James Hilton's Death Loss To Literature

The death of James Hilton recently was a blow to the literary world and was felt in all the English-speaking nations by many who might not be accurately termed extensive readers.

Hilton, a British-born author, who had made his home in Long Beach, California, for the last few years, wrote many memorable novels but perhaps the one which caught the world's attention best was his unforgettable "Goodbye, Mr. Chips."

Another, which might rival "Mr. Chips," was "Lost Horizon," the story about the oasis of peace in snowbound Tibet. That story caught the attention of President Franklin D. Roosevelt and, in 1942, Roosevelt announced to the world that the U. S. bombers which raided Tokyo had come from Shangri-La. Shangri-La was the oasis of peace in Hilton's novel.

The great qualities of "Mr. Chips" were found to be the sterling themes of patriotism, the horror of war, tradition, and honor and respect for those who must do their duty in trying times. It was a study in devotion to a cause, to tradition and to the finer things in life that made "Mr. Chips" an unforgettable novel and one which was felt in all the English-speaking world.

Mr. Hilton decided to live in the United States after he visited California in 1935, and for many years supported himself by writing articles for the Manchester Guardian and the Irish Independent in Dublin. Readers will remember many of his works in addition to the two already mentioned, including "Random Harvest," "We Are Not Alone," and many others. He was a thoughtful, provoking writer.

Old Currencies Used Around The Globe As Legal Tender

Money—"what the other man takes for the things you want"—has rattled in strange shapes in curious transactions.

Cowrie shells, dog, pig and sperm-whale teeth have served as money. Fishhooks, hounds, small shells and stone coins 12 feet in diameter have passed as francs and dollars do today.

Of all odd currencies, the cowrie, white and straw-colored inch-long product of the Indian Ocean has perhaps served more people than any other nonmetallic tender, the National Geographic Society says.

In Uganda a thousand cowries bought a 62-pound ivory tusk; 2,300 bought a cow; a bride was sold for two cowries. Sometimes a surplus of cowries brought inflation. Then tribal leaders heard

of quantities of the shells in an effort to control their value.

Traders Play Tooth Trick

Dog teeth found favor among distant separated Solomon Islanders of the Pacific and Shoshone Indians of North America.

In 1899 the Indians valued a tooth at 25 cents. The islanders, trading among themselves, paid for canoes with teeth. When selling to outsiders, however, the islanders scrutinized the teeth, for traders a half-century ago shook the economy with imports of porcelain counterfeits.

Yap, the Pacific Island, and Paraguay, the South America country, once stood at extremes in weight of currencies. The famed stone money of Yap weighed hundreds of pounds. With circulation nearly impossi-

ble, the enormous stones stood before the rich man's dwelling, bespeaking his resources.

In Paraguay natives cut small shells to shirt button size as money. A hundred buttons bought a sheep, while in Nicaragua the same number of cocoa beans bought a slave. Colored Amazon River stones resembling fish served the Caribs in Guiana as a medium of exchange.

The sperm whale's elusiveness, like gold, raised its teeth to enormous value in the Fiji Islands. Generally owned by chieftains and hand-polished, a tooth bought a bride or a culprit's way out of trouble.

Other things hard to obtain have also passed for money in lands far apart—nails, for instance, were as good as cash at one time in Scotland and in pre-Revolutionary New England. Salt bars are still sound exchange mediums in some countries where the life-giving element is scarce. Beads Passed As Money Eye-appealing baubles similar

to the cowries won widespread popularity. Just as North American Indians gave valued land and skins for beads, the Araucanian Indians of Chile accepted green jadeite beads.

Apart from more ordinary patterns of currency, Antwerp gin became money in Tierra del Fuego a century ago.

In the Pacific, Loyalty Island purchases were made with red fur found under the ears of the flying fox. In the Gilbert Islands buyers once used fishhooks made of shells. Eggs became a limited currency on Naura Island.

The main currencies of Alor, tiny East Indian Island, are metal kettle drums and brass gongs. Arrows are considered as small change.

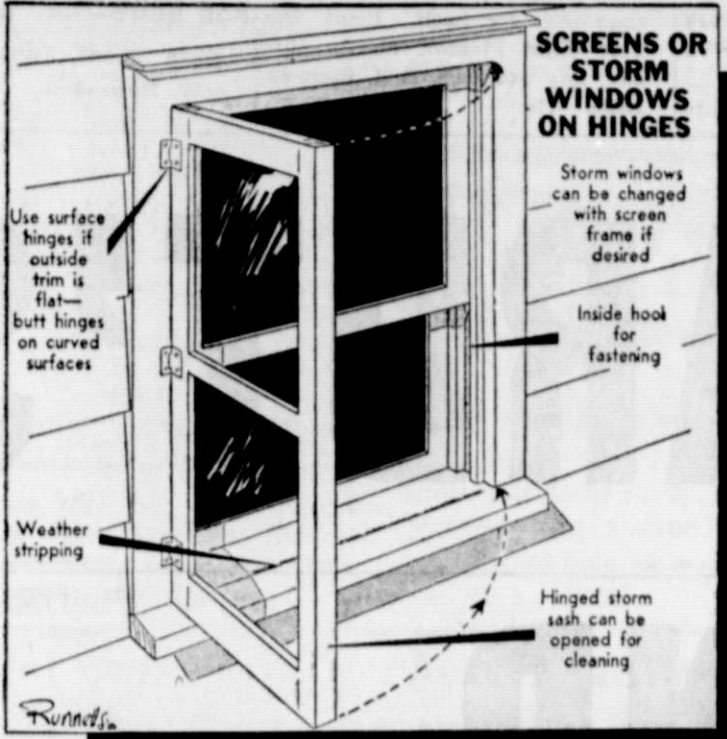

**Hinged, Unused Storm Sash Ease Washing**

Most persons have one or two windows in their houses where they would be glad to leave the storm windows on all summer if it were not for the bother of taking them down and washing them. This reader has a solution.

We have several storm windows which might just as well be left on all summer because we never open those windows.

But because it is a big job to take them off and put them back up, we leave them off until fall when we can wash the windows again before replacing them.

Why wouldn't it be a good idea to hang the storm windows on hinges, the same as a door? Then they could be washed, and the window could be washed without removing the storm sash.

opened during the summer should not be hinged on the side. It would make washing much easier.

Where the outside trim is flat, the hinges can be used on the surface. Where the trim is a curved molding, butt hinges should be used.

By careful installation, loose pin butt hinges could be used, and spare half hinges used on the screen frame. This would simplify cleaning of windows where a screen is used during the summer.

**Pantaloone Fad**

Out in Salt Lake City, some of the girls have started a trend. The trend is taking over among stenographers, school girls and other cute young things.

**Urges Completion of Road to So. America**

Vice-President Richard M. Nixon recently said he would urge the President to make the Inter-American Highway one of his primary Administration projects. Such a highway, long the dream of South-American-minded motorists and businessmen, has been a much talked topic for decades.

Work on such an international road was actually begun in 1933, but has been bogged down since because of politics, rough terrain and for various other reasons. Nixon believes that, at the present rate of progress, the International highway will not be completed for another fifteen to twenty-five years.

However, the Vice-President believes the program could be expedited and that the highway could be opened to traffic in four years if proper emphasis were given the program. The Inter-American highway is 3,349 miles long and runs from Mexico to Panama. It is part of the greater Pan-American highway, which is over 15,000 miles long and which continues from the Panama Canal on through South America.

It has long advocated that major emphasis be placed upon the completion of such a highway project. A land route to the Panama Canal, and beyond it, on into South America, would bring about closer relations, better understanding and improved and enlarged trade between this country, the Central Americas and South American countries.

**Sarah Anne's COOKING CLASS BOILED DINNER BEAUTIFUL**



Corned beef and cabbage is a popular American dinner that is at home both in fancy restaurants and in the dining alcove. Jiggs of comic book fame has for years been rushing to his neighborhood restaurant to order this his favorite dish. Don't drive your husband out of the house — make it for him tonight. We have used the same combination of foods but suggest a brand new method for serving it. Corned beef and enriched yeast-raised bread cubes fill the hollow of a whole cabbage for an elegant meal.

- STUFFED CABBAGE**
- 4 cups enriched yeast-raised bread cubes
  - 1 12-ounce can corned beef
  - 1 medium onion, minced
  - 1 tablespoon parsley
  - 1/4 cup chopped celery
  - 2 small eggs
  - 1 medium head cabbage
  - Salt
  - Pepper
  - 1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese

Arrange bread cubes on a baking sheet and bake at 350°F. (moderate oven) until brown. Remove from oven. Combine cubes with corned beef, onion, chopped parsley, celery and eggs. Cut a slice off the top of a cabbage. Scoop out the center, leaving a firm shell. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Fill with corned beef mixture. Replace top cabbage slice. Secure with toothpicks. Tie cabbage in cheese cloth. Place on a rack in a large kettle filled to about 1 1/2 inches with water. Bring to a boil. Cover tightly; reduce heat and steam about 45 minutes or until cabbage is tender. Remove cabbage and take off cheese cloth. Remove toothpicks. Sprinkle top of cabbage with grated cheese. To serve cut in wedges and serve with cream of mushroom sauce.

**Cream of Mushroom Sauce:** Heat 1 can cream of mushroom soup with 1/2 cup milk.

**Note:** Make cole slaw from leftover raw cabbage.

- Stuffed Eggplant**
- 1 eggplant
  - 3 tablespoons olive oil
  - 10 anchovy fillets mashed
  - 3 cloves garlic chopped
  - 4 tablespoons bread crumbs
  - 3 tablespoons strong beef bouillon
  - Pepper
  - Chopped parsley

Cut eggplant in half lengthwise. Do not peel but cut the center crisscross in all directions with slits about. Saute the two halves on the flat side in the olive oil for about 10 minutes. Place them in a shallow baking dish and cover with the following stuffing.

Mix together the mashed anchovies, the bread crumbs which have been soaked in the beef bouillon. Sprinkle with pepper. Mix well and after spreading it on the eggplant, sprinkle with the parsley, a few bread crumbs and a little olive oil. Cook in an oven 400 degrees for about 30 minutes.

- Spanish Rice with Meat Balls**
- 4 tablespoons butter
  - 1/2 cup chopped green pepper
  - 1/2 cup minced onion
  - 1/2 lb. round steak ground
  - 1 1/3 cups packaged pre-cooked rice
  - 2 teaspoons salt
  - Pepper
  - 3 cups canned tomatoes and juice

Melt butter in a heavy skillet, add green pepper and onion. Cook until tender, but not brown. Form beef into small balls—add to skillet and cook until browned, stirring frequently. Add rice, salt, pepper and tomatoes. Cover and simmer slowly about 10 minutes.

- Spiced Carrot Sticks**
- 3 tablespoons butter
  - 1 tablespoon cornstarch
  - 1 1/2 cups hot water
  - Medium carrots cut in thin strips
  - 1 teaspoon salt
  - 1/8 teaspoon pepper
  - 4 white cloves
  - 2 bay leaves

Melt butter, add cornstarch and stir to a smooth paste. Add water. Cook, stirring constantly, until thick. Pour over carrots. Add salt, pepper, cloves and bay leaves. Cover pan and simmer about 5 minutes or until carrots are tender. Remove cloves and bay leaves.

- Cream Top Apricot Tart**
- 2 cups uncooked dried apricots
  - 4 cups cold water
  - 1 cup sugar
  - 4 tablespoons cornstarch
  - 1/2 teaspoon salt
  - 2 tablespoons butter
  - Baked tart shells
  - Whipped cream

Rinse apricots. Add water and boil 20 minutes. Drain. Measure cooking liquid. Add sufficient water to make 1 3/4 cups. Reserve 9 apricot halves for decoration. Combine remaining apricots, liquid, sugar, cornstarch, salt and butter. Stir until well blended. Cook over hot water until thick, stirring constantly. Pour into baked tart shells. Cool. Garnish

**Snapshot Silhouettes**

You needn't be handy with the scissors, or trace something someone else drew, to make silhouettes. All you need is your camera and your imagination put into action at the same time—that'll give you original ones that are truly your own creation.

The first thing to know about snapping a silhouette is the position of your light. Usually, we take pictures with the light in front of the subject. But for a silhouette, it definitely has to be behind the subject.

For indoor silhouette making, a sheet makes a good background. On a sunny day you can stretch the sheet over a window and pose your subject—in profile, of course—in front of it. Darken the rest of the room as much as you can and you are ready to make a silhouette. This will be a short time

exposure, so place the camera on a tripod or other solid support. You can also snap silhouettes indoors at night. Once again, you use a sheet for a background, this time stretching it across an open doorway so that you can put a light behind it. Just as for daytime shots, you pose your subject, in profile, in front of the sheet and make your time exposure. You can make silhouettes of any subject that can be depended upon to remain still during the length of the time exposure. That rules out most babies and pets. But even then, it is worth taking a chance, even though they might move and ruin one picture. If it works, the resulting picture would be so much fun to have.

# TEACUP TOPICS

Theme song of the spring furs is the hug me tight. In step with the fashion figure, spring furs hug the hips with softness above to conform without emphasizing.

Specific styles turn the fur piece into a spring costume accessor. Convex stoles are shortened and bloused to look more like capes or jackets, one of the most significant silhouette changes of the season. White fox, black fox, foxes dyed in pastel pink or azure blue, in navy blue are favorites for these bloused and cupped stoles.

Natural Norwegian blue fox in misty mauve swirls on net or chiffon foundations. High style stoles six ft. long made of pastel net bordered with fox in an identical tone like turquoise or navy are rich complements to contrast or match spring wool dresses.

Fur boas make a dashing entrance if styled with shoulder slits to wear them high or wear them low, in foxes and in flat furs. Cuddle capes look more like jackets. These shoulder warmers star in mink, fox, Russian broadtail and chinchilla. Zenith of complexion flattery are the sheared rabbit cuddle capes in every color of the rainbow.

Demitasse jackets stop at the waistline with shaping through bands or tucks for a slightly bloused top look and single button closings. They have short sleeves, sometimes are merely vestees, are collarless or with collars thrust away from the neckline. Individual furs have a long, lean look like American broadtail-processed lamb, lightweight Persian lamb, broadtail lamb or sheared beaver. Colors might be anything from snow white and pastels to neutral helges and grays, sparkled with brilliant deep blue or red shades.

Little box jackets, spencers, blazers and belltop briefs reduce size to a minimum with maximum smartness in furs dyed to blend or contrast with spring dresses.

Panel stoles of mink have fresh young plans for spring. More curvaceous, shaped for a bloused elbow look with setback cowl collars on standaway necklines and with clutch pockets. They have suspender styling for shoulder anchorage. Single button closings on front panels of stoles complete their resemblance to jackets.

Mink will be the leader in panel stoles, in all of the mutations and in dyed black, blue iris or champagne. Watch squirrel as the alternative choice, appealing in honey brown dye or natural gray.

Cape jackets hug the waistline for a brand new look. Important in mink, squirrel, sheared fox and sheared beaver. Sleekly sophisticated in broadtail, jet black or natural gray Persian lamb.

Cottons with two dimensional interest: cottons tinted from pastel pinks, lilacs, mauves to brilliant turquoise, scarlet or tangerine; cottons soft to the touch, sheer to the eye silken in their finish—all these and more have a pretty part in wardrobes.

The call to khaki is prevalent. Khaki never had it so good as when this regulation army twill was given a new fashion awareness. It might be used in narrow black and khaki color stripe for a beach coat, hooded above and gathered below for a saucy silhouette. It might take on a vivid turquoise and make naughty but nice pants. It might be used with black cotton satin for a series of play and day clothes. Bleached blond khaki might make a pencil slim dress.

The double entendre of fashion which gives a fresh look and a surface interest to fabrics is highly important. A second dimension appears in cottons which have double weave patterns which play tone on tone in color and look in many cases like elegant brocades. Designers chose blue and silvery combinations for trend setting miniature play dresses and companion pieces. A dramatic travel coat might be of misted pink using a double weave for a slim spring suit.

If you've a liking for cuff links, make a hobby of searching out unusual ones for wear with your blouses, beach shirts, tailored dresses.

Jewelry is light weight this year and comes in colored combinations. Lemon and lime, blue and amethyst. Bracelets are massive but light.

Many white linen collars and cuffs this spring for a fresh, sparkling look.

There are lots of prints for spring, done on wool, silk and cotton. And for summer, brilliant prints on linen.

## Pregnant Women Can Receive Dental Care Without Any Risk

Again and again, dentists must debunk the old wives' tale that a tooth is lost for each child born.

The legend possibly grew during the early days when it was believed harmful for any work to be done on the mouth during pregnancy. As a result, teeth were neglected for the nine months. This often meant that at least one tooth decayed so badly that it had to be extracted.

Today, dentists and physicians agree, it is not only safe for an expectant mother to visit the family dentist, but essential.

Contrary to the popular legend, calcium salts are not drained from the mother's teeth during pregnancy. Nor is the saliva in her mouth unusually acid. Clinical studies also indicate that the dental decay rate during this period is normal. Thus, pregnancy in itself is not a cause of dental disease.

If dental decay increases during pregnancy, it is probably the result of increased and frequent consumption of sweets, poor mouth hygiene and neglecting to have regular dental examinations.

For these reasons, many dentists advise pregnant women to receive dental care, including mouth prophylaxis at intervals of every three or four months. And mothers are instructed to brush their teeth carefully after eating.

Many dentists believe that there can be increased gum disease during pregnancy. Regardless of the cause, however, it is universally agreed that the best protection against gum disorders in pregnancy is good oral hygiene and regular dental examinations.

A tooth that has become badly infected can be removed with safety during this period. In the olden days, dentists would put off removing these teeth until after the baby came, but the normal practice today is to remove the tooth as soon as possible and cure the infection. Extraction of teeth will not cause a miscarriage or harm the baby.

½ cup cream, whipped and sweetened

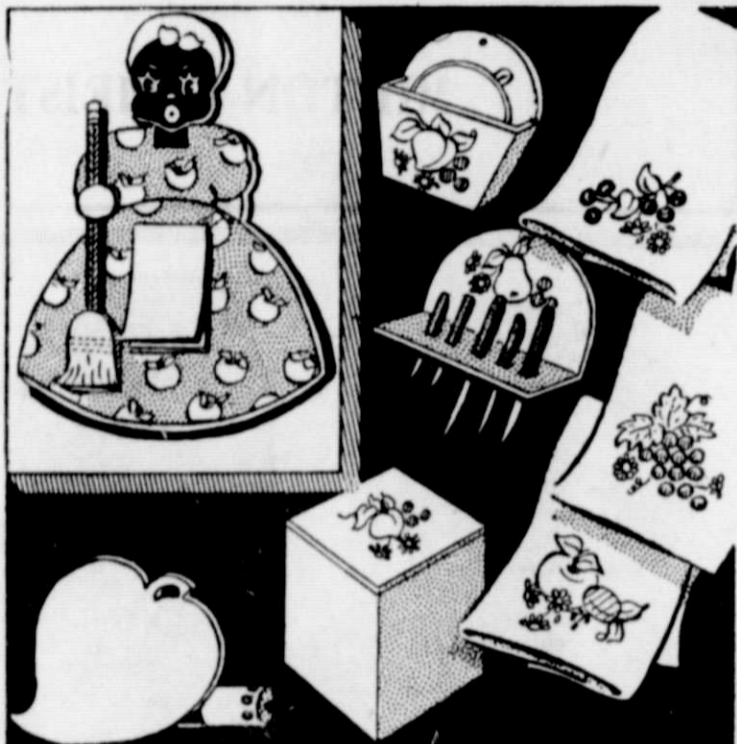

## Factual News About The Eyes

### PEDESTRIANS GET A GLOW FROM SPECIAL CLOTHING

Walking down a dark road needn't be as dangerous now as it was a few years ago, the Better Vision Institute points out. Materials that reflect 150 times as much light as a white painted surface are available, so the pedestrian can make sure he's plainly visible to drivers at night if any light from their headlights falls upon him.

These materials may be used in collars, cuffs, glove-backs, badges, monograms, etc., which may be sewn on clothing or attached to it by adhesive. In the daytime their colors range from navy blue to yellow and the reflectorized quality is scarcely noticeable, but at night they shine brilliantly. One company is producing gleaming stocking caps which can be seen much farther away than white clothing.

Pedestrian deaths are mainly due to poor visibility. Even in the spring and summer about 33 per cent of them happen in hours of darkness and their frequency rises sharply in the autumn, when the days grow shorter. During 1953, pedestrians were involved in 53 per cent of the urban fatal accidents and in 13 per cent of the rural ones.

It would be a good idea for all pedestrians—especially children—to wear some reflectorized clothing when walking about at night, says the Institute. And it would be still smarter for all drivers to have frequent eyesight examinations and make sure their vision is kept in good order.

### 2,500 Questions Asked President

Editor and Publisher, magazine of the Fourth Estate, recently published a tabulation of the questions asked President Eisenhower at his weekly conferences since the beginning of his term of office.

The magazine found that the

President had been asked some 2,500 questions, and that they ranged into almost every field. The significant thing about it all is the readiness of the President of the United States to meet the press and answer any questions which are put forward.

That does not mean that the President answers every question asked, but if he can and if he does not violate security, he makes an attempt to answer them. We can think of no more democratic process, actively working, anywhere else in the world.

This American custom, which it has become in the last two decades, enables every newspaper with Washington representation, and even some of those without it, to forward questions of their readers to Washington for presentation to the President.

Thus, the lowliest citizen can go to the highest citizen in the United States and get an answer to his question, through his newspaper.

In no other country is such a process available to the average citizen. Therefore, in no other country is the relationship between the President and the average citizen so close. This is a significant, and important, foundation of democracy as we know it in the United States.

# SPORTS AFIELD

Why make simple things complicated? Maybe that was your reaction when you first read about special mountings for outboard motors. But, except with pointed-stern craft, special mountings are primarily only for outboard cruisers and other larger, open-sea boats.

If you are interested in getting one, the trick is to use the type of mounting that fits your boat, the size of your motor, and the waves you'll be meeting. Also, choose the kind of mounting that will be easiest for you to work from.

Ordinarily, special mounts are used with outboard boats for big waves because the regular transom, cut down to receive a standard motor, is too low. And they are used with cruisers to keep noise, and sometimes smoke and gas odors, out of the cabin.

According to Willard Crandall, boating editor of Sports Afield magazine, there are fundamentally four positions for mounting an outboard motor. It can be behind the transom, either on a bracket or false transom. It can be on the transom at regular height. It can be higher, with the motor equipped with a long shaft. The fourth way is in a well ahead of the transom.

Regular transom mounting is odds-on the simplest, and it usually is very strong. These two points have made it universally the favorite where big sea waves are not a problem. When they are, there are ways around. A watertight bulkhead can be built ahead of the transom, say at the first frame from the stern. Water that gets over the transom can get into the bulkhead area, but no further, and some sort of drain plug or automatic bailer will let it run back out. This part of the boat can even be used as a live-bait well. Bracing to the bulkhead can strengthen the transom.

Or a small "water trap" can be built just ahead of the motor—something like a glorified drip pan—with appropriate drainage out back. One of these takes up much less space, can help brace the transom and can easily be fitted with a removable cover that extends far enough over the motor to block noise and fumes. Another advantage here is any possible motor dirt or oil is kept entirely out of the boat. Altogether, this sort of installation has so many good points it bids to become a leading type for cruisers.

It does, of course, have some drawbacks. A good motor hatch or cover will hardly remove the sea-wave hazard of regular transom mounting. And motor adjustments and repair become more difficult as the motor is hemmed in by a small compartment.

9 or 10 Miles a Day  
According to one study, the American man, 21 through 65, averages 9 miles a day, the woman 10 miles. The high school student hoofs 16 miles, the policeman paces 18, and a waiter 13.

Probably the outstanding walkers are the English. Hundreds of years ago their walking excursions over the placid countryside developed into pedestrian contests. English heel-and-toe speedsters set the world pace with a formidable array of long-standing records.

Eventually Americans took up the sport. In his 70's Edward P. Weston sped from Los Angeles to New York, 3,483 miles in 77 days. In 1912 Mrs. David Beach strode from New York to Chicago, 1,007 miles, in 42 days, 12 hours. In 1946 George Howe, a spry 92, made 504 miles in 60 days. James H. Hocking, one of the sport's unforgettable figures, marked up 270,000 miles in a long career and philosophized:

"A superb health builder. . . I always averaged about 40 inches to the stride. . . really moving along. The whole trick is stepping off the big toe of one foot, forward with the other, landing on the heel, knees locked, arms swinging."

A number of Americans have journeyed afoot coast-to-coast in informal odysseys. John P. (Iron Legs) Stahl—"a frustrated mailman"—trudged 10,000 miles over Central America, Mexico and the United States as a hobby. He did 13 miles a day usually, once 32.

Rolls Wheelbarrow  
In 1950-51 a woman pushed her son, 9, and a cat in a wheelbarrow from Jacksonville, Fla., to Los Angeles in 13 months. One man, 52, pulled a 350-pound wagon through 44 states while wearing out 19 pairs of shoes.

In 1953 a California woman tipped the scales at 265 pounds. Eying his wife, her husband said: "Let's take a walk." They hit the trail from Fresno to the California-Mexico border. She lost 110 pounds.

Possibly the best publicized hike was Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas's 189-mile, 8-day tramp along the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal from Cumberland, Md., to Washington with eight companions last year.

The greatest hike of all time? That's impossible to pin down. But—late in 1937 Julio Berrisberria, 19, a Venezuelan Boy Scout, left home and plodded over northern South America, Central America, Mexico and 47 states of the United States. At the end of four years he had covered 20,000 miles and had walked through 50 pairs of boots. Some people think that's the record.

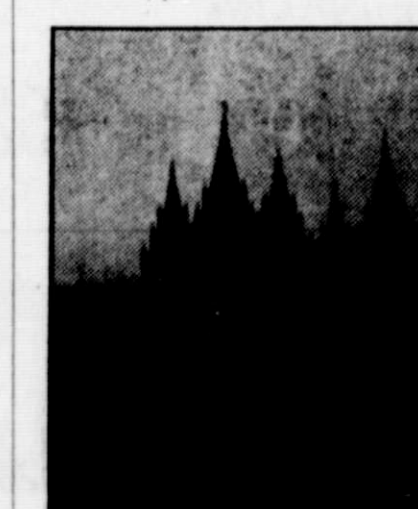
The old expression "fat and happy" is misleading.

## Behind The Scenes in American Business

When March ended, 2,100,000 passenger automobiles were produced in the United States in this first quarter of 1955. What's more, just about that number will have been sold—or dealers will have a good idea where they can sell them without too much delay.

This second statement can't be directly proved, naturally. Registration figures must lag behind deliveries to dealers. However, if automobile dealers felt they were being loaded up with cars, we would all have heard some wails from them by now.

A 2.1-million-car first quarter is being viewed with alarm in some quarters, where it is multiplied by four to get the impossible figure of 8.4 million cars in a year. It may actually mean a 4.2-million-car half-year, since sales rise in the second quarter, but by June or July there will be a slowdown.

Dealers' profits on each car are said to be smaller, but volume offsets this. Manufacturers' representatives are swarming over the dealers' floors, offering their assistance in keeping the dealer in good shape for the real competitive battle, which will set in about July 4 and last until new-model shutdowns after Labor Day.

BOUNTIFUL BOARD — Americans can choose among more than 190 varieties of fish for any meal delicacies. That's in startling contrast to the days many oldsters who lived inland can remember—when the standby was salt mackerel or salt codfish (in small, flat wooden boxes).

This year, says the head of a large food chain's national fish department, total fish and other seafood consumption in the United States will amount to 1.7 billion pounds, or nearly 11 pounds per American.

Modern facilities of processing and freezing fish are responsible for the great gain in recent years in use of fish, he believes. In the 1880's, when coastal fishermen had to round up the elusive mackerel in the April-to-November season when this favored fish appears off the North Atlantic coast, total catch was a fraction of today's amount, and fresh fish were strictly seasonal treats.

THINGS TO COME—An oil can shaped like a fountain pen clips to the pocket of your overalls. No leaks, say the makers. . . In Minnesota, the Blue Cross gives reflective stickers, shaped like its emblem, to motorists. . . A camera the size of a penny box of matches makes pictures which develop into 2½-inch-square prints. . . A do-it-yourself windshield washer, installed by drilling six holes in the hood of your car, squirts enough fluid to clean the windshield at the touch of a foot.

CLEAR SKIES AHEAD — One of the darkest smudges on the bright record of U. S. ingenuity is failure to cope with the growing problem of air pollution. Private industry and public authority have struggled to get smoke, haze and smog out of the atmosphere, with uniform lack of success.

Air pollution's toll has been set as high as \$5 billion a year, in damage to merchandise, homes and other buildings, and plants. In Los Angeles County alone smog is charged with ruining \$480,000 worth of vegetables annually.

A robot control with electronic eyes has just entered the battle against air pollution in Philadelphia. In a \$6.5-million waste-removal program there, fifteen incinerators, of capacities ranging from 100 to 150 tons of waste daily, will get electronic units to keep them from filling the air with smoke and fly-ash. Designed by a manufacturer's industrial division, the robots will keep the incinerators' flames at ideal heat to assure perfect combustion.

OMEN FOR PEACE — Observers who have been following New York's and Chicago's big commodity exchanges for a number of years contend that the war clouds in the Far East are ready to blow over. The agury on which they depend is that nearly every commodity has begun dipping in price.

The connection with the Oriental commodities—rubber, pepper, tea, burlap and cocoa—is of course obvious. These would be immediately and dramatically affected by an outbreak of war.

Commodity prices have pointed in the wrong direction just before major shifts in the economic climate, but the old-timers claim that much more often they have predicted a trend when no one else did. The rise in cotton and lumber in 1914, for example, forecast World War I when all the prophets were saying the Serejevo incident would blow over.

## HERE'S HOW . . .

### MAKE A GARDEN TOOL BENCH

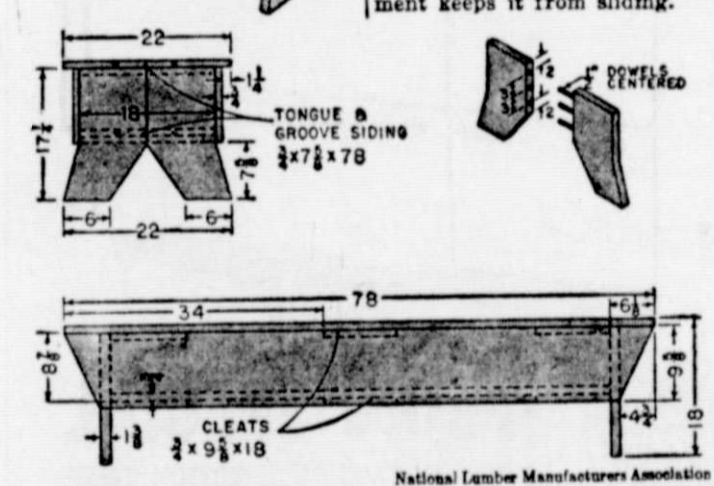
A garden bench may also serve as a storage chest for garden tools, sports equipment or toys. A similar bench will be useful in an indoor playroom.

The chest is made 18 inches wide inside to accommodate rakes.

Tongue and groove lumber is used for the top and bottom, and the edges are painted with white lead, before assembly, to aid weatherproofing. Use No. 10 brass flat-head, wood screws, 1 1/4 inches long for fasteners.

The broad leg pieces are made of two 2-inch boards doweled together to form a piece 22 by 17 1/2 inches, before shaping. Use a 1/2-inch dowel, inserted in each piece to a depth of 1 1/2 to 2 inches, and waterproof glue.

The top lifts on and off easily, and the cleat arrangement keeps it from sliding.
