A. P. Schaeffer, Retired Depot Operator, Public Official Dies

Mrs. E. Romaine And Paul Belger Also Pass Away

Anthony P. "Tony" Schaeffer, 71, retired Kewaskum railroad telegraph operator and former public official, who was widely known in this area, passed away at his home at 10:45 p. m. Sunday, May 13. Although he had been ailing for several years, his death came suddenly and unexpectedly.

Mr. Schaeffer was born in the town of Farmington on April 24, 1885 and grew up there. At an early age he learned telegraphy and took a position with the Chicago and North Western railroad. He served stations at Sharon and Eden, Wis., and then came to Kewaskum where he served as station agent for 36 years before his retirement in 1951.

The likeable "Tony," active as a public official, was former president of the village of Kewaskum and also served as assistant chief of the Kewaskum Fire Department for several years. He was also treasurer of the department for many years and was one of its oldest members. Mr. Schaeffer was a trustee on the Kewaskum school board for many years, about 20, and also served as treasurer of Holy Trinity congregation for a number of years. He was a member of the Knights of Columbus, Council 1564, West Bend, the Holy Name society of Holy Trinity church, and the Order of Railroad Telegraphers.

His marriage to the former Ella Schmidt took place at St. Bridget's church in the town of Wayne on June 6, 1911. She survives him together with a daughter, Pearl (Mrs. Eugene E. Reed) of Gary, Ind., two grandchildren, Eugene and Tonilien Reed; three sisters, Clara (Mrs. John Laughlin), Tillie (Mrs. Paul Gitzinger), both of Chicago, Sybilla (Mrs. George Heinecke) of Barton; three brothers, Jacob of West Bend, John of Howards Grove and Albert of the town of Farmington; one son-in-law, and other relatives and many very close friends.

The body was in state at the residence after 2 p. m. Tuesday. A solemn requiem high mass was read in Holy Trinity church at 9:30 a. m. Thursday. Celebrant at the mass was the Rev. Raynor Hausmann of Belgium, with the Rev. John Forest, Milwaukee, assisting as deacon and the Rev. Leo Belda, West Bend, as sub-deacon. Burial took place in the new parish cemetery.

Members of the Kewaskum Fire Department paid their respects to Mr. Schaeffer in a body on Wednesday evening and a delegation also attended the funeral Thursday morning. Members of the Knights of Columbus and Holy Name society also joined to pray the rosary at the home Wednesday evening.

Woman's Club Ends Season With Talk On Famous Chapel

The Kewaskum Woman's club brought its 1955-56 season to a close on Thursday evening, May 10, when its members and guests, the West Bend Woman's club, Town and Country club, and the Campbellsport Woman's club were impressed and inspired by Mr. and Mrs. D. S. Boynton's illustrated talk on Bjorkunden Chapel. After the Boynton's selected 450 acres of land in a forest of birches on the shores of Lake Michigan at Bailey's Harbor in Door county, Wisconsin, and had their summer home built there, it was Mrs. Boynton who conceived the idea of erecting the chapel. After 9 years, the chapel was completed and first opened to the public in August of 1946. Their home and chapel are designed in Scandinavian peasant architecture and she traveled to the Scandinavian countries to bring back ideas and information she could use to make her designs authentic. Colored slides showed the beauty of the home and chapel both from the outside and within.

Inside the chapel are to be found paintings done by Mrs. Boynton, and hand carvings done by her and her husband, the beauty of which is indescribable. It took them two years to complete the carvings of the baptismal font. All pew ends are ornately hand carved. During the summer months, the chapel is open to all for vesper services every Wednesday, and though it holds only 50 persons, services are repeated over and over until all have had an opportunity to attend.

Mrs. Boynton has since written a book entitled "Faith Builds a Chapel," and stated "The chapel was built as a sanctuary of peace and all the while we were building it, it was building us."

Local Victim of Polio Leaves for Warm Springs, Ga.

Gilbert Reindl, 40, Kewaskum farm resident, who was stricken with polio last Aug. 27, left Tuesday evening from West Bend on a North Western train for Warm Springs, Ga. for treatment of the disease. He is the first polio victim from Washington county to go to the southern sanatorium which specializes in the treatment of polio cases.

Reindl, who had been a patient at St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, since being stricken with the disease, was accompanied by his wife Anne, who will remain with him for about a week before returning to their farm home on R. 2, Kewaskum. Reindl is the father of four children, two of whom also were stricken with polio last year, shortly before their father. They are Mary and Robert both of whom are now fully recovered. The Reindls' other two children are Dorothy and Michael. The children range in age from 1½ to 14 years.

The trip to Warm Springs is made possible through arrangements with the Washington county chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

At first completely paralyzed and near death, Gilbert now has the use of his hands and can help himself considerably, but his legs are still paralyzed. It is hoped, through proper exercise and treatment, the muscles of his legs and arms can be sufficiently strengthened to a gain permit their use.

Mrs. Anna Felix, mother of Mrs. Reindl, is staying at home with the children until their mother returns. The Reindl farm land has been rented out to Andrew Kirchner but the family still occupies the house. A brother, Roger Reindl, Kewaskum, and a friend, J. J. Reichert, West Bend, helped Mr. and Mrs. Reindl meet and board the train. The conductor, John J. Kaerney, who has had considerable experience in handling polio patients, aided the polio victim. He has two daughters who have polio.

The Reindls wish to express thanks to the St. Vincent de Paul society, American Legion of Kewaskum, Kewaskum fire department which furnished the ambulance to transport the stricken man, neighbors who helped with the farm work, and to all other organizations, relatives and friends who assisted and remembered them during their misfortune.

Truck Runs Into Train, Small Boy Hit By Car Here

A pickup truck driven by Henry A. Schacht, 64, R. 2, Kewaskum, was struck by a Chicago and North Western railroad Diesel switch engine at the Main st. crossing at 11 a. m. last Thursday, May 10. The engine was operated by Robert Lindermann of Milwaukee.

Schacht was eastbound on Main st. and failed to stop for the crossing warning signals. His truck was struck in the right rear fender and wheel, and was turned around by the northbound engine. The train was traveling only about 15 miles per hour at the time and this prevented the mishap from being more serious. The driver stated that he failed to notice the warning signal.

Schacht escaped injury but two passengers in his truck were injured. They were Mrs. Natalie Gruendemann, 22, R. 2, Kewaskum, who suffered bruises to her left knee and right thigh and a laceration to her right hand, and Henry Schacht, 2, of the same address, laceration to the chin. They were treated by a local physician.

John Kauth, five-year-old son of Dr. and Mrs. Robert Kauth, Kewaskum, sustained contusions to the right side of his face and a bump on the back of his head when he was struck by a Willys station wagon driven by Eugene Zehren, 39, Kewaskum, on Fond du Lac ave. at the Main st. intersection at 9:15 p. m. Zehren was northbound on Fond du Lac ave. and was traveling at a low rate of speed when the boy darted out from the west curb into the path of the vehicle. The front bumper knocked the child to the pavement. The boy was with his sister but apparently broke away from her momentarily. He was wearing a face mask which he had been given at the "Lone Ranger" movie earlier. The injured lad was treated by a local physician.

Now It's Floating Island at Fahn's

Seventeen months ago it was a buffalo hunt that received much publicity and attracted hundreds of persons to Joe Fahn's Kettle Moraine Lake resort (formerly Round lake). Tuesday it was a floating island that made the headlines for Fahn in the metropolitan dailies and weekly papers.

Recent heavy rains raised to an all-time high the level of the lake and caused a three-acre chunk of west shoreline to float away. Aided by Monday's wind, the new island with pine trees 30 feet tall, bobbed half a mile to the south shore where a portion of it covered frontages of eight cottages. Tuesday the wind shifted and so did most of the island, which was blown across the lake onto the lathing beach of Fahn's resort.

Fahn imported bison from Kansas in December, 1954, as a tourist attraction only to have the beasts charge into the forest when his pet dog began barking. The subsequent buffalo hunt attracted newspapermen from throughout the state. Business is booming as a result of the new attraction but Joe's only problem now is clearing the beach before swimming starts.

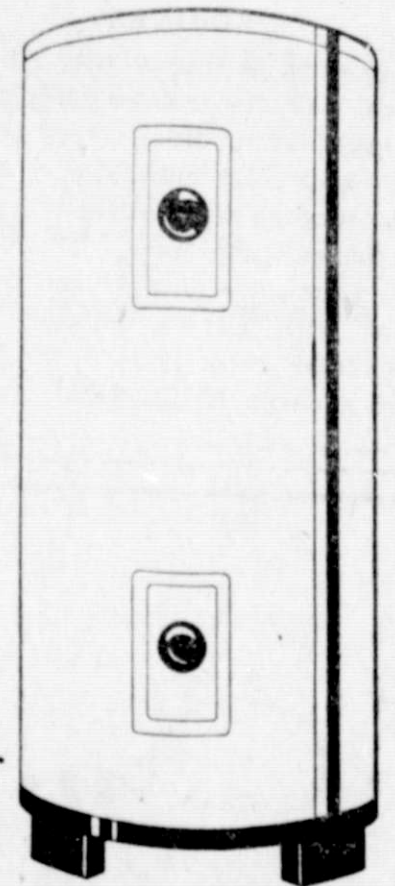

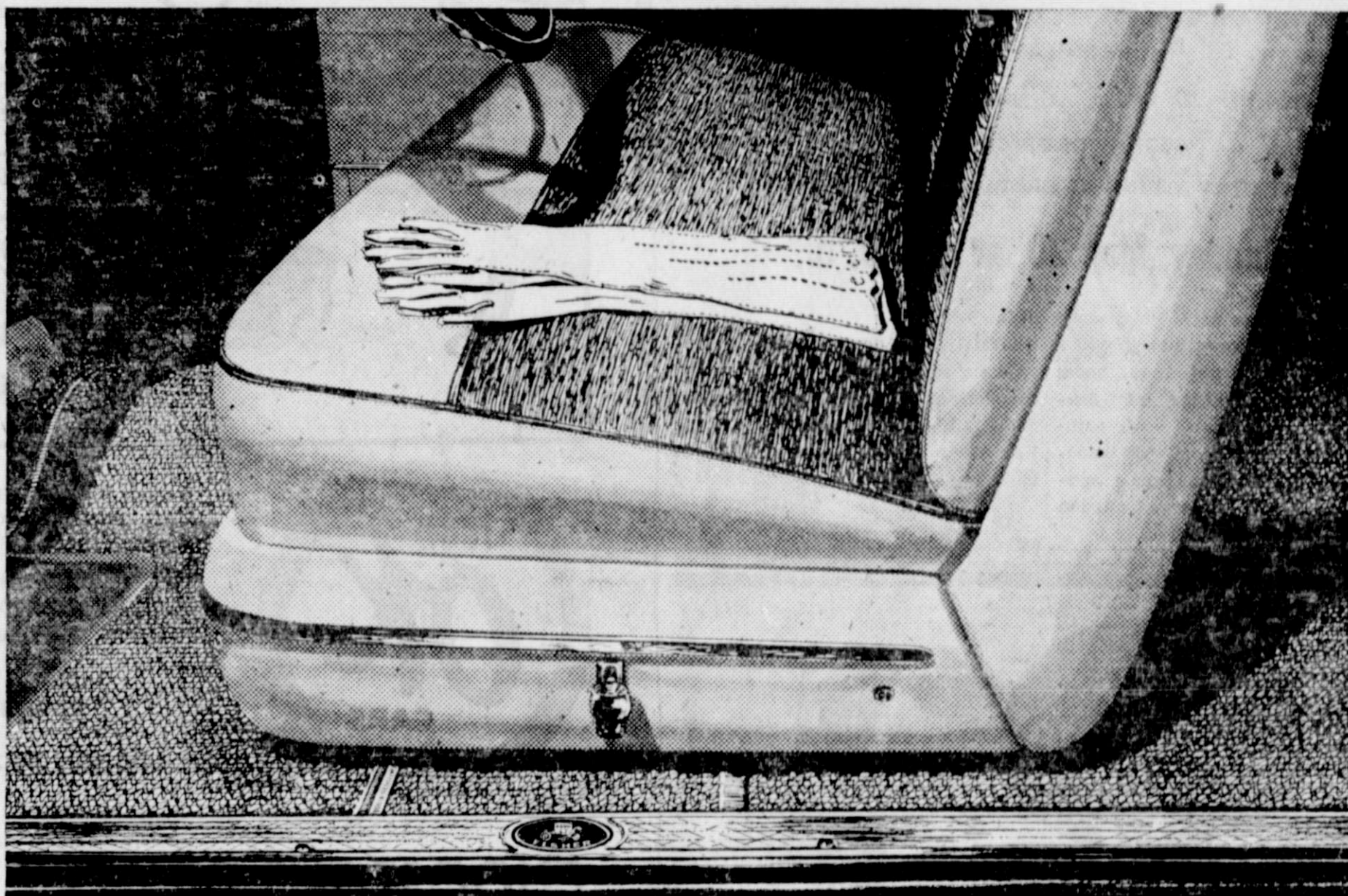

Temporary officers have been set up to make plans for this meeting. They are: Mrs. Donald Wendt, West Bend, acting chairman; Mrs. Harold Fischer, acting secretary; Mrs. Robert Berger, Sister M. Flavian and Mary Cook, nominating committee.

Some of the objectives of a nursing organization are:

1. To work toward best meeting the nursing care needs of a particular area.
2. To promotion of nursing education.
3. To discussion of professional problems.
4. To discussion of nursing care and its relationship to civil defense.

One of the first projects to be promoted by this group will probably be a 'refresher course for nurses' to be held in this area sometime next year under the direction of the University of Wisconsin.

MASKED MAN, TONTO APPEAR HERE; OVER 500 AT MOVIE

As a special attraction to "The Lone Ranger" movie here Friday night the "Masked Man," his Indian friend "Tonto" and his horse "Silver" or at least fairly reasonable facsimiles of them, made a personal appearance on the streets of Kewaskum before the early show. They attracted a huge crowd of spectators, mostly children, whom they also welcomed at the theatre. "Lone Ranger" masks were given to all the children attending the movie. Over 500 persons packed the theatre for the first show.

Poppy Day Funds Aid Veterans' Children

"When you put on a poppy on Poppy Day to honor the war dead, you will be helping children who are the innocent victims of war," said Mrs. Aletta Stautz, Child Welfare chairman of Robert G. Romaine unit of the American Legion Auxiliary, as the Auxiliary prepared for the annual observance of Poppy Day here May 25.

Poppy Day contributions help finance the child welfare work which the Auxiliary is carrying out constantly for the benefit of needy children of veterans, Mrs. Stautz explained. Because of the increasing number of veterans' children needing help, she expressed hope that Poppy Day contributions would be generous this year.

"Since the Poppy Day program is carried out entirely by volunteer workers, all the money contributed by the poppy wearers, above what we pay disabled veterans to make the little flowers, goes to the Auxiliary's child welfare and rehabilitation funds," Mrs. Stautz continued. "Most of it stays right here in Kewaskum and is expended to meet the needs of local veterans and their families. Poppy money is kept separate from other Auxiliary funds, its use restricted to work for disabled veterans and children.

A successful Poppy Day means that the Auxiliary volunteers who carry out our child welfare and rehabilitation programs will not have to go into the homes of needy veterans with empty hands. It means that they will be able to fill empty pantry shelves, to provide clothing, dental and medical care and other emergency needs of children left in distress by the illness or disability of a veteran father. We want everyone to understand that when wearing a poppy to honor the dead, they are at the same time helping unfortunate children of those who served in defense of America."

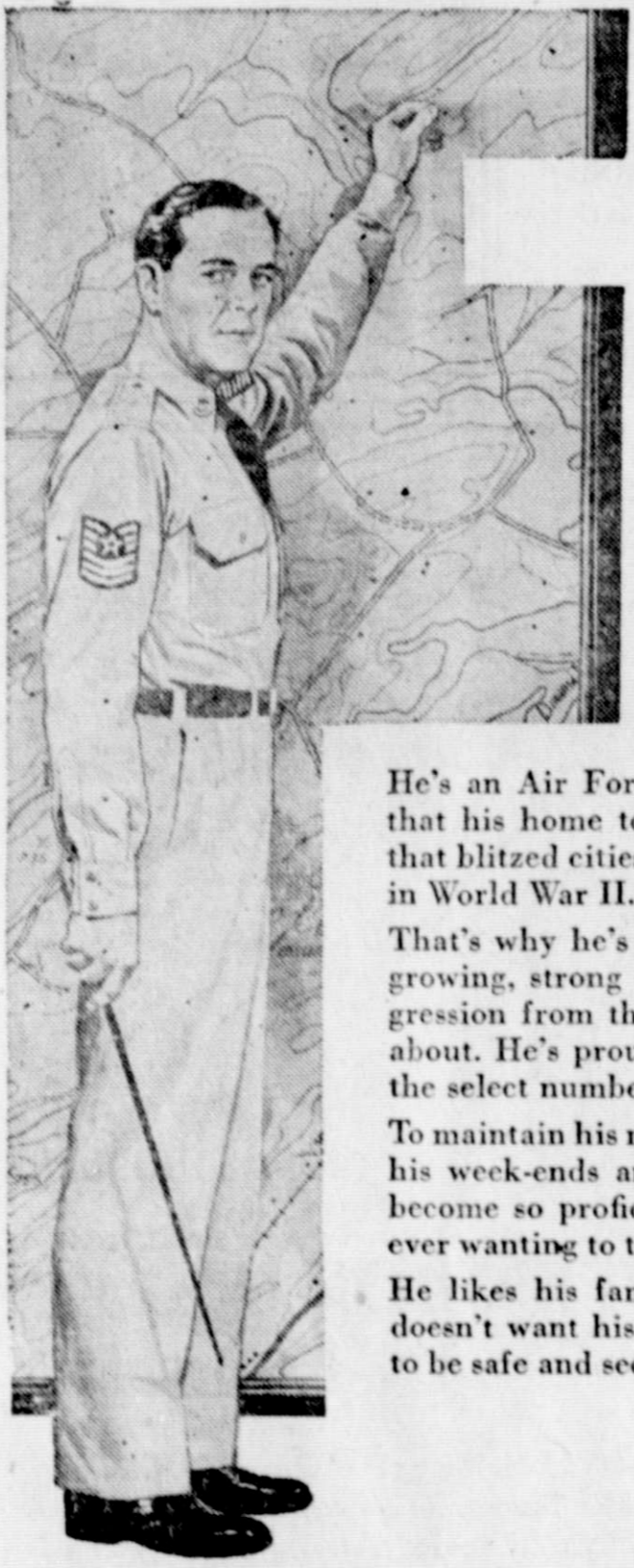
