150 Attend 17th Annual Seefeldt Reunion in Park

One hundred fifty persons attended the 17th annual reunion of the Seefeldt family Sunday, July 29, at the Kewaskum village park, original settlement area of the pioneer members of the family.

The Century Farm or Home Ownership certificate from the State Department of Agriculture was awarded to Herman Seefeldt of the town of Kewaskum. In 1856, August and William Seefeldt acquired ownership of the 80 acre farm located 1½ miles northeast of the village of Kewaskum for the sum of \$500.00. When they arrived in Kewaskum there were no buildings on the land and the first summer they erected shelter for themselves and their animals. In 1863 August Seefeldt sold his interest in the farm to his brother William. In 1869, William Seefeldt sold the farm to his brother Gottlieb and Gottlieb Seefeldt sold the farm again to his brother August in 1881. On April 15, 1890, Herman Seefeldt purchased the farm from his father August covering the same 80 acres purchased in 1856. This farm has been the home of Herman Seefeldt and his family since that time. Mr. Seefeldt is now 88 years of age. Because of Mr. Seefeldt's age and the good attendance at the Seefeldt reunions, the Department of Agriculture made the Century Farm award available for this gathering.

Judge Milton L. Meister presented the award for the State Department of Agriculture. Judge Meister expressed his appreciation to the Seefeldt family for continuing this type of reunion. He remarked: "I have seen in my work for some years how important it is that family relations be continued, kept up and built up." Judge Meister spoke of families that found it necessary to leave the country of their birth because they were not permitted to live as individuals, nor happily as families, where the importance of family life has been stressed that we develop good citizens, and it is only by having good citizens that we can have a good country."

Mrs. Fred Klein, age 76, Kewaskum; Herman Seefeldt, age 88, Kewaskum, and Edward Seefeldt, age 80, Adell, all of them from the second generation of Seefeldts in America, were given special citations. They have given the reunion much encouragement by their faithful attendance and entering wholeheartedly into making the reunions worthwhile events.

Since last year's reunion there were reported 2 births and 4 deaths. The group stood in silent tribute to the memory of William Albers of Long Lake, who died suddenly Thursday night and who was buried on Monday, July 30. Mr. Albers has been very active in reunion activities.

Awards were presented to Mr. and Mrs. Harold Meyer and family of Antigo who traveled the greatest distance to attend; to the youngest member in attendance, Randy Meyer, 6 months, of the above family, and to Mr. and Mrs. Harold Rose of Fond du Lac for the most recently married.

Fire Destroys Large Barn on Garbisch Farm

Five fire departments, including Kewaskum, battled a blaze which destroyed a large L-shaped barn on the Ray Garbisch farm in the town of Scott Monday evening. The barn was a total loss, but the firemen saved nearby sheds, a two-story house, corn crib and two silos.

The Garbisch farm is located on Highway D, three to 3½ miles east of New Fane, and about a mile and one-half west of Highway 28.

The fire was discovered at about 7 p. m. by a neighbor who saw smoke pouring out of the barn. The neighbor notified Garbisch, who was cultivating corn in a nearby field.

The barn had a 38 x 36 foot wing and a 38 x 61 foot wing. One wing was built in 1953. The new portion also boasted an automatic feeder for the young stock kept in it. Also destroyed was the roof of one silo, hay and straw in the barn, a wagon and a new four-row corn drill.

The loss was not estimated, but it is completely covered by insurance. Threshing operations had taken place at the barn the previous day, but no grain was lost because it was stored in one of the sheds. Cause of the blaze was not determined.

Living in the nearby home threatened by the fire are Mr. and Mrs. Kumrow and Mrs. Staehler and daughter Mary.

Fighting the fire along with the Kewaskum department were the Batavia, Beechwood, Boltonville and Silver Creek firemen. The Batavia firemen stayed at the scene throughout the night. The Kewaskum department was at the scene about an hour and one-half.

The fire, which could be seen for many miles in the night, attracted hundreds of people to the scene and created somewhat of a traffic jam. Persons came for miles around in every direction.

The Kewaskum firemen received one other call on Monday and this was at 5:45 a. m. the same day when they were summoned to the Wayland Becker home on Fond du Lac ave. A furnace began smoking and filling the house with smoke. There was no fire and no damage resulted. Sounds strange but with the cool weather we have been having it is necessary at times to have a little fire in the house.

Local Kiwanians At Conservation Workshop in North

ORVAL BEHNKE AND DONALD KOERBLE ATTEND THREE-DAY SESSION AT EAGLE RIVER

Orval Behnke and Donald Koerble, Kewaskum, have completed a three-day conservation workshop at the Trees for Tomorrow Camp, Eagle River, attended by 50 members of the Wisconsin Upper-Michigan District Kiwanis International.

The group went on field tours and heard top-flight speakers to learn how conservation projects could be geared to the needs of their own communities. The session ended Wednesday noon.

A tour was taken through the Trout Lake Nursery and the Star Lake Plantation, a man-made forest, to learn modern forest management techniques.

One of the highlights of the field trips was a demonstration of forest fire fighting methods. In a dramatic exhibition of fire fighting the group saw for themselves why Wisconsin ranks at the top in the nation in forest fire suppression methods.

Prior to a tour of the Rhinelander Paper company, the largest glassine paper mill in the world, the Kiwanians heard Folke Becker, board chairman, talk on the subject of "Paper, Forests and the Economy of Wisconsin."

Other tours were taken to potato farms and through the Nicolet National Forests.

George Kilp, woodlands manager, Nekoosa-Edwards Paper company, explained the function of industrial forests. John Beale, state forester of the Wisconsin Conservation Department, spoke on the function of state and county forests.

WATER AT MAUTHE, LONG LAKE BEACHES IS GOOD

Clyde T. Smith, area supervisor, announced this week that conservation officials of the Kettle Moraine State Forest report sanitary conditions of the water at Mauthe Lake and Long Lake public beaches considered good to very good quality. These facts are based on water analysis by the Wisconsin Laboratory of Hygiene. Samples of the lake water are taken at intervals all during the summer and sent to the State Board of Health for analysis.

"SUMMER ASTHMA"

The weeks ahead are anything but "the good old summertime" to thousands of Americans who suffer from a particular type of bronchial asthma. Of the two million persons in this country who are chronic victims of this ailment, one authority estimates that a half million may suffer from the type that occurs only in the warm months.

The "summer asthma" victim is allergic to pollens and dusts which are prevalent until October in most parts of the United States. The danger actually begins in April when trees pollenate but the amount of pollen in the air does not become disturbing until grasses and flowers begin their production in early May.

The asthma sufferer particularly dreads the period from early August to October because the most prolific pollen producers of all—weeds—are at their busiest in those weeks. There are, for example, nine common varieties of weeds, a single plant of which can pour out as many as 100,000 pollen grains.

When an asthmatic person breathes in pollen or dust to which he is allergic, the result is an attack of wheezing, labored breathing and harsh, unproductive hacking and coughing, which may last hours or even days unless properly treated.

"Summer asthma" may be complicated by another ailment, hay fever, which is also caused by pollen. Some of the victims try to escape this miserable combination by spending the season in areas where pollen is scanty or practically absent. However, few persons can afford this kind of treatment, and one authority reports that, in many cases, even the allegedly clean air of a desert mountain won't help.

Emotional stress and fatigue contribute to the onset or severity of asthma attacks, and in the irritating heat of summer, both of these factors may be more pronounced.

Fear of certain plants may so disable an asthmatic that he may start wheezing even at the sight of paper flowers that are mistaken for real ones.



Oddly enough, asthma is an illness where going to bed may be one of the least helpful things a patient can do. Lying down can intensify an asthmatic attack, even to the point where the patient feels that he can no longer breathe unless he sits up or stands. To enable such patients to get much needed rest or sleep, many physicians prescribe a drug called Tedral that can prevent or alleviate the agonizing symptoms and allow the patient to recline. Tedral seems widely accepted by the medical profession. One allergy specialist states, its beneficial effects are "well known and accepted by allergists" and its use has "become common among general practitioners." Clinical tests have shown that Tedral begins to exert its action within minutes and the helpful effects of a single tablet usually lasts for four hours or longer. A special form of Tedral has also been developed which has a delayed onset of action. This special form when given in combination with the quick-acting form, will usually produce a symptom-free period of eight hours or more. Thus, the use of the combination can mean a night of uninterrupted sleep for asthmatics.

She continued with moths and butterflies telling how they go through three stages—egg, larvae, adult. "Caterpillars are the larvae of moths and butterflies. They are not worms, for worms do not have legs. Some caterpillars will turn into moths and other into butterflies. Now, then, if you know what kind of caterpillar it is, you will be able to tell whether it will become a

moth or butterfly."

In conclusion, Marge stated that perhaps the life of insects sounded rather complicated, the best way to learn about them was to watch them and see what they do, how they live, and how they catch and eat their food.

For the month's health project a radio skit was read on "polio." Entertainment was provided by the new members, Pat Riley, Caren Carolyn and Ruth Laatsch, and Wendy Weiss singing, "Mr. Blue Jay" and "Pretty Robin Red Breast."

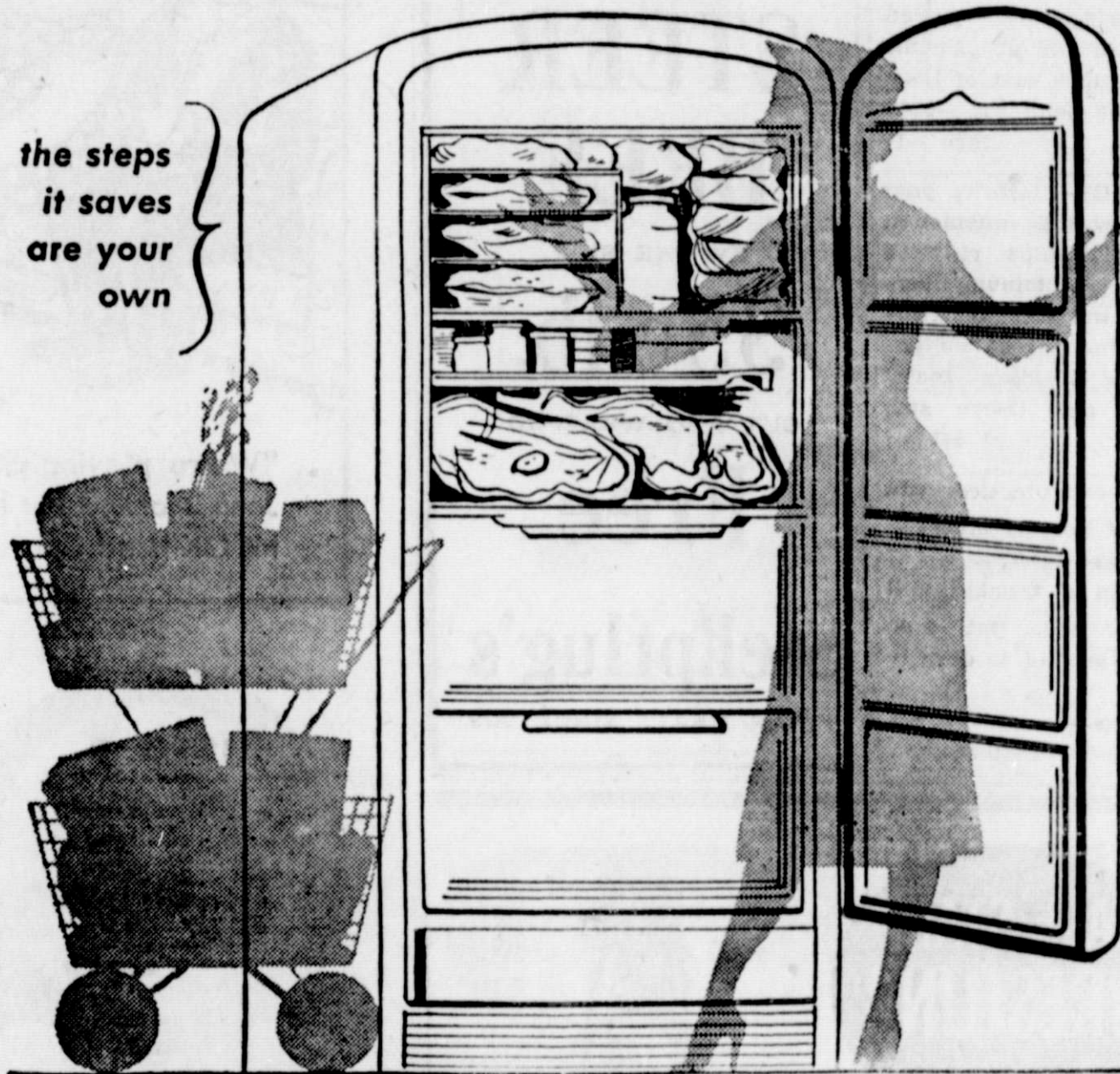

Fischer connected for the four-bagger with Bob Helm of Mequon and Dick Russart of Port Washing-

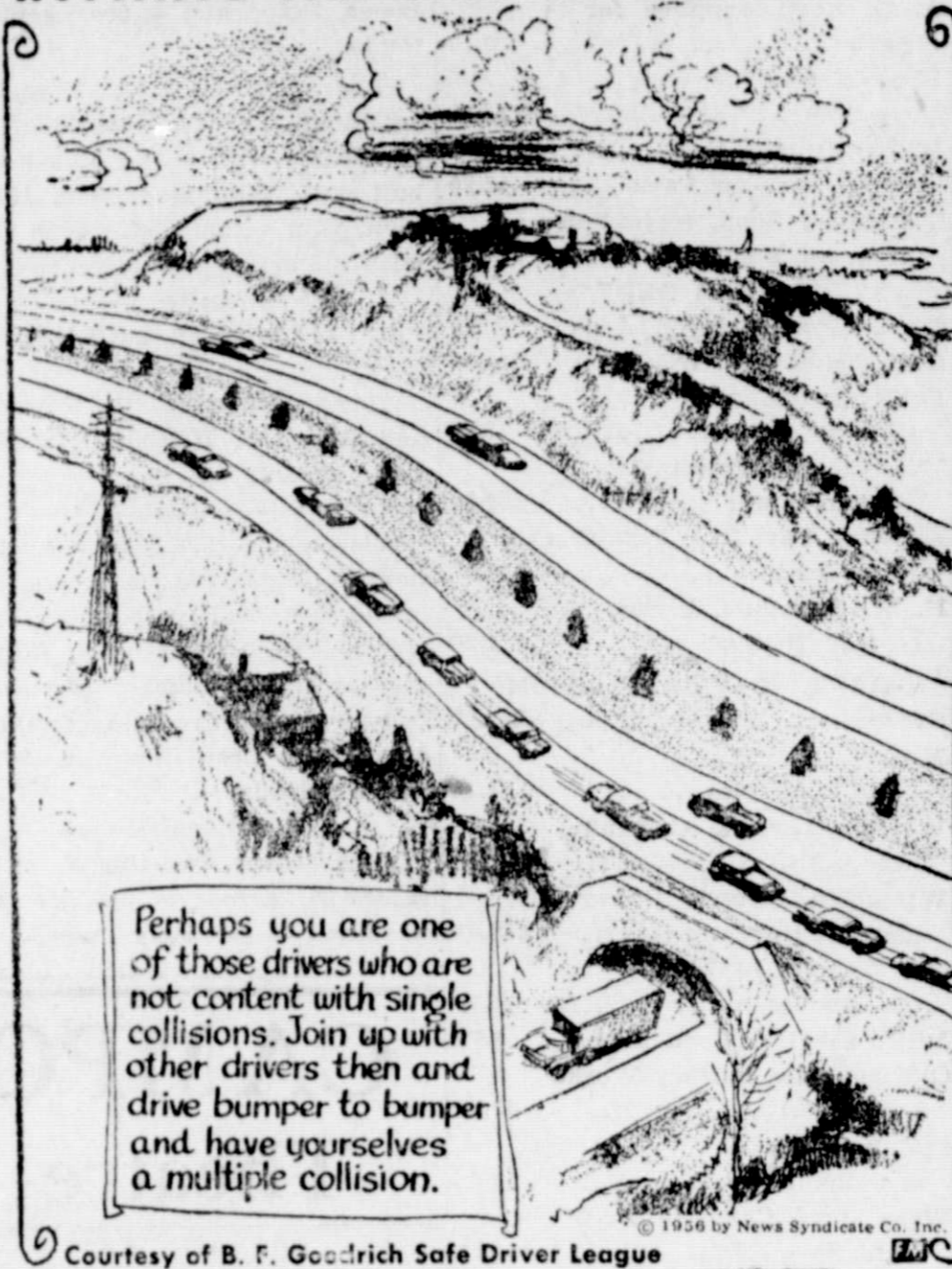
ton on base in the fifth inning. A championship contest between the north and the winner of the South-East all-star tilt will be played on Tuesday night, Aug. 7.
