Capture Gunmen After Series Of Robberies in This County

Kewaskum Police Instrumental in Quartet's Arrest

Four gunmen who have been robbing and terrorizing Washington county residents for the past several months were captured Monday night when they returned to Kenosha following their latest holdup in Barton that night. In Barton the quartet robbed the Frank Millers of \$1,722.26 in cash.

Picked up by Kenosha police and identified as the holdup men were James Clark, formerly of R. 4, West Bend, who at one time was employed at Regal Ware, Inc. in Kewaskum; Howard Zimdars, formerly of the town of Kewaskum and later of the town of Trenton; Ed Dummer, formerly of Watertown, and Jerry Schilling of Kenosha.

County Traffic Officer David Backhaus and Chief of Police Roland Pledl of Kewaskum were largely responsible for the gunmen's capture. Ever since the Tony Fellenz home in this village was burglarized last summer the local officers had suspected Clark and Zimdars and had kept them under surveillance.

In all of their thefts throughout the county the robbers used tape over their faces instead of masks. A few weeks ago Officer Backhaus read in a Milwaukee paper where gunmen who pulled a Kenosha holdup used similar tape over their faces. Chief Pledl contacted Kenosha police, informing them of the local robberies. Detective Sergeant Hill of the Kenosha Police Department came to Kewaskum on a Saturday afternoon about three weeks ago to have a talk with Pledl and Backhaus concerning the holdups. They met at the municipal building and laid out plans to nab the gunmen in their next robbery attempt.

Chief Pledl was called to Barton Monday night by Chief Carl Mayer of that village to take finger prints at the scene of the Miller robbery. The sheriff's department had Kenosha police notified. Police of that city picked up the suspected bandits when they returned to their place of lodging in Kenosha and arrested them.

Clark, Zimdars and Dummer were working for Schilling who operates a tree trimming service in Kenosha. Pledl and Backhaus had suspected all along that the holdups were being staged by bandits who were acquainted locally. Because Clark and Zimdars were former residents of the area and because of their previous records their whereabouts were checked and they were located at Kenosha. Clark was believed to be the setup man for the robberies.

The gunmen admitted three previous thefts in the county including last week's holdup of Henry Lemke's store and tavern in the town of Jackson, the robbery at Larry Greiveldinger's Supper Club on Hwy. 33 west of West Bend and thefts at the John Wiedmeyer residence, R. 1, West Bend. The gunmen got about \$1,400 at Lemke's, about \$350 in cash and billfolds

Both chimney blazes were extinguished without damage.

from customers at Larry's and \$25, a watch, savings bonds, a shotgun and other items at Wiedmeyer's.

They denied the \$250 robbery of Henry Techtman, town of Barton, however. Later when the gunmen were questioned by Undersheriff Al Schmidt and Police Chief Mayer of Barton they also admitted staging the Techtman robbery, for a total of five in the county. They denied knowledge of the robberies of the Mermac tavern and Sentry Foods in West Bend.

In addition to the five holdups in this county the group is reported to have admitted 10 robberies in Kenosha county and will face charges and sentencing in that county before being returned here to face counts. The group used three .22 calibre revolvers in staging their forays.

Several shots were fired during the break-in at the Miller home in Barton and Mrs. Miller's life was threatened by the bandits. Like other times the Millers were tied up during the time their home was ransacked.

Chief Pledl will go to Kenosha to question the bandits and talk to Sgt. Hill to find out whether the bandits had any connection with the Fellenz burglary here.

Mrs. Otto Moritz, Mary Flasch Die

Mrs. Otto Moritz, 85, nee Anna Sell, of Kewaskum, a former resident of the town of Wayne most of her life, died on Tuesday, Nov. 13, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. William Umbs, in this village. She had been seriously ill for two weeks with cerebral apoplexy.

She was born on June 12, 1871 in the town of Wayne, near Theresa, and resided in that township practically all of her life. She came to make her home with her daughter here four years ago. Her marriage to Otto Moritz took place on April 11, 1890 at Theresa and he predeceased her on Oct. 27, 1951.

Mrs. Moritz was the mother of five children, two of whom preceded her in death. Surviving are two sons, Paul of Kohlsville and Arthur of West Bend and a daughter Hulda (Mrs. Umbs). She also leaves one daughter-in-law, six grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

The body has been in state at Miller's Funeral home since 2 p. m. Thursday. It will lie in state there until 11 a. m. Friday and then will be taken to the Salem E. and R. church, Wayne, to be viewed from 12 noon until the time of services at 2 p. m. The Rev. Donald Koehn will officiate and burial will be in the church cemetery.

MISS MARY FLASCH

Miss Mary Flasch, 67, of 3126 N. Richards st., Milwaukee, a former resident of St. Killian, died on Tuesday, Nov. 13, at St. Michael's hospital, Milwaukee. She had been ailing for some time but was seriously ill only a few days.

The trio appeared at the municipal building Tuesday night, Nov. 13, admitted their guilt and promised to make restitution. If restitution is not made court action will follow.

Each sample should be securely capped and clearly marked with the name and address of the person submitting it.

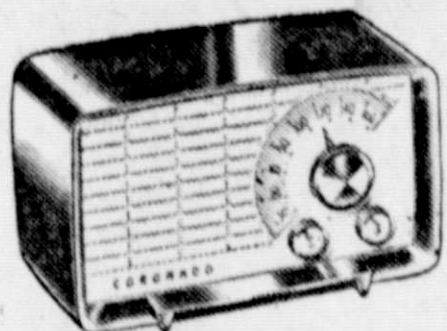

La Buwi said, "the trip was a pilgrimage." He further remarked that the European people are so concerned with yesterday that they are not concerned with tomorrow. Many of the churches he showed are 3 to 500 years old.

During the business meeting, Mrs. Vivian Pledl, a member of the club, was presented with a Red Cross nurse's pin.

The presentation was made by Mrs. Ray Haebig of West Bend, past chairman of Civil Defense in the 6th District of Women's Clubs. It was pinned to Mrs. Pledl by Mrs. Clyde Smith, also a holder of the pin since 1951. Miss Clara Jaehnig of the Red Cross office in West Bend introduced Mrs. Haebig.

No solicitation is being made in the cities of Hartford or West Bend where the Children's service is affiliated with the community chests. Youngsters under the care of

Children's Service cannot remain in their own homes for many reasons. Sometimes a child is being damaged by living with parents who cannot or will not give him a good home. Sometimes he has no home. If he needs placement outside his own community to be given a fair chance, Children's Service is often the best resource for his care.

Last year the agency received 627 children from trouble ridden homes,

ranging from infants to eighteen-year-olds. Some children, born out of wedlock, need special plans to assure them of the equal start so important to every child.

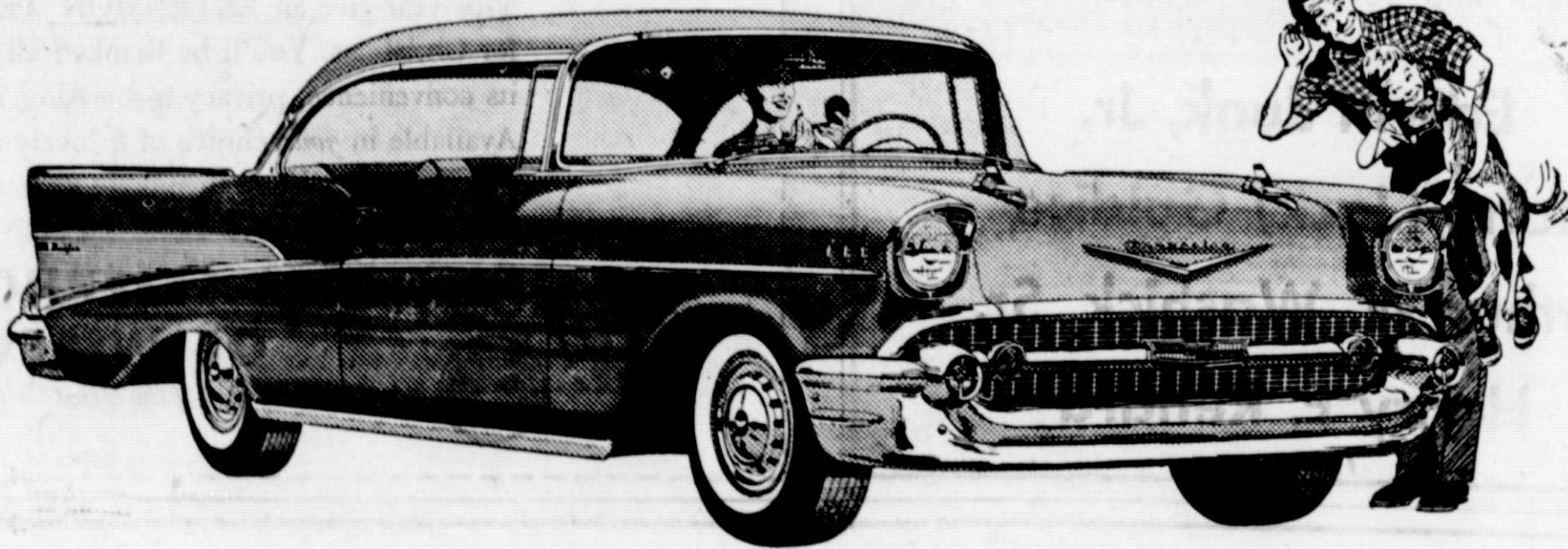

Mrs. Harry E. Koch will be manager of the 1956 Christmas Seal sale in Kewaskum, the Wisconsin Anti-Tuberculosis association announced this week.

The Christmas Seal sale, which is conducted by mail, will open in Wisconsin Nov. 15 and continue through December. Ninety-four cents of each dollar remain in the state to support Wisconsin's voluntary tuberculosis control program. The other six cents support medical research and other TB control work carried on by the National Tuberculosis association.

Christmas Seal contributions in Wisconsin finance year-round public educational services, medical research programs in Wisconsin,

chest X-rays and tuberculin tests to help find TB, and rehabilitation and social services for TB patients and their families.

For the third year, companion Christmas Seals are featured. The seals picture cheerful, green-clad youngsters carrying the familiar double-barred cross, symbol of the voluntary crusade against tuberculosis.

Christmas Seals are the sole support of the voluntary TB control movement. TB remains the leading infectious disease killer in the nation. It attacks Americans at the rate of one every five minutes and takes a life once every half hour.

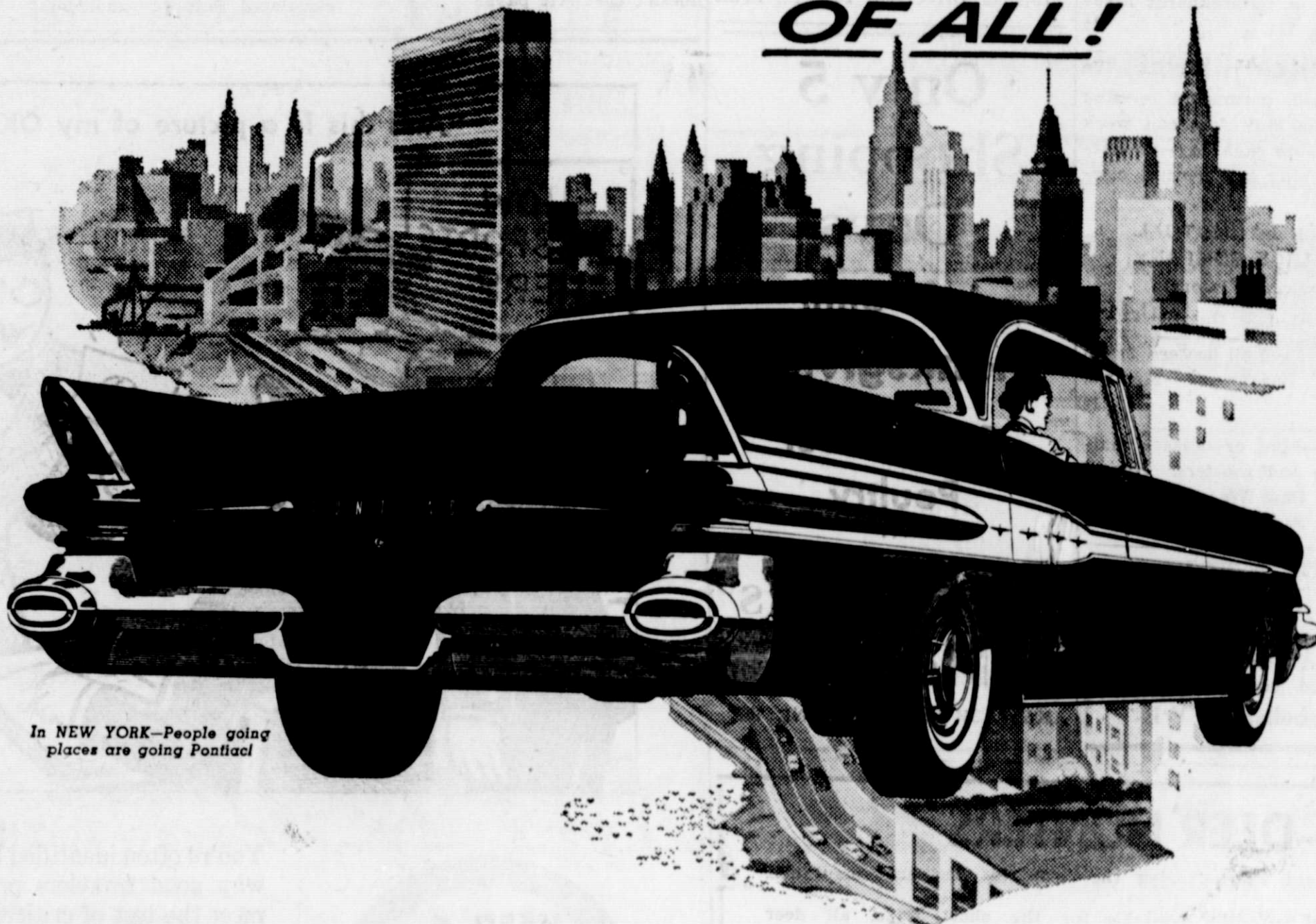

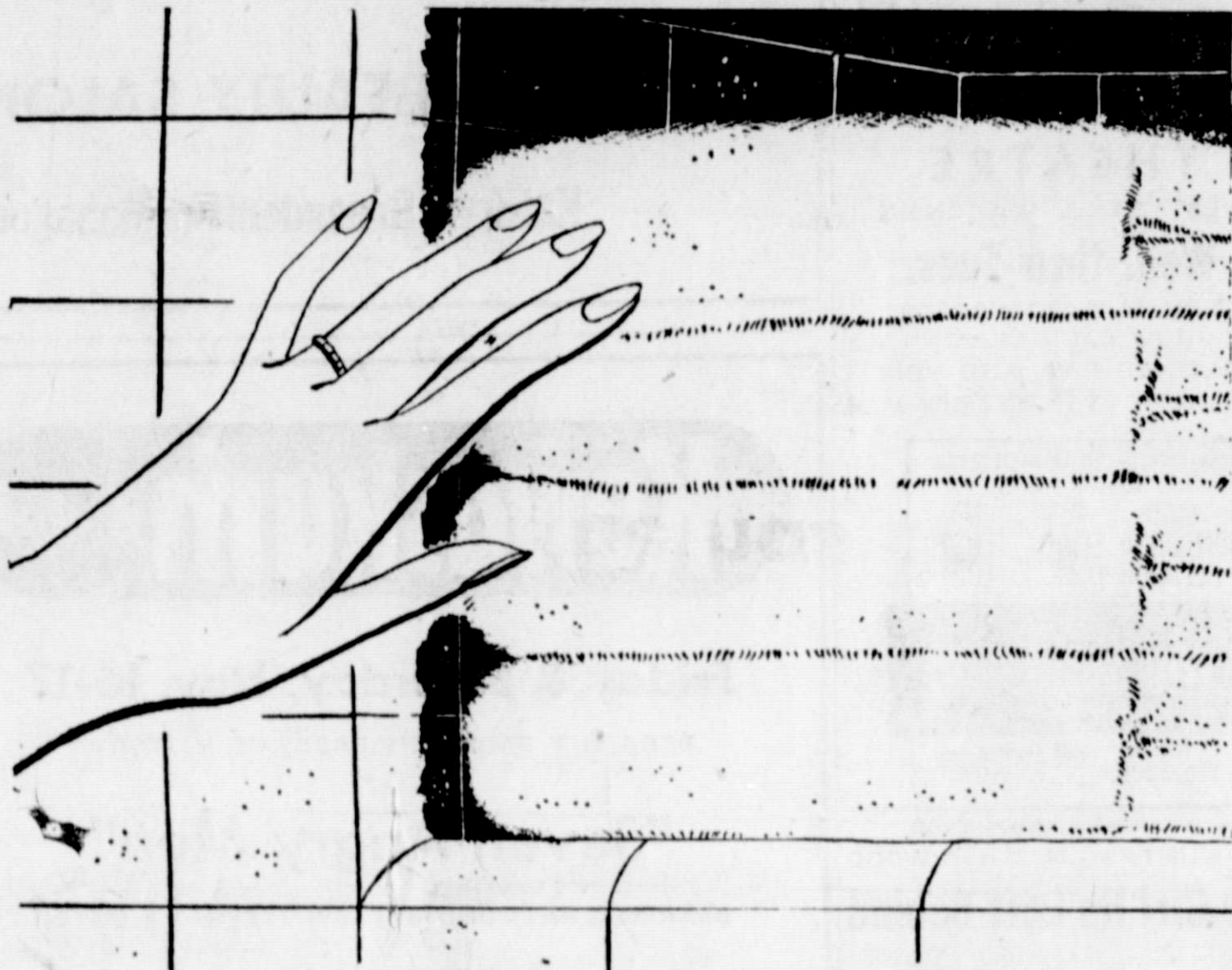

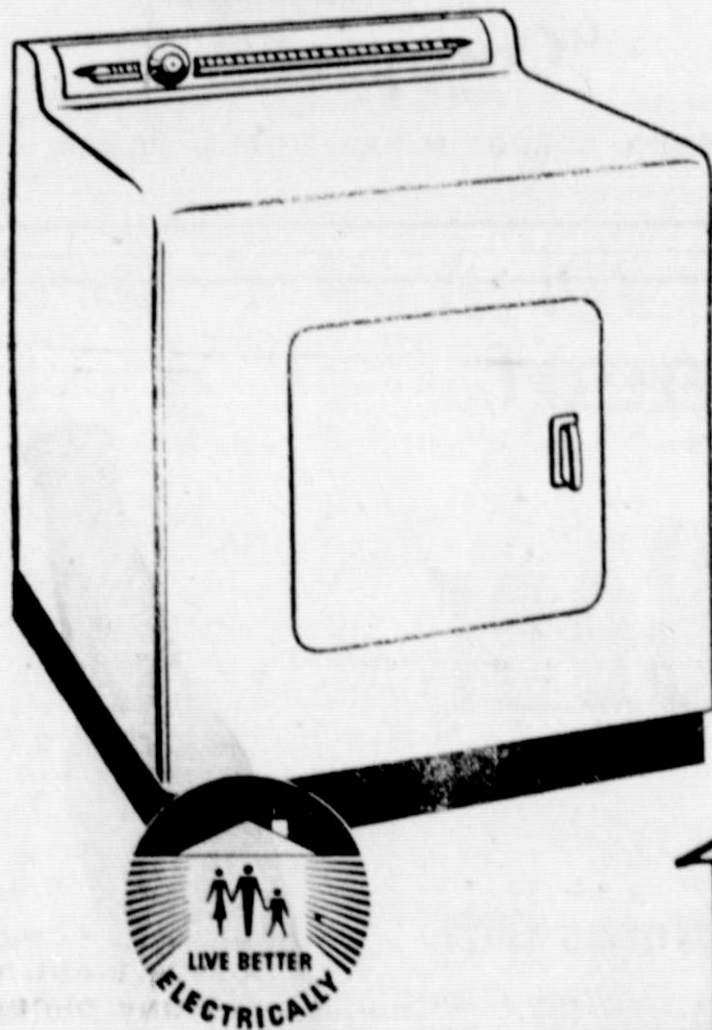
