Boy Hit By Car, Hunter Injured In Mishaps Here

OTHER RESIDENTS SUFFER FRACTURES IN FALLS DURING WEEK

Kewaskum had a run of accidents and ailments of a wide variety during the week which required emergency medical attention to two children and three adults.

The most serious injury was suffered by Clifford Kleinke, five-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Kleinke, Kewaskum, who was struck by an automobile at about 5:10 p. m. Monday on East Main street as he dashed into the street after a softball. The boy was hit by a car driven by Kenneth Lee Collins, 33, of R. 3, Kewaskum.

The Kleinke child, a kindergarten pupil in the Kewaskum Public schools, was playing ball with a group of other children from the neighborhood on a vacant lot between Stark and Kewaskum sts. When the ball rolled across the street he darted after it and ran right into the path of Collins' car. Collins was returning from work at the time and was traveling west on Main st.

The right front fender of the Collins auto struck the youth, who was thrown about 15 feet by the impact. There were skid marks for a distance of 42 feet where the driver had braked in an attempt to avoid hitting the boy, according to Chief of Police Roland Pledl and State Traffic Officer Sam Young, who investigated the accident. Deputy Officer Marvin Schaefer also assisted at the scene.

Accompanied by his father, the Kleinke boy was rushed to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, by Chief Pledl. He suffered a concussion and other head injuries, fractured ribs and multiple contusions. His condition was reported as improving.

The mishap occurred at a busy time of the day, just after factories had let out and when there were many children on the streets on a beautiful day. This, with the screaming of sirens, attracted very many excited spectators to the scene.

David Backhaus, 28, of Kewaskum, Washington county traffic officer, was treated by a local physician who removed a BB pellet from a shotgun shell from Backhaus' left cheek. Backhaus was hunting at a pot hole near Kewaskum when he was struck by a pellet from a shotgun shell which is believed to have glanced off a tree branch and struck the hunter.

Backhaus is reported to have been hunting when another group of hunters came into the area, apparently not knowing the first group was there. The other hunters shot at ducks and one of the pellets struck Backhaus.

In other mishaps during the week Louis Vorpahl, 66, Kewaskum, suffered a dislocated shoulder in a fall at his residence. Dorothy Buczek, Kewaskum, suffered a fractured wrist in a fall at Holy Trinity school, and an emergency call to a home was received when a resident had a gall bladder attack.

Funeral services were held in Holy Trinity church, Kewaskum, at 9:30 a. m. Wednesday, the Rev. F. C. La Buwi officiating. Burial was in St. Joseph's cemetery, Waukesha. The body was in state at Miller's Funeral home from 2 p. m. Tuesday to 9 a. m. Wednesday.

Removing Fahn's Floating Island

The floating island at Fahn's Kettle Moraine lake resort (formerly Round lake) north of Kewaskum is in the headlines again.

Workers were scheduled to begin removing the 6,000 ton island from the lake last week. Plans were made to remove the island because of the damage the floating body of roots, vines and decayed vegetation caused to piers, beaches and other property on Kettle Moraine lake.

The original island was broken into some 10 pieces by storms and heavy waves. The largest piece rested on the beach near Fahn's resort.

The island is being removed by workers of Harold Tomkins of Manitowoc with a power shovel. It was estimated the work would take about six days at a cost of approximately \$3,000 which, according to George Kling, Milwaukee, will be paid by a cottage owners' association.

Kiwanis Live Turkey Shoot This Sunday

FOURTH ANNUAL EVENT TO BE HELD AT BAR-N RANCH

The Kewaskum Kiwanis club will sponsor its fourth annual Live Turkey Shoot on Sunday, Oct. 7, at the Bar-N Dude Ranch, 7 miles northeast of Kewaskum on County Trunk GGG, from 9 a. m. to sundown.

Patterned after the historic turkey shoots which were so popular in frontier days, this fascinatingly interesting annual event has become outstandingly popular. Thousands of men, women and children from all over the state attend as participants and spectators. The turkey shoot is handled as follows:

Large line tom turkeys are placed in protected crates at the end of the rifle range with only their heads exposed to the marksman. For a fee of \$1.00 for three shots (four shots on advance sale tickets) the marksman attempts to hit the turkey's head from the firing line, using a .22 rifle. The turkey he hits is the turkey he gets for the family larder. Rifles and ammunition are furnished.

Other events include trap and deer rifle target shooting. Sportsmen desiring to enter these events bring their own shotguns and rifles. In addition, there are games for every member of the family to enjoy. Food and refreshments will be served.

The shoot is sponsored by the Kewaskum Kiwanis club and all profits go to the Kewaskum Youth Benefit and Community Benefit funds.

Another large crowd is expected to attend the turkey shoot this Sunday. The Kewaskum Frozen Foods plant will remain open all day Sunday so winners of turkeys at the shoot can have them dressed to take home or have them frozen or stored until Thanksgiving.

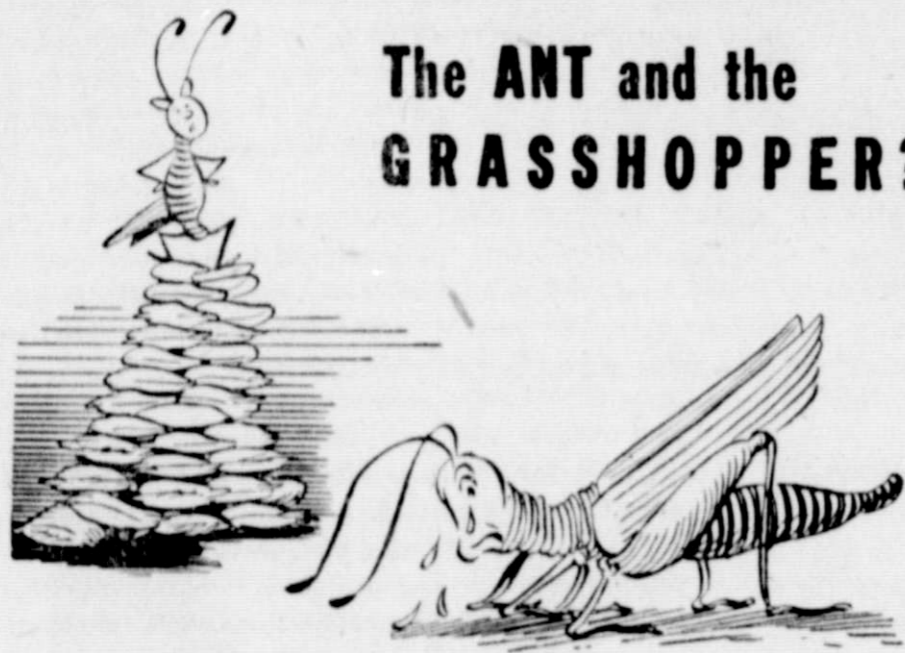

National Polio Unit Gives \$6,800 To Local Chapter

A check for \$6,800.00 has been received by the Washington County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis to provide financial aid for local polio patients, it was announced this week by Anton P. Staral, chapter chairman. This makes a total of \$10,800.00 advanced to this chapter this year.

Staral said that this county is one of nearly 500 in the nation where local March of Dimes funds are insufficient to cover polio-fighting needs.

"The chapter's present financial plight is the result of the assistance it has given in the past to 23 patients who have required—and still require—costly care to give them a chance to recover their fullest capacities," Staral explained. "One county patient is presently hospitalized at Warm Springs, Georgia, and the chapter is paying over \$800.00 a month for his care.

"In the Salk vaccine we now have the means of bringing about the eventual control of new polio," he continues. "Age restrictions governing the use of the vaccine have now been removed. It is safe, potent and effective and can be adminis-

tered by any physician. Those who have not yet received it should begin the series of inoculations immediately to be protected against analytic polio next year.

"However, we must not forget those victims of polio for whom the vaccine came too late," Staral emphasized. "Our job in the conquest of polio will not be finished until polio is finished as acrippler of human beings and until further mass appeals to the American public are no longer necessary to insure the care of those who have been stricken.

"Until that day comes, it is reassuring to know that the whole March of Dimes organization stands behind our chapter, ready to give financial assistance in case we must have it. The resolve of the national foundation has always been to see to it that no one in our country need go without necessary care in the treatment of polio for lack of funds."
