it to their doors and newsstands, bringing it up to date weekly as new events erase lines and add new ones. The money you spend with your home town publisher "buys" this box of freedom—you get a usable "product" and we stay in business.

We do not feel we are a group of false prophets, exacting offerings for a tin god. The minister does not defile divine grace by accepting pay; the doctor does not betray mercy by accepting his fee. Each man's service should earn his living.

Yet, we may say that this manner in which the community newspaper publisher "earns his living" is a separate and eloquent expression of still another freedom. The advertising that you see and depend upon, as it is printed in this newspaper and thousands of others across the country, is perhaps as pure a demonstration as you can find of our cherished freedom of enterprise.

Free enterprise with its resultant high standards of living in this country, the freedom to buy and sell and compete with other buyers and sellers—all this is a basic theme behind newspaper advertising.

No, these freedoms of ours need no apologies. They call, rather, for a greater measure of pride on the part of the people and a deeper knowledge of their true significances.

The priceless heritage of the free and independent interchange of thought is not to be kept without ceaseless vigilance. Only by guarding the truth itself can we guard the greatest of all our liberties—the right to proclaim the truth. On that liberty rests the destiny of millions.

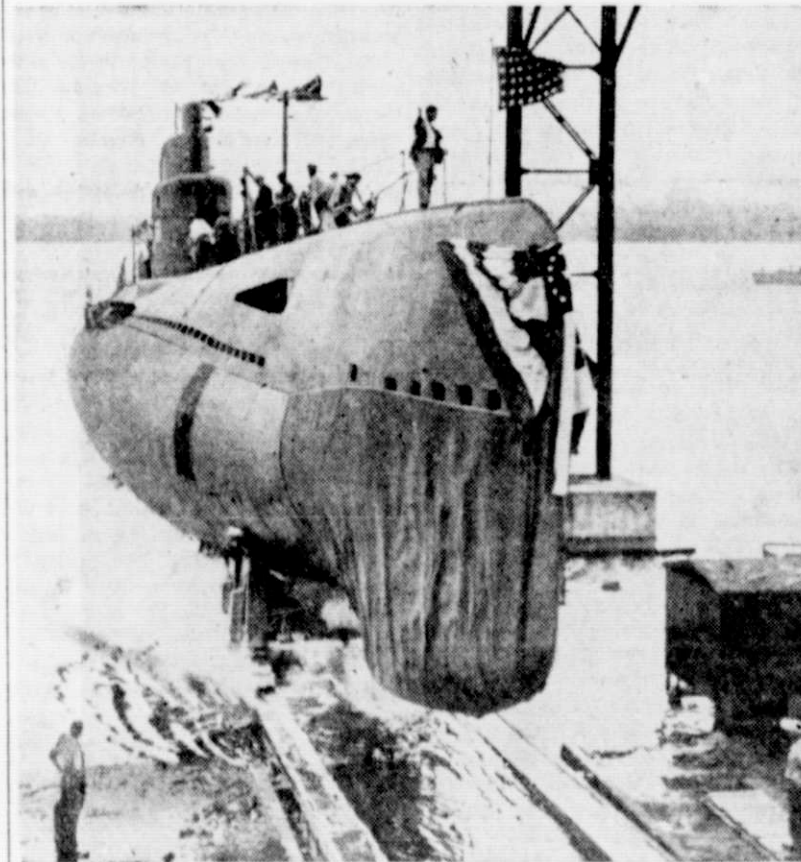
RETURNS . . . Daughters, 75, 73, wish mother, 99, happy birthday.



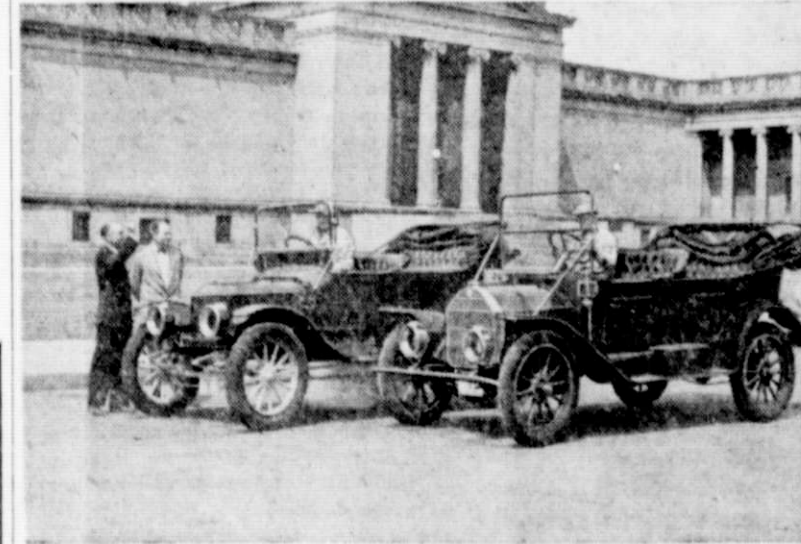

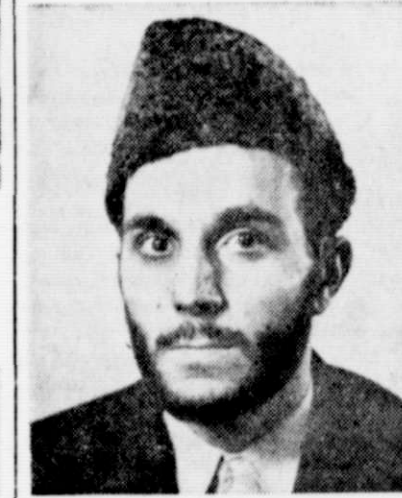

The department reported farmers were able to plant crops on the largest aggregate acreage since 1933. Yield prospects are reported virtually as good as the best in recent years.

Larger acreage of corn, hay, soybeans and sorghums than intended earlier are growing under mostly favorable conditions. Of the major crops only rice and hay are expected to set new production records, but several others will be of near-record size.

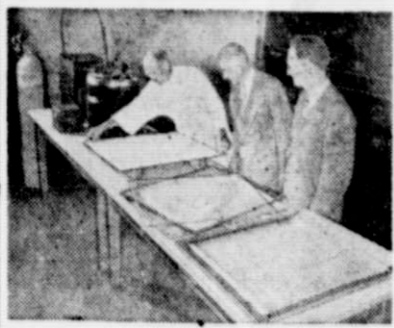

HISTORICAL DOCUMENTS

Two American Documents To Be Enshrined on Constitution Day

America's most precious historical documents—the Constitution of the United States and the Declaration of Independence—will be enshrined permanently in hermetically sealed glass enclosures at a ceremony Monday, (Sept. 17) Constitution Day.



In a test sealing, Dr. Roy W. Wampler, assistant director of research for the Libbey-Owens-Ford Glass Company; Alvin W. Kremer, of the library of congress, and Dr. G. M. Kline, of the national bureau of standards, show how the original documents of the constitution of the United States and the Declaration of Independence will be preserved permanently in helium-filled glass cases.

the parchments, particularly since this will be the last time the documents will be touched by human hands. Scientists say the enclosures will preserve the papers "for as long as man can foresee."

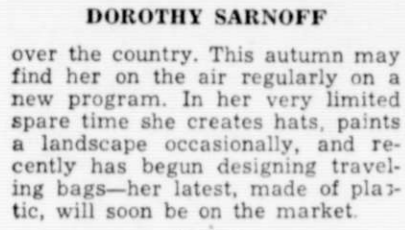
Plans for preserving the original engrossed and signed manuscripts are the result of studies and experiments made during the last 10 years by the national bureau of standards at the request of Luther H. Evans, librarian of congress. During the last two years the library and the NBS have been assisted by thermopane technicians of the Libbey-Owens-Ford Glass Company, who perfected the special metal-to-glass seal used to keep the glass cases air-tight.

"Every resource of science and technology has been applied in the effort to make these precious documents as permanently secure as the principles they proclaim," said Dr. Evans.

DR. EDWARD U. CONDON, director of the national bureau of standards, explained that exhaustive tests were conducted before the NBS scientists and the library decided this was the best method of protecting the documents and at the same time making it possible to continue to exhibit them publicly.
