## Barn, Machine Shed on Arnold Schmidt Farm Burn to Ground

**MOST OF FARM MACHINERY, CATTLE AND SHEEP ALSO LOST IN FIRE SUNDAY**

The large barn and an adjoining machine shed on the Arnold Schmidt farm, located 1 mile west of Kewaskum on Hwy. 28, were completely destroyed by fire in a costly blaze last Sunday morning. The farm home and other nearby buildings were prevented from catching fire by the Kewaskum firemen.

Lost along with the barn and shed in the flames were most of the farm machinery, including a tractor, hay loader, drags and other machinery, six or more head of young cattle and 14 sheep. Twelve more sheep were saved. Cause of the fire was not determined. As there was no wiring on the top floor of the barn where the blaze started, it is believed that it may have been caused by spontaneous combustion.

The fire was noticed by Grandma Mrs. Louis Doms, who resides with the Schmidt family, at about 7:50 a. m. She informed one of the Schmidt sons who was in the house. He saw smoke pouring out of the barn roof and dashed to the barn to notify his parents, who were doing the milking on the ground floor and were unaware of the fire above them.

Whipped by an easterly wind, the flames spread quickly throughout the building. When firemen arrived the barn was almost half burned. They remained at the scene for nearly four hours, concentrating their efforts on saving the garage, pig pen and chicken house. The wind was blowing sparks from the blaze over the house and the firemen had to keep a watch on that, too.

The Schmidts got all of the milk cows out of the barn before the fire spread to the lower floor but there wasn't time to save the young cattle and all of the sheep. Many of the sheep ran back into the burning barn after they had been removed.

The fire department obtained the service of a tank truck from Regal Ware, Inc. and the milk truck of Greg Heimermann to help haul water to the farm.

An estimate of the damage was not obtainable early this week. The loss is covered to some extent by insurance.

Hundreds of persons were attracted to the scene on Sunday and Monday to view the destruction.

## Local Truck Burns In Chicago Mishap

An Aunt Nellie semi-trailer of the Bird Trucking company, Kewaskum, was damaged by fire following a crash near 1310 N. Cicero ave. in Chicago last week. The truck was driven by Bernard E. Hafemann, 33, of Kewaskum.

Hafemann reported that the accident occurred after the right front tire blew out and he lost control of the machine. The right front of the tractor knocked down a steel post which caused the gasoline in the side tank to ignite. Hafemann stayed with the truck until it crashed into a mesh fence and was brought to a stop. Then he leaped from the burning cab and ran clear of the blaze. He was uninjured.

Firemen were called to put out the blaze. The truck was damaged from both the fire and accident.

## JUNIOR KEWASKUM 4-H'ERS

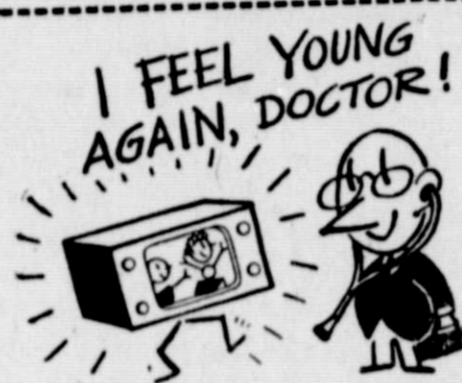

## \$106,289.94 Highway Improvement Program Scheduled for Washington County in 1956

Street and highway improvements scheduled by the Highway Commission of Wisconsin for the year 1956 will approximate 106 millions of dollars according to Edward J. Konkol, Madison, executive secretary of the Wisconsin Good Roads association. The basic program totalling \$67,600,000 will be financed by \$16,200,000 federal aids, \$49,300,000 state funds and \$2,100,000 local funds. In addition to the basic program, a supplementary program amounting to \$28,500,000 and a secondary program of \$10,000,000 for county and local roads has also been scheduled.

This represents the largest highway improvement program ever scheduled in a single year in the history of Wisconsin, Konkol said.

The increase in the program is the direct result of a 2c increase in the motor fuel tax which went into effect July 1, 1955 estimated to produce an additional \$20,000,000 annually, 50% of which is allocated to the state trunk highway system and 50% for town and county roads and village and city streets.

Wisconsin needs this accelerated annual highway construction program of new roads to meet present and future traffic requirements and to bring about a reduction in highway accidents and fatalities, Konkol said.

As of June 30, 1955, Washington county had \$2,457.88 in their unallotted reserve fund but they had already expended \$91,000.00 from future allotments to be made to the county from the state highway fund.

The proposed projects for Washington county in 1956 call for the engineering, grading, base course and Portland cement concrete on 0.90 mile of State Trunk Highway 60 on E. Sumner street, Hartford. Estimated cost \$201,000.

A second project calls for the right-of-way, grading, ballast, base course and blacktop surfacing on 5.10 miles of State Trunk Highway 60 between Hartford and State Trunk Highway 175. Estimated cost \$374,000.

Another project calls for the construction of a bridge, grading, ballast, base course and Portland cement concrete surfacing on 13.6 miles of U. S. Highway 41, the 2nd lane and interchanges, at the intersection of U. S. Highway 45 and State Trunk Highway 33. Estimated cost \$3,000,000.

Another project calls for the grading, base course and surfacing on 0.6 mile of State Trunk Highway 33 on the Cherry street extension, city of West Bend. Estimated cost \$205,000.

Another project calls for the blacktop resurfacing on 8.3 miles of State Trunk Highway 83 between the south county line and Hartford. Estimated cost \$170,000.

Another project calls for the

blacktop resurfacing on 5.0 miles of State Trunk Highway 145 between Germantown and U. S. Highway 45. Estimated cost is \$125,000.

Another project calls for the blacktop resurfacing on 11.0 miles of State Trunk Highway 175 between State Trunk Highway 60 and the Dodge county line. Estimated cost \$25,000.

These projects are scheduled to be performed during the year 1956.

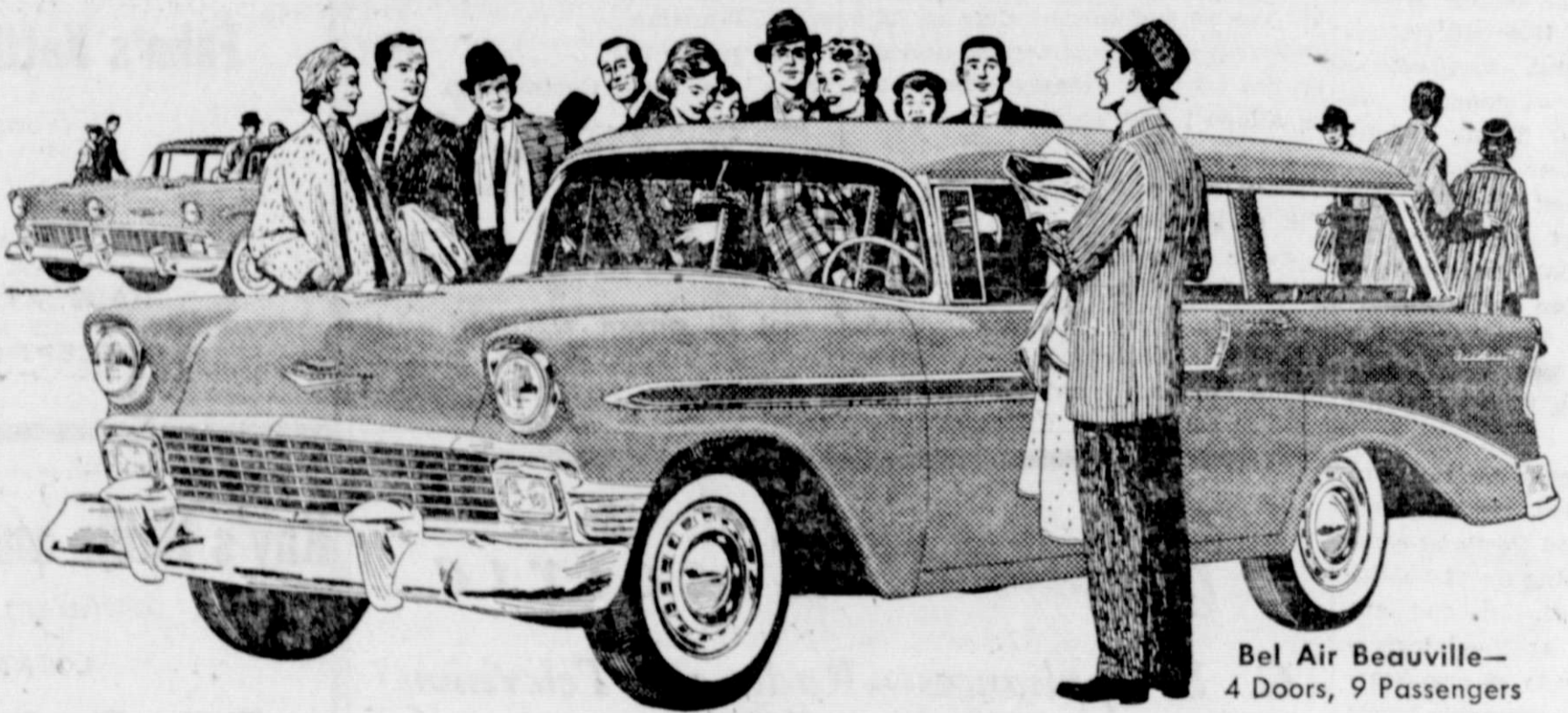

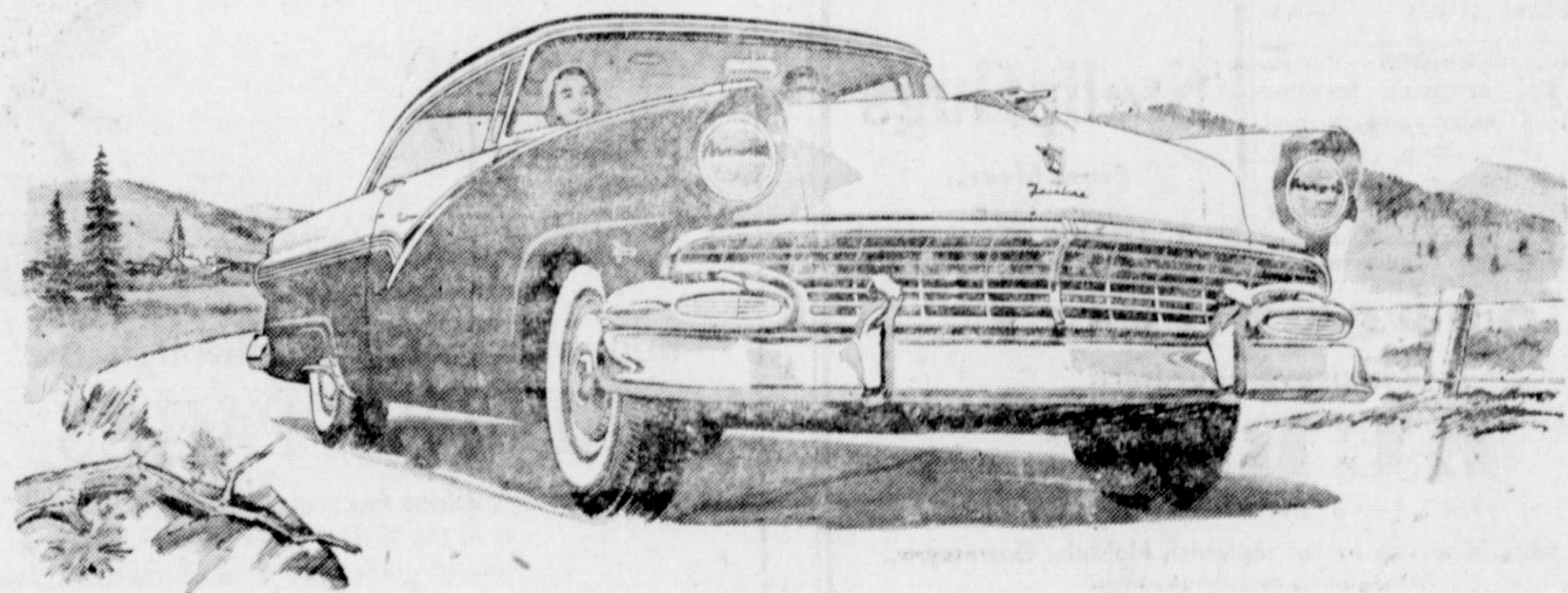

## Kewaskum Vo Ag and FFA Flashes

### SCHOOL MILK PROGRAM TO START MONDAY

As an agriculture instructor it feels great to say that Monday, Jan. 23, will be the first day of the milk program at our high school.

The federal government made available \$50 million for the 1955-56 school year, to be used 'to increase consumption of fluid milk by children in non-profit schools of high school grade and under.'

The initial allotment to Wisconsin for carrying on this program in the public schools of the state during the current year is expected to be approximately \$796,000. Last year the state of Wisconsin used about 52% of the monies allotted it for this program.

The department of public instruction and the U. S. Department of Agriculture hope that the Special School Milk Program will improve the diets and health of school children by:

1. Making the serving of milk possible in schools where it has not been served before,

2. Encouraging a greater percentage of school children to drink milk, and

3. Creating an opportunity for those students now drinking milk to drink more milk if they so desire.

We hope that we can teach the students the importance of drinking adequate amounts of milk each day.

Through the cooperative efforts of the school board, the school administrator, teachers, the dairies, parents, and pupils this school milk program can be a great success.

The Vocational Agriculture students are in charge of the handling and delivering of the milk to the rooms during the "milk break," and they will also take care of the noon lunch hour orders in the ag room.

The results in orders for the first week as reported by the teachers

are 293½ pints of milk ordered per day, or 1,465 for a five-day week. There are 223 of the 260 students in the high school participating.

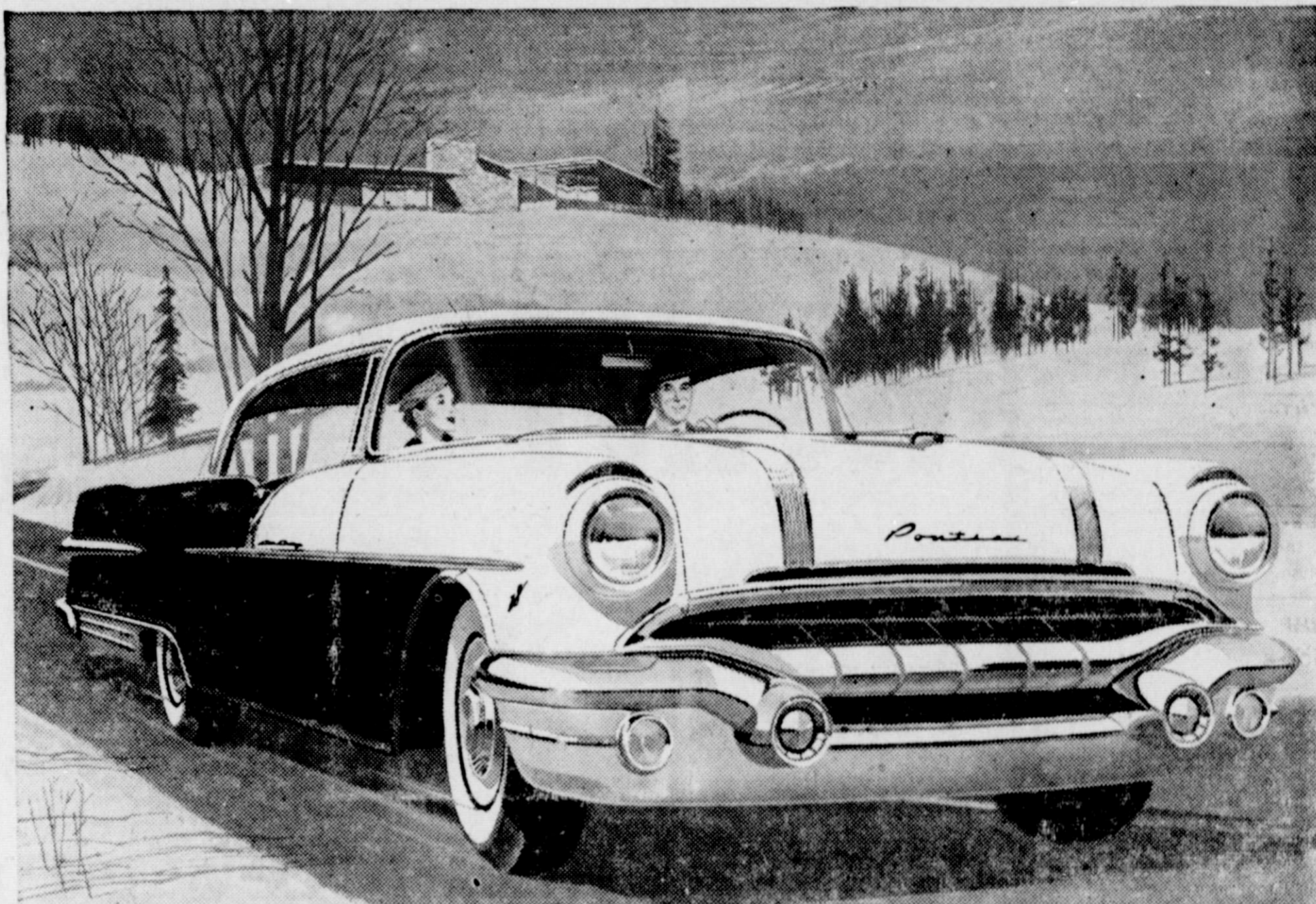
