Barn Burns to Ground on Mrs. Dornacker Farm

A barn on the Mrs. Lorraine Dornacker farm at St. Bridgets, located between Highways 28 and H west of Kewaskum, was completely destroyed by flames in a blaze that was discovered shortly before 4 p. m. last Saturday. The farm is better known as the former "Jack" Murphy place.

The farm is not being operated by the tenants and fortunately there was no grain or cattle in the barn. There were a number of bales of hay in the northeast corner of the structure which were destroyed along with a flock of ducks which ran into the burning barn.

Used furniture was stored in the upper story of the barn and destroyed in the blaze were a washing machine, gas stove, heater, refrigerator, power lawn mower, bathtub, wheel barrow and other household items. Quite a bit of lumber stored in the barn also was lost as was a pile of wood outside of the building.

The fire started in the center of the barn and may have been caused by defective wiring although the cause was not determined. The loss was partly covered by insurance.

The Kewaskum fire department was called to the scene and when they arrived the entire upper half of the barn was ablaze. The flames got a good start before the fire was discovered and there was no chance of saving the building.

Firemen remained at the farm for a good four hours until around 8 p. m. wetting down and protecting the other buildings, preventing the flames from spreading and watching over the fire which was fanned by a high wind. Luckily the wind was from the south, blowing the embers and sparks away from the house. The firemen did not leave until the entire first floor structure and supports had caved into the basement part of the barn. Then the remainder of the water on hand was used to soak up the debris.
