Hunters Bag Many Bucks in Local, Northern Areas

Fourteen deer were reported killed by hunters in Washington county during the current season up until the time of this writing. Many others were reported shot in Fond du Lac, Dodge, Sheboygan and other surrounding counties as well as the north woods, from where numerous hunters had not yet returned.

The first buck shot in the county shortly after the season opened Saturday was brought down by Orville Klumb of Rockfield who bagged a seven-pointer in the Rockfield swamp. The same morning Edmund Cross of Milwaukee shot a 10 point buck in the Theresa swamp, town of Wayne, and Janice Riley of R. 1, Kewaskum, got a four point buck in the town of Farmington, near St. Michaels.

Other deer killed in the county Saturday were by Rudolph Kaczmarzyk, Milwaukee, Theresa marsh, town of Wayne; Willard Gerner, R. 1, West Bend, town of West Bend; Raymond Eichstedt, R. 2, Cedarburg, town of Jackson; Walter Theisen, R. 1, Allenton, town of Addison; Edward Strupp, West Bend, Theresa swamp, town of Wayne, and Delmar Gatzke, Jackson swamp.

Syl Watry, West Bend, got a buck Sunday in the Kewaskum swamp and Arnold Berg, R. 1, Allenton, got one in the Theresa swamp, town of Wayne. Three more deer were reported shot in the county early this week. Successful hunters were Arnold Kutz, Newburg, town of Trenton, Monday; Elroy Schrauth, R. 3, Campbellsport, Rock marsh, town of Wayne, Tuesday; Lawrence Gross, R. 1, Kewaskum, town of Farmington, near St. Michaels, Tuesday.

Some bucks were shot in the Mauthe lake, New Prospect and Dundee areas but we do not have a report on them. One we learned of was a large buck shot by "Chesty" Pesch of the town of Auburn near Mauthe lake Saturday. Quite a few deer were reported to have been registered at the Mauthe lake station during the week.

Few reports have come in from local hunters who returned from the north woods. Many of them were snowbound and were unable to get home in time. We have been informed that successful hunters included Allen Kertcher, Steve Rahn, Ray St. Mary, who shot his buck, and his son Edward, who bagged a camp deer, and Melvin Schaub. Others in the party with the above hunters are not known. We know Oscar Ortman, son Duane and Dorwin Perkins were among those returned empty handed.

Vince Kohn, John Muckerheide and Math Kohn, in company with Clarence Kohn of West Bend, returned with one buck bagged by Clarence. Roger Reindl, Walter Schmidt, Barney Strobel, Harold Westerman and Joe Kudek, who hunted only over the week end, returned with one buck, reportedly shot by Reindl.

There were many, many dozens of other local hunters who went north but we have no reports from them. Unless they inform us, we have no way of knowing of their success or failure. So let's hear from you for our next issue.

Chevrolets to Host Beaver Dam in Lakes Opener Sunday Night

DEFENDING CHAMPIONS HAVE SEVERAL VETERANS BACK, FOUR OTHERS LOST

The Kewaskum Chevrolets, Land o' Lakes league defending champions for the third straight year, will open the 1957-58 basketball season on Sunday night, Nov. 24, by playing host to the always powerful Beaver Dam squad. Game time is 8:15 p. m. and it will take place for the first time in the huge new high school gym, where all the team's home games will be played this season. This will be the first basketball tilt played in the new gymnasium as the school team does not play at home until Tuesday.

Kewaskum's three-year champs will not have the great team this season which ran over all opposition the past few years. Thus the team can expect much tougher going and the competition should be closer in the Lakes circuit. A wide open race is expected.

Manager "Cisco" Backhaus will be "hurting" for players for the first time. Four of his veterans will be lost to the team. They are Bob Dreher, who moved to Florida recently with his family; Big George Hanrahan, who is in the army; Gordie Wierman, who lost his life in an auto accident at the end of last season while returning home from a tournament, and possibly Ellie Ramthun, who may not be able to play because of a knee injury. All four will be greatly missed.

However, several stars of the team will return. They include the old pro, John Tessar, who won the Lakes individual scoring crown last season with 540 points, an average of 28.4 per game. Rounding out the team will be such standout veterans as Augie Bilgo, Don Meisenheimer, Frank Krueger, Russ Rodenkirch and Dick Edwards. Manager Backhaus hopes to add Dave Mertzig to the team. A star on last year's high school team, he would be a welcome addition. Even with Mertzig the squad will have only seven players and help could be used.

Due to a lack of enough players, Kewaskum will not have a team in the Land o' Rivers loop this season. However, the league will operate with eight teams entered.

Eight teams will also comprise the Lakes circuit. Besides Kewaskum and Beaver Dam they are West Bend, Horicon, Mayville, Hartford, Cedarburg and Rosendale. Fox Lake and Green Lake have dropped out. All of these teams will open action this week end, either Saturday night or Sunday. In other tussles West Bend will host Horicon, Mayville goes to Hartford, and Cedarburg is at Rosendale. Besides the Chev's, teams expected to be strong are West Bend, Beaver Dam, Mayville and Hartford.

Kewaskum and Beaver Dam have put up some great battles for first place the past couple of seasons and

Village Tax Rate Will Remain About Same As Last Year

If the budget for the village of Kewaskum is approved as it has been presented the 1957 tax rate will remain about the same as that in 1956, when the rate was \$22.50 per thousand.

The budget hearing will be held on Monday, Dec. 2, at the municipal building.

One reason why the tax rate will remain the same is that the school levy showed an increase of only \$8,500. Also the village tax levy was decreased by approximately \$9,000, thereby balancing the budget. No significant changes are expected in the state and county taxes.

Plan Christmas Mailing Early, Postmaster Asks

Predicting that the Christmas mail this year will set an all time record, Acting Postmaster Harry E. Koch announced his 1957 "Mail Early For Christmas" campaign today.

With Christmas only a little more than a month away, the postmaster reminds us, "It's later than you think!" Most folks have a tendency to wait until December rolls around before they give their Christmas mailing plans a thought!

The postmaster further suggested that right now is the time to take the following steps. Check your Christmas card lists very carefully—make sure that each address includes the full name, street and number, city, zone and state.

He said, also, that it is a good idea to stock up on plenty of stamps, heavy wrapping paper, sturdy corrugated cartons, strong cord, and paper adhesive tape for use in securely packing and wrapping your Christmas gifts. If you'd like to include your Christmas card or letter inside your gift package, just add the appropriate first class mail postage to the postage for the package itself; thus, insuring simultaneous arrival of your gift and greeting.

Keep in mind that only Christmas cards carrying first class three cent, or six cent air mail postage, may include a personal message. Nothing more than a signature is authorized on cards mailed at the two cent third class rate, and be sure your return address is on every Christmas card envelope—this is socially correct, and helps both you and your friends to keep your mailing lists up-to-date.

The postmaster says he is completing advance preparations to handle the Christmas rush. So, now, it is really up to you!

It's important to plan your Christmas mailings so that those Christmas cards and gifts for most distant points are mailed first. Try to get all of your out-of-town cards and gifts into the post office before Dec. 10, and those for nearby points should be mailed by Dec. 15.

Indians Beat Random Lake in 1st Game 54-40

JERRY OPGENORTH SCORES 29 IN TUNE-UP GAME FOR LOOP OPENER

The Kewaskum Indians opened the basketball season with a non-conference game in Random Lake's auditorium Tuesday evening and despite the floor disadvantage, won easily over the Lakers by a 54-40 margin. This was a tune-up game for the Tri-County loop opener with Brandon here on Dec. 6.

Jerry Opgenorth, one of two veterans on the team, got off to an auspicious start and easily copped scoring honors for the night with a total of 29 points, scored on 12 buckets and five free throws. The other veteran on the squad, Mark

Rodenkirch, took second scoring honors with 13 points on five buckets and three gift tosses. Between the two they were responsible for 42 points and got little offensive aid from the rest of the team.

Schmit was top scorer for Random Lake with 13 points, followed by Kluck with 12. The Indians made 10 free throws and their opponents six.

The Indians took an 11-6 advantage at the quarter and led all the way. They tallied 16 points in the second period to 12 for the Lakers,

bringing the halftime margin to 27-18. Kewaskum again outscored Random by far in the third quarter, 15-7, and held a sizable 42-25 lead going into the final stanza. Then substitutes saw most of the action and the losers outscored the winners, 15-12 making the final count 54-40.

Other Tri-County teams also saw non-league action Tuesday. Rosendale defeated Green Lake, 57-37; Lomira lost to Horicon, 49-33, and Oakfield was downed by St. Mary's Springs, 58-48.

The Indians will play another

non-conference contest Tuesday night, Nov. 26, when they will host the strong Oostburg five. This will be the first game in Kewaskum's spacious new gym for the Indians.

LARGE BARN BURNS ON FARM NEAR BOLTONVILLE

A large barn was destroyed by fire Saturday on the Gordon Me-Chain farm about 1½ miles north of Boltonville. The blaze started apparently in a hay mow at the south end of the barn. The cause was not determined.

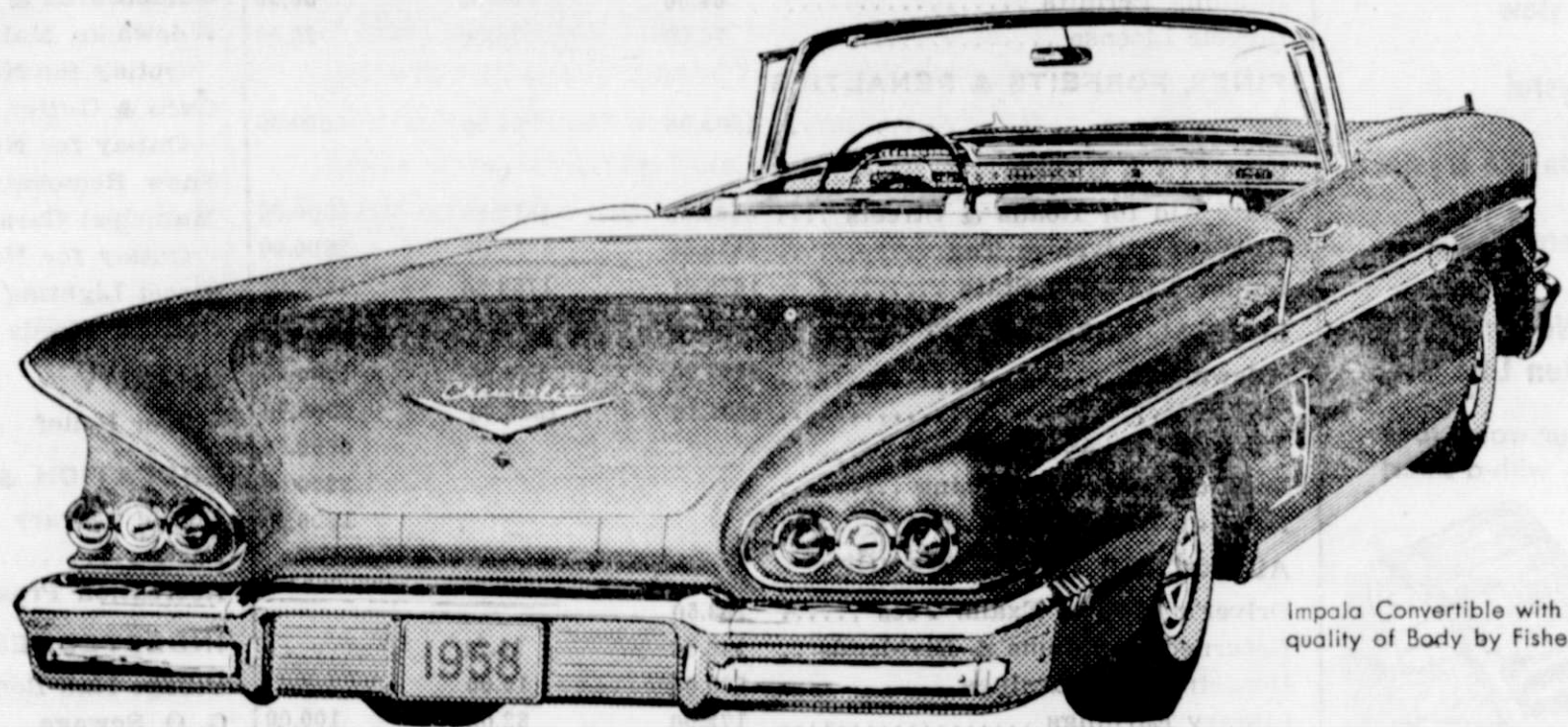

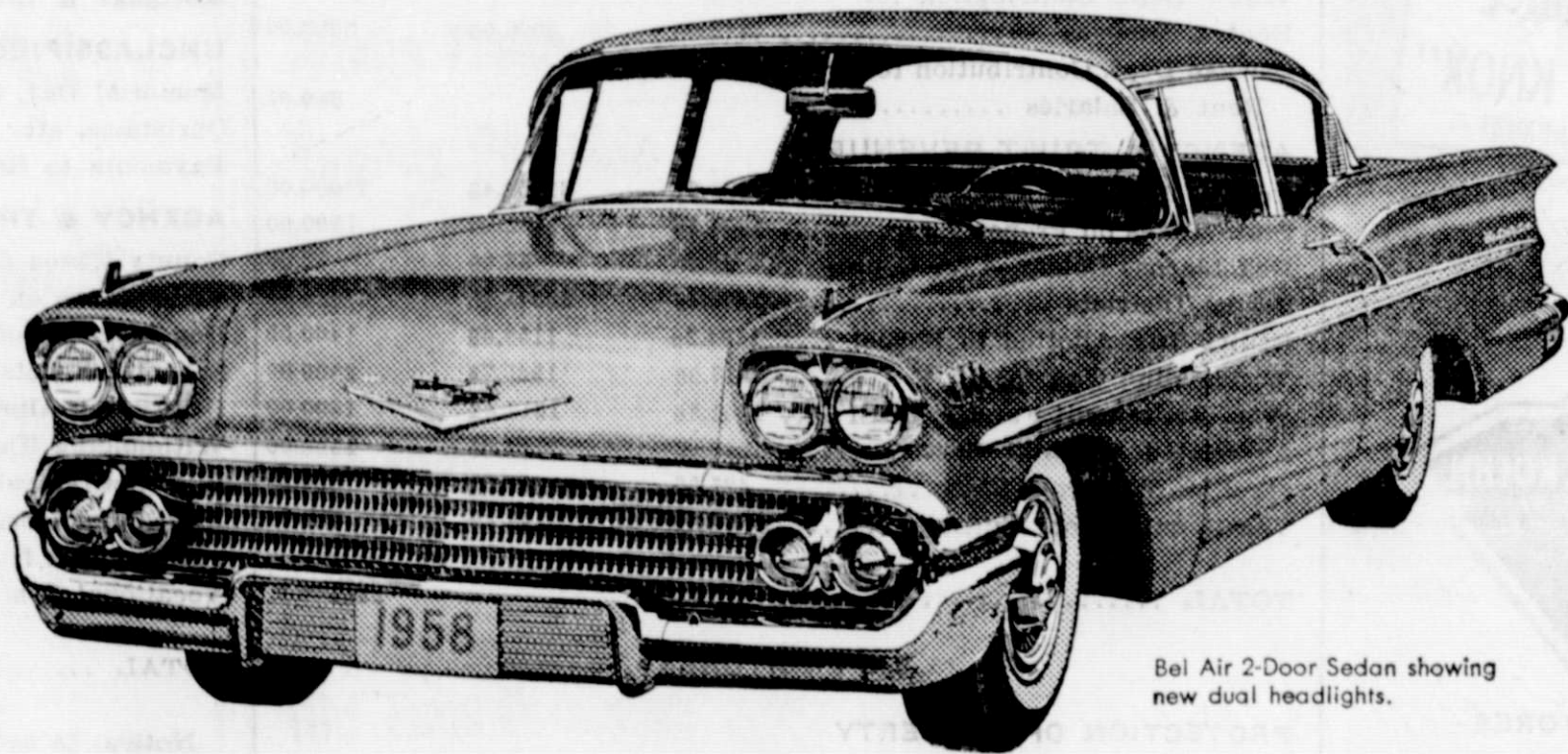

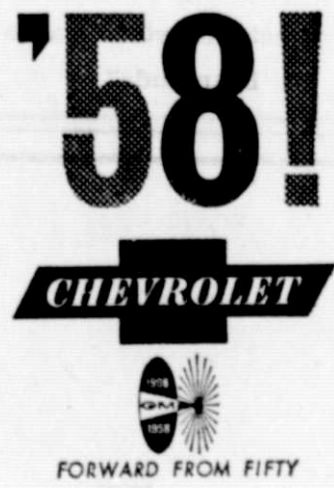

Around the Town

Most of our deer hunters have returned home after their annual trip to the north woods. Lots of them didn't get back as soon as they expected to because of being snow-bound up there. They wished for snow to track the deer but wished too hard as about 15 inches of it fell in some places over the week end and forepart of this week. We southerners get mostly rain.

The deer kill was expected to be almost twice as heavy as last season because of a reported larger number of deer in the north and the permit to hunt any deer for camp meat. But many of the hunters we have seen return and talked to came home empty handed, especially the earlier arrivals. Some of the larger groups had only one or two bucks to show. Others had none and were pretty well disgusted.

In proportion to the number of hunters, we would judge there were as many or more bucks shot in this area as there were in the north. And the local hunters did not go out every day like those upstate, hunting only over the week end or for a couple of hours when time permitted weekdays. Approximately 250,000 hunted in the north compared to a small number around home. But there were many bucks shot hereabouts and most of them were big, well fed ones, while up north 20,717 bucks were counted the first four days. That is an average of about one deer for every 12 hunters, although there were several days still left to hunt. In addition to the 20,717 bucks, 12,528 other deer were bagged under the party permit system.
