Have A Chest X-Ray Regularly To Detect Any Signals of T. B.

Have you had a chest X-ray lately? Yes, even though you may look healthy and feel fine, still your lungs may be harboring the germs of tuberculosis. And a chest X-ray is one of the easiest and quickest ways of checking. Since tuberculosis often attacks without any noticeable symptoms, persons may have the disease in its curable, early stages without being aware of it. They may even allow their best chances for recovery to slip by simply because they don't realize that the germs have "set up housekeeping" in their bodies. Such unsuspected cases among the apparently healthy keeps up the risk for each of us of contracting tuberculosis. Especially is this true for older people—men more so than women.

X-rays take only a minute or two of your time, are painless, and can be obtained through your family doctor. Facilities may be available right in his office, at your local hospital or county T. B. sanatorium, or at the mobile X-ray units that visit your community at regular intervals.

No, one X-ray does not tell the whole story. Suspicious shadows may mean T. B. in the lung—or they may be caused by something else. The doctor often must make fore he can say for sure: "This is T. B." But the X-ray picture points the way.

Since treatment of tuberculosis is most successful when the disease is diagnosed early, a chest X-ray is one of the four best forms of "health insurance." Should certain other diseases such as cancer of the lungs or some heart ailments be present, a chest X-ray may also discover their early signs.

If your doctor says your X-ray shows healthy lungs, you have no cause for worry. Of course you will need another X-ray occasionally to make sure everything stays O. K. If he says your X-ray makes him suspect trouble in your lungs, you will have taken the first step towards arresting the disease and regaining good health.

Plant for Colorful Foliage in Fall

Many home owners like to plant trees that will provide rich green foliage in summer and glorious reds, oranges and yellows in the fall, according to the National Arborist Association. Evergreen trees of course will provide beautiful green color all year from light green during the height of

their growing season to deep green all winter. In the foliage of deciduous trees, which shed their leaves, there are two groups of coloring pigments. These are the carotins, which provide yellow color; and the anthocyanins, which cause leaves to turn red. Soil fertility and the amount of water available also have some effect on foliage color.

Trees having gray foliage include the Russian olive, and some of the poplars, willows and the

little-leaved linden. They turn yellow in the fall.

Trees with red fall color include many of the maples, hornbeams, dogwoods, oaks, sassafras, plums, and viburnums.

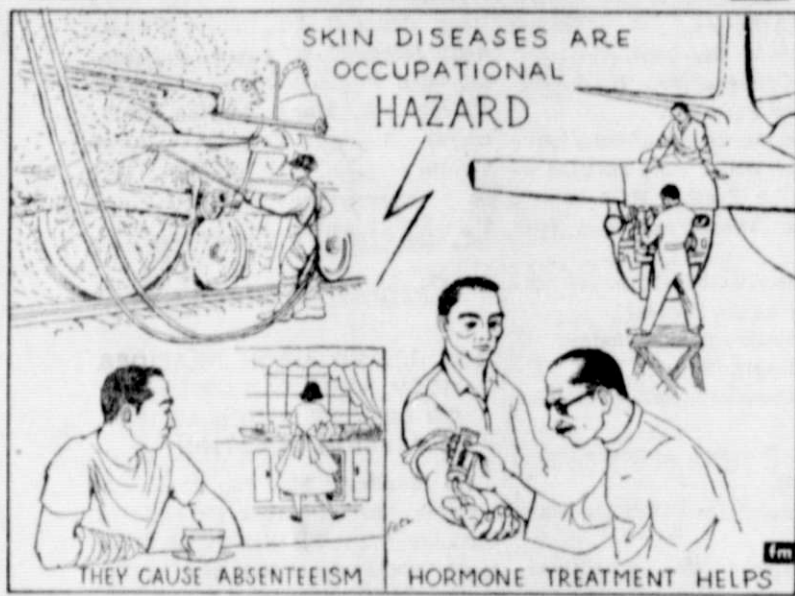
Those with brilliant yellow fall color include some of the maples, birch, redbud, beech, ginkgo, magnolia and ash.

Consult with your local arborist or tree expert for trees to give you the colors you want. A mixture of evergreen, red and yellow provide strikingly lovely effects in

the fall months, providing you have the room for a number of trees.

SCIENCE IN YOUR LIFE



Occupational skin diseases are more common than all other types of occupational diseases combined—and are becoming a major health problem for industry — according to Dr. Louis I. Dublin, medical statistician.

"About one per cent of the industrial workers in the U. S. are affected annually by occupational dermatoses, and in some fields the incidence is as high as one out of 15 workers," Dr. Dublin says.

Absenteeism due to skin diseases increased over one-third in the one-year period covered by a recent study of industrial plants in the United States. Skin disease was reported as an occupational hazard in such major modern industries as aircraft plants, railroad shops and textile mills.

However, medical specialists from several countries now report that the hydrocortisone hormone, applied locally, will erase the disfiguring blemishes occurring in a wide variety of these ailments. Cortril ointment has proved effective against hives, poison ivy, allergic

rashes, insect bites, occupational dermatitis and infantile eczema—one of the commonest and most annoying illnesses of young children.

"The results are sufficiently dramatic," reports the *American Journal of Surgery*, "to speculate that the hormone may do for the field of dermatology what the antibiotics have done for the specialty of ear, nose and throat."

Dr. Frederick Kalz and his associates in Montreal reported on a recent clinical study of 581 patients in the *Canadian Medical Association Journal*. They found the ointment "most effective" in the relief of a variety of acutely inflammatory and itching skin conditions.

Kewaskum Community High School Electors!!

As a Taxpayer and Citizen of the Kewaskum Community High School District, I feel compelled to bring some facts to all of of the Electors which should make all Electors vote "NO" at the June 6th Referendum.

Rough sketches and plans were shown to the few electors who appeared at the Special Meeting on May 23. The Architect included a street on the Bilgo Site from Tower street Easterly along the whole South edge of the High School land, and, provided an area just West of the proposed building for a parking lot, which together would accommodate 500 cars, he said.

The Architect generalized the location of the Bilgo barn, when asked its location; but I feel sure it will be so close to the school the district will have to purchase it.

Mr. and Mrs. William Volm advised the electors they expected the school district to complete its contract with them and purchase their land at a cost to the district of about \$10,000.

So the following facts should influence the vote of all of us, I honestly believe:

Bilgo Site

1. COST:
 18 acres of land\$31,000.00
 Cost of barn 5,000.00
 Volm contract 10,000.00
 \$46,000.00

2. MAINTENANCE COSTS:
 Building and maintaining streets are very expensive. Twin sewage pumps must be installed and maintained.

Volm-Rosenheimer Site

COST:
 21 acres of land\$17,000.00
 I assume the Bilgo site can be sold for its purchase price. Leaves more money to build more roads.

MAINTENANCE COSTS:
 Considerably less streets to build and maintain. No sewage pumps to be installed and maintained.

So more of our limited borrowing power can be used to build class rooms and not streets if you vote "NO" on June 6th.

3. FUTURE:
 Probably more land lost for streets when Tower Avenue is extended north and a street built along the north boundary.

FUTURE:
 Streets already planned on adjoining land owned by others or on land offered without cost.

4. PARKING:
 500 cars at 80 cars per acre takes six acres for parking purposes.

PARKING:
 Parking on village streets will be sufficient in the foreseeable future.

So more land available for strictly educational purposes if school is placed on Volm-Rosenheimer site and if you vote "NO" on June 6th.

5. EDUCATIONALLY:
 Grade school children and high school children (ages 6 to 19) will intermingle and go to school on same site. This is inadvisable!

EDUCATIONALLY:
 Grade school children will be separated from high school children by half a mile at least. This is certainly advisable!

6. EXPANSION:
 The architect and school district's attorney both said expansion necessary in 5 years. Where will we find room to expand for the next 50 years?

EXPANSION
 Practically this whole site is being retained for educational purposes and additional acreage can now be purchased at a reasonable price. No like problem here.

So for educational reasons vote "NO" on June 6th!
Will a "NO" vote on June 6th delay building program?

Only until the annual meeting the end of June when further study and deliberation could well result in a wiser decision. A "NO" vote on June 6th could prompt our school board to continue its studies during the following 3 weeks and then give us all the story at the annual meeting. Then we can decide on the basis of all facts at the annual meeting.

Vote "NO" at the Referendum on June 6th!

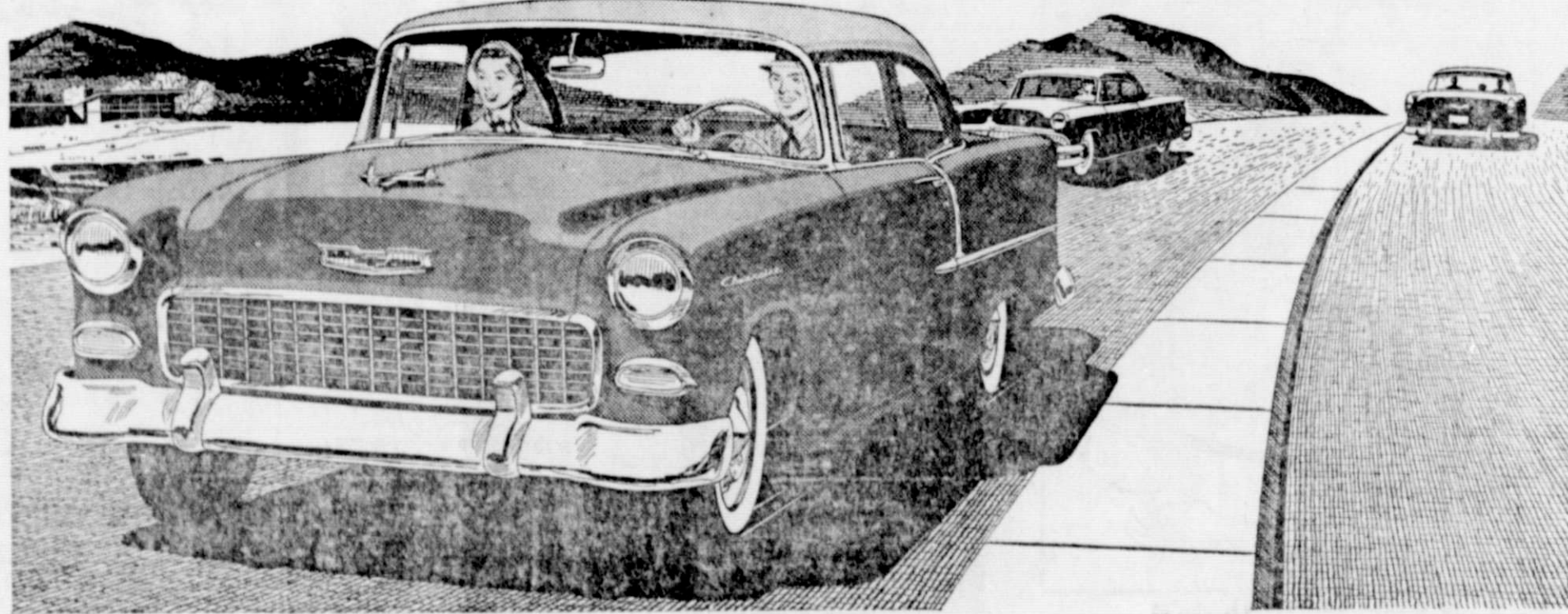
