Notorious Milwaukee Gang Attempts Break-in at the L. Rosenheimer Store

One Burglar Captured, Another Gives Self Up, Third Believed Shot Is Still Being Sought

Bond Set at \$10,000 for Two in Jail

CAR STOLEN IN VILLAGE BY ONE MEMBER TO MAKE HIS ESCAPE

Three "big time" Milwaukee burglars came to a small town Sunday night to attempt a burglary at the L. Rosenheimer department store on Fond du Lac ave. and were caught in the act before they ever got started by alert local police, who did an outstanding job of performing their duty.

The trio of notorious safe crackers ended up with one of the members being captured, another believed to have been shot fleeing the scene of the attempted burglary, and the third giving himself up to police on Tuesday.

Captured following a block long chase through village streets and back yards was Nick Tarantino, 27, of 727 E. Michigan st., Milwaukee. A second member of the gang who allegedly took part in the attempted burglary and was being sought by Milwaukee and Washington county police, walked in and gave himself up to Milwaukee police Tuesday. He is Frank P. Allota, 25, of 408 N. Jefferson st. A third member, Salvatore (Sam) DiMaggio, 40, of 1536 N. Franklin place, who was believed to have been shot fleeing the scene and may be hiding out to nurse his wound, is still being sought by police.

According to Milwaukee detectives, who scoured the city Monday searching for Allota and DiMaggio, all three burglars have long police records. Tarantino is awaiting trial in Milwaukee on a charge of participating in an \$875 safe-cracking last May 12 at Michael's Tap, 625 N. 5th st. DiMaggio, an ex-convict, is scheduled to appear Feb. 27 in Milwaukee District Court for preliminary hearing on charges of burglary and possession of burglary tools in connection with an entry last Sept. 4 at Eugene's Restaurant in the Juneau Hotel, 815 E. Wisconsin ave. Despite his denial, DiMaggio was identified by police as being the would-be burglar who entered the dining room through an alley window only to be surprised by the shots of detectives, who had been tipped off a burglary was to be committed.

Allota, although picked up five times by Milwaukee police, has never been convicted of a crime. He and DiMaggio were charged in connection with an Oct. 2, 1955 safe

burglary which netted \$1,656 from the Mattioli Pharmacy, 3501 W. National ave. but the counts were dismissed Jan. 6, 1956 due to insufficient evidence. Allota was recharged with the same crime five days later, but this also was dismissed June 2, 1956 due to insufficient evidence.

Chief of Police Roland Pledl of Kewaskum was "tipped off" shortly after 10 p. m. Sunday night that some "suspicious characters" were seen in the rear of the Rosenheimer store. The alarm was given by a young couple who from their car saw the men force their way into the store. The burglars first tried to force an office window protected by steel to guard against burglary. When they failed at the window the men pried open a rear door. As soon as the burglars had gained entry the young couple called police.

Chief Pledl immediately went to the store and issued a call for assistance over the police radio. Washington county deputies David Backhaus and Forest Brown, both of Kewaskum, answered the call. Backhaus, who was on duty in the village at the time, arrived at once and Brown came a short time later.

Chief Pledl and Backhaus checked the store and saw where entry had been gained but could not see anyone inside the building. With Deputy Backhaus at the rear of the store, Pledl circled to the front of the building and again looked inside. Not seeing anyone he checked neighboring taverns to see if they had seen any suspicious persons. There was no one in the first tavern he checked and while he was walking across the intersection of Fond du Lac ave. and Main st. to check the Republican hotel, he heard the sound of breaking glass. The burglars evidently thought both officers were in the rear of the store and pounded out the glass in the front door with a pinchbar to make their escape.

Immediately Pledl called to Backhaus and gave chase as the burglars ran from the store, crossed the street and darted between the drug store and Bowe building amid a hail of bullets from Pledl's revolver. As the chief took aim and fired at one of the robbers, he screamed "You shot me" and fell to the ground. But he got up and started running again with Pledl in pursuit. The chief ran into a washline in the yard behind the drug store which knocked is cap off and delayed him. When he took up the chase again the burglar ran out between the bank and insurance building, crossed Main st. and raced in between the hotel and Homer's barber shop where Pledl lost him. The

J. Battaglia Hurt In Train-Car Crash At Local Crossing

John Battaglia, 39, of this village, a cashier at the Bank of Kewaskum, had a narrow escape from death or serious injury last Friday morning when his car was struck by a North Western railroad freight train at the First street crossing.

It was reported that the accident occurred as Battaglia, who was driving north in the driveway of the Lay Lumber Co. property parallel to the tracks, turned right on First street and onto the railroad crossing at the Heinemann dairy plant.

Witnesses to the accident said that the northbound freight did not sound its whistle. There are no warning signals at the crossing. The train was reported traveling about 10 or 15 miles per hour, Battaglia's 1956 model car was badly damaged by the impact. The driver applied the brakes but too late to avoid being struck by the freight. The car skidded about 16 feet.

Battaglia was taken to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, for treatment of a sprained back, forehead contusion and severe shock. He returned home from the hospital Monday in apparent good condition.

Post Office in New Quarters In Koch Bldg.

The Kewaskum post office was moved from the Frank Hepp building on Main street about a block east into its new quarters in the A. G. Koch, Inc. store building last Saturday. It opened for business there on Monday.

Acting Postmaster Harry Koch had received previous orders from the post office department that the post office was to be moved no later than Feb. 28. Last Friday he received further orders that it should be moved right away and so the moving was done the next day.

New mail boxes and other equipment was scheduled to arrive before moving but failed to do so. As a result the post office is being operated under a temporary setup until the new equipment arrives. At that time the present boxes and other equipment will all be removed. This is expected to be done within the next month or at the most two months.

The Koch building housing the post office has been completely remodeled and redecorated according to postal department specifications. An archway in the wall was closed, a partition was removed and a new one set up to make the room larger, a room for incoming and outgoing mail was set up, a loading dock was built at the rear of the building, rest rooms were installed, new doorway added, a water bubbler and new lighting installed, a flagpole erected at the northeast corner of the building which extends high above the post office, and a temporary stairway was built for the front door. A permanent stairway will be completed this spring as soon as weather permits.

After our residents get used to the idea of going to a different place for their mail, they are sure to like the surroundings and set-up in the new post office.

Indians Win Tourney Opener, Play Oaks in Sub-District Finals

Kewaskum and Oakfield will tangle for the sub-district championship at the Campbellsport High school gym Friday night as the result of tournament action there Tuesday evening.

The Indians had little trouble in downing Lomira in the tourney opener, 55-36, to gain their place in the finals. Oakfield trounced Campbellsport, 63-43, to gain a berth in the championship bracket.

Friday night's card will have Campbellsport and Lomira meeting at 7 p. m. for the consolation championship, while the Oaks and Indians square off at 8 p. m. for the title. The winner will meet the winner of the sub-district meet at DeForest, Wis.

Kewaskum outscored the Lions in every period except the last and

led all the way. The quarter ended 13-7 and 14 more points in the second period gave the Indians a 27-13 halftime advantage. The winners made 17 in the third stanza to Lomira's 10 and were way ahead, 44-23, going in the final quarter.

Dave Fickler took scoring laurels in the game with 19 points, followed by Dave Mertzig with 15. Schwefel was high for the Lions with 12. The Indians sank 12 free throws to Lomira's 6.

Indians Cop 3rd Place, Beat Lomira in Finale

The Kewaskum Indians wound up their 1956-57 season in the Valley Tri-County conference Friday night with a 67-53 victory over Lomira here. With the win Kewaskum coped undisputed third place in the final standings with a 9-5 record. North Fondy won the championship with a perfect 14-0 record and Brandon placed second with 10-4.

The win over the Lions was the Indians' sixth in a row and eighth

in the last nine starts. They started the season poorly and lost four of the first five games. After the holidays they began to jell, losing only to North Fondy's titlists since, and moving from the cellar to undisputed third place at the season's end.

The winners outscored Lomira 18-12 in the initial period and 15-9 in the second stanza to possess a 33-21 halftime lead. The Lions closed the gap some with 16 points in the next quarter to 13 for the Indians, who still were on top, 46-37. In the last period the losers scored 16 and Kewaskum 21.

Mertzig led the Indians with 22 points, while Opgenorth was close behind with 19. Schwefel topped Lo-

mira with 16 markers. The Mitchellmen sank 13 free tosses to the Lions' 3.

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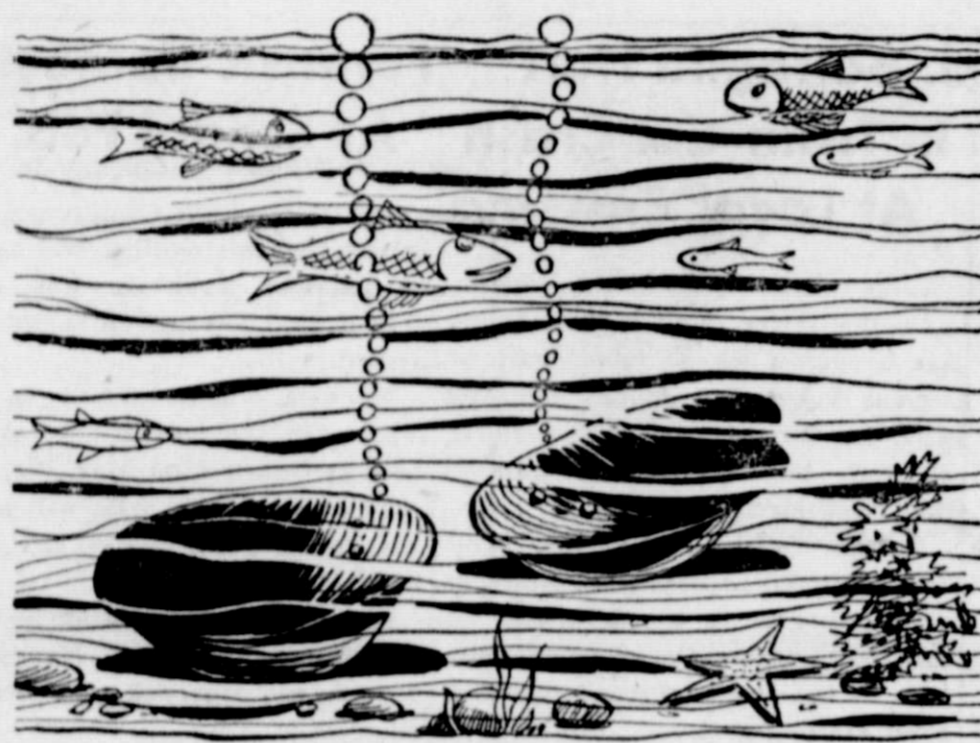

Chevs Win 6th in Row, 109-55, Near Title; Fox Lake Walks Off Floor

The point-happy Kewaskum Chevrolets went on another scoring rampage of more than 100 points here Sunday night when they shellacked Fox Lake, 109-55. The win was the team's sixth in succession this half without a setback and moved them closer to another title. The Chevs have scored well over 100 points in three of their last four games.

Kewaskum might have bettered their own scoring record of 126 points and John Tessar might have set a season's individual record were it not for some poor sportsmanship on the part of Fox Lake. A "disgruntled Fox Lake team walked off the floor with three minutes to play and the Chevs on top, 109-55, which then became the final score. The visitors were either dissatisfied with the calls of the officials or disgusted with the lopsided score, or a combination of both. So they quit, trailing by over 50 points.

The Chevs' title chances were given a big boost by Cedarburg, which upset second place Mayville Sunday. Mayville was only a game behind Kewaskum but their setback put the locals two full games on top with only three tilts left to play.

Mayville dropped into a tie with Beaver Dam and Rosendale.

Kewaskum's hook and jump shot artist, John Tessar, loop leading scorer, pumped in another amazing total against Fox Lake. He wound up with 48 points on 19 goals and 10 free throws. And Tessar sat out most of the final quarter. This, and the fact that Fox Lake quit with three minutes left, probably kept him from setting a scoring high. Other top scorers in the rout were Don Meisenheimer with 16, Frank Krueger 14 and George Hanrahan with 13. Best scorers for the visitors were Roberts with 18 and Gove 13.

The Chevrolets outscored Fox Lake by large margins in every quarter. It was 25-13 at the quarter and 56-28 at halftime. Making 30

in the third stanza to their opponents' 13 made it 86-41.

In the most important tilt left on the schedule Kewaskum plays at Mayville this Saturday night. A victory will clinch at least a tie for the second half championship. They finish with West Bend and Horicon here.

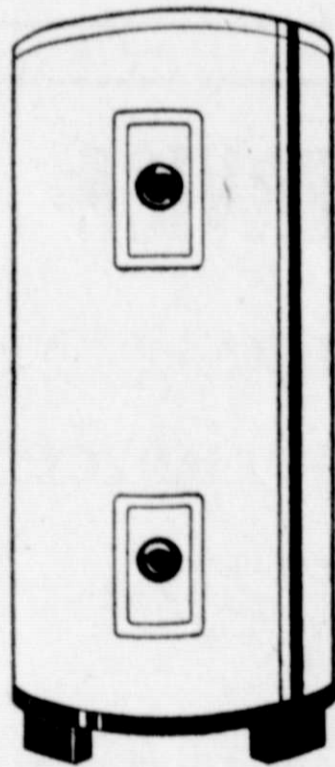
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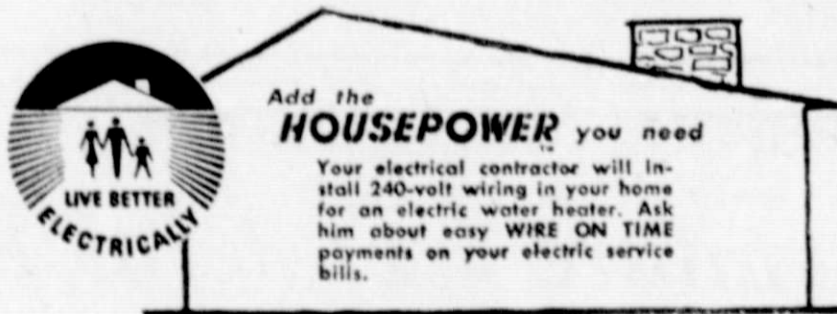


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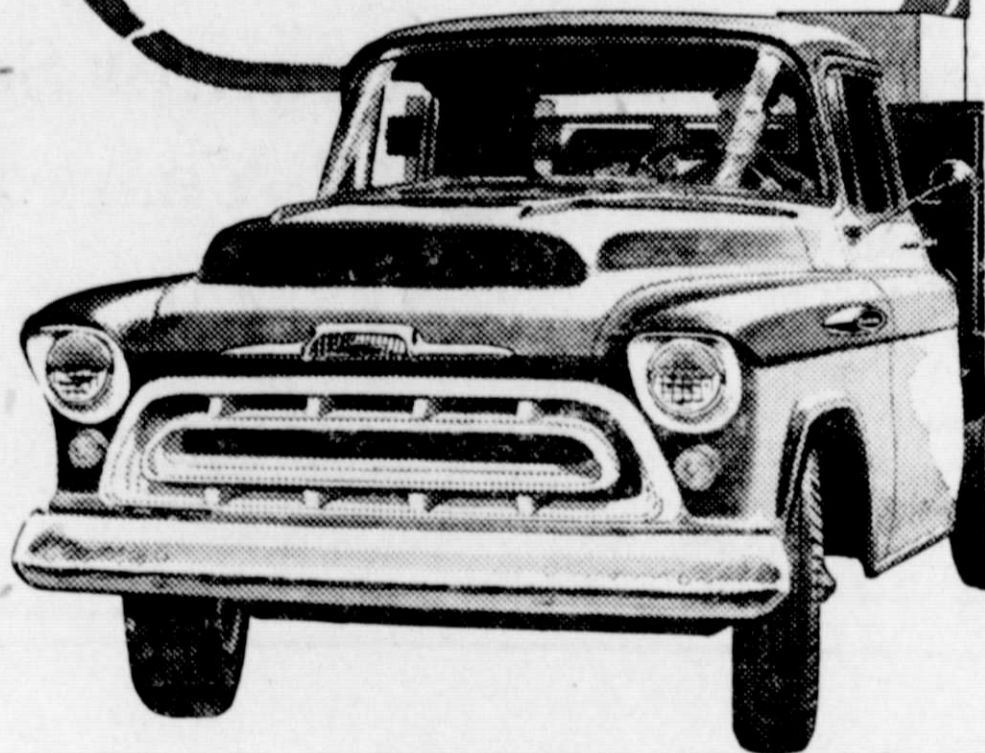
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Local Chapter Has FFA Week Display

Future Farmers of America members throughout the nation scheduled special activities to focus public attention on the work of their organization during National FFA Week, Feb. 16-23.

Locally, members of the Kewaskum FFA chapter have a window display at the Yoost Meat Market and have put on a program for the Kiwanis club.

Membership in the FFA is made up of farm boys who are students of vocational agriculture in high school. The organization's activities are designed primarily to help develop rural leadership and good citizenship and to stimulate the boys to better achievement in their study and work toward successful establishment in farming.

The Kewaskum FFA chapter has 52 members. Officers are: Pres, Roger Garbisch; V. P., Roger Dobke; Sec., Ron Bales; Treas., Russ Kempf; Reporter, Dave Nigh; Sentinel, Bob Becker. O. E. Behnke, vocational agriculture instructor in Kewaskum High school, serves as advisor of the FFA chapter.

The National Future Farmer organization has more than 382,000 members, with 8,990 local chapters in the 48 States, Hawaii, and Puerto Rico. Future Farmers choose the week of George Washington's birthday

each year for the observance of National FFA Week. Although generally recognized as a Revolutionary War general and our first president, Washington's first love was the farm he called Mount Vernon. There, he was one of the first in the nation to practice contour planting, crop rotations, fertilization, and other soil conservation and improvement methods. It was more than a century after Washington's death before general use was made of many of the sound agricultural practices that he advocated.

IMPRESSIONS OF JAPAN TOLD TO WOMAN'S CLUB

Their "Impressions of Japan" were shared with the members of the Kewaskum Woman's club on

Saturday, Feb. 16, when Mr. and Mrs. Ronald Fraser were guests. The former, an instructor of English and speech in the Campbell-sport High school, served as a 1st lieutenant in World War II, his wife as an army librarian, and it was while they were stationed in Japan for a period of two years that these impressions and views were gathered. In describing the islands and the Japanese people, the Frasers mentioned the fact that they are the only group of people on the face of the earth who are completely literate. Contrary to many Americans' beliefs, they are a very nice people and they learned to love them. They are also cultured, but difficult to know.

Mrs. Fraser pointed out the well-known fact of it being highly over-populated, and that it is a non-Christian country with most of the older people having gone back to the ancient Buddhism religion.

Their clothing was described in detail and it was pointed out how very important clothes are to a Japanese. Many items of clothing were displayed as well as crystal jewelry, lacquered dishes, dolls, most all of the items in the vivid colors of which the Japanese are so fond.

During the coffee hour that followed, Mr. and Mrs. Fraser answered questions about their stay in Japan. Hostesses were Mrs. Carroll Haug, Mrs. C. M. Rose, Mrs. Marvin Martin and Mrs. Edw. B. Miller.

Burglary

(CONTINUED FROM PAGE ONE) bandits were short and ran right under the wash line which caught the chief in the neck.

Tarantino, who was captured a short time later, jumped over a fence and headed in the other direction as all three of the burglars spread out. Many Kewaskum residents saw the action and joined in the chase. Many people were just going home from the basketball game at school at the time. Someone saw Tarantino running about a block away and sounded the alarm. Soon many persons, with flashlights, began searching for him. While Officer Brown was searching around Koch's mill and Pledl was looking through a garage at the Tony Hansen residence across the street some of the searchers came across Tarantino hiding in a dark corner at the rear of the Hansen home. With gun drawn Chief Pledl rushed in and with the aid of Officer Brown put the burglar up against the building to be searched and handcuffed. He was taken by Police car to the nearby municipal building for questioning and later removed to the county jail at West Bend.

While Tarantino was being apprehended, Jerome Stautz of West Bend reported his car was stolen from in front of the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Clifford Stautz, on Prospect ave. Stautz had attended the basketball game and intended to park his car just for a few minutes while he picked up his children. When he came out it was gone. One or both of the other burglars, unable to return to their car which they had parked north of the Rosenheimer store on Fond du Lac ave. across from Buczek's tavern, apparently stole the Stautz car to make a getaway. The car was later found abandoned at the Lighthouse Lanes bowling alleys south of Kewaskum on Hwy. 45.

The thieves car, a green 1948 Dodge, was picked up and taken inside of the municipal building by the officers, where it is still being held.

Found in Rosenheimer's store, all neatly laid out on a desk and ready to be put to use, were a complete set of new burglar tools, including 4 crowbars, 4 pinch bars, 3 drift pins (for removing safe combinations), coal chisels and other equipment. A sledge hammer was found on the floor in front of a stairway. The tools were abandoned when police surprised the thieves. They were surprised so quickly after they entered the store that only one mark was found on the safe, a sledge hammer blow on the safe combination.

The burglars gained entrance through a large door used to take in eggs and stock at the store. The intruders locked the door behind them again. The fact that all doors as well as the window which they had attempted to enter puzzled police who were not sure the men were in the building until they bolted through the panel in the front door. The shooting and noise of the chase attracted a large crowd of curious and excited people to the scene. Milwaukee, Sheboygan, Fond du Lac and Washington county sheriffs, detectives and police were

in Kewaskum Monday investigating the attempted burglary and trying to link the burglars with others committed recently in neighboring counties. Finger prints of all tools, hats found in the abandoned car, and on the car itself were taken and sent to the state crime laboratory at Madison. Even the sweepings in the store were gathered up for evidence.

Tarantino and Aliota are being held in jail under \$10,000 bond on charges of entering the store with the intention of committing burglary. To offset any possibility of an attempted jail break or other trouble the two were separated, one being jailed in Washington county and the other in Ozaukee county. Tarantino is being held in this county and Aliota at Port Washington.

An intensive police hunt is being made for DiMaggio, who is reported to be the ring leader of the large gang of burglars, and it is expected he may be apprehended shortly. Pledl said DiMaggio may be wounded and could be hiding out nursing his wound.

After giving himself up Tuesday Aliota was speedily brought to Washington county where both he and Tarantino were arraigned before Justice of the Peace Herbert P. Matenaer Tuesday afternoon. Bond was set at \$10,000 each and the two were locked up pending dis-

position of their case.

At first it was believed that four men were involved in the break-in but later evidence revealed that only the three were involved. Pledl said he recognized Aliota and DiMaggio from "mug" shots on file in Milwaukee where he formerly served on the police force 25 years. Two Milwaukee detectives assisted Pledl and Sheriff Alvin Schmidt of Washington county in interrogating Tarantino, who maintained he was the only one involved in the break-in.

Kewaskum and the village's very efficient and wide awake police officers gained statewide and even national publicity during the week in newspapers, over radio and on television as a result of their excellent job in making such quick work of the "big city bad men," who had previously evaded capture by some of the best policemen.

OUR POLICE CHIEF SAYS:

The car left running with the keys in the ignition which was stolen Sunday night should serve as a warning to residents not to have their autos unattended with motors running. One never knows when crime will strike in the village and cars with motors running provide an accessory to crime and an invitation to be stolen.
