Radio-Controlled Traffic Lights

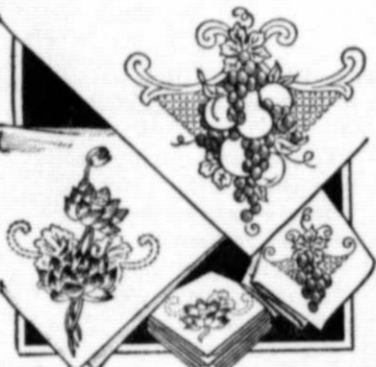
Mayor Martin Kennerly announced recently that Chicago would install a system of radio-controlled traffic lights—the first such system to be put into operation in the world.

The first radio-controlled lights will be installed at thirteen busy intersections, and the lights will favor the prevailing flow of traffic. Eventually radio-controlled lights might be extended to some 450 intersections, where traffic is heavily unbalanced, according to Chicago authorities.

One of the advantages of the radio-controlled lights is their cost, which runs considerably cheaper than cable-controlled lights. Another advantage is the possibility that these radio-controlled lights may some day be converted to radar-controlled lights.

The radar-control idea would work something like automatic garage door openers, and lights tripped by a road crossing. We believe that eventually most lights will be set so that they will automatically change to pass traffic if no other cars are coming from the other direction.

In larger cities the only solution at intersections where traffic is likely to be unbalanced is a system whereby the light changes automatically, in accordance with the flow of traffic, to permit maximum transportation at all times. The experiment in Chicago may be a first step toward this eventual goal.

Check Yourself For Cancer

The 1953 annual report of the American Cancer Society urges all Americans to seek periodical examinations in an effort to detect cancer while the disease is still in its "silent" stage.

The term "silent" is used to describe the malignant condition in undetectable form. That is, there are no symptoms which patients recognize as danger signals.

The American Cancer Society points out that of more than 70,000 people who die in the United States each year of six types of "silent" cancer, more than 40,000 could have been saved if the cancer had been detected early. Whereas the person affected may not recognize any danger signals, such as pains, lumps or bleeding, a doctor using special detection equipment can detect the growth termed "silent" cancer.

The A.C.S. says six common types of cancer which kill more Americans than they should are cancer growths of the mouth,

uterus, heart, skin, rectum and lungs.

The most interesting part of the A.C.S. report is that which states that cancer, in any of these six forms, if caught before it begins to spread, can usually be localized for treatment. Treatment under such conditions is far more effective than treatment after the disease has spread.

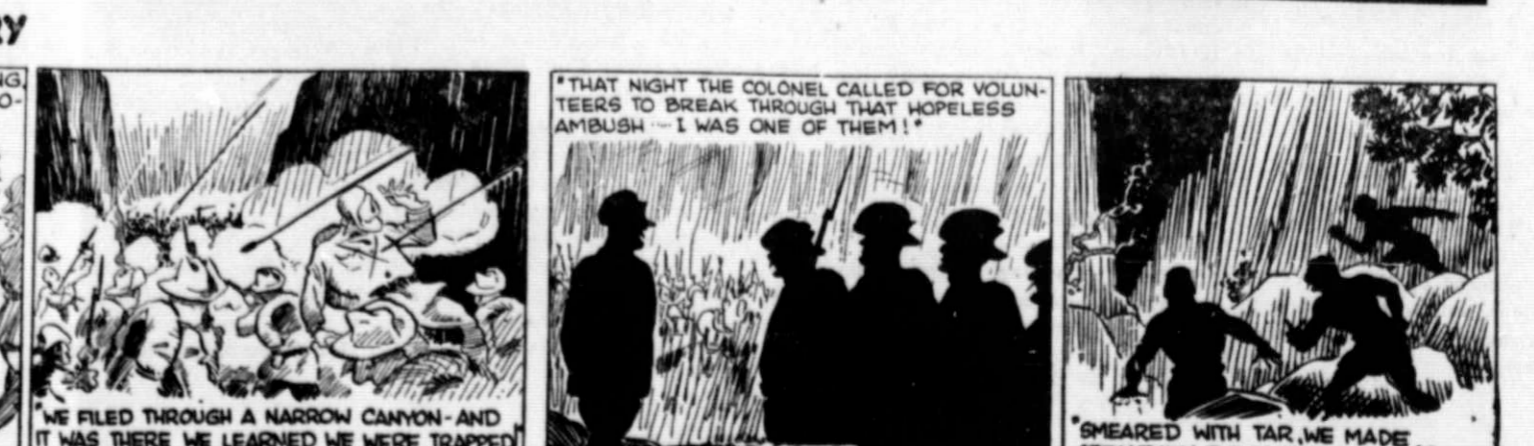

PREPARING GARDEN TOOLS FOR WINTER STORAGE

Polish metal smooth with emery cloth or steel wool. Kerosene to remove rust.

Repair handles if necessary. Sand and oil handles with linseed oil.

Clean off all dirt with putty knife or scraper.

Sharpen tools with file.

Oil metal parts with heavy machine oil or grease.

Prepare Garden Tools For Winter Storage

Proper care of household tools will add years to their life, and will also make them easier to use. This is the time of year to get the garden tools in shape and store them for next spring, although, keeping tools in shape should be a year around program.

Clean the tool thoroughly with a knife, putty knife, or other handy instrument. All rust should be removed. Use chemical rust remover or kerosene if necessary.

Working parts of the tool should be polished bright. Steel wool and machine oil can do wonders along this line. This includes the blades of shovels, hoe, trowels, etc.

Make sure the tool is sharp. Note that these tools, the hoe, shovel and trowel, are all sharpened on one side of the blade. Furthermore, these tools are made of soft steel which can be

Cancer Research Shows Progress

More is known about the mechanisms of cancer than about a number of other diseases. This fact appears in a recent bulletin.

Because cancer can be produced and observed in a laboratory, an important step toward its conquest has been taken. The bulletin states that ten of every 100 cancers can now be cured; it could number 25 with present knowledge. The other 75 are a research problem.

Because of knowledge about growth and cells, and because they are governed by laws of growth, it is also known that benign or non-cancerous tumors or growths are governed, within certain limits, by such laws. Thus it is possible to carry on research in this field. However, cancer cells disregard the normal laws of growth.

Certain factors about cancer are now known that enter into the ever-progressing fight on cancer. A certain degree of hereditary predisposition to cancer is apparent in man. The mechanisms of resistance are poorly understood. The study of heredity in relation to cancer is extremely difficult in man, the bulletin points out, because of his complex heredity and long life span, but such studies are urgent.

Also, human cancer occurs more frequently with increasing age, particularly after 40. Although not proven nor disproven, experimental work suggests that cancer is seen more frequently in older people because cancer-producing factors have had longer to operate in them.

It is known too that certain substances predispose certain people to cancer. And, it is known that excessive exposure to ultraviolet sun rays leads to an increased incidence of skin cancer in man. Experiments are also studying the role of hormones, viruses and nutrition in predisposition to cancer.

The bulletin emphasizes that early detection of cancer is one of the most important factors in its cure; methods of diagnosis and treatment are constantly being improved; research is continually looking for means of controlling, curing and preventing the disease.

Denver Style Tunaburgers

3 eggs
1 can (6 oz.) flaked tuna
2 tablespoons chopped green pepper
2 tablespoons chopped onion
1/2 teaspoon salt
Dash pepper

Beat eggs and mix with remaining ingredients. Cook spoonfuls on a greased hot griddle or skillet. Serve in buns or on bread with catsup or chili sauce. Makes six sandwiches.

Broiler Beef Sandwiches

1 can (12-oz.) roast beef, or luncheon meat
8 slices rye bread
Mayonnaise
1/4 cup catsup
Prepared mustard
2 medium size tomatoes

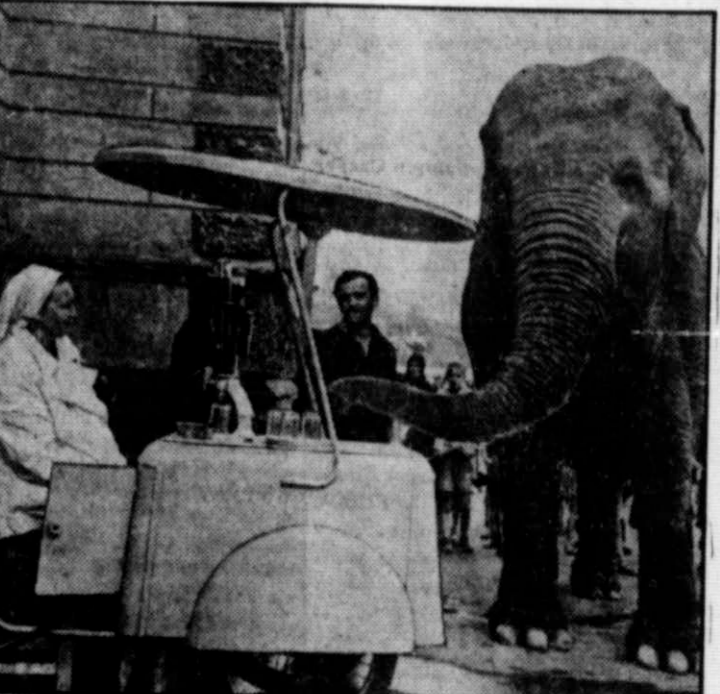
Chill and slice meat. Spread bread lightly with mayonnaise, and toast in broiler. Turn and put meat on 4 of them. Spread catsup and mustard on remaining slices and top with thinly sliced peeled tomato. Broil until beef and tomato are hot. Put sandwiches together and serve hot. Makes four sandwiches.

Fresh, canned, or frozen lobster is always available to the busy homemaker — so when planning your meals remember seafood is good for you, it is high in protein, important vitamins, and minerals.

Boiled Lobster

Have ready a large kettle containing vigorously boiling water. Add 1/2 cup rock salt for each quart of water. Put in live lobsters one at a time, having the water come to the boiling point after adding each. Lobsters should be entirely covered by water. Cover and simmer 15 minutes. Cool in the broth or if the lobster is to be served hot, lift from broth and drain.

Lobster Thermidor

3 cups cooked lobster cut into pieces
3 tablespoons butter
1 tablespoon flour
1/2 pint cream
1/4 lb. mushrooms
Salt
Paprika
2 tablespoons sherry
2 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese

Melt 2 tablespoons of butter, add lobster and cook 5 minutes. Sprinkle with the flour. Stir. Add cream. Heat slowly and add mushrooms which have been sliced and sauteed in 1 tablespoon butter. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Add sherry. Put into lobster shell and set in baking pan. Sprinkle with the cheese. Bake in an oven 450 degrees until brown.

Lobster Stew

2 tablespoons butter
4 tablespoons flour
2 cups cream
Pepper
1/2 teaspoon sugar
2 cups lobster meat cut in pieces
1 egg yolk

Melt butter and add flour, stirring until smooth. Add cream gradually. Cook for 10 minutes stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Season. Add lobster meat. The stew should have the consistency of a thick white sauce. Just before serving, add egg yolk. The stew must not boil after the egg has been added. Serve lobster stew poured over an omelet.

Lobster Sauce on Shrimp

One 1-lb. lobster
1 tablespoon water chestnuts minced
1 tablespoon bamboo shoots
1/2 teaspoon salt
Pepper to taste
1 crushed clove of garlic
4 tablespoons salad oil
1 cup chicken stock
1 1/2 lbs. fresh shrimp shelled and deveined
1 egg slightly beaten
1 tablespoon cornstarch
1/4 cup water
2 tablespoons finely chopped scallions

Put the lobster meat through the fine blade of a meat chopper. Mix with the minced water chestnuts and bamboo shoots. Add salt and pepper. In a heavy frying pan heat the salad oil and saute

the crushed garlic for 5 minutes. Remove the garlic from the oil. Add the lobster mixture, chicken stock and shrimp. Cover the pan and cook over moderate heat for 10 minutes. Add a little of the pan juice to egg. Stir egg into mixture and cook 2 minutes longer, stirring constantly. Dissolve cornstarch in the water and add to mixture. Cook for 2 minutes and stir constantly. Add scallions. Serve at once on hot rice.

Lobster Croquettes

2 cups chopped, cooked lobster meat
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon parsley, chopped fine
1-8 teaspoon nutmeg
Few grains cayenne
1 teaspoon lemon juice
1 cup thick white sauce
Add seasonings to lobster. Add white sauce. Chill. Shape, dip into crumbs and fry in deep fat.

Lobster Salad

2 cups flaked cooked lobster
1/4 cup chopped, stuffed, olives
2 hard boiled eggs sliced
1 teaspoon minced chives
1/2 cup chopped celery
Lettuce
French dressing
Combine all ingredients and chill 1 hour before serving. Serve on lettuce.

Troopers Tongues Wag In 27 Lingoes

There is at least one unit in the Army that can take orders in 27 different languages.

A recent survey in the 505th Airborne Infantry Regiment stationed at Fort Bragg, N. C., revealed that some 250 troopers speak at least one language in addition to English. Languages spoken range from Gurmukhi, a Hindustani dialect, to Ilocano, a Filipino dialect.

Most common among the languages spoken is Spanish with 171 men in the 505th speaking this tongue. Next is German, with 28 Teutonic tongues registering their ability. French and Italian each are represented 18 times. Polish is spoken by 13 of the troopers.

Probably the most versatile linguist in the regiment is Captain A. W. O. Naylor-Foote who speaks English, Spanish, French, Portuguese and the Hindustani dialects of Urdu, Khaskura and Gurmukhi.

Corporal Ewstachij Wanio is fluent in German, Russian, Polish and all three Slovak tongues while Sergeant First Class George Marecek is an able spokesman in Czech, German, Polish, Russian, Yugoslavian and Italian.

Almost every section of the world is represented in the languages spoken by the versatile troopers. The Pacific is represented by Guamanian, Hawaiian and Filipino. The Orient is represented by Japanese, Korean and Chinese and Europe by Greek, Dutch and the Romance languages.

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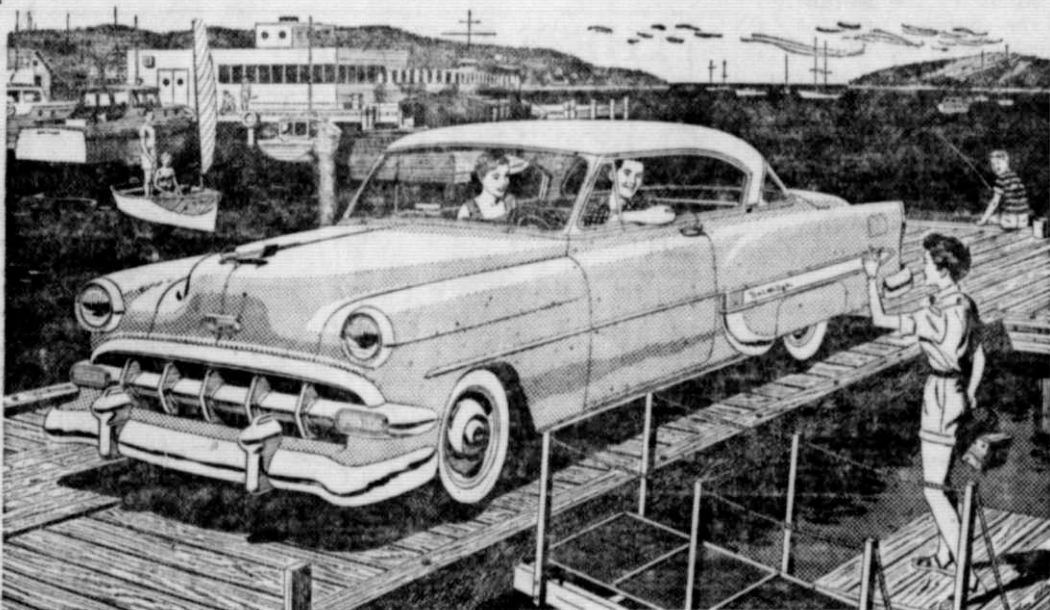
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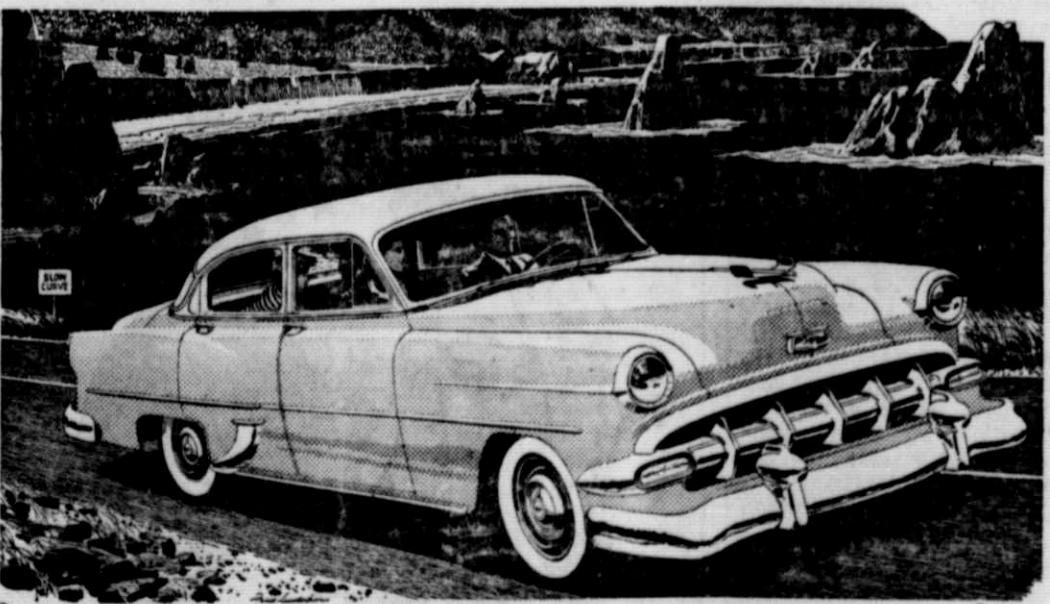

The teen ager who's fortunate to have her own large closet should see to it that it's kept neat and well organized. Besides storing your clothes, your closet should be fully equipped to act as a "first aid station" to repair clothes in need, says Betty Ann.

The shelf within easy reach should hold these necessities: A sewing kit, a cleaning kit, a good clothes brush, a pin cushion and a pad and pencil. Besides containing needles, threads, hooks and eyes, your sewing kit should have ribbon to repair the broken shoulder straps of an otherwise good slip. And a card of all colors of yarn will be handy for mending snagged sweaters.

By wallpapering a few hat boxes, then labeling them "school" and "dress" you'll never be at a loss when dressing in a hurry. Shoe boxes, covered with wallpaper, make excellent hosiery, glove and scarf boxes.

Another must for the well dressed closet and teen ager is a shoe kit with shoe creams, cloths, brushes and a rubber sponge for cleaning dressy suede shoes. A shoe tree is a wise investment, too, for keeping shoes in the best of condition.

Whenever you take off a dress or suit or blouse and hang it in your closet don't forget to reach for your pencil and paper. Write a note saying what needs to be done to the garment before you can wear it again.

After writing "press," "sew," or "clean," pin the note right on the hanger. Then, set aside a couple of hours each week to take care of these tasks.

Gingham is being used for all kinds of clothes from cocktail and evening dresses to beach togs and travel suits. This is not too surprising, as cotton clothes have been fashion news for sometime.

2 tablespoons fat; 1 cup chopped onion; ½ pound ground beef; 1 cup sliced carrots; 4 ounces medium noodles; 1 quart water; 2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce; 1 tablespoon salt; 1/8 teaspoon pepper; parsley for garnish.

Melt fat in skillet. Add onion and beef and cook until browned, about 10 minutes. Add carrots, noodles and water. Cover and simmer over low heat about 45 minutes. Add Worcestershire sauce, salt and pepper. Mix lightly. Arrange on hot platter. Garnish with parsley. Makes four servings.

Chocolate Nut Squares

1 egg, slightly beaten; 1 tablespoon water; ¼ teaspoon vanilla; 1 package cookie mix; 1 package (1 cup) semisweet chocolate morsels.

Combine slightly beaten egg, water and vanilla. Add to cookie mix with semisweet chocolate morsels, mix well. Turn into an ungreased 7 by 11 by 2 inch pan; spread with spatula. Bake in a moderate oven, 375 degrees, 20 minutes. Cool. Frost with quick chocolate frosting. Sprinkle with chopped nuts. Yield: Two dozen squares.

Try this crumb topping for your favorite coffee cake. Sprinkle it with spicy oatmeal cookie crumbs which have been mixed with a little brown sugar and moistened with melted butter or margarine.

Beat a cold jellied soup lightly with a fork before serving, then spoon into serving cups or other soup dishes. Garnish with slices of cucumber sprinkled with parsley or chives.

Bake muffins in tiny muffin cups and sprinkle with grated parmesan cheese before putting into the oven. Delicious with butter at tea time.

Teachers Should Have Good Health

Much has been done to improve the health of our school children—more is in prospect. This is as it should be—our future is in their hands. But have we as individuals and as communities given proper attention and concern to the health of their teachers?

No one knows better than teachers themselves that good teaching comes easier day by day when they feel well. How can we expect them to handle a roomful of high-spirited youngsters if their own health is under par?

We as parents have a stake in the health of our children's teachers. Keeping well not only pays dividends in making the teacher's work happier and more effective, but offers an excellent opportunity for the positive health guidance of her pupils.

The emphasis today is on the development of the "whole" child—his mental, emotional and social development as he grows and develops during his school years. We work towards his maximum well-being as an adjusted youngster capable of taking full advantage of his educational opportunity. But how can we expect this to come about if his teacher, the key person in his school experience, is herself not well or is emotionally upset?

Teachers have certain obligations as to their own health among which are the regular check-ups by their physicians, x-rays for tuberculosis, and so forth. But communities have responsibilities too. They should provide opportunities for social contacts that bring fun and relaxation for their teachers and are based on an appreciation of the important place of teachers in our daily living.

This carries with it the provision for adequate salaries so that teachers are in a position to meet their responsibilities and take their proper place in our way of life. Adequate sick leave is another "must" so that when ill teachers do not stay at their desks to their detriment and that of their charges because financially they can't afford to be ill.

More and more teachers know and practice the principles of good nutrition, the need for sufficient rest and the importance of being a part of the community. But they need our recognition of all this and our cooperation as parents to put it all together. Yes, the health of our school children is very important to us all, but so is that of their teachers.

You'll Relish Hamburgers Even More When You Use Relishes

ALMOST everyone likes hamburgers. And they taste even better with these easy-to-prepare special relishes.

Mayonnaise Pickle Relish (Makes 1 cup)

One-half cup mayonnaise or salad dressing, ½ cup sweet pickle relish, 2 teaspoons grated onion, freshly ground pepper to taste. In a small bowl or a jar, combine mayonnaise or salad dressing with remaining ingredients; blend well. Cover and keep in the refrigerator until time to serve with hamburgers.

Mustard Mayonnaise (Makes 1 cup)

One-half cup mayonnaise or salad dressing, ½ cup prepared mustard, 1 tablespoon prepared horseradish. In a small bowl or a jar, combine mayonnaise or salad dressing with remaining ingredients; blend well. Cover and keep in the refrigerator until time to serve with hamburgers.

Ever hear of Catch-a-Fellow Salad? It's quite a dish—whether or not it catches a fellow.

Catch-a-Fellow Salad (Serves 6)

Six hard-cooked eggs, chopped; ½ cup finely chopped celery, ½ cup finely chopped pimento, 2 tablespoons chopped, green onion; 1 teaspoon prepared mustard, ½ cup mayonnaise or salad dressing, 6 large tomatoes, salt and pepper to taste, crisp salad greens. In a bowl, combine eggs, celery, pimento, onion, mustard and mayonnaise or salad dressing; mix thoroughly. Cover and chill several hours.

For each salad, turn the tomato stem end down and cut into quarters, not quite through. Spread tomato quarters out a little

on the crisp salad green and spoon egg salad mixture into the tomato roses. Or cut each tomato crosswise, into 3 slices. Arrange the largest tomato slice on the crisp salad greens. Top with egg salad mixture, then with second tomato slice, egg salad mixture and remaining tomato slice.

Health and Beauty

Listening to a group of ladies talking, the writer is impressed that one of the most absorbing topics of conversation is cooking recipes.

Most of the interest centers around desserts and foods that are mixed and combined with condiments to make them taste good. Civilized races have gotten so far away from the simple food provided by nature, that it is no longer palatable to them, unless seasoned with condiments. Probably no race of people in the world suffers so much from constipation, colitis and intestinal disorders as the Americans.

In our own country, malnutrition is evident among the rich as well as the poor. There is no state in which there is any excuse for this. Vegetables of every kind as well as many fruits, will grow if planted and given reasonable care. Every little farm should provide milk and eggs in abundance for the needs of the family.

Somehow our boards of health do not get very good results by sending out doctors and nurses to remove tonsils and hold dental clinics. It is like pouring a little water on a burning building. Instruction in the care of the body; must begin in the schools and homes.

The prospective mothers should be instructed how to eat properly, in order to put the right material into the teeth of their unborn children. Calcium or lime enters largely into the formation of sound teeth. The expectant mother should eat fresh leafy vegetables, beans, fruit, milk, etc.

The diet should be rich in lime and phosphorus. Only in this way will the child form sound teeth.

The baby should have milk; the first breast milk is best; fruit juices and cod liver oil with plenty of sunshine. If this regimen were carried out, the expensive dental clinics could probably be dispensed with in a few years.

The average child goes to school after a breakfast of hot biscuits (white), a piece of bacon and a cup of coffee if he wants it. The families who can afford that sort of diet could provide milk instead of coffee, whole wheat instead of white flour. Eggs could be substituted for bacon every day or two. Some butter could be served also.

A supper of fruit, milk, whole wheat bread, or oatmeal would spell the difference between undernourished sick children and healthy ones.

Give the children plenty of bread and cereals that have not been devitalized by removing everything but the starchy portion. They like fruit.

Perfume has been important to woman for hundreds of years. The composition of a perfume is a complex affair. It would take a scientist to explain the ingredients and "why" to you.

The best thing to do is to put your trust in the name of a good manufacturer and a reputable shop. The seal should be unbroken.

It is a good idea to buy a small amount of a new scent and give it a try before investing in a large bottle. Your body chemistry can change the scent of a perfume. Keep trying until you find one that can really become a part of you.

Lastingness is not necessarily the test of a good perfume. Here again your body chemistry comes into play. In general, the heavier spicier scents last longer than the light floral ones.

Perfume will out-cling and out-last cologne. This is why it is more expensive. Most perfumes will not live longer than four hours on the skin. For this reason, it is a good idea to carry a small flacon in your purse.

American women often do not wear enough perfume. The best way to apply perfume is to spray it on to the pulse spots—temples, throat, inner wrists and the crook of the arms.

It is wise not to apply perfume directly to fabric or fur. Never put perfume in white or pale colored furs or fabrics.

Once you have opened a bottle of perfume, use it. Perfume evaporates and its scent will change if left to age. Seal perfume very carefully each time it is opened.

To most persons Sulphur Butterflies are best known as the yellow to orange butterflies that may be seen in flocks clustered on the ground around some roadside pool. So conspicuous are these flocks sometimes that even an amateur may make a safe guess as to their identity as he whizzes by in a speeding automobile.

Holland's "The Butterfly Book" lists eleven kinds of Sulphur Butterfly under the genus *Colias* and Holland lists two in his simpler "Butterfly Guide." Lutz in his "Field Book of Insects" lists two species of *Colias* and points out that they differ from the commoner better-known Cabbage Butterflies by having silver-centered spots on the under sides of the wings, which spots are lacking in the Cabbage Butterflies.

Comstock in his "Introduction to Entomology" lists three Sulphur Butterflies, each under a different genus and none under "*Colias*." Klotz in his estimable "Field Guide to the Butterflies" applies the common name of Sulphur Butterfly to eight out of the ten species of *Colias* he mentions. It should be obvious from this that while you can make a good guess at a bunch of butterflies around a mudhole you may get deeply involved if you try to rationally simplify the literature you will find on them in the average library.

We are not here too concerned with meticulous details about these butterflies. Even our artist did not venture a guess as to the species he was drawing but instead merely listed his subject as belonging to the genus "*Colias*."

The name Sulphur Butterfly is used rather promiscuously. While Klotz lists eight species as belonging in the genus *Colias* he also considers members of the genus *Anteos* as being "Angled Sulphurs," three members of the genus *Phoebis* as being "Tropical Sulphurs" with two others lumped with them. He gives the common name of "Sulphur" to six of the seventeen species of the genus *Eurema* which he groups as the "Little Sulphurs."

For our purposes here we must mention that all of these butterflies are members of the family Pieridae which are grouped as the Whites and Sulphurs. The pigments formed from the uric acid wastes of their bodies are not found in other butterflies. In many of these butterflies there is a difference in the wing patterns in the different sexes and many times the females of typically yellow species may be white. There is also sometimes seasonal differences in members of a common species. The food of the larvae of the butterflies most frequently considered as sulphurs is usually clovers while our typical cabbage butterfly and its close relatives feed essentially on the mustards. There are usually many generations in a year due primarily to the relatively short larval period.

All this apparent confusion might invite you to study these interesting and common butterflies that the National Wildlife Federation presents to you through its Wildlife Stamp series.—E. Laurence Palmer

Ideal of Church-Home Still Lives

WHEN we look back on the origins of the Christian church, we are reminded that the churches, in various places where the missionary journeys of Paul and others led to their establishment, were in the homes of the disciples.

Saint Paul, in greeting Priscilla and Aquila, says, "Likewise greet the church that is in the house."

A church could not very well be maintained in a home without the family being a part of it, and family religion is strongly exemplified in the experiences of these early Christians.

The home and family, therefore, were of great importance in the beginnings of the Christian church. Their status suggests very clearly what ought to be the relationship between the church and the home, between Christian belief and practice and family life, at all times, and in all places.

However, one must realize without any undue pessimism that in most, if not in all, communities today the facts and conditions regarding church and home are very different from those that the New Testament records.

In the great multitude of cases, such strictly Christian homes are perhaps the exception, even where there is profession of Christian faith. To mention one example: For good or bad, the rule of parents in the home is no longer what it was in those early Christian homes.

And present-day conditions create new difficulties, as families are not often together as they once were.

But the ideal, implicit in Christian faith and teaching, and in the close association of home and church in the days of early Christianity, still remains.

Most gun owners don't realize that the reputable American gun manufacturers put their finished product through a series of tests that are every bit the equal of the much-touted European proof-testing methods.

In general, proof-testing, either here or abroad, involves firing of a cartridge that develops more pressure than would any normal factory load. In addition to this proof-testing and targeting-in, it is common practice among American companies to function-test firearms.

This means firing the gun as it normally would be fired in common usage. If it is a lever-action rifle, cartridges of various makes and bullet weights are inserted into the magazine and the operator loads and fires in the same manner you would in the field.

All this actual testing with cartridges is the final step in the manufacture and checking of a reputable American-made firearm. Prior to this stage, gauges are used at virtually every point in manufacturing and assembling, and dummy cartridges are used whenever necessary.

It is therefore understandable, arms expert Walter J. Howe points out, that after all this testing, gauging and proving, the manufacturer is puzzled when he receives a complaint that his gun caused serious injury or death to a person because it did not perform properly.

Nowadays, when an accident happens because of part failure or malfunction, the trouble can usually be traced to the fact that the gun was repaired by someone who used a homemade part rather than a factory replacement. As a matter of maintaining their reputation, manufacturers keep all current and many obsolete parts available for purchase by gunsmiths, dealers and individuals. In no instance are the prices for gun parts so high that it is "economical" for the individual or gunsmith to make it himself.

If people realized how often inaccurately-made or improperly heat-treated parts have been the cause of persons losing life or sight, they would certainly change their attitude about making parts that can be gotten from the manu-

facturer. It stands to reason that the factory, producing thousands of units everyday, by gauge, properly heat-treated, can do a much better job than the amateur or professional gunsmith who has nothing to be guided by but an old part.

Adventurous Era Now Dawning

To college graduates, and all young men and women in the world today, who are setting out to earn a living, the day of opportunity is not past. It is frequently heard that the current high tax structure in this country, and in most countries, discourages initiative and drive, and that the day of individual fortunes is past.

All the facts and figures available refute this as complete nonsense. In almost every community in this great country there are wealthy businessmen who have made every penny of their fortunes since World War II.

The nation is growing in population by 1,500,000 a year, the long-term trend is toward a higher and higher standard of living, and free enterprise system is still respected and protected in these United States.

That is all any ambitious, and talented, young person needs today. While it is true that taxes will take a greater proportion of income than they took twenty or thirty years ago, it is also true that there are many advantages for the youth of today which were not enjoyed by the generation which preceded him.

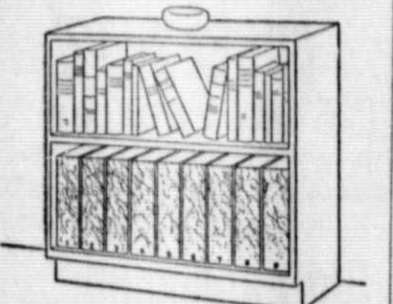

Dressy Letter Files
ORDINARY letter files can be dressed up to present a pleasing appearance on a bookshelf in the home or office. By using a leather-textured hardboard known as Masonite Leatherwood, one can make a set of flat-backed files look very much like a leather-bound set of books.



The transformation is accomplished by cutting to size the required number of pieces, slightly rounding the edges and corners, and then gluing them on. Be sure to weight the backs, or use long clamps, to get a good bond. The Leatherwood may be given a light sheen by the application of liquid wax. The use of die-cut numerals or decalcomanias to distinguish the various volumes is suggested. Instead, letters or numerals could be enameled directly on the hardboard.

Behind The Scenes in American Business

NEW YORK—Climax over the business-affecting sections of the just-passed income tax law almost obscured the personal clauses. However, those are many and important. The next return isn't due until April 15, 1955, but meanwhile the taxpayer may be altering his plans.

If he's thinking of retiring and wondering if his income will stretch, he can check his calculations against the new exemption from the 20 percent basic tax. It applies to the first \$1200 a year of income from pensions, annuities, rents, interest or dividends. He gets that exemption after 65 if he's in private employ, at any age if he has been a municipal, state, or non-military federal worker, and has retired.

Medical expenses begin to be deductible after they pass 3 percent of income. Old level was 5 percent. Maximum medical deductions are up to \$10,000 from \$2500.

If you have been watching to make sure that Sonny earns no more than \$599.99 before you yank him off his summer job, relax. As long as you contribute more than half his support, he's still a deduction.

If you were supporting a helpless person who wasn't close kin, you got no deduction. Now you can. Where the family chipped in to support a dependent, no one got the exemption. Now you prorate it. The dependent has had to live in your home to make you eligible; now he or she can live anywhere.

Women of any marital status, and widowers or divorced fathers, can now deduct up to \$600 a year of baby-sitting or nursery-school costs for small children. Moreover, widows or widowers retain the full married-couple exemption for two years after the death of the spouse.

CANNY RESEARCH—Newest monument to U. S. industry's reliance on research is a multi-million-dollar scientific and development center now a-building at Barrington, Ill., outside Chicago. Beginning in 1955, a prominent can company will use this new modern laboratory to house its staff of more than 150 scientists and technologists.

This company has a long-standing tradition of research-mindedness, which has brought many container advances.

THINGS TO COME—An electronic truck scale, especially useful to highway load limit checkers, weighs each axle load and computes total weight without the truck's having to stop. "Sew Handy" is a seamstress' aid kit containing a needle threader, small blade, stitch-pick, and hem ruler. A polyethylene door for a styrene bread-box rolls up and down like an old-fashioned desk top. A five-inch aluminum spirit level has a clip like a fountain pen to secure it in a pocket.

PRODUCTION PICKUP—Tire production is expected to pick up to substantial levels in the later months of this year, according to a leading tire company forecasts. Tire inventories, which usually reach their peak in April or May and gradually decline until October, are already at an ebb because of strikes in the industry.

Another reason to expect higher tire output lies in the acceptance of tubeless tires as original equipment of some 1955 automobiles. While more than 3 million tubeless tires have been sold since they were introduced in 1947, all of them have gone into the replacement market. Automobiles have not been equipped with these tires at the factories.

So, even though other companies are now producing versions of the tubeless tire, there hasn't been time to warehouse large stocks of them. Production will be stepped up to meet automobile makers' demands.

STILL GROWING—Ten days ago the Census Bureau announced that this year's election day should find more than 100 million Americans of voting age, the first time this has ever happened.

The National Office of Vital Statistics compiled its June figures, and announced that 1,914,000 future taxpayers had been born in the first half of 1954. A footnote on the baby boom: toys were at the top of department store items showing a year-to-year sales increase.

Countering the trend is a year-to-year reduction in June brides: 176,000 in 1954, 186,000 in 1953.

BITS O' BUSINESS—Steel operations edged up a tiny bit last week. Companies hope a bigger upswing is ahead now that vacations are over and auto companies are set on 1955 models.

Mount Conquered

Mount Godwin Austen, second highest mountain peak in the world, was recently conquered by an Italian mountain-climbing expedition. Early in August a nineteen-word message told the world of the achievement.

The leader of the mountain-climbing expedition was Ardito Desio, professor of geology at Milan University, who has made an intense study of previous efforts to conquer the second highest mountain peak in the world.

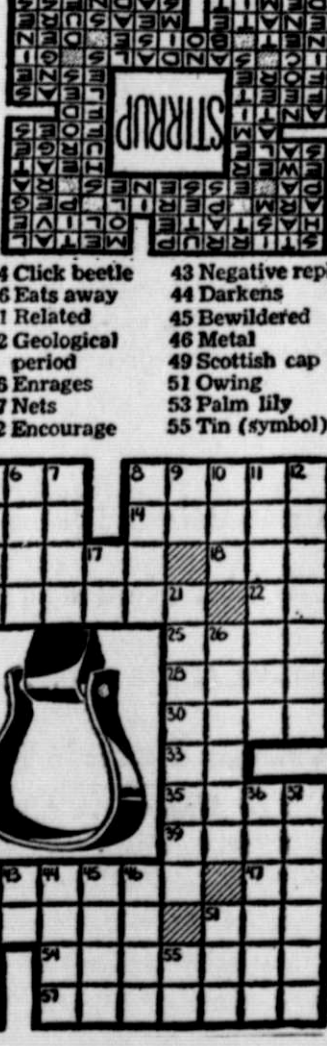

HERE'S HOW...

MAKE A SAFETY SWING

A strong safety swing for the baby uses 3/4-inch lumber. First cut the pieces as shown in the drawing. Exposed edges should be smoothed with a plane.

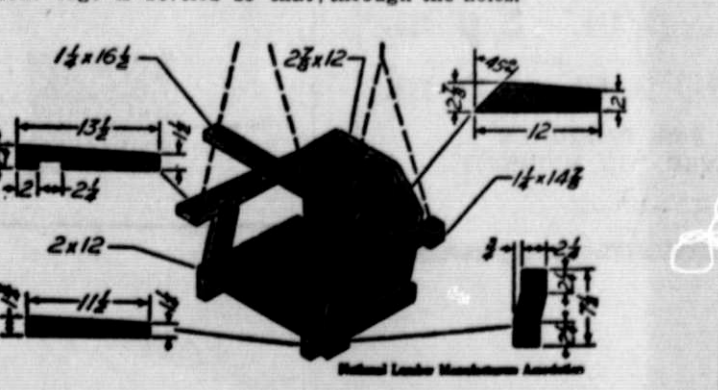
Waterproof glue should be used at all joints, in addition to screws or nails. The front seat slat is nailed to the side runners; then add the rear seat slat, allowing enough space for the back rest to fit between the runners. The center slats are then equally spaced.

The arm rests and supports and back rest support are then assembled, using screws. The front edge is beveled so that

the back rest will slope about 2 inches backward at the top. Then the arm rest supports are fastened to the runners with No. 4 wood screws, 1 1/2 inches long.

A 1 1/4 by 10 1/4-inch supporting piece, not shown in the drawing, is fitted beneath the rear seat slat and between the runners to support the back rest.

One-half inch holes for the ropes are bored in the arm rests as shown. The front ropes are threaded through the sliding safety bar. Knots beneath the arm rests will prevent the rope slipping through the holes.
