Three Kewaskum Residents, West Bend Man Killed in Head-on Crash

All Relatives in 1 Car; Other Driver In Critical Condition

MR. AND MRS. ADOLPH HEBERER, HIS SISTER MARTHA AND THEIR SON-IN-LAW OTTO STENSCHKE ARE VICTIMS

Three Kewaskum residents and a West Bend man, formerly of Kewaskum, were fatally injured and one West Bend young man was critically injured in a head-on collision of two cars on Hwy. 33 about two miles east of Beaver Dam at 10:50 p. m. Sunday. It was one of the most tragic accidents involving local residents ever to occur and the worst highway crash in Dodge county this year.

All four of the crash victims were related and were riding in one car. The dead include a Kewaskum married couple, the husband's sister, and the couple's son-in-law. They are:

ADOLPH HEBERER, 70, Kewaskum.

MRS. ADOLPH HEBERER, 68, Kewaskum, his wife.

MISS MARTHA HEBERER, 69, a sister of Adolph Heberer, who also resided with the Heberers in Kewaskum.

OTTO STENSCHKE, 41, West Bend, son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Heberer.

Critically injured is:

WARREN SCHMIDT, 24, West Bend.

According to the report of the Dodge county sheriff's office, the crash occurred on a curve as cars driven by Heberer and Schmidt met while traveling in opposite directions, Heberer east and Schmidt west. It was foggy Sunday night and many mishaps occurred in Washington county because of the poor visibility that night. But officers reported that the fog was not a hazard at the scene of the fatal Dodge county crash. The right fronts of both cars collided head-on. Heberer's 1953 model auto and Schmidt's 1950 model car were demolished, according to Traffic Officers O'Malley, Korth and Muenchow of the Dodge county police department, who investigated.

Heberer and Stenschke were dead at the scene. Mrs. Heberer died at 5:30 a. m. Monday at the Lutheran Deaconess hospital at Beaver Dam of a fractured spine, fractured pelvis, fractured upper right leg, and multiple cuts and bruises on her face and arms. Martha Heberer died Tuesday morning at the same hospital of injuries she suffered in the crash. She sustained multiple fractures of both legs, compound fractures of the thigh, a fractured right arm and possible skull fracture and concussion. Schmidt is still confined at the hospital and is in critical condition but is expected to recover. He suffered a fracture of the right thigh, multiple contusions of the chest and face, lacerations of the face and possible internal chest injuries.

All four of the crash victims were returning from a trip to the Mayo Ebrothers Clinic at Rochester, Minn., where they had visited Barbara Stenschke, 13, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Otto Stenschke, who was hospitalized at the clinic to correct a spinal condition. Mrs. Stenschke went to Rochester over the week end to relieve her husband. She escaped death or serious injury in the mishap because she remained with her daughter to look after her welfare until the time she was to be returned home by ambulance Monday. She was informed of the tragedy early Monday.

Stenschke and Schmidt are neighbors in West Bend. The Stenschkes reside at 446 Fourth ave. and the William Schmidts, parents of Warren, live at 418 Fourth ave. The deaths raised the Dodge county 1956 toll to 18.

Undersheriff Robert Schultz at Juneau said that he would question Schmidt when his condition warrants. Schmidt, a junior at the University of Wisconsin, was enroute to Madison to begin a summer vacation job at the time of the crash. Authorities had not yet decided about an inquest on Tuesday.

The accident was a very severe blow to Mrs. Stenschke, the former Lucille Heberer, who lost her husband, both parents and an aunt in the tragic mishap. Besides this, her daughter Barbara is expected to be confined to a cast for about six months with her spinal condition. And only recently, on May 11, a gasoline truck "threw a tire" and crashed into Mrs. Stenschke's beauty parlor, known as Lucille's Beauty Shop, at 446 Fourth ave. in West Bend. She and nine other persons in the beauty salon as well as the truck driver and his young son narrowly escaped death or serious injury in the accident.

Last Rites Held For Four Crash Victims Thursday

Funeral services for the four persons who lost their lives in a head-on collision Sunday night, three of them from Kewaskum and one from West Bend, were held on Thursday afternoon.

The Rev. E. J. Zanow officiated at triple funeral services in St. John's Lutheran church, New Fane, at 3 p. m. Thursday for Mr. and Mrs. Adolph Heberer and Miss Martha Heberer of Kewaskum. Interment was in the parish cemetery.

Last rites for Otto Stenschke, 446 4th ave., West Bend, were conducted in St. John's Lutheran church in that city at 1 p. m. Thursday. The Rev. W. P. Sauer officiated and burial was in Washington County Memorial Park.

All four bodies were in state at Miller's Funeral home, Kewaskum, from 2 p. m. Wednesday until 10 a. m. Thursday when they were taken to the churches to lie in state until the time of services. All of the

victims were very well known and a crowd estimated by police officers at more than 2,000 persons visited the Miller funeral home to view the remains Wednesday evening. Two columns of people lined the sidewalk and street outside of the funeral home for more than half a block to wait their turn in line to view the bodies. This continued from early evening until almost 11 p. m. before the lines diminished and all got into the funeral home. Cars were parked on all surrounding streets for many blocks and two officers were at the scene constantly to direct the traffic and keep the line of viewers in order.

Adolph Heberer was born at Campbellsport on Jan. 31, 1886 and spent his earlier years there. For 46 years he owned and operated a large cheese factory at New Fane. He had been a cheesemaker 50 years. He married the former Linda Buss at New Fane June 25, 1910, and the couple lived in New Fane until two and one half years ago when they came to Kewaskum to live in retirement in their new home.

Mr. Heberer was secretary of St. John's Lutheran church, New Fane, and served as president of the Auburn German Mutual Insurance company.

Mrs. Heberer was born in Fond du Lac county Sept. 7, 1887. She was a member of the Ladies' Aid society of St. John's Lutheran church.

Mr. and Mrs. Heberer were the parents of three children who survive. They are Roland of New Fane, Lucille (Mrs. Stenschke) of West Bend, and Melinda (Mrs. Ervin Seifert) of New Fane. They also leave five grandchildren, a daughter-in-law and a son-in-law. Mr. Heberer is further survived by a sister, Mrs. Emil Hoenig of Milwaukee, and Mrs. Heberer also leaves a sister, Mrs. Amalia Heberer of Reedsville.

Martha Heberer was born at Campbellsport on Mar. 26, 1887 and went to Milwaukee at an early age. She was employed there until a year ago when she came to Kewaskum to make her home with her brother and sister-in-law. She never married, and is survived by a sister (Mrs. Hoenig), nieces, nephews, a sister-in-law and two brothers-in-law.

Mr. Stenschke, a die maker at the West Bend Aluminum company, was born in Milwaukee on Aug. 9, 1914. He moved to Kewaskum with his parents when a boy. He attended the local public and high schools and was active in athletics. His marriage to Lucille Heberer took place at St. John's church, New Fane, on Aug. 2, 1936, and the couple made their home in West Bend.

Surviving are his wife, together with two children, Robert and Barbara, both at home; his mother, Mrs. Traugott Stenschke of Milwaukee, and a sister Martha (Mrs. Leroy Keller) of Kewaskum. His father passed away a short time ago.

Miss Hallock Wed To Floyd Stautz

The First Methodist church at Waupun was the scene of a four o'clock nuptial ceremony on Sunday afternoon, June 17, during which Miss Ellen Anne Hallock, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. McLean Hallock, 420 Park ave., Waupun, became the bride of Floyd F. Stautz, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clifford Stautz, Kewaskum. The Rev. George H. Booth, student pastor, of Madison performed the ceremony with the Rev. Ralph V. Austin of Union Cong. church, Waupun, assisting.

During the service Miss Donna Ward of Eau Claire and Richard Van Voorhis of Madison sang a duet and Miss Ward also rendered a vocal solo.

The bride's gown was of white satin under white nylon tulle. The bodice of chantilly lace had a scalloped scoop neckline and was long sleeved. The skirt consisted of tiers of nylon tulle edged with chantilly lace, the lace forming a chapel length train. The fingertip veil was held by a crown of chantilly lace with small pearls. She carried a crescent shaped bouquet of red roses.

The bride was attended by her sister, Margaret R. Hallock, as maid of honor and by Jean M. Clay of Spooner, Wis. a roommate of hers at the university, and Janet T. Hallock, another sister, as bridesmaids. The attendants were attired in gowns of blue satin embroidered on white organdy over white taffeta with a powder blue cumberbund, pleated in front and extending to the bottom of the waltz length dresses. The bodice had a scooped neckline with scalloped sleeves. Their headpieces were pale blue crowns with hearts of pearl and face veils. They wore single strand pearls and button earrings, gifts from the bride. Their bouquets were of pale pink glads. Cyclist Donald Klumb Dies of Crash Injuries

Donald G. Klumb, 28, of R. 3, West Bend, who was employed as a mechanic at the L. Rosenheimer farm implement company in Kewaskum, died last Thursday night, June 14, at St. Joseph's hospital. West Bend, of injuries he suffered on June 7 when the motorcycle he was riding was struck by a car driven by Wilmer Schmidt, 22, of R. 2, Kewaskum.

The mishap occurred on Hwy. W about 1 mile north of Kohlsville at 6:45 a. m. Klumb was on his way to work at the L. Rosenheimer firm at the time. Klumb, who sustained a fractured leg, a skull fracture and internal injuries, never regained consciousness after the accident.

Schmidt was driving south on Hwy. W and noticed the motorcycle coming from a side road, according to the sheriff's report. He applied his brakes and swerved to the left. The right front fender of the car struck the motorcycle and the car swerved into the ditch. Skid marks at the scene showed about 162 feet from the point of the accident to where the car stopped.

Schmidt received the maximum penalty for driving a motor vehicle while his license was suspended. He was fined \$500 and costs Monday morning when he appeared before Police Justice Herbert Matenaer.

Klumb's death was the 10th traffic fatality on Washington county's highways in 1956.

Klumb, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Alvin Klumb, was born July 13, 1927 and served in Japan with the U. S. Army from 1951 to 1953. Since his discharge he had been employed at the L. Rosenheimer firm.

Surviving are his parents, two sisters, Harriet and Naomi, at home and three brothers, Richard of West Bend, and Herbert and Norbert at home.

Funeral services were held at Zion Lutheran church, Kohlsville, at 2 p. m. Monday. The Rev. Marvin Volkman officiated and burial was in the parish cemetery. Grave-side rites were conducted by the Fred A. Schaefer VFW post of West Bend.

Four Kewaskum Students Receive Degrees at UW

Four students from Kewaskum were awarded degrees at the University of Wisconsin's annual commencement late Friday afternoon, June 15, at the university at Madison.

They and the degrees they received are:

BACHELOR OF SCIENCE: Richard L. Romaine, Patricia M. Stenman (medical technology), Mary C. Oppenorth, Route 3 (education), and Floyd F. Stautz (civil engineering).

More than 2,300 students filed across the platform to receive diplomas. Bachelor degrees were awarded to 1,700 students, while some 600 men and women received higher degrees. Over 500 of the graduates are war veterans, and over 600 are married. Nearly 75 per cent of them come from Wisconsin homes, while the other 25 per cent come from 43 other states, the District of Columbia, and from 24 foreign lands scattered throughout the world. The 1956 commencement brought to over 111,000 the number of degrees granted by Wisconsin's state university during its 107-year history.

Honorary degrees were conferred on five men long identified with education in Wisconsin.

Graduation highlighted a week of intensive activity on Wisconsin's campus. A reception by Pres. and Mrs. E. B. Fred in honor of the graduates, their parents, and alumni was held Thursday evening. Friday morning the All-University Honors convocation cited 485 students for their fine academic achievements. Members of 10 classes graduating from the UW over the years from 1906 to 1951, holding reunions this year, were among the thousands who attended the colorful commencement.

Floyd F. Stautz, Kewaskum, was among the 210 graduating students who stepped out of their caps and gowns right into the uniforms of the U. S. Army, Navy, Marine Corps, or Air Force at the University of Wisconsin's 103rd commencement late Friday afternoon, June 15, on the state university campus.

Of the total of 210 graduating students, 142 were commissioned second lieutenants in the Army, 39 as second lieutenants in the Air

Force Reserve, eight as ensigns in the Navy, and 12 as ensigns in the Navy Reserves, and four as second lieutenants in the Marine Corps and five as second lieutenants in the Marine Corps Reserves. A total of 2,300 students received their first and higher degrees from Wisconsin at the commencement.

Floyd was commissioned second lieutenant in the Corps of Engineers.

Sheriff Is Ordered To Prevent Illegal Gambling in County

George Brugger, sheriff of Washington county, was directed last week to "make an investigation and eliminate any form of gambling" in the county in a letter received by his office from D. H. Prichard, director of the division of beverage and cigarette taxes in Wisconsin.

Attorney General Vernon Thomson and District Attorney Leroy J. Goring of Washington county were sent copies of the letter. They in turn forwarded copies of the letter to all newspapers in the county for publication "in the interest of law enforcement" throughout the county area.

The letter serves notice that violations of state statutes against gambling, particularly bingo, have occurred at picnics conducted by civic organizations in the county recently, and that additional violations are reportedly being considered for the future. The letter calls upon the sheriff to "prevent anyone or any organization from becoming involved. The letter follows:

Dear Sheriff Brugger:

This letter is to confirm our meeting with you and the district attorney at your office yesterday at which time you were advised that we have received several complaints to the effect that various forms of gambling have been conducted recently in Washington county and the complaints further state that some forms of gambling are being considered for the future. These complaints have particular reference to gambling at

picnics conducted by civic organizations. The violations appear to be various forms of gambling, particularly bingo.

This, as you know, is contrary to the Wisconsin statutes relative to lotteries, which is in Chapter 348.01 of the laws of the state of Wisconsin. While all lotteries and gambling of this nature and type may be for a good purpose, nevertheless, it is contrary to the state law and we are, therefore, calling it to your attention so that you may prevent anyone or any organization becoming involved in illegal activities which are contrary to the statutes.

We are passing this information on to you so that you may make an investigation and eliminate any

form of gambling, in violation of Chapter 348 of the Wisconsin statutes. We will appreciate hearing from you the results of your investigation so that we will be in a position to answer any inquiries from higher officials of the state as to what action was taken.

John Tessar, pitching his first game of the year, came in to relieve him and did a stellar job the rest of the way, holding Germantown hitless and runless for the last 5 and two-thirds innings. Tessar whiffed 10 batters in that short time and passed only 2. He struck out the last batter in the 4th inning and then struck out the side in both the 5th and 6th frames for 7 in a row before giving up a walk.

Schaetzel blanked the Chevs for the first eight innings, both of Kewaskum's runs coming in the 9th stanza when John Tessar hit a home run with Bud Korth on base. So Tessar not only starred in pitching but also at the plate. No batter in the contest got more than one hit.

On Sunday night Kewaskum was scheduled to play an exhibition game under the lights here with the Long lake team of the Rock River league but it was washed out by rain. On Thursday night of this week the Chevs played another night game at home against Cedarburg, which is tied with them in second place. Next Thursday night they will play their first arclight tilt away from home when they travel to Plymouth. Manager Cisco Backhaus reports that the opening tilt of the season, which was rained out, will be made up at Mequon on July 4.

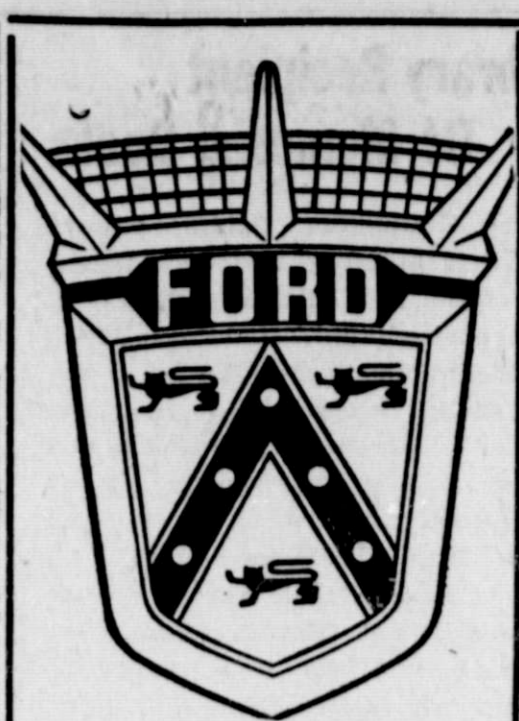
