James D. Reigle Appointed Village President Following Resignation of Charles Miller

TRUSTEE NAMED TO OFFICE VACATED BY MILLER, WHO RETIRES AFTER 13½ YEARS

James D. Reigle, 29, has been appointed president of the village of Kewaskum to fill the unexpired term of Charles Miller, veteran president of Kewaskum who resigned last week.

Miller, who served as president of Kewaskum continuously since he was first elected in April, 1942, tendered his resignation last Tuesday.

Reigle was a trustee of the village. He was elected to that post in April, 1954. His term as trustee would have expired in April of 1956. The unexpired term of the village president runs until April, 1957.

The new village president was appointed last Thursday night at a meeting of the village board when the resignation of Miller was officially accepted. In tendering his resignation, Miller said he was retiring from his post at this time because major projects undertaken by the village have now been completed and he thought the time, in view of his health, was propitious.

A graduate of Ohio University, class of 1949, Reigle is a veteran of World War II, having served two years and two months in the U. S. Army Air Corps where he held the rank of sergeant. He served with the 43rd Air Supply Squadron in Germany.

Reigle is married and has two children, Jeffrey, 4½, and Jennifer, 1. He is a member of the American Legion Robert G. Romaine Post No. 384 and the Kiwanis club of Kewaskum. He is secretary of Regal Ware, Inc., Kewaskum.

"Charlie" Miller took office on April 13, 1942 and held the office of village president of Kewaskum successively ever since that time. He was last elected in April of this year for a two year term.

During Miller's terms in office the Well No. 2 and pump house were built in 1948; the municipal building was erected in 1951; the elementary school in 1950; sewage treatment and incinerator plant in 1955; village ordinances were re-

vised in 1954; the high school property was purchased in 1955; a supervised children's summer recreation program was instituted in 1953; a new village accounting system and yearly audit was put into effect in 1951; new fire truck was purchased in 1950; and many new subdivisions were added since 1942 including the Bilgo addition, Belger addition and Roseland Heights.

A trustee to take Reigle's place on the village board will be named at a later date.

Open House at New Sewage Plant Nov. 27

An open house will be held from 1 to 5 p. m. on Sunday, Nov. 27, at the new \$260,000 Kewaskum sewage treatment and incineration plant, it was announced this week by officials of the village. The open house will be held to give the public an opportunity to inspect the plant.

This modern and efficient plant in a beautiful building located just off of highway 45 a short ways south of the village, was recently completed and put into operation to serve residents of our little city. Everyone who attends the open house will see how the up-to-date plant operates.

Sewage treatment machinery and the building cost approximately \$207,000 with the balance used for the erection and installation of the building and equipment for incineration purposes.

Invitations printed this week are being sent to neighboring city and village officials and others and all residents of Kewaskum and community are cordially invited to attend the open house.

Death of Elmer C. Kluever Tuesday

EDITORIAL

WELL DONE CHARLIE

After serving his community as village president for 13½ years, Charles Miller has resigned his office. With the completion and successful operation of the new sewage treatment plant he felt it was time to heed his doctor's advice and step out of public life.

During Mr. Miller's tenure of office the population of Kewaskum has increased approximately 50 per cent. With this expansion came the many civic problems which are the bedfellows of growth and progress. Through these difficult years the accomplishments of his administration were highlighted by the digging of well number two and erection of its pump house in 1948; the erections of the municipal building in 1951 and the sewage treatment and incineration plant in 1955. A new fire truck was purchased in 1950. A new village accounting system and annual audit was put into effect in 1951. A supervised children's summer recreation program was instituted in 1953, and the village ordinances were revised in

1954. The Bilgo, Belger and Roseland Heights subdivisions have been added to the village since 1942. Other civic improvements have been the street lighting on main street and the systematic improvement of old streets and construction of new streets.

Twenty-five village trustees, three clerks and a commissioner, four police officers, two marshals, three village attorneys, two assessors, and many other village officers have served under Charlie Miller since he took office in April, 1942.

The fact that the voters of Kewaskum have elected "Charlie" to head their village government for over a decade should be ample testimony of their confidence and respect in him. But he indeed deserves a special vote of thanks for his giving of time and self to his community through one of its most difficult periods of expansion. It is largely through his guidance Kewaskum has become a better place to live.

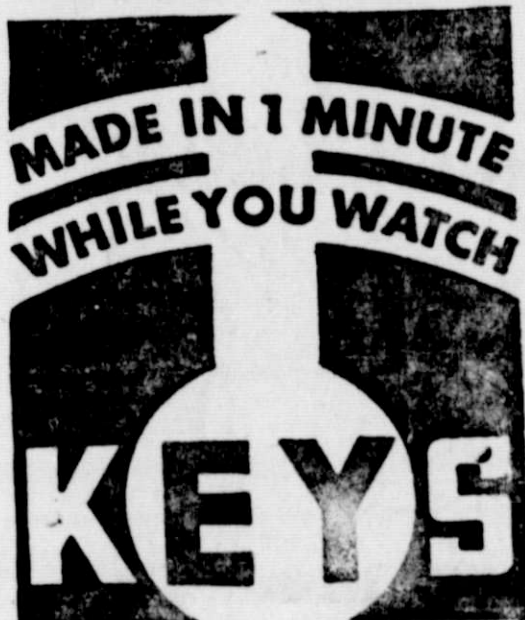

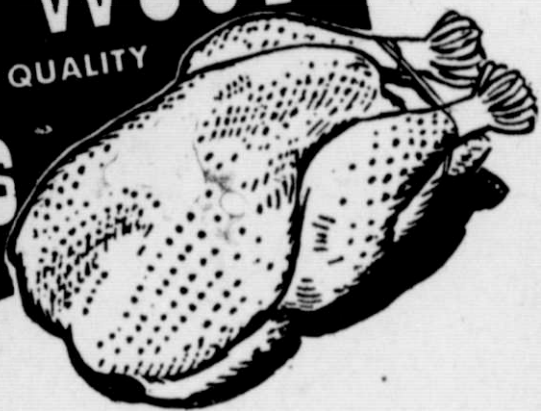

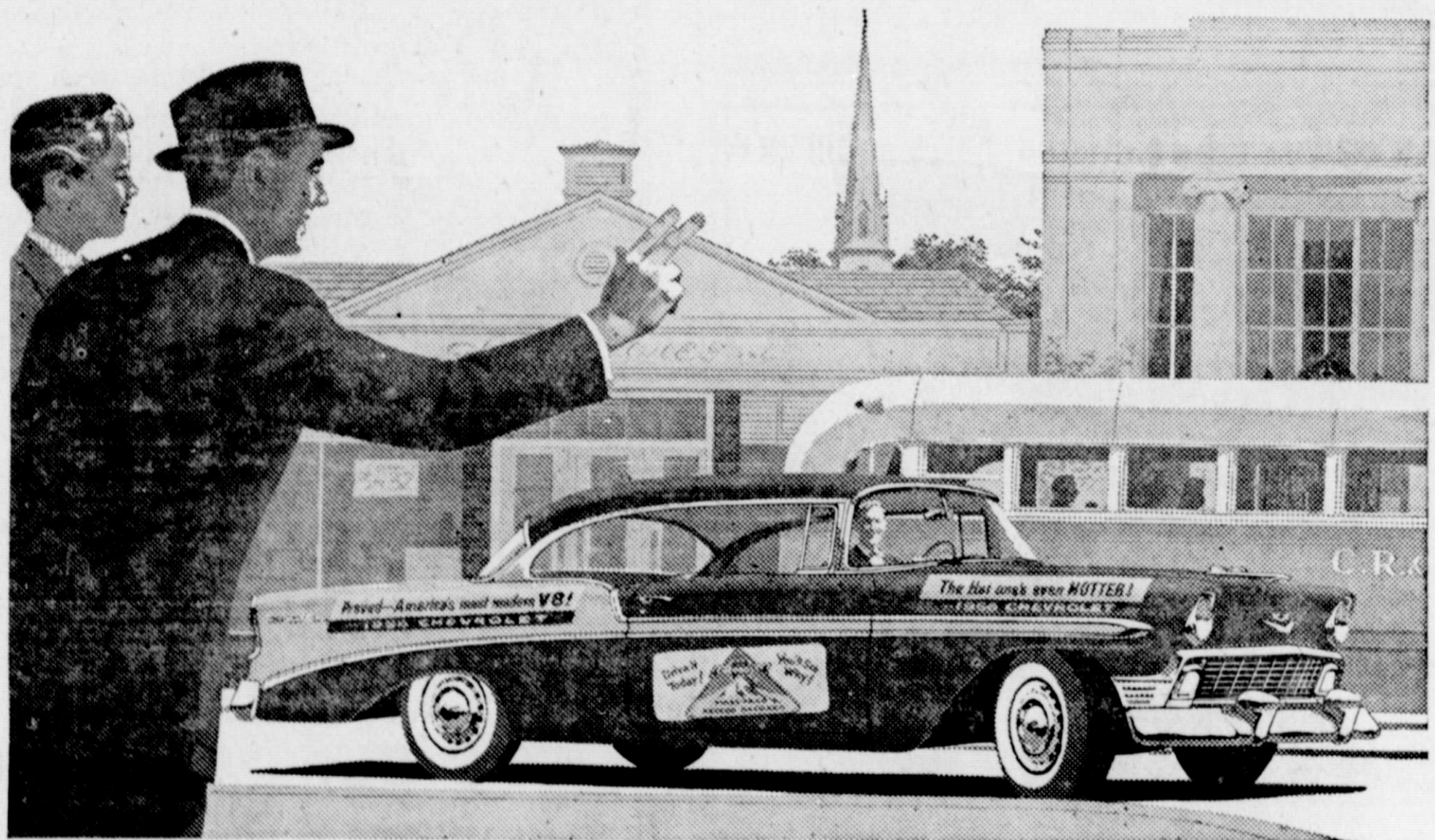

Kewaskum's next contest will be played at Beaver Dam a week from Sunday, Nov. 27, at 2:30 p. m. and this will be another tough one.

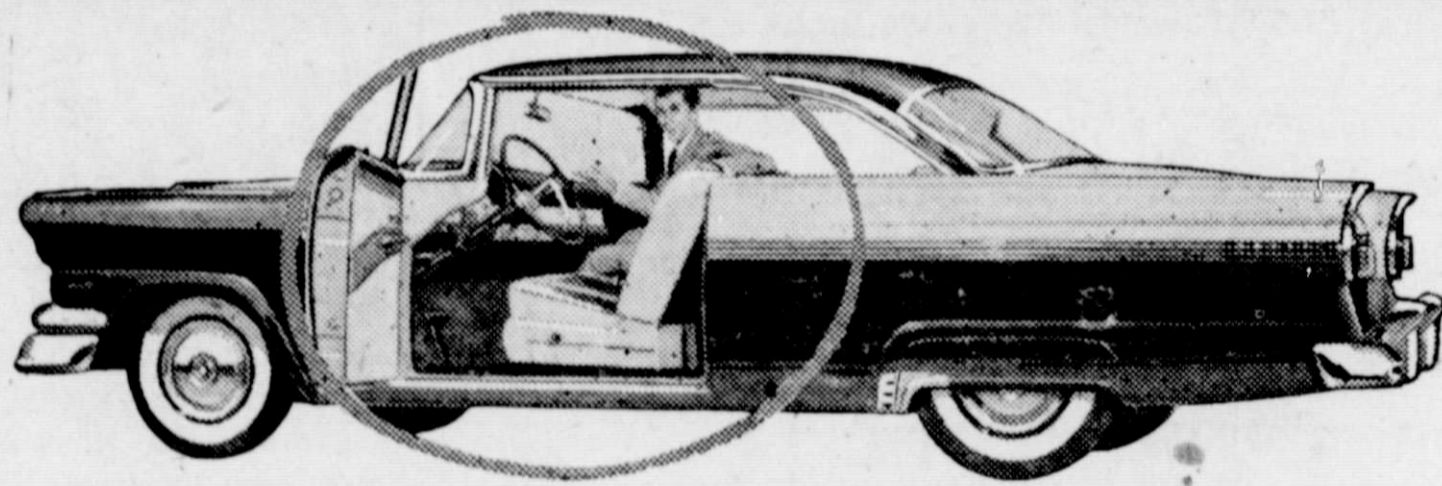

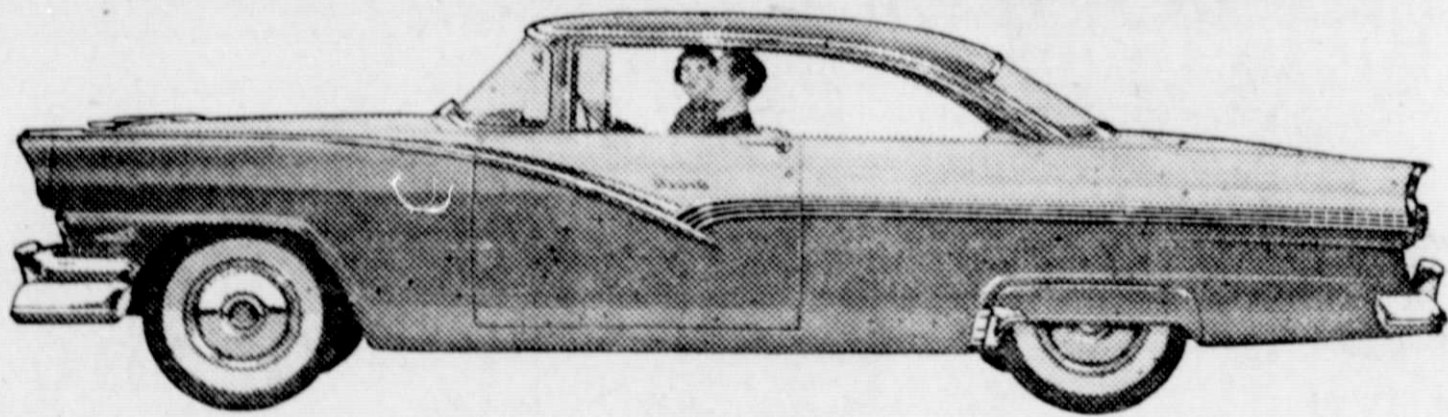
