## Sewage Plant Supt. Schaefer Resigns; Grueschow Hired

### VILLAGE BOARD ESTABLISHES CITIZENS COMMITTEE TO RENAME STREETS

Regular Meeting  
Sept. 4, 1956

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin met in regular monthly session with President Reigle presiding and all board members present.

The minutes of the previous meetings were approved as presented upon motion by J. Stellpflug, seconded by M. Schaefer and duly carried.

Harry Schaefer, Sewage Supt., reported that on Aug. 20, 1956, the Heinemann Creameries plant waste was diverted from the village sanitary sewage system. He presented a report for the period of Aug. 20 to Sept. 2 showing that since such waste was diverted, the sewage disposal plant was operating efficiently as designed.

Elroy Egerer asked permission of the board for the moving of a house onto the rear portion of a lot presently owned by him on Fond du Lac Ave. He was advised that no action could be taken by the board unless a regular building permit application is submitted.

The board agreed to improve the alley connecting Main Street and Habeck Street and lying between East Water Street and Kewaskum Street. The commissioner was instructed to advise all abutting property owners to remove not later than Oct. 8th all obstructions presently on said alley.

The Supt. of Public Works was instructed to rough grade Meadow Lane.

The board agreed to construct sidewalk on the east side of South Street south of Clinton this year rather than wait until the spring of 1957.

The board established a Citizens Committee for the purpose of possible renaming of the village streets in conjunction with the making of the assessor's plat map. Members of this committee are to be representatives of the various local civic organizations.

Motion by A. Merwin, seconded by J. Eberle and carried that all bills and wages as recommended by the Finance Committee be allowed and paid.

## Milwaukee Beagle Club Trial Here; Eberle Dog Champ

The annual field trial of the Milwaukee Beagle club was again held at Kewaskum last Friday through Sunday, Sept. 14-16, with a large entry of about 100 dogs.

Beagles were entered from Indiana, Illinois and Michigan, besides Wisconsin. The dogs were run on cottontail rabbits in the surrounding area and headquarters for the trial were at Joe Eberle's kennels. The annual event was a very successful one. The only difficulty encountered was in finding rooming places for all the dog owners.

The Milwaukee club trial was held two weeks after that of the Wisconsin Beagle club, which also took place at Kewaskum over the Labor Day week end.

Eberle's Lawyer won first place again in the trial in a class of 34 males. This was the third time the beagle placed first in recent trials, giving the dog its field championship with the required 120 points. To become a champion, a beagle must win three first places in sanctioned trials besides gaining the required points. Having attained its championship, Eberle's Lawyer is no longer eligible to compete in field trials and will be used for breeding purposes. The beagle established a remarkable record for such a young dog.

## Certificates Mailed to 349 Red Cross Swim Students; 120 Local

Letters to those awarded certificates in this year's Red Cross "Learn to Swim" program have been mailed. A total of 349 certificates were issued. Beginning swimmers received 239 cards, while intermediates were awarded 58, swimmers 27, and Junior Red Cross life savers 25. Had it not been for the inclement weather, many more certificates would have been earned.

This past season 816 students were enrolled in the first session of the Red Cross swimming program and 568 in the second session for a grand total of 1,384. This total includes an adult class registration of 20, two Junior Red Cross life saving classes totaling 50, two groups from Kewaskum amounting to 120, and 70 participating in the itinerant program at the Big Cedar Lake Yacht club on Saturday mornings. As in the past, the itinerant schedule also included the 4-H Camp at Camp Awana. This year 132 took part June 13-15.

The enrollment represents the largest ever recorded in our chapter history. Last year's enrollment numbered 1614 students. This is an increase of 370 students over the 1955 program. The chapter is pleased that so many from West Bend and the surrounding area again participated in the swimming lessons. It is urged that everyone who can possibly do so will take part in the Red Cross "Learn to Swim" program next summer.

It should be emphasized that receiving certificates is not the important part of the lessons—rather it is the knowledge and skill that was acquired and is being PUT TO GOOD USE. The Red Cross swimming instructions are free because everyone donates to the Red Cross



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fund campaign.

Airman Konwent joined the Air Force through the local recruiting office, 19 N. Main st, Fond du Lac, July 1956, after graduation from Campbellsport High school.

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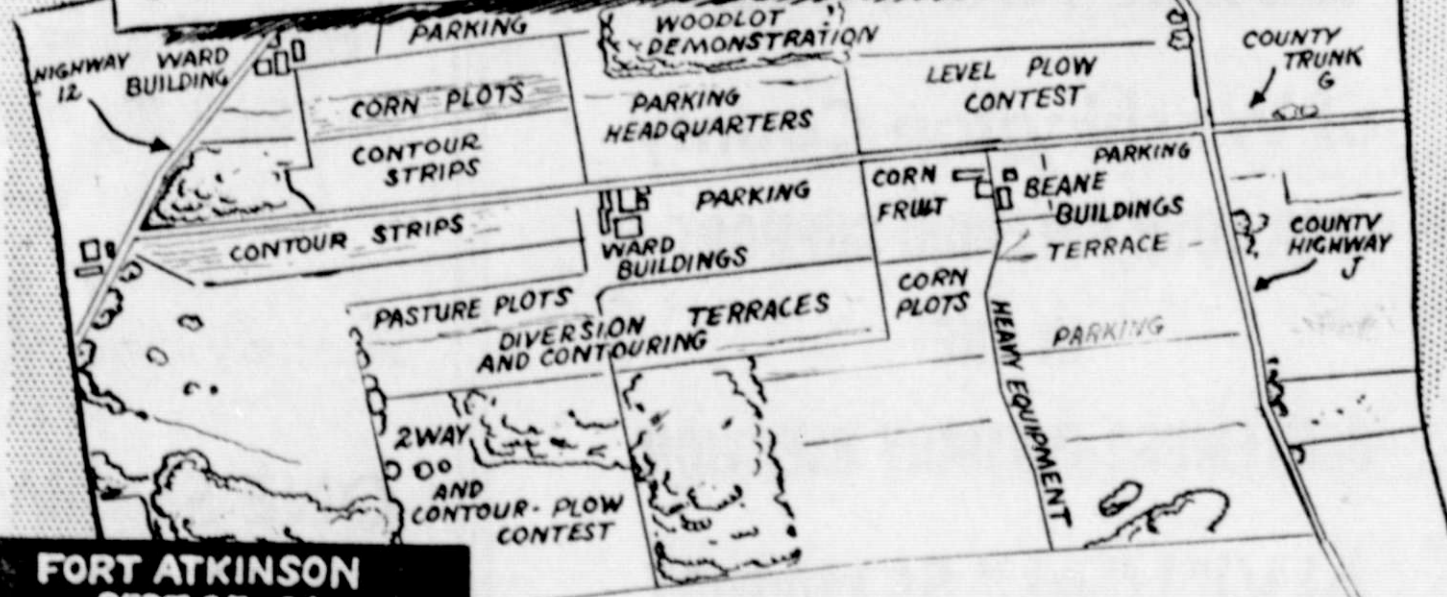
