Over 600 at Dedication of High School

TOUR OF BUILDING FOLLOWS PROGRAM; STATE SUPT. IS MAIN SPEAKER

Kewaskum's new \$600,000 Community High school was formally dedicated Sunday afternoon during a special program highlighted by a talk by George E. Watson, state superintendent of schools, who was the main speaker. At the conclusion of the program guided tours were taken through the building in groups.

More than 600 residents from the various towns and villages which comprise the school district, together with many outsiders, were on hand for the dedication, reception, and tours of the building. They were especially impressed with the size, beauty and modern design of the building and its rooms as well as the up-to-date teaching methods, fixtures and complete equipment. Of special interest were the modernly equipped kitchen and cafeteria, huge heating plant, spacious gymnasium and stage, shower and locker rooms, soundproof music rooms, agriculture, homemaking, manual training and science departments, odor removing machine, drying room for uniforms and library.

Mr. Watson complimented the residents of the school district for completing their building program, and providing the children with a fine school. He said that in addition to being attractive, the high school also is functional. Mr. Watson emphasized that no one should lose sight of the general education program, adding there is a danger of putting too much emphasis on the sciences instead of the fundamentals.

With the dedication of the ultra-modern school building, located at the end of Bilgo lane in the village, there was also a program dedicating a grand piano which was presented to the school by the children of the late Mrs. D. M. Rosenhelmer as a memorial to her.

At the dedicatory program the Rev. F. C. La Buwi, pastor of Holy Trinity congregation, gave the invocation. Melvin Riley, president of the board of education, presided and welcomed the residents. Clifford Rose, principal, introduced various guests before calling upon the speakers, who represented the community, school board and students.

Speaking on behalf of the residents of Kewaskum was James Reigle, village president. Miss Paula Petri, member of the board of education, spoke on behalf of that group, and Gerald Opgenorth, president of the student council, gave a brief address on behalf of the student body. Representatives of the architectural and contracting firms also attended.

Besides the principal address by Mr. Watson, there were selections by the high school band and girls' glee club under the direction of Ted Sinclear, head of the music department. Carol Miller presented a piano solo. Closing benediction was conducted by the Rev. C. F. Hammen, pastor of Peace E and R

Name Mrs. H. Koch Seal Sale Manager Village Agrees on Snow Removal from New High School Grounds at Cost

Mrs. Harry E. Koch will serve as manager of the 1957 Christmas seal sale in Kewaskum, the Wisconsin Anti-Tuberculosis association announced Wednesday.

The 1957 sale will start in most Wisconsin communities Nov. 18, and will continue through December. It is conducted by mail and provides almost the sole support of the voluntary TB control movement. Ninety-four cents of each dollar remains in Wisconsin to support the program on the local and state level.

The balance, six cents, supports medical research and other TB control work carried on by the National Tuberculosis association.

TB control programs financed by Christmas seal contributions are chest X-ray and tuberculin skin testing programs to help find TB, and services to TB patients and their families.

Seal funds also finance medical research at the University of Wisconsin and TB courses for medical and nursing students in other Wisconsin schools.

The 1957 Christmas seal, which supports and symbolizes the fight against tuberculosis, shows the heads of a jolly Santa Claus and a wide-eyed girl reflected in red and silver Christmas tree ornaments against a background of evergreens. The seal was designed by G. Clinton Bradley, Philadelphia free lance artist, and was selected in the annual contest for all artists conducted by the NTA to pick the Christmas seal design.

Death of Mrs. Herman Schultz

Mrs. Herman Schultz, 85, nee Emma Butzke, passed away Monday morning, Nov. 11, at the home of her son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Schultz in Kewaskum. She had been ailing several years and her demise was attributed to the complications of advanced age.

Mrs. Schultz was born Jan. 7, 1872 in the town of Scott, Sheboygan county. She was a resident of Beechwood and vicinity most of her life. For the past nine years she had made her home with her son-in-law and daughter on South st. in the village.

The deceased's marriage to Herman Schultz took place at Beechwood. He preceded her in death on Oct. 20, 1938. Three children were born to the couple, two of whom predeceased their parents. One daughter, Laura, died at the age of 15 years and another daughter, Florence (Mrs. Otto Schultz) died Aug. 13, 1951. The surviving daughter is Marie (Mrs. Arthur Schultz) of Kewaskum. Mrs. Schultz also leaves two sons-in-law, Arthur and Otto Schultz of Kewaskum; three grandsons, and two brothers, Ernst Butzke of Nashville, Tenn. and George Butzke of West Bend. The body was in state at Miller's Funeral home after 6:30 p. m. Tuesday. Funeral services were held Wednesday at 2 p. m. at the funeral home, the Rev. C. F. Hammen officiating. Burial was in Beechwood cemetery.

Sportsmen Remove Stones from Dam

The Kettle Moraine Sportsmen's Association of Kewaskum last week engaged the services of Francis Bohn and his caterpillar to clear away some of the rocks from the old dam on the Milwaukee river just north of the Main st. bridge. This work was done to provide a channel for the fish to swim through.

Last spring the sportsmen were responsible for the removal of the stops from the new river dam at the south end of the village. This was done to lower the water level and give vegetation a chance to grow to provide food for the fish. At the same time the river bed was cleaned out.

The water will be kept at this low level throughout the winter and then will be gradually raised next spring as the vegetation grows again. The shallow water and ice are expected to kill many of the rough fish this winter. Then in spring or summer fully grown game fish will be planted in the river by the Wisconsin conservation department to provide immediate good fishing.

Organist 50 Years At Church Honored

200 ATTEND PROGRAM FOR MRS. FRANK THULL AT ST. MICHAEL'S

About 200 persons attended a special program Sunday afternoon, Nov. 3, honoring Mrs. Frank Thull, organist at St. Michael's Catholic church at St. Michaels for fifty years. Children of the parish school re-enacted her life as well as the history of the church choir.

Mrs. Thull, 71, was presented with gifts from the parish and her services were lauded by the Rev. Matthew Urban, pastor of the church. She received a chair, floor lamp and radio.

Mrs. Thull, who is still the church organist, actually started playing at the church in 1899, at the age of 13, but it was in 1907 when she became the regular organist. Mr. and Mrs. Thull have five children, two of whom live at St. Michaels, two at Nenno and one at West Bend.

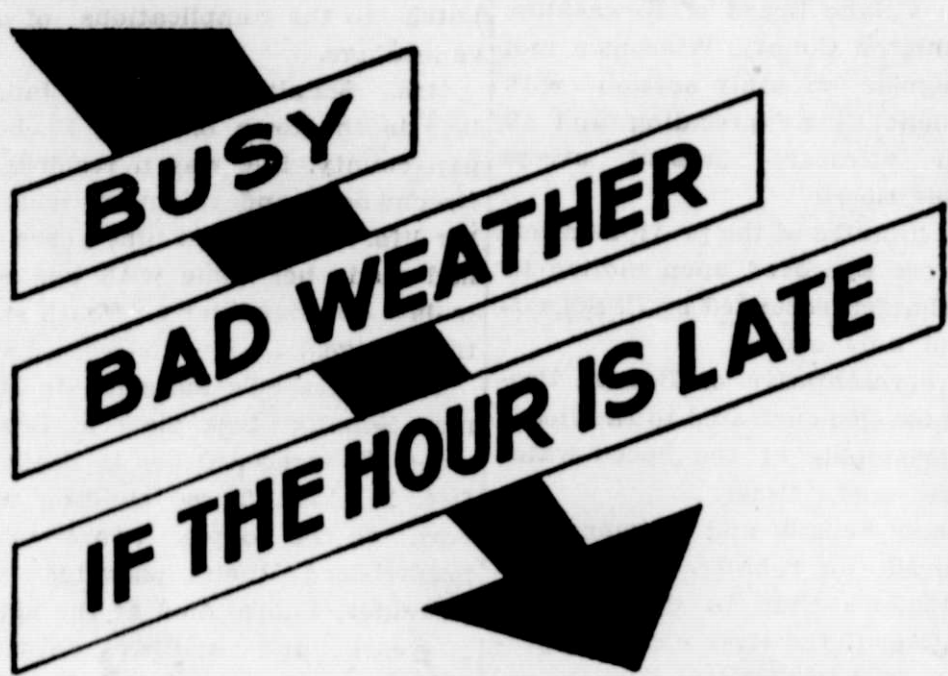

Enrollment in Junior Red Cross Began Nov. 11 in County Schools

Students in public and parochial schools in the West Bend chapter of the American Red Cross were given an opportunity Monday, Nov. 11, to enroll in the Junior Red Cross which bands together to provide a wide variety of good citizenship-building activities on the community, national, and international levels.

The enrollment will be carried on in each of the 34 schools from Nov. 11 to 25 under the chairmanship of Fred Holt, local Junior Red Cross chairman.

Announcing the annual enrollment, Holt said nearly 22,000,000 students were members last year in the U. S., its territories, and in the U. S. military schools overseas. Here in the West Bend chapter the membership was 4,375.

"The juniors serve in virtually all Red Cross chapter activities as well as their own programs," he stated. "Through their Junior Red Cross work, they experience the satisfaction that comes from voluntary service to others."

No individual fee is required for membership in the Junior Red Cross. Instead, the fee is by group—one dollar for every elementary classroom, and one dollar for each 30 pupils or less enrolled in secondary schools.

These fees finance the Junior Red Cross services locally and the Junior Red Cross children's fund, through which the juniors carry on their national and international programs.

Enrollment carries with it a subscription to the Junior Red Cross "Journal" for each group of 30 students in secondary schools and a subscription to the Junior Red Cross "News" for every elementary classroom.

The juniors are guided by their activities by teacher-sponsors. Many of the services are carried on as a regular part of school work. For instance, the last year two exchange albums were made by the Decorah

and Fair Park schools; holiday favors, nutcups, bulletin board designs, fruit cakes, clip boards and weaving frames were made for the Veterans hospital at Wood and the Washington county home. The Kewaskum and West Bend high schools provided an evening of entertainment at the Ward Memorial Theater, and the McLane string quartet entertained the patients of Section 3 in their solarium during a birthday party.

Two members attended the Junior Red Cross training school at Lake Geneva Aug. 20-29. They were Miss Madeline Brandenburg, member of the chapter board of directors and Miss Steffanie Reseburg, council president and resource member for the midwestern area council.

Juniors participate in the radio programs "Red Cross on the Air WBKV" on Saturday mornings, 11:00 - 11:15 o'clock. In junior first aid 90 pupils received certificates, and in the secondary schools, standard first aid 198 rated certificates. During the swimming program 391 students received a certificate in one or more of the swimming levels. Home nursing training is given in the secondary schools in conjunction with home economics.

In these activities, juniors are learning by doing, learning to take their places as community leaders in a few years.

Bull Brings \$1,400 at County Holstein Sale

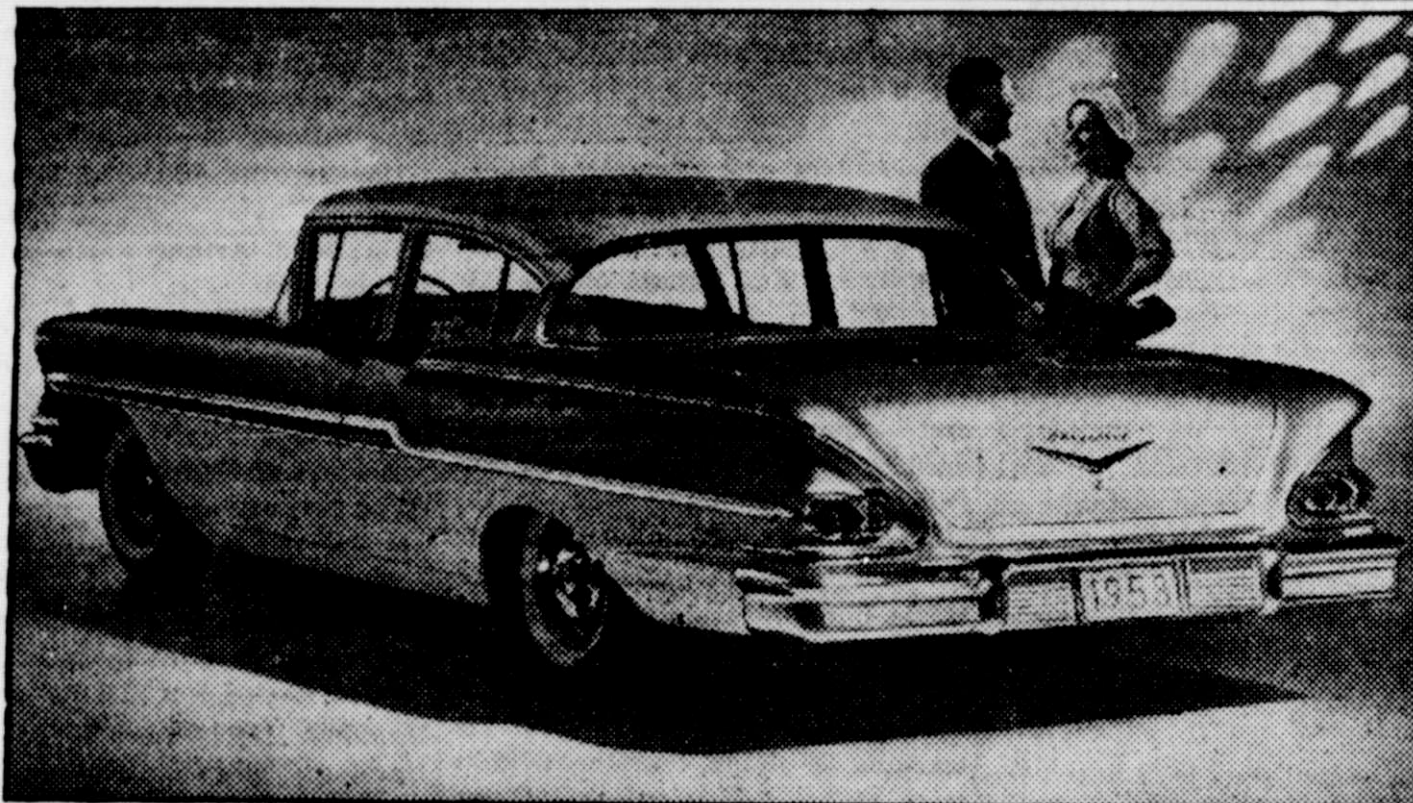

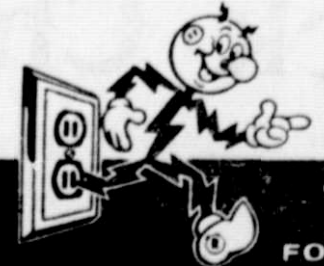
