MARVIN MARTIN APPOINTED CIVIL DEFENSE DIRECTOR

On July 14 Governor Kohler signed into law new civil defense legislation. This law makes it mandatory for every town, village, city and county to have a civil defense organization. In enforcement of this law, Village President Charles Miller has appointed Marvin A. Martin as civil defense director for the village of Kewaskum.

To provide local public administrators with an explanation of their responsibility under this new law, and to assist them in planning for the civil defense organization they will need to meet their responsibilities, the state office of Civil Defense has scheduled a series of 14 one-day institutes throughout the state. The state OCD is also mailing a copy of the new law to the chairmen of the 71 county boards.

Kewaskum Beats West Bend, 9-7

The Kewaskum Chevs knocked off West Bend under the lights here Thursday night, 9 to 7. The Lithias, who had been tied for second place with the Chevs, were as good as dropped out of the running for the second half title while Kewaskum increased their chances for the championship. The Chevs now are tied with Cedarburg for second, one-half game behind leading Port Washington.

The setback came as a surprise to the heavy hitting Lithias, who had won 7 of their last 8 games. This string included four victories in tournament play at Plymouth, where they emerged the champions and became eligible to compete in the Wisconsin Semi-Pro baseball tourney at Milwaukee County stadium. They played their first tournament game Friday afternoon of this week.

The Chevs got off to a whirlwind start against West Bend, taking a 7-0 lead before the visitors scored their first runs in the seventh inning. Pitcher Glen Backhaus was coasting along in great style with a shut out until the Lithias got to him for four runs in the 7th. The Chevolets pushed over three runs in the second, which was featured by Bob Staehler's long home run. They scored two more in the fourth. The West Bend rally in the 7th made it 6-4 but Kewaskum counted another button in their half of the frame to make it 7-4. The Lithias made one more in the 8th but the Chevs came back with three to sew up the victory. West Bend added two consolation runs in the ninth but they weren't enough.

The Lithias outbit the winners, 14 to 12, but Kewaskum banged out five extra base hits, including another home run by Augie Bilgo in the 7th. Bilgo, John Tessar and Gordie Wierman paced the Chevs with three hits apiece. "Red" Stautz, a former Kewaskum player, led the Lithias with four safeties in five trips.

Louis Miller pitched for West Bend. He fanned five and walked two. Backhaus struck out three and passed two. Although they were hit freely both pitchers went the route.

On Thursday night of this week the Chevolets played an exhibition game against Waucousta and next Thursday night, Aug. 18, they play their last league night game with Cedarburg here. The latter and Kewaskum are tied for second place. Both have a chance for the second half title and this will be a crucial game.

HELLO! Statesman Has New Look

This week's Statesman comes to you for the first time with a new look and in a new form. Like so many other newspapers in the country we have changed to modern, tabloid size.

When you first picked up your paper it probably seemed small to you. Actually it is far larger. With this size we now have 60 more inches of space for news and advertising each week. Formerly the Statesman consisted of four regular-sized pages of all home print. Besides the extra space it allows, this new size makes for much easier reading and more convenient handling. Furthermore it spreads out the news over more pages and provides an advantage for advertisers. With fewer ads on a page they will be seen by more people.

For many years the Statesman has had four pages or ready prints to fill half of the paper. First we purchased them from the Western Newspaper Union and of late years from the Journal Publishing Co. at Grantsburg, Wis. Now both have discontinued supplying ready prints because nearly all newspapers have turned to all home print and there is no more call for ready prints. Also, there isn't another company in the state or this area left which supplies the prints. So we didn't have much choice. All that was left to decide was the size and style we would turn to. Rather than print only four pages of our former sized paper, after much thought and debate, we chose the eight-page, more advantageous size.

While making the transformation to our new size, you will notice that we also changed to new type for our headings. That is 20th Century bold face type glaring at you in both 24 point and 18 point sizes. While at it we also purchased new column rule, new border and new wood furniture (spacing) to produce the Statesman. We also had to buy more than a quarter of a ton of newsprint paper. And more changes will be made later.

You can understand that this change over was a very big job this week. Our press and folder had to be changed over, new chases had to be used for the smaller pages, border, column rule and furniture had to be measured and cut, new type had to be inserted in the type cases and old thrown out, the pages had to be planned and changed, type and ads taken out of the old chases and put into the new, trips had to be made to Milwaukee and other cities, and there was much other work. So if your ad or news item isn't just where you'd like it to be please bear with us until it can be changed and we get back to normal. Also please forgive us if you locate a few errors and everything doesn't show up the way it should. Like we said, it was a big job.

We hope you will get to like our new size and style as you get used to it. More improvements will be made from time to time and the additional space will allow us to run a few features, cuts and pictures. And there you are!

Youth Killed in Plant Accident

Louis Weis, 20, son of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Weis of Campbellsport, was killed instantly when crushed by a 2,000-bound piece of crane equipment at the Gehl Manufacturing company plant at West Bend shortly after 7:30 p. m. Wednesday. The youth had been employed at the plant for only a couple of months.

It was reported that Weis had been standing on the main floor of the plant and giving directions to a crane operator for moving large pieces of machinery. The equipment had been put in place when the overhead crane tore loose from its connection and dropped on the young man.

Plant officials said that Weis was killed instantly. There was no reason given for the downward plunge of the crane equipment and an investigation is underway at the plant.

Weis was a Campbellsport High school graduate where he was active in athletics. He was born at Campbellsport Aug. 19, 1934 and lived there all his life. He is survived by his parents, two brothers, Jerome of Great Lakes, Ill. and Michael at home, and three sisters, Eileen, Barbara and Margen, all at home.

The body is in state at the Twohig Funeral home, Campbellsport. Services will be held at St. Matthew's church there at 9:30 a. m. Saturday. The Rev. Peter Schwamb will preside and burial will be in the church cemetery.
