On Thursday, Oct. 27, and Friday, Oct. 28, Kewaskum Community High school will hold its annual homecoming celebration on the local athletic field.

Polio Vaccine Now Ready; Order Now

The Salk polio vaccine available to all Wisconsin children from birth through 14 years of age through their family physicians is being shipped out daily by the state board of health in increasing quantities. Dr. Carl N. Neupert, state health officer, announced Wednesday.

The funds which have been allotted by Congress for the purchase of vaccine for Wisconsin children is only enough to provide vaccine for approximately half of the children in the 0 through 14 age group, Dr. Neupert points out. This means that there just isn't enough polio vaccine to go around at this time and that it is being given on a "first come, first served" basis just as long as an equitable distribution throughout the state can be maintained.

Enough vaccine will be set aside by the board of health to immunize 10 per cent of the children in the 0 through 14 age group through public clinics, but this vaccine will probably not be available until January of next year. For these reasons, Dr. Neupert advises parents not to wait for public clinics but to see their family physicians and arrange for immunization of their children at the earliest opportunity.

Dr. R. G. Edwards, Kewaskum health officer, urges parents to please contact their family physician at once so that he may requisition the doses needed for your child.

The posters were based on the Community Chest theme of people helping others. For her prize she will receive a deluxe edition of the Book of Knowledge.

Three honorable mention awards were won by Gene Albright, 11, of R. 1, Franksville; Michael Shovers, 11, Shorewood, and Robert Wilson, 10, Milwaukee. Each will receive a ceramic figure of a Red Feather Kid, the chest's "Oscar."

Two girls, ages 15 and 16 years, both of R. 1, Kewaskum, students at Kewaskum Community High school, were reported as missing on Tuesday morning when they failed to report for classes at the school. The complaint was received by Chief of Police Roland Pledl from Principal Clifford M. Rose.

Arriving on the school bus at 8:30 a. m. Tuesday the girls failed to report for school. Instead they purchased Greyhound bus tickets for Milwaukee on the 8:55 a. m. southbound bus. The girls had \$5.00 each which they had obtained at home by telling their folks they needed the money to purchase new books at school.

When no trace of the girls was found and they had failed to return by Wednesday a report that they were missing and a description of the pair was radioed to Milwaukee police by the Washington County Sheriff's Department. The girls were located in Chicago, Ill. the same day. One of the girl's mother resides in Chicago at 2122 E. 75th st.

The fathers of the girls went to Chicago Thursday to pick up their daughters.

Resignation of E. Brumm Accepted; Settlement Made

Alfred M. Rode, chairman of the Washington County Board of Public Welfare, announced Monday that the difference between Washington county and Eugene A. Brumm, former director of the Washington County Public Welfare Department, have been resolved. Brumm unconditionally resigned as director of the welfare department effective Oct. 15, 1955 and his resignation has been accepted by the Washington County Board of Public Welfare.

Rode's announcement was released for publication this week by Leroy J. Gonring, district attorney for Washington county.

According to Atty. William Marth, counsel for Brumm, the amount of the settlement amounted to approximately \$5,100, or the amount of Brumm's salary from the date of his discharge Dec. 10, 1954 until his resignation effective Oct. 15, 1955.
