A Kewaskum father and son were injured Saturday morning when their automobile collided with a milk truck on Hwy. H about a mile west of Hwy. 45 at the Fred Spoerl farm west of the village. The mishap occurred about 10 a. m.

The accident happened as a truck driven by Armen C. Laubenstein, 29 of R. 2, Kewaskum, turned into the Spoerl farm driveway. A car driven by Harvey W. Butzlaff, 47, of Kewaskum, struck the center of the truck, tipping it over. Both vehicles were going east on Hwy. H.

Butzlaff incurred a right knee injury and his father, Herman Butzlaff, 77, a passenger, suffered deep lacerations to his face, arms and legs.

The Butzlaffs were moving from their farm to the home in the village they recently purchased in Roseland Heights. They were carrying some personal belongings in the car when the crash occurred.

The two were treated at a local physician's office and then taken to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend. The front and left front side of the car were badly damaged.

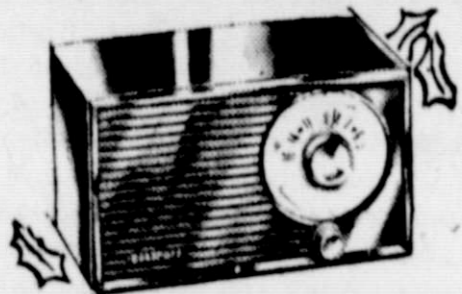
## Local Man 4-H Tractor Leader

Any boy who is interested in the care of his tractor, such as the greasing, safety, carburetor adjustment, lubrication, and other things that need to be done to the tractor on the farm, should sign up for the 4-H tractor project. There will be several meetings held in the implement shop, where the boys will have an opportunity to practice doing these various things, and get the correct information on them, and then they will be expected to do these same things on their tractor back home, when the work is needed.

## Unbeaten Chevs, Mayville Play Here For First Half Title

### CHEVS WIN SIXTH STRAIGHT AT FOX LAKE SUNDAY

First place and the probable first half championship in the Land o' Lakes league will be at stake when undefeated Mayville and Kewaskum clash in the local gym this Sunday night in the most crucial game of the season. Mayville has won seven straight and Kewaskum six straight and the winner of this tilt will virtually sew up the first half crown, barring an upset. It should be a close one with the Chevs given a slight nod because of the home floor advantage.

After Sunday's game Kewaskum still must play at West Bend and Horicon in the first half. The Chevs should win both of these but you never know what may happen at West Bend. Mayville, which has played one more game to date, must still get by the strong Hartford team. Both Kewaskum and Mayville are loaded with talent with the Chevs' advantage in height making up for Mayville's speed and accurate shooting.

The Chevs got quite a scare at Fox Lake Sunday before emerging with their 6th successive win but came back strong in the second half to win by a sizable 88-70 margin. Kewaskum couldn't get rolling in the first half, playing in the Fox Lake gym for the first time. The Chevs owned a slight 23-21 lead at the end of the quarter but were outscored 19-14 in the second period. This gave the Lakers a 40-37 halftime advantage.

But the team began to jell in the third stanza, scoring 20 points to Fox Lake's 12, and went ahead 57-52. Then in the final quarter the Chevs reached their regular form and really poured it on. They swished in 31 points in the final period while holding the Lakers to 18 and won easily by 18 points.

John Tessar kept the team in the running in the first half with 13 points, while his mates weren't doing much. John scored 15 more in the second half to take top scoring honors for the evening with a total

of 28. Also contributing heavily to the winners' cause were Don Meisenheimer with 15 points and Frankie Krueger with 12. Large George Hanrahan was held to five points, his lowest total of the season. Guard Feil paced Fox Lake with 18 points. Other top point makers for the losers were Gove with 17, Lehman with 14 and Schultz with 13.

The officials really called them close, a total of 48 personals being charged, 24 on each team. Fox Lake lost three players with five personals. The Chevs didn't lose any but had four men with four fouls.

### Around The Town

Like the wife who, when her husband came home late, said, "I've missed you so," then raised the gun and fired again, you probably missed this column last week. No, we didn't forget it. In fact we had an editorial all written and set up on a certain double board fence the village put up between Fond du Lac ave. and South st., voicing our disapproval and that of other neighbors. But at the last minute we decided not to run it. This was because we were limited for space due to Christmas advertising and before press time an opening was made in the fence which proved satisfactory and allows persons to pass through.

There is still time to enter the Christmas decorating contest being sponsored in the village. Most of the decorations are already up and as usual there are many beautiful ones. We feel sure the judges will have a hard time deciding who the winners of the \$75.00 in prizes will be. Winners will be selected by the judges sometime between Christmas and New Year's day so you better hurry.

When you decorate your tree for Christmas, decorate safely. To prevent trees from toppling over, select a place in a non-traffic area of the room. Use a substantial tree stand. Keep the tree away from radiators, fireplace, or other sources of heat. Do not put inflammable materials on the tree. Be sure your tree does not block ready exits in case of fire. Last Christmas Eve fires across the nation killed 23 persons, most of them children eagerly awaiting the excitement and gifts of Christmas. Don't let it happen again at the happiest time of the year.

The Institute for Safer Living estimates that the tragic toll of deaths on the nation's highways between midnight, Dec. 22, and midnight, Dec. 31, will probably exceed 1300. These will be deaths due to speeding, drinking, and general disregard for highway law and order. Behave like a sensible human being when you drive your car. Say "Merry Christmas" by driving more sanely than you have ever driven before. Our holiday toast to drivers is:

Enjoy the holidays  
Stay safe and sound  
Make it milk or coffee  
When homeward bound.

In fact the town is half deserted of men every Sunday, to say nothing of the large numbers who go fishing during the week. Many more local fishermen also built ice shanties this year and there is a regular village of Kewaskum shanties congregated on the ice. The population of men is almost as large on the ice as it is in town over week ends. If you can't find 'em here, look on the ice. And they have really been hauling fish out of Lake Poygan the past two weeks, most fishermen returning with the limit almost every time they went fishing. 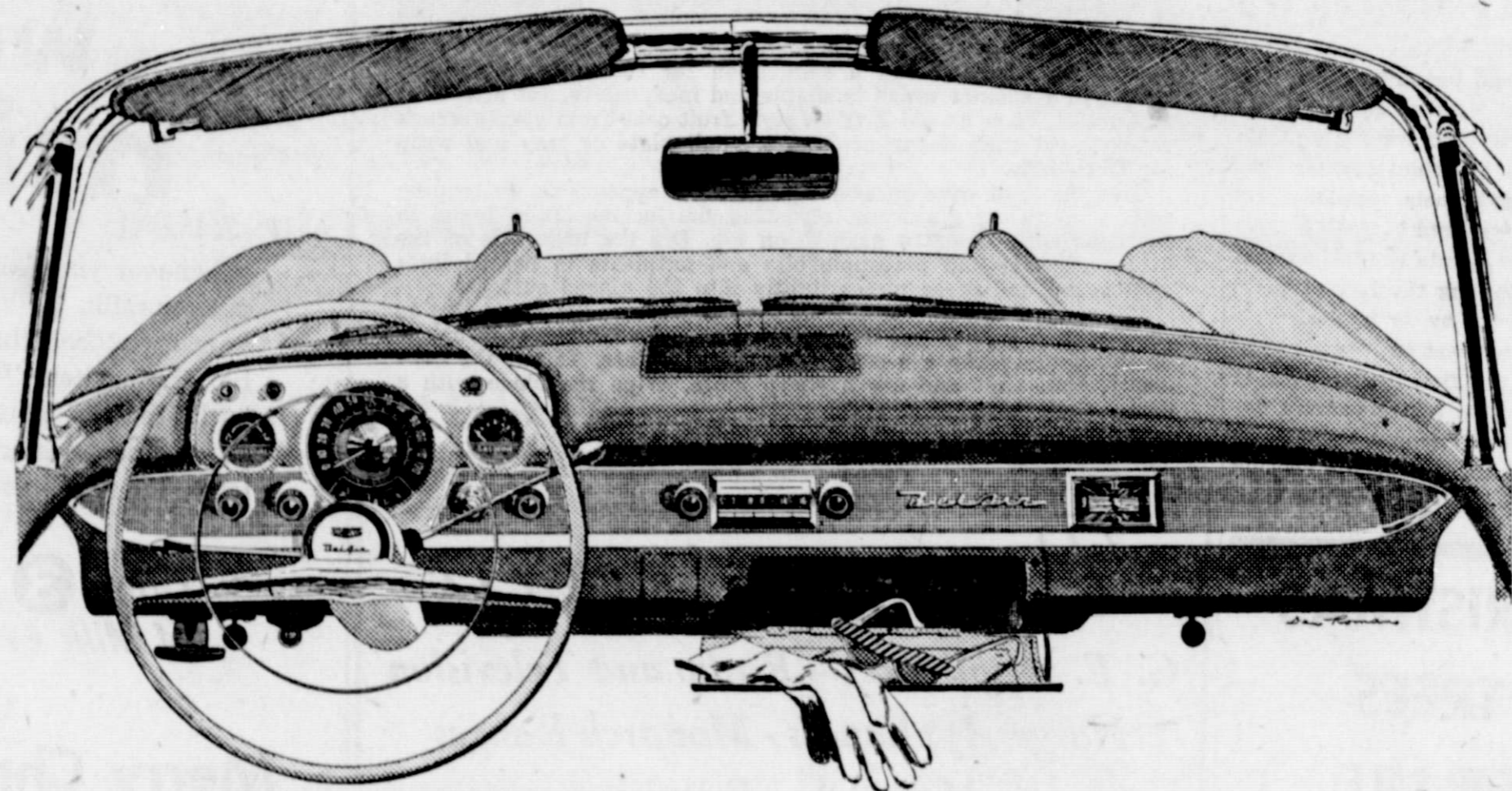
one of the spoons because of the interest he expressed.

Combine tapioca, salt, pepper and milk in saucepan. Place over medium heat and cook until mixture comes to a boil, stirring constantly. Add butter. Remove from heat and allow to cool slightly while beating eggs.

Beat egg whites until stiff. Beat egg yolks until thick and lemon colored. Add tapioca mixture to egg yolks and mix well. Fold into egg whites.

Turn into hot buttered 10-inch skillet. Cook over low heat 3 minutes. Then bake in moderate oven (350° F.) 15 minutes. Omelet is sufficiently cooked when a knife inserted comes out clean. Center Milarch of the Lakers was high scorer with 20 points, followed by Fredericks with 16 and Paulson with 14. Oppenorth again was tops for the Indians with 19 and right behind him was Dave Mertzig with 17.

On Friday night of this week Kewaskum will renew its rivalry with Campbellsport on the Bells' floor. Campbellsport has lost two games to date in loop play but must be favored over the Indians. They have more size and experience while Kewaskum lost all but one member of last year's championship team. This will be the final contest until after the holidays.

**CHANGE IN FISHING REGULATIONS EFFECTIVE JAN. 1 GOOD NEWS FOR ICE FISHERMEN**

Good news for the many Kewaskum ice fishermen was the announcement made this week by Conservation Warden Charles A. Schlumpf of Fond du Lac county that any size walleyed pike will be legal quarry for fishermen the year around on Lake Winnebago waters. This new regulation will be in force effective Jan. 1.

Up to now, the fishing season on the waters for pike began April 1 and concluded Feb. 15. In the future ice fishing will continue after that date as long as the ice is safe. Ice fishermen who catch walleyes under the present 13-inch minimum length must return them to the water until New Year's day. After that any size can be kept.

After Jan. 1 the only fish left in Winnebago waters with a size limit will be sturgeon, 40 inches; trout, 6 inches; lake trout, 17 inches, and

muskelunge, 30 inches. There are no trout in Lake Winnebago itself but there are in some surrounding waters.

Included in the Winnebago waters are Lake Winnebago, the Fond du Lac river, Lakes Butte des Morts, Winneconne and Poygan, the Wolf river as far up as the Shawanodam, Willow creek from Lake Poygan to Auroville dam, Pine river from Poyette to the Poy Sippi dam, Waupaca river from the Weyauwega dam downstream to the Wolf, Embarrass river from the Pella dam to the Wolf, Shioe river in Outagamie county, the Fox river in Marquette county downstream to the DePere dam except for Little Lake Butts des Morts but including Buffalo and Puckaway lakes.

The sturgeon spearing season on Lake Winnebago will be from Feb. 11 through Mar. 1 with a bag limit of two. Spearing on Poygan, Winneconne and Butte des Morts will be from Feb. 11-15 with a one sturgeon bag limit.

Ice fishing hours remain the same, 7 a. m. to 8 p. m. daily.

A joyous and nappy Christmas is our wish for all.

This year the winning patrol of the troop contest will receive a three day week end vacation at Carpenter Lake in northern Wisconsin. We understand the fish jump into the boats.

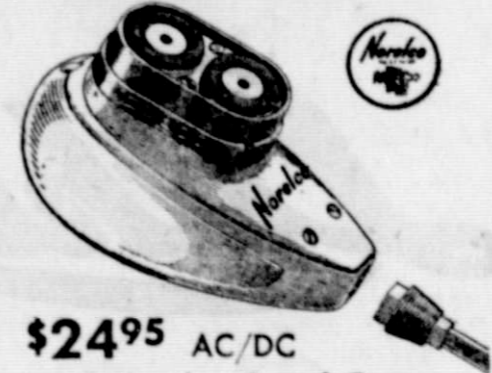

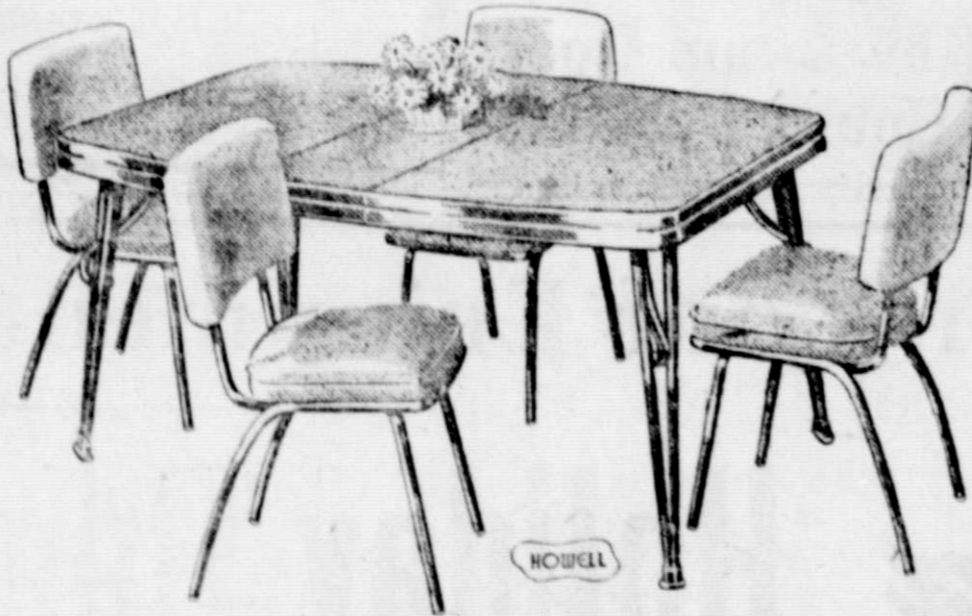
