Presidential Election Day Next Tuesday

STATE AND COUNTY OFFICERS WILL ALSO BE ELECTED; POLLS OPEN 9-5:30

Like a wake before a storm, voters are quiet but filled with anticipation and growing excitement as the big election day next Tuesday, Nov. 6, approaches. This will be a presidential election and along with their ballot for president voters will be given a general election ballot listing the state and county officers also to be elected.

Polling in the village will be at the municipal building and town of Kewaskum voting will be done in the Woodman hall. Polls at both places will open at 9 a. m. and close at 5:30 p. m.

A large vote is anticipated in the village and throughout the county and state. A heavier vote than in the last presidential campaign is anticipated throughout the nation. The turnout might be a record one with the many national, state and county offices to be filled.

Interest in the presidential election is, of course, centered on the race between the Republican ticket of President Eisenhower and Vice-President Nixon and the Democratic slate of Adlai E. Stevenson and Estes Kefauver. Four other slates of Independent candidates also appear on the presidential ballot.

On the state level Vernon W. Thomson (R) will be opposed by William Proxmire (D) for governor; Warren P. Knowles (R) and William A. Schmidt (D) are candidates for lieutenant governor; Robert C. Zimmerman (R) and Marguerite R. Benson (D) are out for secretary of state; Warren R. Smith (R) and William S. Clark (D) seek the state treasurer's post; Stewart G. Honeck (R), Robert LaFollette Suher (D) and Frank Nikolay (I) are in a three way race for attorney general.

Incumbent Senator Alexander Wiley (R) is opposed by Henry W. Maier (D) and Walter Semrou on the Socialist Labor Party ticket. Incumbent Member of Congress from the 6th district, William K. Van Pelt (R) is opposed by Rudolph J. Ploetz (D).

Elmer J. Schowalter, Republican candidate for re-election to the state assembly, is opposed by Edwin Junk, Jr. on the Democratic ticket.

On the county level incumbent County Clerk Anton P. Staral (R) is opposed by Arthur W. Washick, Sr. (D). County Treasurer Paul L. Justman is unopposed. In the race for sheriff to succeed George Brugger Alvin L. Schmidt (R) and DuWayne R. Hasenfus are the candidates. Coroner James E. Albrecht (R) is opposed by Dr. Philip M. Kauth. Clerk of Circuit Court Lawrence P. Berend (R) is opposed by John N. Guddice (D); Dist. Atty. Leroy J. Goring (R) is opposed by Atty. Henry Renard. Register of Deeds Edwin Pick and Surveyor Ethan D. Maxon are both unopposed.

Indians Run Wild, Blank Hustisford, 59-0, Lions 38-0; Finish Up Third

LOPSIDED VICTORY FRIDAY NIGHT MAKES HOMECOMING GRAND SUCCESS

The Kewaskum Indians really clobbered two opponents in their last two games of the season the past week. Last Friday night they climaxed a very successful homecoming by humiliating Hustisford, blanking them by a whopping 59-0 score. And in the season's finale here Tuesday night they hung another whitewash on Lomira, this time by a 38-0 count.

Kewaskum finished in third place in the Tri-County conference as a result of these last two one-sided

victories. The team's record for the season is five won and two lost. North Fondy took the championship away from defending Kewaskum with seven straight wins without a defeat. Brandon placed second with 6 and 1.

The win over Lomira was the Indians' fifth in succession after losing the first two games of the race to North Fondy and Brandon. Too bad the schedule wasn't turned around and the Indians could have met Fondy and Brandon in the last two games. They no doubt would have beaten them as the inexperienced squad started slow but

greatly improved toward the end of the race.

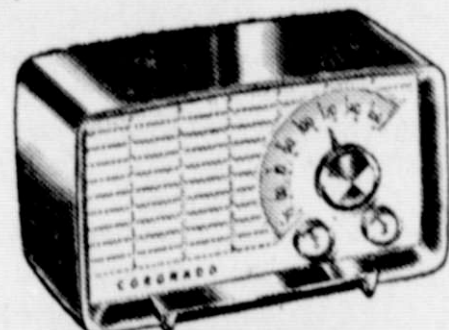
The 59 points against Hustisford was the largest total racked up by any team for the season. Totalling 97 points in two games while holding the opponents scoreless is real evidence of a powerful offensive squad as well as an airtight defensive unit. Tuesday's tilt was the last one for 12 seniors on the squad.

Coaches Mitchell's and Bade's steamroller was hotter than a four-alarm fire as they swamped Hustisford. Halfbacks Dave Mertzig and Dick Schmidt ran wild as each
