Val. Peters, 89, Retired Businessman and Former Village President Dies

HARNESSMAKER 52 YEARS AND FORMER TREASURER OF FIRE DEPARTMENT SUC-CUMBS WEDNESDAY

Valentine Peters, 89, retired Kewaskum businessman and former public official, passed away at 10:15 a. m. Wednesday, Nov. 23, at St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend. One of the oldest residents of the community, he had been a patient at the hospital since Sunday.

Mr. Peters was a harnessmaker for 52 years, 40 of them in Kewaskum, before his retirement in 1933. He formerly served as village president of Kewaskum for a two-year term, from April 1933 to April 1935; he held the office of treasurer of the Kewaskum Fire Department for many years and was an honorary member of the department at the time of his death, and served as chief inspector of elections for the village many years.

He was born May 14, 1866 in the town of West Bend. He resided in Minneapolis, Minn. for 12 years and came to Kewaskum in March of 1899. His marriage to Mary Powers took place in Minneapolis.

Surviving are the widow, one daughter, Irene (Mrs. John Strachota) of Milwaukee; one son, Quentin Peters of Milwaukee; two daughters-in-law, one son-in-law, five grandchildren; five great-grandchildren; one sister, Mrs. Math. Weiss of West Bend, and three brothers, John N. Peters of the town of West Bend, Gerhard Peters of Milwaukee and Philip Peters of Slinger rural route. One son, Frank, preceded his father in death on Nov. 4, 1928.

The body will be in state after 2 p. m. Friday at Miller's Funeral home. Funeral services will be held at 9 a. m. Saturday from the funeral home to Holy Trinity Catholic church at 9:30 o'clock. The Rev. F. C. La Buwi will officiate and interment will be in Holy Angels cemetery at West Bend.

Six members of the Kewaskum Fire Department will act as pallbearers for the deceased.

House Moved Along Streets

A house on Second st. which was purchased by Myron Belger from Regal Ware, Inc., was removed from its foundation and moved several blocks to Kewaskum st. on the east side of the village (Belger addition) on Tuesday. The house was formerly owned by Mrs. Robert Backhaus.

The building was moved with a truck, trailer and skids. It was transported along Second and School sts. to First st., east on First to East Water, south on East Water to Main, east on Main to Kewaskum and then north on Kewaskum st. to its new location, a lot owned by Mrs. Walter Belger. Most electric and telephone lines and street lights in the path of the house had to be removed. Wisconsin Electric Power Co. and Telephone Co. crews cut the wires ahead of the house as it moved along the streets and then followed it up to connect the wires again. One by one the streets were closed to traffic during the several hours it took to complete the moving.

Regal Ware, Inc. intends to use the old lot for parking space. Belger will remodel the house into two apartments.

Many Hunters Bag Deer, Number of Them in This Area

Scores of eager deer hunters from Kewaskum and area were out in full force the past week for the nine day season which opened last Saturday and closed this Sunday. Many hunters were successful in their quest for a deer so far. Most of the bucks were bagged in the north woods but quite a few hunters shot their deer right close to home. A large number of hunters had not yet returned home at this writing.

The first Kewaskum hunter to get a deer but who did not get a deer was Marvin Martin. He struck a buck with his car while passing through Horicon marsh on his way north last Thursday evening. The deer was not killed and escaped. Further details will be found in another item in this issue. Marvin and Arno Garbisch hunted in the Norwalk area over the week end and were unsuccessful. Too bad the season wasn't open earlier.

The first successful hunter to report shooting a deer was Richard Backhaus. He hunted alone around Saynor and bagged his buck the opening morning, returning home the same afternoon.

Raymond DeTemple of here and nephew Chuck Andrews of Fond du Lac hunted in Marinette county and DeTemple shot a 15-point buck on opening day.

Chuckie Dreher was seen with two bucks on his car Wednesday morning. Chuck bagged one of them Monday and "Fuzzy" Dreher got the other one Tuesday. They hunted around Crivitz and returned home Tuesday night. Chuck's Dad, Earl Dreher, and his brother Earl, Jr. hunted there over the week end but failed to shoot a buck. They reported seeing quite a few, however.

The first hunter to report shooting a deer in this area was Dick Edwards. He shot a 150 pound buck near Armstrong in the town of Greenbush Sunday.

Hospital Beds for Public Use Bought By Firemen, Union

Announcement was made this week by the Kewaskum Fire Department that two hospital beds are now available for public use to all residents of Kewaskum and members of Local 849. The beds will be loaned to anyone who requires them for use in private homes.

One of the beds was purchased by Local 849 and the other by the fire department and were scheduled to be shipped here late this week. It is hoped to add another hospital bed or two in the near future. At present sponsors for two more beds are being sought.

Persons in need of a bed are requested to contact the fire department. They will be kept at the fire station in the municipal building. Those requiring the use of a bed must have a written statement from their family physician.

Purchase of the hospital beds is another progressive movement by the firemen and local union. The fire department also operates and maintains an up-to-date ambulance service, a very efficient ambulance crew and first aid squad, drowning equipment, lighting system, and radio equipped utility truck, among other services.

Girl, 15, Second Local Victim of Polio in Week

Another new polio case was reported over the week end in Kewaskum, which had an epidemic of the disease late the past summer and early fall. She is Delane Schwartz, 15, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jerome Schwartz, who was stricken Saturday and taken to Southview hospital, Milwaukee, in the firemen's ambulance for observation. It was reported that the case is a rather severe one. Miss Schwartz is a Kewaskum Community High school student.

Last week another youth in this area, Melvin Rundle, 17, R. 2, Kewaskum, was stricken with polio. He is also a patient at Southview hospital.

Dr. R. G. Edwards, health officer, urged all persons in the area to contact their family physicians as soon as possible to obtain their Salk vaccine inoculations to offset the possibility of contracting the disease. The doctors must be given an opportunity to obtain the necessary vaccine from the state to give the needed "shots." Inoculations now reduce the possibility contracting the disease in summer when it is more prevalent.

Approximately 300 children have been given Salk "shots" in the Kewaskum area to date. Dr. Edwards estimated that there are still more than 500 children who have not obtained them. He said that results of the Salk vaccine have been most favorable.

3 Deer Hit By Cars, 4th Causes Mishap

Three deer, two of which were killed, were struck by cars the past week in this area and another one was the cause of a mishap.

Marvin Martin, Kewaskum, hit a deer with his car in the Horicon marsh at 6 p. m. last Thursday while on his way to Norwalk, Wis. to go deer hunting. The deer's horns crashed through the windshield and the left side of the auto was damaged. The animal, a buck, was not killed and escaped.

A young fawn was killed on Hwy. 45 about 3:30 p. m. Sunday when it was struck by a car as it ran into the road south of the Kewaskum swamp near Joe Jaeger's.

A deer which ran into the path of an auto driven by Stanley C. Porubcan, 38, R. 2, Campbellsport was struck and killed at 7:05 p. m. Sunday. Porubcan said that someone else picked up the animal and carted it away. The deer was gone when officers reached the scene. The right front fender and hubcap of the car were damaged.

James F. Goodrich, 45, R. 2, Campbellsport, was treated for cuts and bruises on his face and legs which he received at 9 p. m. Sunday when he lost control of his car on County Trunk SS near New Prospect. It was reported that a deer jumped onto the road in the path of Goodrich's car and he slowed down to avoid hitting it. The car pulled to the right and onto the soft shoulder of the road, then swerved across the road and rolled over.

Autos driven by Waldemar Oelke, 38, R. 1, Oakfield, and Roger Peterson, 35, Oshkosh, collided at 12:05 a. m. Thursday on Hwy. 45, 1/2 mile south of Kewaskum. 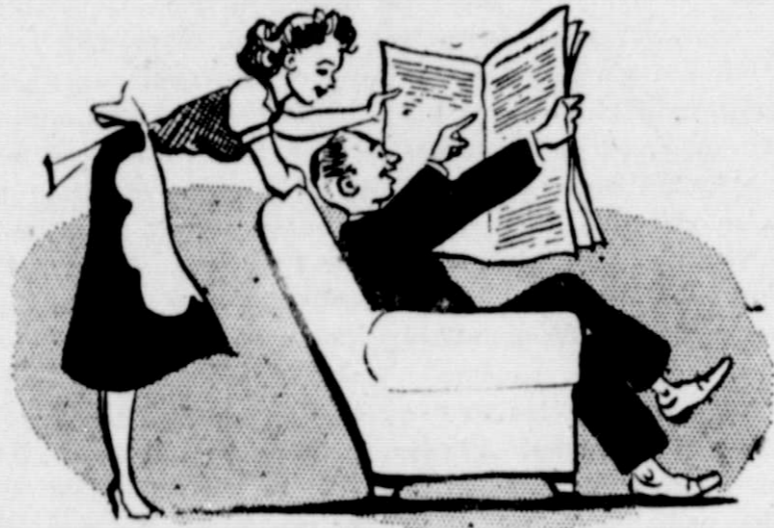
Mr. Strachota was the title defender in two divisions of the Milwaukee Greater All-Star bowling league.

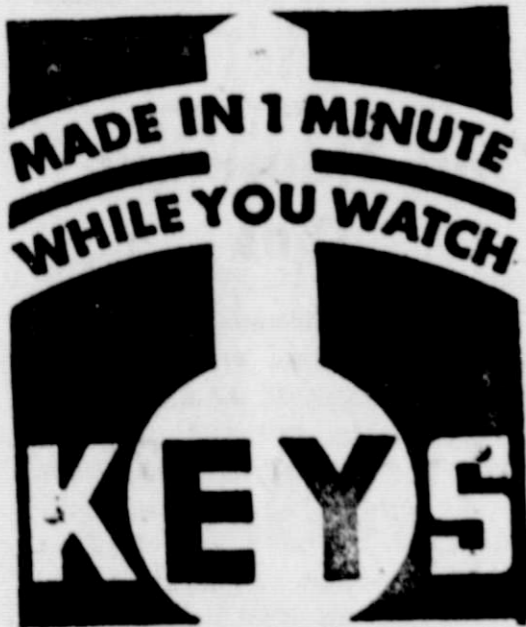
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EDITORIAL

NOT JUST FOR A DAY

Beginning today, literally millions of people throughout the country will begin stepping up their efforts to make a success of the nation's second "S-D Day"—Safe Driving Day—Thursday, Dec. 1.

Maybe your first reaction will be: "So what? Doesn't concern me. I'm a good driver." Well, think this over:

Last year in the United States, someone like you—or like someone in your family—died in traffic every 15 minutes. Someone like you—or like someone in your family—was injured every 25 seconds.

It wasn't just the incompetent and the reckless who died or were hurt. A very large percentage were good drivers and innocent passengers, and careful pedestrians. It doesn't concern you?

The President thinks it does. So do all 48 governors, and mayors of cities throughout the nation. All have endorsed S-D Day. Nearly 200 national organizations are sponsoring it in co-operation with the President's Committee for Traffic Safety. They make two requests:

First—"Let's try to avoid traffic accidents completely for the 24 hours of Dec. 1, S-D Day."

Second—"Let's learn from S-D Day that traffic safety is a year-around job."

Let's keep on remembering the second point. What S-D Day should give us—in addition to 24 accident-free hours—is lasting realization that permanent safety on our streets and highways requires two elements: (1) sound, comprehensive, official safety programs, efficiently administered by our public authorities—the year around; and (2) public support for those programs—the year around.

If we're going to stop killing and injuring ourselves, and others, in traffic, then everybody—public officials and private citizens, alike—must fulfill his personal responsibility for safety: not just for a day, not just for a year, but every day, every year.

County Residents Asked to Make Every Day S-D Day

Undersheriff Alvin Schmidt of Washington county, chairman of the Safe Driving Day program in the county, this week issued a reminder to all motorists that they should prepare to make every day S-D day in Washington county.

S-D Day will be observed throughout the nation on Thursday, Dec. 1, and Schmidt is asking the co-operation of motorists as well as pedestrians to make the day an accident-free day in the county.

In this age when medical science is striving to overcome diseases which kill and maim mankind, we should pause to consider another killer—the traffic accident.

Sponsors of S-D Day are asking for contributions of common sense—not money—in the fight against traffic deaths and injuries. They realize that only with the whole-hearted support of the driving and walking public can any safe-driving campaign be successful. And they are asking for that support in terms of individual awareness, by each person, of his own responsibility in curbing traffic accidents.

Organizations co-operating in the observance are hoping for a 24-hour traffic-accident holiday. But this year's observance will go beyond that 24-hour period in an attempt to educate the public to a year-around reconsideration of driving and walking habits.

The President and our governor ask all Americans to join in this job of accident elimination. The program has also been endorsed by nearly 200 national, state and local organizations who are banding together in a concerted effort to rid our streets and highways of the accident menace.

Common, everyday courtesy and an extension of the Golden Rule—and the will to use them—will go a long way. Keep in mind that over 5,000 Americans would still be alive today if we had driven every day during the past year as we did on S-D day last year.

Licensed deer hunters in Wisconsin last year were nearly double those of 10 years ago. Last year 247,310 licenses to hunt deer sold compared to 133,548 in 1945.

We cannot say that these children can't be helped, we must help them to help themselves. For each

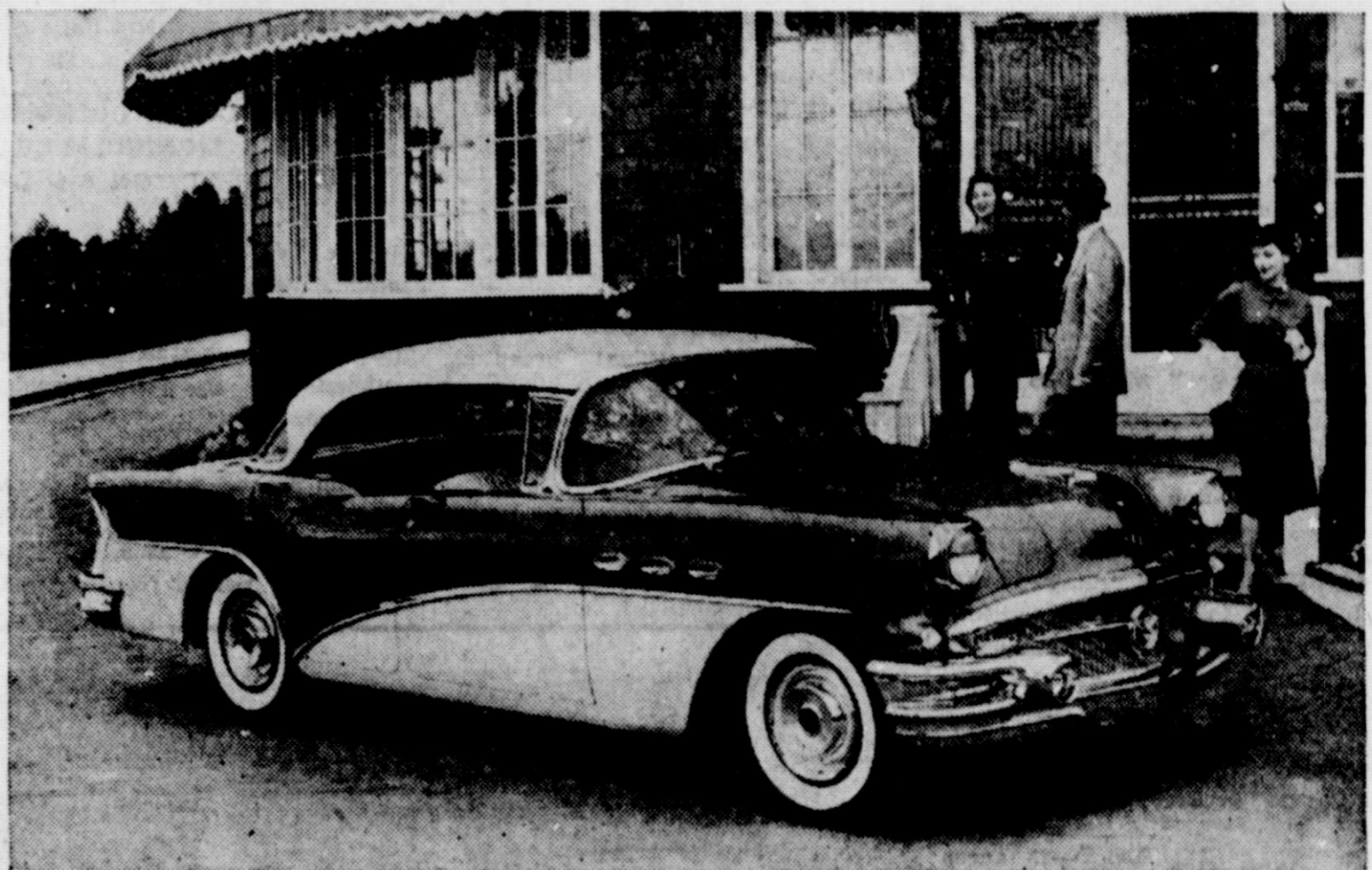
child that cannot benefit from schooling, there are many who can. We must give each child an equal chance to prove that he can or cannot benefit.
