## Nine Candidates In Senate Race at Election Tuesday

A special primary election for United States senator will be held next Tuesday, July 30. Voters will select a Republican and Democratic candidate as nominees for the Aug. 27 election to succeed the late Joseph McCarthy in the U. S. Senate.

A good turnout at the polls is expected because of the large field seeking the Republican nomination. There are nine candidates in all, seven on the GOP ticket and two on the Democratic ballot.

Voters are reminded that locally the polls will be open a half hour later than heretofore as the result of a new ordinance recently passed by the village board. The polls will open at 9 a. m. and close at 6 p. m. Formerly they closed at 5:30 p. m. This will give voters an opportunity to cast their ballots after working hours if they cannot get there during the day. Voting, as usual, will be done in the municipal building.

## Body of Drowning Victim Recovered

The body of Arnold A. Floeter, 39, of Campbellsport was recovered from Lake Winnebago shortly before 11 a. m. Friday off Sylvan Bay on the east shore of the lake. Floeter's death is believed to have been due to drowning but it was indicated that a heart attack might have been responsible for his death.

Floeter, manager of the Brittingham and Hixon Lumber Co. at Campbellsport, was on an outing with Lions club members last week Tuesday and was returning on a lake cruiser when he toppled into the lake while descending a ladder from the upper deck.

A native of Westfield, Wis., Floeter came to Campbellsport four years ago from Portage. He is survived by his widow, a daughter Arlene, 15, and three sons, Larry 12, Howard 4, and Alan, 18 months; two brothers, a sister, his father, Albert A. and his maternal grandparents.

Funeral services were held at 10:30 a. m. Monday at Immanuel Lutheran church, Campbellsport. The Rev. Joel Sauer officiated and burial took place at Westfield.

## Youth Placed on Probation in Fatal Car Crash

Joseph Szot, Jr., 17, of 5258 N. 58th st., Milwaukee, who was driver of the car in which two Milwaukee girls were fatally injured on May 27 on a park road at Mauthe lake in the Kettle Moraine State Forest northeast of Kewaskum, was placed on three years probation last week.

Municipal Judge Hazen W. McEssy of Fond du Lac imposed sentence on Szot. The youth pleaded no contest before Judge McEssy July 5 to a negligent homicide charge. His driver's license was also revoked for one year.

The fatal accident occurred after an outing of Messmer high school graduates at the lake. Killed when Szot's car went out of control, skidded 166 feet and rolled over were Jeannine Sauve, 19, Glendale, and Carol Zielinski, 17, Whitefish Bay.

The mishap happened when the group was enroute home following a class picnic at Mauthe lake. Szot was charged with "negligent operation of a motor vehicle and handling a motor vehicle while under the influence of intoxicants." The judge transferred the case from juvenile to criminal court because of the serious nature of the offense.

## High School Adds Two New Teachers

Expected to join the faculty at Kewaskum Community high school this fall, according to Principal Clifford Rose, are two new teachers, Betty Loppnow, a physical teacher, and Violet Schmidt, home ec teacher, both of Racine.

Miss Loppnow was graduated from Dana college in Blair, Neb., last spring while Miss Schmidt is a 1951 graduate of the University of Wisconsin. She taught at South Milwaukee high school last year.

Both the high school and grade school faculty staffs are being increased by one over last year. Anticipated enrollment at the high school this school year is about 300 and at the public grade school, at least 275, for a total of 575.

Ready for occupancy when school opens in September will be the new 22-teacher-station Kewaskum high school, just about completed now at a cost of approximately \$700,000. It includes a large double gym. The old high school building, two blocks southwest, will house fifth through eighth graders, with the old ag shop in this building to be converted into a cafeteria for grade school use. The also comparatively new public grade school building will be used for kindergarten through fourth grade.

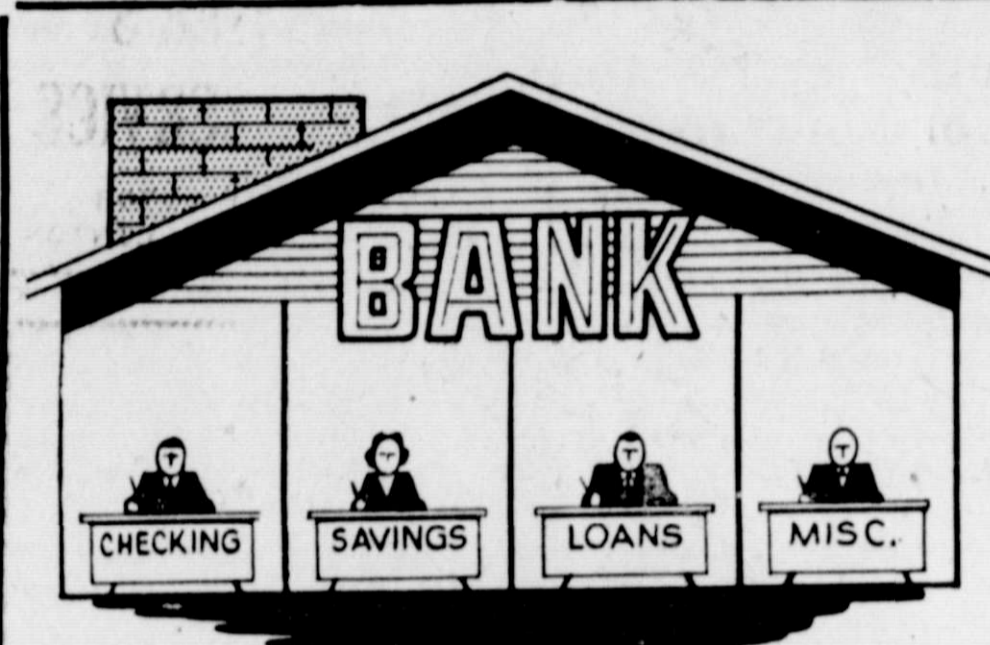

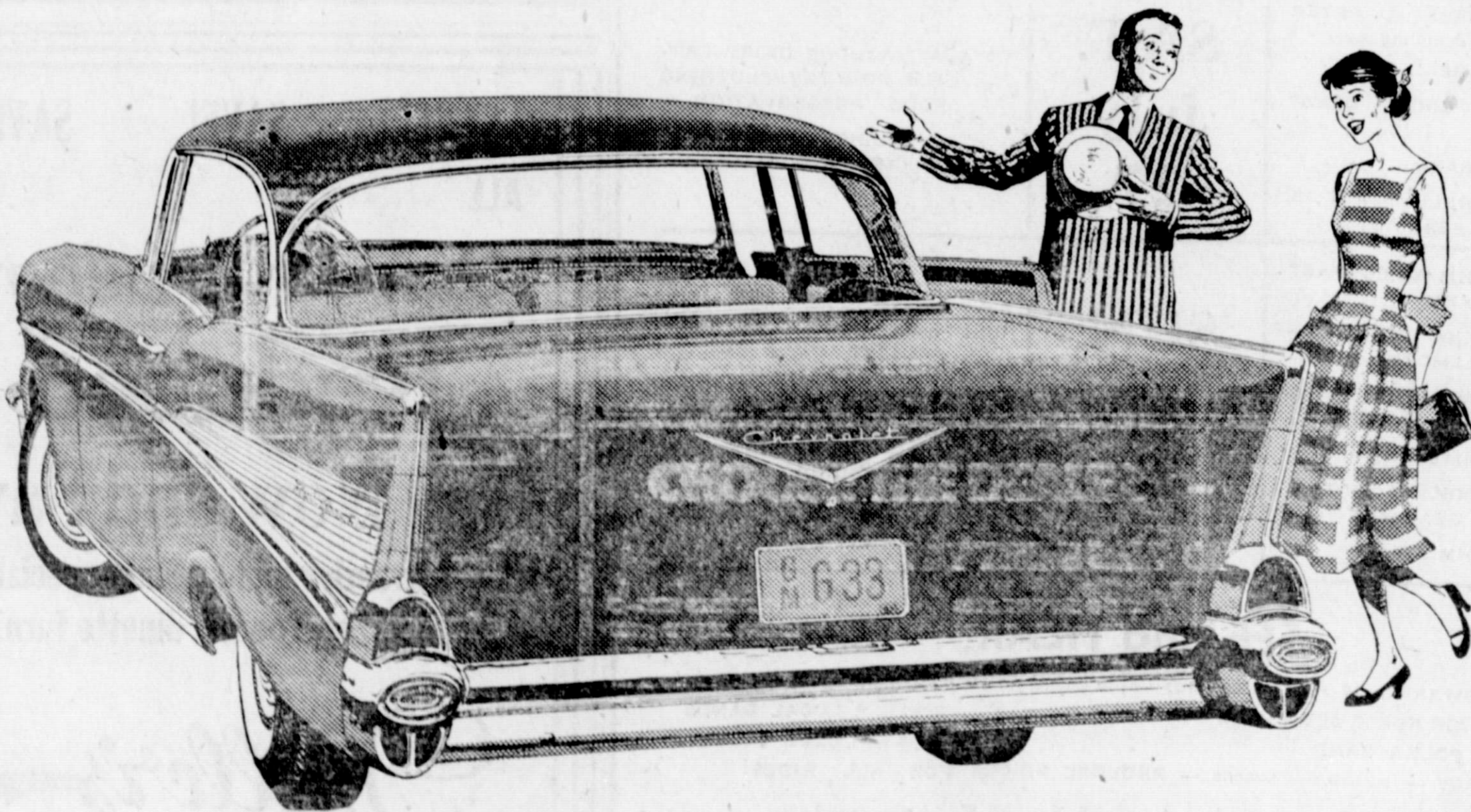

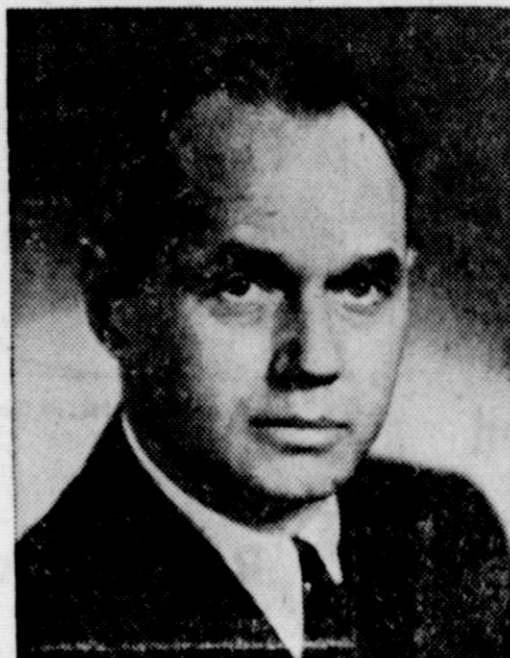

### Mertzig Pitches No-Hit, No-Run Tilt, Wins 12-0; Lose Abbreviated Game

STRIKES OUT 15 BATTERS IN 12-0 SHUTOUT THURSDAY; JACKSON HERE SUNDAY

Dandy Dave Mertzig, young pitcher who just graduated from Kewaskum high school this year, entered the Land o' Lakes league hall of fame by pitching a no-hit, no-run game against Belgium Thursday night under the lights here as the Kewaskum Chevs blanked the visitors, 12-0.

In hurling his no-hit game which every pitcher dreams about Thursday night, Mertzig struck out 15 batters, while walking five, and had the Belgium players under complete control. Dave struck out the side in three innings, the 2nd, 5th and 7th. The only batters to reach base got there on walks or errors. Only six players reached base and only once did a runner get to third. This is quite a rare achievement for the youngster, who twirled a terrific game.

In the meantime the Chevs fat-

tened their averages with 13 hits off of two Belgium pitchers, Walvoort and Schueller. Heading the hit parade was Augie Bilgo who starred with 3 hits in 5 trips, including a resounding homer. Bob Dreher, Pee Wee Stenman, Herb Fisher and Mertzig each collected 2 safeties. Kewaskum scored in every frame but the 2nd, 4th and 7th. Their biggest frame was the 6th, in which they pushed across 5 runs.

It was a different story at Belgium Sunday when the winners lashed out 11 hits off Don Meisenheimer in 6½ innings, good for 7 runs. Kewaskum outhit them with 12 in the brief contest but fell short in runs by one. Walvoort again started for Belgium and went all the way, as did Meisy. The latter whiffed only 2 and passed 3. Wal-

voort fanned 6 and walked 5. Trailing 6-5, Belgium scored 2 runs in the 6th to pull out the victory just before the rains came. Augie Bilgo again was the hitting ace in the contest with 3 for 4 and his safeties included another long home run as well as a double. Fuzzy Dreher also collected 3 for 4, all singles, and G. Opgenorth chipped in 2. Karnitz and Wester each garnered 2 safeties for the winners.

This Sunday afternoon Kewaskum entertains Jackson, which has won 3 and lost 6 in the south section of the league. Game time is 2 p. m.
